ANNUAL REPORT, &c.

The Managers of the Asylum in compliance with the directions of the Contributors, submit the following summary view of the present condition of that Institution.

Pursuant to authority granted by the Contributors at their last meeting, the managers have erected an additional building at the extremity of each wing; principally for the accommodation of the noisy patients. These buildings project four feet in front, and exhibit at each end a corner building 31 feet 4 inches in front, by 28 feet 4 inches in depth, three stories high, exclusive of the basement story, and covered with a slate roof pitching four ways. Wings project from them in a southern direction at right angles to the front. These wings are two stories high, covered with a slate roof, and corresponding with the front wings; they are each 26 feet 8 inches in length or front, by 22 feet 6 inches in width. The basement story of the western building contains an apartment for holding ice 11 feet square in the clear, lined with boards with charcoal between the wall and the lining. It is ten feet below the common cellar floor; and the top is arched with brick. An apartment for washing, 11 feet 6 inches by 19 feet, and the furnace for warming the rooms above with heated air, are in this story. The first story is divided into four rooms, of which three are each 12 feet square. One of these is for a bath room, and the others are for the patients' rooms. A day room 12 feet by 19 feet, occupies the whole width at the southern extremity. Between the three first mentioned rooms and the old wing, there is an entry 6 feet wide in the wing, and 8 feet wide in the corner building, in which is the staircase, and likewise a passage five feet wide from the wings into the yard. The second story contains four rooms, each 12 feet square, for the patients; and an entry, stairway and closets. The third story is divided into two rooms for patients, each 12 feet square, an entry and stairway. From this entry there is a communication with the garret of the wings; a reservoir for holding water to supply the bath room and wash house, is to be placed in the garret

of the new wing. The basement of the eastern building, contains an apartment for smoking meat; and furnaces for warming the rooms above will be placed in this story. The arrangements of the upper stories are similar to those in the western wing. These buildings have been erected with walls entirely distinct from the old buildings, as being the most substantial and the only effectual mode of preventing the transmission of sound. The passage from the front wings is by double doors into the entry leading into the yard. From the opposite side of this entry is a door opening into the entry of the corner building. At the head of the stair way in each story is a door to secure the passage. There are flues in the partition walls for ventilating and warming the rooms; and the windows have iron sashes as in the front wings, except in the third story of the corner buildings where they are to be secured by wire. In some of the rooms there are to be inside shutters wholly to exclude the light. The joists and floors have been rendered and plastered as a security against fire, and the whole has been done in nearly a similar manner to the buildings first erected, with such alterations as more particularly to adapt them for the class of patients they were designed to accommodate. As they are nearly finished, it is probable they will be ready in a few weeks for the reception of the patients. The managers have taken advantage of the presence of the workmen, to have many repairs done which were required in the old building. The money thus expended has it is believed been frugally and advantageously applied. The managers in order to defray these expenses, have found it necessary to borrow the sum of four thousand dollars. This loan has been obtained at an interest of five per cent. As the treasurer had previously paid off two thousand dollars of the old debt owing by the Contributors, the actual addition to our debt is but two thousand dollars.

Since our last report 19 patients have been admitted into the house. The number of patients under care at that time was 37, and since then 15 have been discharged, and 4 have died; leaving in the house at the present time, 37 patients. Of those who have been discharged 8 were recovered, 2 much improved, 2 improved, and in 3 no sensible change could be perceived. Of those who remain, 4 are recovered, 3 much improved, 4 improved, and 26 without

apparent change. Of the deaths which have occurred, one was caused by weakness from over excitement previous to admission, and the others were cases of slow decline of the bodily powers. From the statement of the committee of accounts, it will be seen that the sum which has fallen due for the board &c. of patients, during the year which has now elapsed, exceeds the expenses of the family, and the interest on money borrowed. For the continued prosperity of the institution and the success which has attended its treatment of the insane, we desire to feel grateful to the Supreme Disposer of events.

