BOROUGH GLOWS WITH XMAS CHEER

Homes and Buildings Don Lighted Arrangements as Greetings to All

By one candle, wreaths and other decorations betokening the season's cheer have appeared at the windows and doorways of Swarthmore homes. In contrast to last week's several outstanding early birds it is now practically impossible to find any home without some sprig of holiday adornment.

Borough Hall, itself having set such a fine example to well dressed buildings for many seasons, now welcomes the extension to Park avenue illumination which its neighbor, the Methodist Church, donated this week. SEWER RENTALS REQUIRED

Council Passes Ordinance Following State Supreme Court Decision

On December 5 the Supreme Court of the State of Pennsylvania handed down a decision establishing the constitutionality of the act under which the Central Delaware County Authority was formed. This decision stipulated that the municipalities composing the Authority must raise the necessary funds by sewer rentals and not by general taxation. Therefore, if the Authority was to perform its necessary functions the Borough of Swarthmore, the only member not having already established sewer rentals, was compelled to do so.

Many years ago the State of Pennsylvania adopted a policy of regulation in an effort to check the increasing pollution of the streams and rivers, with the ultimate purpose of eliminating pollution altogether. Pressure was at times brought to bear on municipalities and some progress made. The advent of the public works programs of the Federal Government gave great impetus to the movement because of the grants of money which enabled many municipalities to proceed which had not previously.

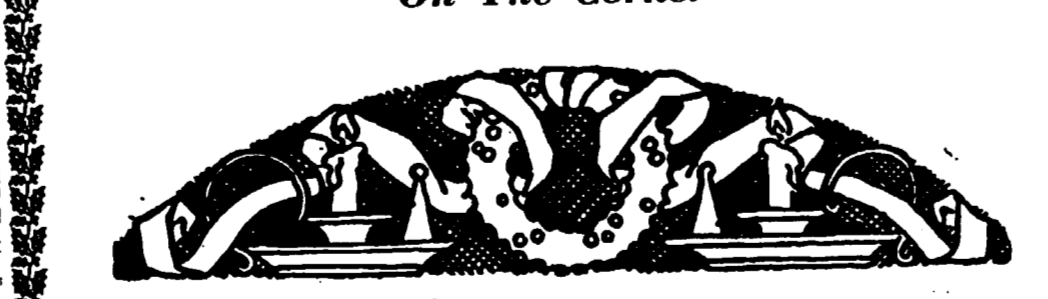

ORDINANCE No. 413

An ordinance further amending Ordinance No. 276 of the Borough of Swarthmore approved December 20, 1925...

The Council of the Borough of Swarthmore does ordain:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 275, approved December 30, 1925, shall be amended and supplemented by the addition of Articles XXIV and XXV thereto...

Section 1. SLEEPING APARTMENTS. No sleeping apartment shall be designed or used for the preparation, or storage of food...

Section 2. PLUMBING FACILITIES. Every dwelling shall be equipped with at least the following standard plumbing fixtures properly connected to a public sewer...

Section 3. HEATING AND VENTILATING EQUIPMENT. All devices for heating buildings, whether individual rooms, halls or other compartments therein...

Section 4. AIR SPACES. All one-story dwellings shall have an air space between the roof and the first floor ceiling equal to at least 30% of the volume of the building...

Section 5. SIZE AND DIMENSIONS OF DWELLING HOUSES. No dwelling house hereafter erected shall be of less area than 600 square feet exclusive of porches...

Section 6. CELLARS. Every building used as a dwelling must have a basement or cellar under the major portion of the house or a cellar area of not less than 200 square feet...

Section 7. BASEMENTS, FOUNDATIONS, AND OPENINGS. Basement and cellar walls shall be constructed of stone, brick, or poured in place concrete...

Section 8. FRAME DWELLINGS, WALLS AND PARTITIONS. Exterior walls and bearing partitions of frame dwellings shall not be less than 2 1/2 inches in height...

Section 9. RAFTERS. Rafters of frame roofs shall not be less than 2 1/2 inch nominal size spaced more than 16" center to center...

Section 10. FLOOR JOISTS. The minimum thickness of wood floor joists shall be nominal size not less than 1 1/2" center to center...

Section 11. FLOORS. All wood surface floors on the first floor must be laid double, the grain of the two courses shall be diagonal or at right angles to each other...

Section 12. WINDOWES. Every room in every dwelling hereafter erected or altered shall have at least one window opening to the outside air...
