DR. JAMES BOGARDUS **APPOINTED BY STATE**

Receives Commission as Deputy Secretary of Department of Forests and Waters

The appointment of Dr. James F. Bogardus, of Swarthmore, as Deputy Secretary of the Department of Forests and Waters, effective March 25, was announced last Friday by Secretary Ralph M.

Until his appointment by Governor Earle, Doctor Bogardus had been Assistant Professor of Geography at the University of Pennsylvania, and has been granted a leave of absence from the University to fill his new appointment.

He is particularly fitted to fill an executive position in a conservation department of the State government because for many years his special field of interest and work has been the utilization of land and

Doctor Bogardus was born in New York City in 1896. He was graduated from the George School in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, in 1917; received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Swarthmore College in 1921; and had conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Philosophy by the University of Pennsylvania in 1927.

Dr. Bogardus recently resigned as president of the Young Democratic Club of Delaware County. He is a member of Kappa Sigma and Phi Beta Kappa fraternities.

His experience in education has been wide and varied. He has been a member of the faculties of the University of Cincinnati, of Swarthmore College, and since 1923 of the University of Pennsyl-State College each summer for the past nine years. He has traveled extensively both in the United States and Europe.

SPILLWAYS

Water is stored in vast reservoirs, so that you will always have plenty of water ... even during long dry spells. But, because of heavy rains, and the resulting floods, these reservoirs might become too full and be overflowed, unless provision were made to allow the excess water to escape.

Spillways are built into the dams for this purpose and are, in effect, safety valves. A spillway is a section or length of the dam, lower than the rest, over which the water may flow before the water level reaches the top of the main structure.

A storage reservoir has no fixed or permanent water level. In times of drought and low stream flow, the level of the reservoir drops as the water is drawn off. When heavy rains and high stream flows come, the water rises until it reaches the level of the spillway, over which surplus water escapes.

AN ORDINANCE levying a sixth annual special tax or assessment on all assessable property within a certain tract of land annexed to the Borough of Swarthmore by virtue of Ordinance No. 310, approved November 21st, 1929. Situate in the Southeasterly part of the Borough, sometimes known as the Kimmel Tract, for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough for costs and expenses attendant upon said annexation and the adjustment of indebtedness incurred thereby, being the sixth of ten annual assessments for this purpose.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Borough of Swarthmore, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same: SECTION 1. For the year 1935 there shall be levied and assessed against all assessable property within the tract of land herein called the Kimmel Tract, more particularly described hereafter, over and above the general Borough Tax both for current expenditures and sinking fund, and over and above all other taxes or assessments lawfully assessed against pressure. or assessments lawfully assessed against prop-erty within the said tract, a special tax or assessment at the rate of two mills on each dollar of assessed valuation for the purpose hereinafter set forth.

SECTION 2. The tract of land in the Borough of Swarthmore on which this special tax or assessment is hereby levied for the year 1935 is Situate in the Southeasterly portion of the Borough of Swarthmore, County of Delaware and State of Pennsylvania, having been annexed to said Borough by Ordinance No. 310, approved November 21st, 1929, and is described more particularly in said Ordinance No. 310, and also in Ordinance No. 314, approved March 24th, 1930, levying the first of the said annual assessments.

SECTION 3. The foregoing special tax or assessment is levied pursuant to the provisions of Section 5 of said Ordinance No. 310, approved November 21st, 1929, and is levied as the sixth of ten annual installments to be collected out of the property in the said tract for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough of Swarthmore for any and all amounts found to be due to the Township of Ridley by way of adjustment of indebtedness, and to pay any other person or corporation, and all incidental fees and costs involved in the annexation proceeding, or growing out of the same. Council reserves the right to determine the time, manner and amount of future installments over the said period of ten years until the total amount of said costs and expenses has been collected from the present or future owners of properties comprised within said tract.

Through an oversight an omission occurred in the report last week of the Annual Concert of the Woman's Club Chorus. They were branches in Springfield, Wallingford, Cockboth beautifully interpreted by the chorus, and the effective solo work of Mrs. Robert E. Carels in the first one was especially noteworthy.

Perhaps the feeling that Health and Welfare is rather a prosaic subject accounts for the fact that meetings for the discussion of such topics usually draw smaller audiences than programs with more distinctly "cultural" or entertainment appeal. 

### BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE No. 367

AN ORDINANCE levying a fifth annual special tax or assessment on all assessable property within a certain tract of land annexed to the Borough of Swarthmore by virtue of Ordinance No. 322, approved Jan-uary 5, 1981, SITUATE in the Southerly part of the Borough, sometimes known as the Frank Smith Tract, also as "Swarthmore Estates," for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough for costs and expenses attendant nnexation and the future ad justment of indebtedness incurred thereby, being the fifth of ten annual assessments for this purpose.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Borough of Swarthmore, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the

SECTION 1. For the year 1935 there shall be levied and assessed against all assessable property within the tract of land herein called the Frank Smith Tract, more particularly described hereafter, over and above the general Borough tax, both for current expenditures and sinking fund, and over and above all other taxes or assessments lawfully assessed against property within the said tract, a special tax assessment at the rate of seven mills on each dollar of assessed valuation, for the purposes hereinafter set forth.

SECTION 2. The tract of land in the Borough of Swarthmore on which this special tax or assessment is hereby levied for the year 1935, is SITUATE in the southerly portion of the Borough of Swarthmore, County of Delaware and State of Pennsylvania, being bounded on the North by Yale Avenue, on the West by Cornell Avenue, on the South by Leiperville Road, on the Southeast by Michigan Avenue, and on the East and Northeast by lands of John S. Campbell, et al, said tract consisting of 79.334 acres, more or less, of which 41.567 acres, more or less, were formerly situate in Springfield Township, and 37.767 acres, more or less, were formerly situate in Ridley Township, the entire tract, known as the Frank Smith Tract, and also as "Swarthmore Estates," having been annexed to said Borough by Ordinance No. 322, approved January 5, 1931.

SECTION 8. The foregoing special tax or assessment is levied pursuant to the provisions of Section 5 of said Ordinance No. 322, and is levied as the fifth of ten annual installments to be collected out of property in the said tract for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough of Swarthmore for any and all amounts found to be due to the Township of Ridley and/or to the Township of Springfield, by way of adjustment of indebtedness, and to any other person or corporation, and all incidental fees and costs. Council reserves the right to determine the time, manner and amount of future installments over the said period of ten years until the total amount of aid costs and expenses has been collected from the present or future owners of properties comprised within said tract.
