Section IX — Such annual sewer rates and charges shall be a lien on the property charged with the payment thereof from the first day of September of each and every year when same are due and payable and if not paid on or before December 1st of any year, may be collected by the Borough Solicitor by action in Assumpsit in the name of the Borough against the owner of the property charged, or by distress of personal property on the premises, or by a lien filed in the nature of a municipal lien. Section XI—The net revenue of such sewer rentals, after payment of all operating and maintenance expenses, including engineering, inspection and legal services in relation to the said public sewer system, including outfall sewers, pumping stations, sewage treatment works, and the like, and all sums payable to Central Delaware County Authority, or other organization representing municipalities coopaware County Authority, or other organ-ization representing municipalities coop-erating in the collection and disposition of sewage, shall be paid into the general fund of the Borough for the uses and pur-poses described by the Acts of Assembly relating to sewer rentals.

Section XII — Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any of the rules and regulations prescribing the method of using or connecting with said sewers, shall be liable to a fine or penalty of \$10.00 for each and every offense, to be collected for the use of the Borough in such manner as fines and penalties are now collectible. And whenever such person shall have been notified that he or it is violating the provisions of such ordinance, each day that he or it shall continue such violation after such notification shall constitute a separate offense, punishable by a like fine or penalty to be collected as above.

Marriage Council Worker Disucation Before Local Women

Mrs. Norman Freeman of the Philadelphia Marriage Council addressed the stated meeting of the League of Women Voters in Bond Memorial on Thursday afternoon, December 15. Mrs. Freeman discussed the advisory and educational program of the Council very freely. Its purpose she defined as the preparation of young people for marriage both from the preventive aspect of public health and the economic

Twenty active marriage councils now exist in the U.S., though Mrs. Free-Europe. Case work technique is always used and the cases fall into three classifications; those wanting pre-marital information, those wanting help on specific problems, and those who are generally upset emotionally. Mrs. Freeman stated that the chief objective of THE Marriage Council is to relieve fear who come to it are for the most part from the thinking, middle class group."

"The idea of marriage preparation is not a new thing," she declared. "It used to be supplied by the church and the family doctor, but because of changes in present day life the influence of religion and medicine is waning. Young people face greater problems today because they have greater freedom of choice. Popular literature confuses them and the divorce rate alarms them." she declared.

Mrs. Freeman commended the committee of the Federal Council of Churches which educates ministers to deal with problems of marriage prep-

She described at some length the courses on marriage preparation which of the students in 200 different colleges. among them Vassar, Temple and Drexel. In Drexel this course is required for freshmen men. Some medical schools are instructing students to handle problems of young people considering marriage.

Mrs. Freeman listed as legal ways in which unsuccessful marriages are prevented; that 19 states have laws preventing hasty marriages; that 27 states are fighting to outlaw syphilis; that New Jersey and New York require laboratory tests and physical examinations before marriage. An ordinance further amending Ordinance No. 275 of the Borough of Swarthmore, approved December 30, 1925, by prescribing further regulations pertaining to the size and construction of dwelling houses and other buildings both within and without the fire limits, regulations as to the construction of walls and partitions, floors and roofs, prescribing the minimum requirements of sanitary, heating and ventilating facilities, regulations pertaining to windows, entrances, cellars, air spaces, foundations and the use and occupancy of bedrooms, bathrooms, living rooms and kitchens.

Every dwelling shall be equipped with at least the following standard plumbing fixtures properly connected to a public sewer in accordance with other ordinances of the

Lavatory
Tub or shower bath
Kitchen sink

Section 3. HEATING AND VENTILAT-ING EQUIPMENT. All devices for heating buildings, whether individual rooms, halls or other compartments therein, which operate by burning solid, liquid or gas fuel, must be properly connected with chimneys extending to the outer air above the main roof of such building, of a size and design to adequately carry off all gases produced by combustion. No plans shall be approved for dwelling house purposes unless adequate provision is made for ventilating all rooms.

