However, there could hardly be a subject more vital to the intelligent women of this or any community, and it is hoped that there will be a large attendance at the regular meeting of the Swarthmore Woman's Club next Tuesday afternoon to hear and see an interesting program which has been prepared by the Health and Welfare Section, of which Mrs. Joseph Seal is chair-

man. Mrs. A. F. Jackson, president of the Community Health Society of Central Delaware County, will show some moving pictures which are entertaining as well as instructive; and Mr. Prentice Murphy, executive secretary of the Children's Bureau of Philadelphia, will speak on some present-day problems. Mrs. William T. Johnson and Mrs. Howard J. Dingle will be the hostesses. Tea will be served.

"From 1915 to 1930 Mrs. Thomas Safford was the capable and deeply interested president. It was largely through her efforts that Swarthmore's exhibit at the Sesqui-Centennial was outstanding. In 1930 Mrs. William West became the efficient and beloved president here.

"The Swarthmore branch has organized branches in Springfield, Wallingford, Cockranville and Tonawanda, N. Y. During the war it supported a French war orphan. "A word as to its national history,—The Needlework Guild was founded in America, in Philadelphia, by Mrs. John Wood Stewart, until a few years ago, its president. At one time Mrs. Safford of Swarthmore was the national publicity chairman. The national branch started with a few girls, who inspired by the stories brought to them by Mrs. Stewart's aunt who had been in England, home of Needlework Guild, began to sew and organize. Among these was Miss Rosamund Binder, present most capable national secretary. At present the other national officers are Mrs. Truman Newbury, Honorary President, and Mrs. Thomas J. Preston, Acting President.

## The Correct Tax Penalties

Penalties on 1934 unpaid taxes were inaccurately explained in last week's SWARTHMOREAN. The correct penalties follow. A penalty of 5 percent after December 31, 1934, plus interest at 6 percent per annum after May 1, 1935, on the poll tax, county tax, poor tax and securities tax. One-half of one percent per month or part thereof after December 31, 1934, plus interest at 6 percent per annum beginning May 1, 1935, is the amount of the penalty on Boro taxes, which include taxes on the Swarthmore Estates and the Kimmel Estates. The school taxes on real estate and the per capita tax carry a penalty of 5 percent after October 1, 1934, plus interest at 6 percent per annum beginning May 1, 1935.

## BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE No. 367

AN ORDINANCE levying a fifth annual special tax or assessment on all assessable property within a certain tract of land annexed to the Borough of Swarthmore by virtue of Ordinance No. 322, approved January 5, 1931. SITUATE in the Southerly part of the Borough, sometimes known as the Frank Smith Tract, also as "Swarthmore Estates," for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough for costs and expenses attendant upon said annexation and the future adjustment of indebtedness incurred thereby, being the fifth of ten annual assessments for this purpose.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Borough of Swarthmore, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same:

SECTION 1. For the year 1935 there shall be levied and assessed against all assessable property within the tract of land herein called the Frank Smith Tract, more particularly described hereafter, over and above the general Borough tax, both for current expenditures and sinking fund, and over and above all other taxes or assessments lawfully assessed against property within the said tract, a special tax assessment at the rate of seven mills on each dollar of assessed valuation, for the purposes hereinafter set forth.

SECTION 2. The tract of land in the Borough of Swarthmore, on which this special tax or assessment is hereby levied for the year 1935, is SITUATE in the southerly portion of the Borough of Swarthmore, County of Delaware and State of Pennsylvania, being bounded on the North by Yale Avenue, on the West by Cornell Avenue, on the South by Leiperville Road, on the Southeast by Michigan Avenue and on the East and Northeast by lands of John S. Campbell, et al, said tract consisting of 79.334 acres, more or less, of which 41.667 acres, more or less, were formerly situate in Springfield Township, and 37.667 acres, more or less, were formerly situate in Ridley Township, the entire tract, known as the Frank Smith Tract, and also "Swarthmore Estates" having been annexed to said Borough by Ordinance No. 322, approved January 5, 1931.

SECTION 3. The foregoing special tax or assessment is levied pursuant to the provisions of Section 5 of said Ordinance No. 322, and is levied as the fifth of ten annual installments to be collected out of property in the said tract for the purpose of reimbursing the Borough of Swarthmore for any and all amounts found to be due to the Township of Ridley and/or to the Township of Springfield, by way of adjustment of indebtedness, and to any other person or corporation, and all incidental fees and costs. Council reserves the right to determine the time, manner and amount of future installments over the said period of ten years until the total amount of said costs and expenses has been collected from the present or future owners of properties comprised within said tract.

AN ORDINANCE fixing the rate of taxation for the year 1935 for Borough purposes, and for the payment of interest on the debt of the Borough, and the creation of a Sinking Fund.

SECTION 1. There shall be levied against all assessable property within the Borough, a tax rate of seven mills on each dollar of assessed valuation for general Borough purposes.

Section 2. There shall be levied against all assessable property within the Borough, a tax rate of two and one-half mills on each dollar of the assessed valuation for the payment of interest on the debt of the Borough, and for the creation of a Sinking Fund.
