## RECENT GIFTS TO FRIENDS LIBRARY

### Swarthmore College Historical Museum Enriched by Quaker Women's Donations

Among the recent gifts received by the museum connected with the Friends Historical Library of Swarthmore College are relics of two historic Quaker women whose lives have incalculably enriched this vicinity.

Three interesting memorials of Susan B. Anthony and the great struggle for human suffrage, have been acquired by gift of her niece, Miss Lucy E. Anthony, of Moylan. One of these is a facsimile of the "Declaration and Pledge of the Women of the United States Concerning their Right to, and Use of, the Elective Franchise." This was "Composed and Engrossed for Signatures by Isabella Beecher Hooker, in the City of Washington, D.C., U.S.A., February 22, 1871". It bears a pleasing portrait of Isabella (one of the famous Beecher children), and is signed by Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Lucretia Mott, Julia Ward Howe, Dr. Mary E. Walker, and eight other pioneer suffragists.

Accompanying this document, there came a gilt-framed portrait-group of seven of Susan B. Anthony's closest associates. Lucretia Mott is in the center of the galaxy, while clustering around her are Harriet Beecher Stowe, Maria W. Chapman, Abby E. Foster, Antoinette Brown, Lucy Stone, and Lydia Maria Child.

Accompanying these gifts was a third connected with Miss Anthony, namely, a Resolution presented to her by the National Woman Suffrage Association at its convention in Washington, in January, 1883, just before her visit to the women of Europe. It testifies to the association's "appreciation of the life-long devotion of Susan B. Anthony to the Cause of Women!" and "acknowledges her as the chief inspirer of women in their struggle for personal liberty, for civil equity and for political equality."

A few weeks before the recent death of Mrs. Lucretia Longshore Blankenburg, she brought to this library ten or a dozen Friends' books which had long been in her collection; and she bequeathed to it the Quaker bonnet, shawl, and two lace caps which had been worn by her grandmother, the wife of Samuel Myers, of Bucks County, Pa.

For many years, her devoted service in several Friendly "concerns" brought her the popular title of the "Grand Old Lady of Philadelphia"; and numerous prizes, testimonial dinners and other public expressions testified to the love and veneration which Philadelphians cherished for her and for her husband, "the Reform Mayor", a worthy successor to the founder of the City of Brotherly love.