bearing partitions of frame dwellings not more than two stories in height shall be constructed of studs not less than 2"x4" nominal size spaced not less than 16" center to center with double studs on both sides of all openings and double studs at all corners. All openings are to have double heads. All corners shall be cross braced with lumber of the same size as the studs. A plate made of lumber not less than 2"x4" nominal size laid double shall be placed at each floor and at the eaves. All exterior frame walls shall be sheathed with boards measuring not less than 3/" in thickness laid diagonally over which shall be placed the finish surface. Not less than one layer of building paper of a grade acceptable to the building inspector shall be placed between the sheathing and the finish surface.

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any thereof should be held invalid, it is the intent of the council of the Borough of Swarthmore that the remaining provisions hereof, not so invalidated, shall nevertheless be and remain in full force and effect.

Section 8. CELLAR FLOORS. Basement and cellar floors shall be made of concrete 3 inches thick poured on a subgrade which meets the approval of the building inspector. The concrete shall consist of one part by volume of portland cement, 3 parts by volume of sand, and 4 parts by volume of crushed stone or pebbles. The cement content may be increased at the option of the owner. All ingredients shall be subject to the approval of the building inspector.

Section 9. FRAME DWELLINGS; WALLS AND PARTITIONS. Exterior walls and bearing partitions of frame dwellings not

roofs shall not be less than 2"x6" nominal size spaced not more than 16" center to center. Diagonal hip and valley rafters shall be not less than 3"x6" nominal size or 2"x6" nominal size doubled. Shingle lath where used shall measure not less than 2"x7" actual measurement.

Section 11. FLOOR JOISTS. The minimum thickness of wood floor joist shall be 2" nominal size provided such joists are not more than 12" in depth. All joists shall be suitably cross bridged for each 8' of span. Such floor joists, also stair horses, shall be spaced not more than 16 inches on centres. Trimmer and header joists, except where supported by partitions, are to be doubled when the number of tail joists is more than three. Joists under partitions running the same way shall be doubled, and where framed around flues, fireplaces, etc., 2" clearance must be provided. Headers carrying more than three tail joists must be housed into trimmers, or be hung in stirrups.

Section 12. FLOORS. All wood surface floors on the first floor must be laid double, the grain of the two courses to be diagonal or at right angles to each other. The combined thickness of the two courses shall be not less than 114 inches SECTION 13. WINDOWS. Every room in every dwelling hereafter crected or altered shall have at least one window opening to the outer air. In living or bedrooms the window area between stop beads shall be at least 12 square feet, and the total window area shall be equal to at least one-ninth of the floor area of the room. In bathrooms the window area shall be not less than 6 square feet between stop beads. In bathrooms and toilet rooms on the top floor, ventilating skylights of equal area may be substituted for windows. Bath and toilet rooms may be ventilated without windows, provided sutitable approved mechanical ventilation is installed.

Every window shall be made so as to open in all its parts, either double hung or casement.

Section 1. The provisions above set forth in Article XXIV, Sections 1 to 13 inclusive, are intended to modify and supplement the requirements of the other provisions of Ordinance No. 275, by reintended to repeal any of the other provisions of said ordinance, or of any other ordinances of this borough pertaining to the location or construction of buildings both within and without the fire limits, as defined in said Ordinance_No. 275.

Section 5. SIZE AND DIMENSIONS OF DWELLING HOUSES. No dwelling house hereafter erected shall be of less area than 600 square feet exclusive of porches; and no room used for living or sleeping purports. no room used for living or sleeping purposes shall hereafter be constructed, subdivided or altered so as to contain less than 80 square feet of floor surface, nor shall the ceiling height be less than 7 feet 6 inches above the floor.

Section 6. CELLARS. Every building used as a dwelling must have a basement or cellar under the major portion of the house, or a cellar area of not less than 200 square feet, and provision shall be made for proper ventilation. Basement floors must be not less than 4 feet below the average level of the ground, and the distance between the basement floor and the lower 3t-12-23-38
