### seum, Miss Cross Will Speak on Ancient Civilization

At the stated meeting of the Woman's Club next Tuesday, Miss Dorothy Cross, of the University Museum, will give an illustrated lecture on "Queen Shubad and terious Royal Tombs in the Early Cemeteries of Ur. These give evidence of strange sacrificial customs, and are the most spectacular and the most thrilling archaeological discoveries of the past decade. The elaborate gold and silver jewelry, toilet articles and vessels are in their variety and wealth unequalled in Mesopotamia, and in point of age are without parallel anywhere. Selections of these together with cylinder seals and other objects will be displayed in connection with the lecture. Miss Cross has had wide experience in studies along this line. She has served as State Archaeologist for the New Jersey State Museum; and as a fellow of the Laboratory of Anthropology at Santa Fe, she spent a season on a field expedition to the mound sections in Central Illinois. She also spent a season in the study of the Indian Rock Shelters in northern New Jersey. Another year was spent in the field on the University Museum's expedition in northern Iraq. She is now assistant in the Babylonian Section of the University Museum.

### This Month's Meeting of Parent-**Teachers' Association Centers** Around "Scholarships"

The December meeting of the Home and School Association was held Monday evening in the library of the College Avenue school with the president, William Craemer, presiding. In the unavoidable absence of the representative of the National Parent-Teachers' Association from the Washington office, who was originally scheduled as speaker for the evening, Roland G. E. Ullman, vice-president of the Swarthmore Association, was fortunate in securing Dean Frances Blanshard, of Swarthmore College, to supply the vacancy.

Mrs. Blanshard, who talked on "Scholarships," tolds of the various scholarships available at Swarthmore College, how application for them is made and how the committee makes the choice from among the applicants.

Frank R. Morey, supervising principal of the Swarthmore schools, talked of the Home and School Scholarship of \$300 which is given at each commencement time to the pupil fulfilling the requirements for this scholarship, which was established in October, 1926. Mr. Morey told of the other scholarships which have been awarded at the last two or three commencements. They are: Two faculty scholarships, a senior class scholarship, a scholarship from the proceeds of the operetta given under the direction of Miss Doris Van de Bogart, director of music, and Miss Hanna Kirk, teacher of English. Scholarships to University of Virginia and Temple University have been added recently.

Conference with the teachers of the Foreign Language Department followed the meeting.

Next month a joint meeting of the Education Department of the Swarthmore Woman's Club, the League of Women Voler, and the Pieme and Sch ciation will be held at the school. Mrs. Theodore W. ### proach in Teaching Religion to the Young Child

An audience of over one hundred and thirty parents and teachers listened with profound interest to a talk on religious education of young children given Wednesday evening in the Woman's Club House, by Mrs. Sophia Fahs, of the Riverside Church in New York.

To explore religion, rather than to ex pound it was the essential theme of Mrs. Fahs' quiet, thought-provoking talk. The old idea that religion is a set, fixed dogma that we can cram into our children should change to the belief that it is instead, a growing, living thing to be explored, to find out more about.

Each of us is a separate, lonely individual—each of us has to face the Unknown in Life and our religion is in just that-how we face the Unknown.

This method of teaching religion does not mean simply to explore the Bible or Christian thought, but to explore wherever Life is found-to study how other peoples in history have dealt with the Unknown-to learn of other great leaders as well as Jesus-to make a study of superstition and omens and different religious systems with the point of view that they are merely weak crutches whereby man attempts to fortify himself.

A concrete example of Mrs. Fahs' method of approach to religion in her Fourth Grade class was a study of Water-the wonderful changes it undergoes, man's in Biblical times and in our day, ending with a microscopic study of a drop of water, thus acquainting children early with Wednesday in December. a force in Nature, with a part of the Unknown in Life.

Perhaps the most unusual of Mrs. Fahs ideas was her statement that parents should not think that teaching a young child to are things he needs to do before he prays. # WOMEN HEAR L.W.V. **PROGRAM AT CLUB**

# Lovett Dewees Speak on Various Phases of Birth Control

On Tuesday, at the Woman's Club House, the League of Women Voters presented to the women of Swarthmore two speakers from the Pennsylvania Birth Control Federation. Mrs. R. Dale Fitzmiller, executive secretary of the Federation, spoke from the standpoint of social and relief work, and Dr. Lovett Dewees, chairman of the Medical Committee on Clinics of the Birth Control Federation; spoke on medical conditions.

Certain glands, Dr. Dewees said, are depleted during the childbearing period and experimental study has shown that it takes two summers before the mother's condition becomes normal. Summer sunshine seems to be a necessary aid to recovery. These studies have been made with normal, healthy women Dr. Dewces presented telling statistics on the death rate of children in the first year of life. Children born a year apart show a much higher death rate in infancy than those children where the interval of time between births is longer. These statistics showed clearly the relation of the health of the mother to her child.

Social agencies, such, for example, as hospitals, are prohibited by law from giving information which is needed not only for the individual's care and protection, but for the protection of society at large. Recent studies throughout the United States show that the birth rate among families on relief is 60 per cent higher than the rest of the population.

The League of Women Voters was asked to work for more intelligent legislation that would lighten the social, physical, psychological and economic conditions of vast numbers of people.