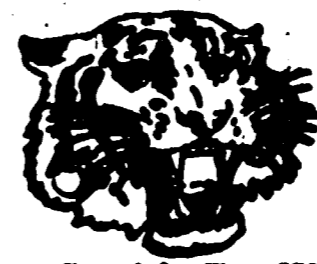

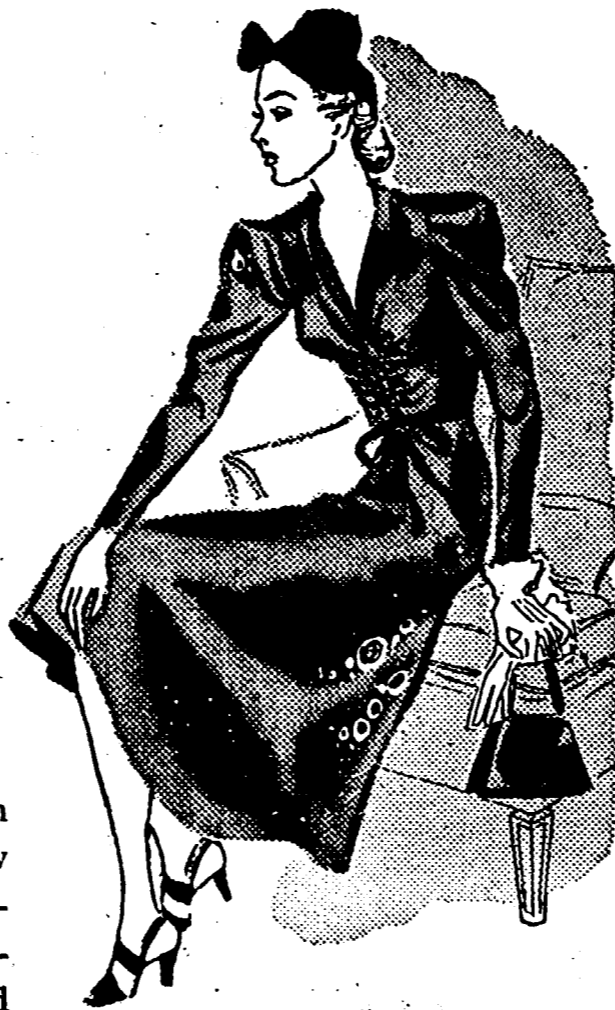

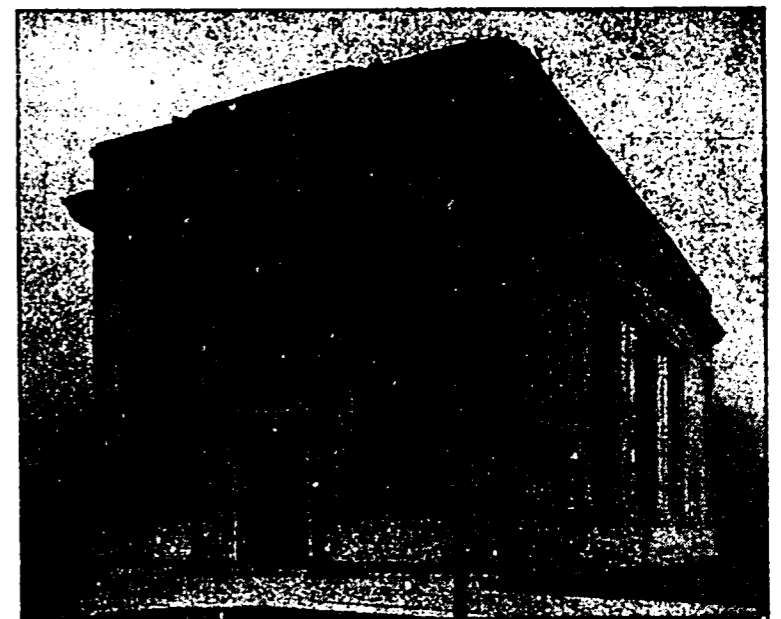

**RECENT GIFTS TO FRIENDS LIBRARY**

**Swarthmore College Historical Museum Enriched by Quaker Women's Donations**

Among the recent gifts received by the museum connected with the Friends Historical Library of Swarthmore College are relics of two historic Quaker women whose lives have incalculably enriched this vicinity.

Three interesting memorials of Susan B. Anthony and the great struggle for human suffrage, have been acquired by gift of her niece, Miss Lucy E. Anthony, of Moylan. One of these is a facsimile of the "Declaration and Pledge of the Women of the United States Concerning their Right to, and Use of, the Elective Franchise." This was "Composed and Engrossed for Signatures by Isabella Beecher Hooker, in the City of Washington, D.C., U.S.A., February 22, 1871". It bears a pleasing portrait of Isabella (one of the famous Beecher children), and is signed by Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Lucretia Mott, Julia Ward Howe, Dr. Mary E. Walker, and eight other pioneer suffragists.

Accompanying this document, there came a gilt-framed portrait-group of seven of Susan B. Anthony's closest associates. Lucretia Mott is in the center of the galaxy, while clustering around her are Harriet Beecher Stowe, Maria W. Chapman, Abby E. Foster, Antoinette Brown, Lucy Stone, and Lydia Maria Child.

Accompanying these gifts was a third connected with Miss Anthony, namely, a Resolution presented to her by the National Woman Suffrage Association at its convention in Washington, in January, 1883, just before her visit to the women of Europe. It testifies to the association's "appreciation of the life-long devotion of Susan B. Anthony to the Cause of Women!" and "acknowledges her as the chief inspirer of women in their struggle for personal liberty, for civil equity and for political equality."

A few weeks before the recent death of Mrs. Lucretia Longshore Blankenburg, she brought to this library ten or a dozen Friends' books which had long been in her collection; and she bequeathed to it the Quaker bonnet, shawl, and two lace caps which had been worn by her grandmother, the wife of Samuel Myers, of Bucks County, Pa.

For many years, her devoted service in several Friendly "concerns" brought her the popular title of the "Grand Old Lady of Philadelphia"; and numerous prizes, testimonial dinners and other public expressions testified to the love and veneration which Philadelphians cherished for her and for her husband, "the Reform Mayor", a worthy successor to the founder of the City of Brotherly love.
