so little about seeing you after all  
I have said I ed not help being very  
much amused. Why else did I send  
you her letter, you ask. I sent it  
for pure mischief bec. you dislike  
her so & bec. I th'd perhaps w'd provoke  
you & bec I was really puzzled how  
to answer it & bec I too th'd it was  
characteristic — but never never  
bec I dreamed of telling her  
Innsbruck — So, I shall expect  
a full apology when we meet  
& I shall not forgive you as grudgingly  
as you did me either.