Light and Power Rate Become Effective January 5

The Philadelphia Electric Company has announced rate changes that will effect reduction of more than three-quarters of a million dollars in the annual bills of a class of the Company's customers exceeding 110,000 in number. The changes relate to the charges for

general light and power service, known as the retail light and power rate (Rate "RLP") and will go into effect on January 5 next, it being necessary under the Public Service Company law for thirty days to elapse between the filing of the rate and its effective date. Any customer whose monthly use of


electricity exceeds the amount allowed under the minimum bill established by the RLP rate will benefit by the changes. In detail the changes are as follows:

The second step of Rate RLP is reduced from five and one-half cents per kilowatt hour to five cents per kilowatt hour. In cases where joint residential and general use of current prevails, the demand factor of the residence part of the will be reduced from 0.5 kilowatt to 0.4 kilowatt-a 20 per cent reduction. This will benefit all customers who now take residence service in connection with service supplied for other purposes. Between 35,000 and 40,000 accounts are affectedmostly where residence service is supplied along with service to small stores, barber shops, delicatessens, office quarters, and the like. Over 3,000 professional men, principally doctors and dentists, will benefit. Customers who desire to have their demand measured instead of determined from

a record of the amount of load which they have installed, will receive the benefit of a reduction from 60 cents per month to 30 cents in the charge for the demand meter. Customers who have their demand measured have been required to pay on the basis of not less than 90 per cent of the

greatest demand established within the year. The present rate change reduces this requirement to 75 per cent. 4. A reduction from 90 per cent to 75 per cent of the greatest measured demand of the preceding eleven months, used in calculating the minimum billing demand.

> bills first coming due after January 5, 1935, will be pro-rated on the basis of the number of days of use before and after the effective date of the new rate.

Prior to March 2, 1933, when the present rate schedule went into effect, changing conditions had developed some inequities in the application of the company's tariffs as between customers in the retail light and power class, and also between certain customers in this class and residential customers. It was desirable at that time to eliminate those inequities, but in doing so changes were required which resulted in increasing the bills to some customers. All other customers in this classification received reductions in proportion to their use under the new rate.

An analysis of the experience with the previous rate reduction and changes of application indicate a net saving of approximately \$864,000 to the group. This reduction, together with the present reduction, will represent a total net decrease in rates of more than \$1.600.000.

Tariffs giving effect to these reductions have been filed with the Public Service Commission and also are on file in the offices of the company at which latter places they are available for examination upon request.

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



Royal Tombs near Ur. These explorations have vielded startling facts about an ancient civilization existing in that region about 3000 B. C. The one tomb which was of most importance because it had been absolutely undisturbed for these five thousand years or more, was that of Queen Shubad. In the outer chamber of this tomb were found the skeletons of more than sixty attendants, together with beautifully ornamented harps, gold and silver cups, daggers, and countless other personal possessions. There were even the remains of a cart and two asses in this tomb. Whether the attendants entered the tomb and there drank poison, or whether they were placed there after death is not known. The speaker showed slides of the remains, and she also had a display of many of the actual pieces of gold and silver jewelry, oilet accessories, and alabaster vases These articles show much fine work, and

are elaborately decorated with carnelian and lapis lazuli. All the materials for these things must have been transported not less than eight hundred miles, as they were not to be found in that region. No explanatory writings or tablets were found ; in these tombs, so there is no key to the social and political conditions of the time; (Continued on Page 8)



Royal Tombs near Ur. These explorations have vielded startling facts about an ancient civilization existing in that regionabout 3000 B. C. The one tomb which was of most importance because it had been absolutely undisturbed for these five thousand years or more, was that of Queen Shubad. In the outer chamber of this tomb were found the skeletons of more than sixty attendants, together with beautifully ornamented harps, gold and silver cups, daggers, and countless other personal possessions. There were even the remains of a cart and two asses in this tomb. Whether the attendants entered the tomb

and there drank poison, or whether they were placed there after death is not known. The speaker showed slides of the remains. and she also had a display of many of the actual pieces of gold and silver jewelry. toilet accessories, and alabaster vases. These articles show much fine work, and are elaborately decorated with carnelian and lapis lazuli. All the materials for these things must have been transported not less than eight hundred miles, as they were not to be found in that region. No Aplanatory writings or tablets were found in these tombs, so there is no key to the social and political conditions of the time

May I insert here an editorial from a Philadelphia paper during the recent drought:

". . . For two months there was no rain. . . . Four days ago the Cheyenne Indians performed a traditional rain dance. That night it began to rain. Science, no doubt, can explain that certain atmospheric conditions had changed before the rain dance was begun. But science will have no truck with rain-making rites. Which is quite all right for science. But the Indians had primitive faith, and the white folk saw the rain. Indeed, as the Hopi Indians have shown repeatedly with their own successful rain ceremonies, there must be things in heaven and earth which no man can comprehend. Drought is one of them; faith, for all our glib talk about it, is another."

# **COUNCIL APPROVES BUDGET FOR 1935** Budget for Coming Year Set at

Final approval of the 1935 budget was

authorized by Council at its regular meeting Wednesday evening, following the report and recommendations of Harry L. Miller, the very able chairman of the Finance Committee. The figure set for next year's expenditures is \$39,389,00. Although the tax rate for 1935 will not be established until early next year, the budget adopted assures the same tax rate as in 1934.

The total amount of the budget is divided among the following divisions: General Borough expenses, \$5,002.00; Highways, \$6.330.00; Police Department, \$9,-515.00; Fire Department, \$4,706.00; Health and Sanitation, \$2,032.00; Public Properties, \$2,914.00; Lighting, \$5,700.00; Sewer, \$1,890.00, and Sundries, \$1,300.00. The total budget allows the addition of \$2,000.00 to the Highway Committee for maintenance and street repairs, and

\$1,000 to the Property Committee for necessary improvements and repairs. The total budget of \$39,389.00 is slightly larger than the 1934 budget of \$37.680.00. The close of this year shows a surplus of \$1,000.00 from the 1934 budget and this, Club to Have Puppet Show on is about \$1,000.00 more than the 1935 budget figures, gives Council a very good margin.
