DISAGREE AS TO RADCLIFFE COLLEGE.

Opposition to the Request for Its Incorporation in Massachusetts.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 21.—The General Court is asked not to incorporate any degree-conferring college under the name of Radcliffe College, for the present at least. The Society for the Collegiate Instruction of Women asks for a charter for what is called the Annex, but there is opposition, including graduates of the Harvard Annex, as well as many men who are Harvard alumni and believe that women should be admitted to the full privileges of the university.

The 1,600 women of fifteen different colleges who want Harvard degrees for the future graduates of the Annex, and who sign this petition, are evidently in earnest. They petitioned the Harvard Overseers not to make Radcliffe College a sort of pendant to the chain of college and professional schools which make up Harvard University, but these gentlemen could not see their way clear to the granting of full Harvard degrees to women.

The women petitioned the Society for the Collegiate Instruction of Women not to accept a half-and-half sort of relation with Harvard. But the society replied through the President, Mrs. Agassiz, that in effect the proposed arrangement was satisfactory.

from the Secretary of War the full power of deciding as to the location of the approaches of a bridge by providing that a special board be appointed to control the matter.

Mr. Quigg also argued that the property owners in the vicinity of the proposed bridge were strongly opposed to its erection and contended that the bridge ought to be removed to a point further down town. He read from the report of the engineer in the employ of the present company, showing that a bridge could be built with a complete span from shore to shore and without a pier, but that it would cost \$3,000,000 more than the bridge proposed. Mr. Quigg insisted that the present efforts of the company were to save these \$3,000,000.

A week ago a vote was taken on the bill, which resulted in a tie. As twelve members were then present it was decided that this vote should not be regarded as conclusive and further action in that direction was postponed until to-day. Messrs. Brickner (Dem., Wis.) and Wise, (Dem., Va.) who were opposed to the bill last week, voted for it to-day.