*Extract from the "Rules for the Management of the Asylum."***OF THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.**

When application for the admission of a patient is made, a certificate, obtained, when practicable, from a physician in the neighbourhood, ought to be submitted to the visiting managers, giving a statement of the case according to the form, and in reply to the queries subjoined.

I do hereby certify, from my own knowledge that
of aged years, is in a state
of insanity, and proper to be received into a house provided
for the relief of persons of that description.

I further certify, that the answers annexed to the following queries are correct, as far as I can judge.

1. How long has the patient been afflicted with insanity?

2. What medical, or other means have been used?

3. Has the patient shown any disposition to injure him or herself, or any other person?

4. Does any other complaint exist?

5. What other circumstances have occurred tending to throw light on the case?

Previous to the admission of such patient, an examination shall be made of the case, by the attending or one of the consulting physicians, and his certificate obtained that such person 'has been examined by him, is found to be deprived of the use of his or her reason, and may with propriety be admitted as a patient into the Asylum:' and the following bond shall be signed by two persons; as sureties, (one of whom must reside in or near Philadelphia,) for the regular payment of such board as may be agreed upon by the visiting managers.

Application is hereby made for the admission of _____ as a patient into the Asylum for the relief of persons deprived of the use of their reason; upon whose admission, we severally engage to provide a sufficiency of suitable clothing for _____ use whilst there; to pay to _____ Superintendent of said Institution, or to his assigns or successor in office _____ dollars per week, for _____ board; to make compensation for all damages done by _____ to the glass, bedding or furniture, and to cause _____ to be removed when discharged; and in the event of death whilst there, to pay the expenses of _____ burial.

If persons becoming sureties shall so prefer, the visiting managers may accept, in lieu of compensation for damages done by patients to the glass, bedding, or furniture, a small additional charge to the board agreed upon.

In case persons at a distance are desirous of having any information respecting the admission of a patient, their letters may be addressed to any of the managers, or to the Superintendent.

OF VISITERS TO THE ASYLUM.

When near relations or particular friends of patients desire to be admitted to see their connexions, application must be made to the Superintendent; or, in his absence, to the attending physician, who may allow such visits when circumstances will admit.

As the general admission of visiters would be improper and injurious to the patients; no persons, except as above, shall be admitted to the apartments occupied by patients, unless introduced by a manager; but, on application to the

Superintendent, they may be shown such parts of the building and appendages as are not so occupied.

ANNUITIES.

A mode of obtaining contributions by annuities, not much known amongst us, but familiar to Friends in England, has been agreed on by the Contributors. On paying any sum of money to the Treasurer, for the use of the Institution, interest of six per cent. thereon, is annually to be paid to the annuitant; at whose decease, the interest money ceases, and the principal remains the property of the Asylum. This mode will probably be convenient to many, who are desirous of promoting the designs of the Institution, and yet do not prefer making any considerable donation during their life time.

FORMS OF LEGACY.

I. Form of a bequest of personal Estate.

“I give and bequeth to A. B. and C. D. and the survivor of them, and the executors and administrators of such survivor, the sum of _____ in trust for the use of an Institution near Philadelphia, known by the name of “The Contributors to the Asylum for the relief of persons deprived of the use of their reason,” and to be paid by the said trustees to the treasurer for the time being, of the said Institution.”

II. Form of a Devise of real Estate.

“I give and devise to A. B. and C. D. and their heirs, all that _____ (here describe the property) together with the appurtenances, to hold to them, the said A. B. and C. D. and the survivor of them, and the heirs of such survivor forever; in trust nevertheless, for the sole use and benefit of an Institution near Philadelphia, known by the name of “The Contributors to the Asylum for the relief of persons deprived of the use of their reason,” and upon this further trust, absolutely to dispose of, and convey the same, either in fee, or for such other estate, and in such way and manner, as the Contributors to the said Asylum shall, at any meeting or meetings, order, direct and appoint.”
