EDW. THOMAS DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Passing of Cedar Lane Resident Mourned by Family and Many Friends

On Friday, December 28, at his late residence on Cedar Lane, Swarthmore, Edward O. Thomas passed away after a long illness.

Born in New York City, he was for many years a resident of Mt. Vernon. He came to Swarthmore to live in 1923. Continued poor health made it necessary for him to go South for the winter seasons and to the mountains for the hottest part of the summers, but he loved his Swarthmore home and was keenly interested in all the town affairs, though unable to take an active part in carrying them on.

Mr. Thomas was also interested in the work of the Friends' Meeting, of which his wife is a member, and was especially drawn to those philanthropic services which brought happiness to children and young people. Only those who knew him well realized how generously he was always helping others.

He is survived by his wife, Margaret Flahler Thomas; two brothers, Henry and George Thomas, of New York, and two sisters, Jessie and Irene Thomas, of Mt. Vernon.

The funeral services, which were held on Wednesday, were strictly private and the interment was at Friends' Southwestern Cemetery, Cardington, Pa.

ALAN VALENTINE NEW PRESIDENT OF ROCHESTER UNIV.

Alan C. Valentine, former assistant professor of English and dean of men at Swarthmore College, was selected by the University of Rochester as its fourth president. He is a former Rhodes scholar, athlete, graduate of Swarthmore and now master of Pierson College at Yale University.

The fourth president of the 84-year-old university will succeed Dr. Rush Rhees whose resignation at 70 remained unaccepted for a year by the board of trustees while a special committee surveyed the educational field to find a successor, examining the qualifications of 101 men.

Mr. Valentine possessed a sympathetic interest in all fields of education and had rare ability in dealing with people.

The university under Dr. Rhees became richly endowed and now stands fifth in the country in financial assets. Besides its liberal arts colleges for men and women, it also has a school for medicine and dentistry.

Mr. Valentine was born at Glen Cove, N. Y., on February 23, 1901, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Post Valentine.

He was graduated from Swarthmore in 1921. While attending that college he played on the varsity lacrosse team in his junior and senior years and was guard on the varsity football team for three years.

Mr. Valentine edited The Swarthmore Phoenix, the campus weekly, The Halcyon, the college year book. He captained the varsity debate team, of which he was a member four years, was president of the men's Student Government Association, and won the Ivy Medal, the highest honor a Swarthmore man can receive.

He belonged to the Book and Key, senior honor society, Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Delta Epsilon and Phi Kappa Psi.

Mr. Valentine was elected a Rhodes scholar with assignment to Balliol College, Oxford, but before going to England he taught in the Wharton School of Business and Finance of the University of Pennsylvania, receiving an honorary M.A. degree there in 1922.

At Oxford he received honors in English language and literature. He holds the Oxford degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts. He was a member of the college and varsity rugby teams for three years, and also played on the lacrosse and tennis teams.

Mr. Valentine was one of the coaches and players of the American Olympic rugby team which won the championship at Paris.

After engaging in special work for the Oxford University Press in Oxford, London and New York, he became assistant professor of English at Swarthmore in 1928. He also served as dean of men and executive secretary of the endowment campaign in 1929-30.

In 1932 he left Swarthmore for Yale to become associate chairman of the Board of Admissions and master of Pierson College. Last year he was made chairman of the board. He is also an honorary member of the Elizabethan Club at Yale.

The new president is director of the Association of American Rhodes Scholars and editor of the official magazine.

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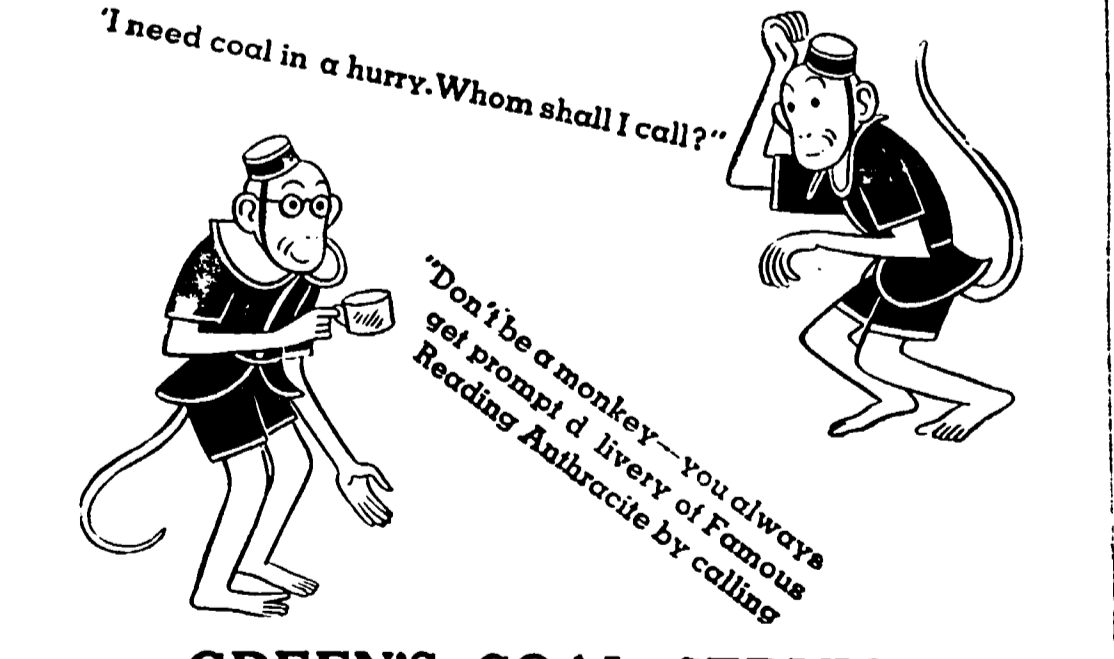
