## HIGH SCHOOL BACCALAUREATE

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On Thursday, June 9, at 8:15 P. M. the 43rd annual Commencement will be held in Clothier Memorial Hall, when the largest class, 84, in the history of the school will be graduated. Admission will be by ticket only. The graduating class will wear caps and gowns for the first time, the boys wearing black, the girls white. The Commencement program is as follows:

## Gets League of Nations' Prize

Word has just been received at Swarthmore High School that William S. Me-gonigal, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Me-gonigal, of Chester, and a member of the Junior Class of Swarthmore High School, is the recipient of the first Pennsylvania prize of \$25 for his paper submitted in the High School Examination Contest of the League of Nations, sponsored by the League of Nations Association.

Miss Margaret B. Hamel, head of the history department of Swarthmore High School, supervised the Swarthmore pupils.

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### Exceptionally Large Turn Out at Annual Parade and Services This Week

The increased attendance Monday morning when Swarthmore honored her war dead at the annual Memorial Day services was thought by many to be due to the wide spread interest in the recently organized High School Band, which was participating in its first community event.

Surpassing all expectations as to their newly acquired accomplishments, the Band marched west on Park avenue, instruments ablaze, to the Borough green, where the members took their stand. Not only parents and friends, but everyone felt high enthusiasm and pride in these youngsters.

The Rev. Thomas A. Meryweather, Chaplain of the Harold Ainsworth Post, gave the prayer at the Memorial Tablet. Scoutmaster A. P. Willis called the roll of those who have passed on. As each name was sounded a Boy Scout came forward and placed a flag at one of the Legion markers before the Tablet.

After the setting of the memorial wreath by ex-Commander Robert T. Bair, a salute by a firing squad of United States Marines, and "Taps", the High School Band struck up "America" and citizens joined in singing.

Commander J. Paul Brown turned the exercises over to the chairman of the Memorial Day committee, Guenther H. Froebel, and Mr. Froebel directed the formation of the parade to East-lawn Cemetery. Here, at the grave of Charles F. Seymour, the Rev. J. Jarden Guenther made the invocation and led in prayer.

Burgess John H. Pitman delivered the address of the day, leading up to a quotation of an esteemed associate, "a man's life is not measured by how many years he lives, but by what he does and how well he does it." This declaration, made during the World War by a man with two sons at the front, formed the theme of Mr. Pitman's constructive talk. "All of us are asked to serve now by living orderly intelligent lives. What are we doing to make our community, our state, our nation a better place in which to live? What are we doing to train the coming generation to avoid the mistakes of our generation? Peace has its trials and battles as well as war. 'Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty' is still a verity.

"Patriotism is not a feeling to be aroused only in times of great national emergencies. It is not confined to lines drawn upon a map. Nor is it bounded by the ages."

Commander Brown spoke on the Legion's stand for Peace. Charles F. Seymour, Jr., placed the wreath at the grave on behalf of the Post. There was a repeated volley and "Taps", then Mr. Guenther pronounced the benediction, and the assembled throng started homeward. A large number followed the parade as it retraced the length of Park avenue to Harvard, turned left to Chester road and proceeded along that thoroughfare to the railroad and down Park avenue, disbanding again at the starting point.

The High School Band, having withdrawn in lieu of the more experienced marching musicians hired by the Legion, waited at the Bank and, as the parade filed by, played its closing selection.

The Legion Auxiliary, Red Cross, Company H Old Guard, Woman's Club, Business Association, Rotary Club, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Boy Scouts, Cubs and Fire Company all lent their representation to the parade. Borough police officers standing at attention guarded the crossings and saluted the passing colors.

Thus ended the official exercises, although the Fire Company was busy an hour or so longer gratifying the cherished wish of each Swarthmore youngster whose heart yearns for the annual ride on a fire engine.

(Continued from Page One) The further function of a mural painting is to go beyond the purely decorative is to communicate something of the spirit of man and of the times in which the work is done; something of the circumstances of life that have a meaning for the majority of people. Hence the devotion of these spaces to the common, the universal aspects of contemporary life rather than to the exotic or the romantic. Such things as work and unempowerment and the great structures of dams are all familiar to us, conditioning our lives and thoughts which we have been close to the physical reality or not. Thus I have painted them, and to the men and women involved I have given the men and character of people we have known and worked with, loved or mourned, as likewise I have depicted them with that essential dignity and the will or the resignation with which people everywhere meet the fortunes of circumstance.

Dealing with life itself and derived from that life that is familiar to all of us, it is inevitable that the paintings should trace on the minds of people looking at them views as divergent as the antipodal opinions that men everywhere arrive at regarding the same reality. That there should be discussion and differing opinions over the work, therefore, is to be expected, and in the degree in which it may cause people to ponder the realities of our time may lie the measure of its contribution to the real educational and cultural mission of the college.

"The artist has dramatized the contemporary civilization in which we all share," declared an editorial of the Philadelphia Bulletin, Friday evening. The editorial compared Egleson with the Italian painters, Leonardo Da Vinci and Michelangelo, pointing out that all three began their careers as engineers.

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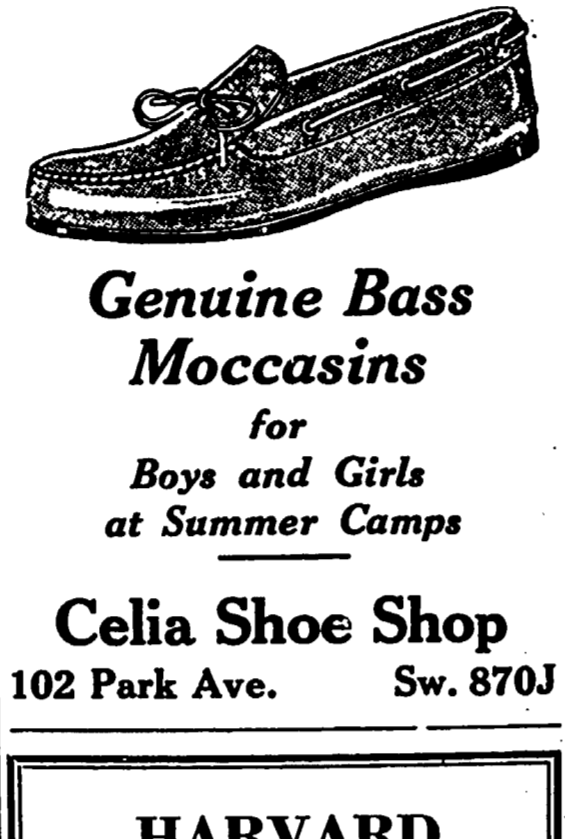
