Army Ordnance officials have approved a National Rifle Association plan by which a Swarthmore man has been designated to examine privately owned rifles which may be suitable for military use. Under the accepted plan the secretaries of the 2,200 NRA clubs and other officials of this nation-wide organization have been instructed to examine for suitability all rifles of those types which the owners may wish to return. In past years many .30 caliber Springfield 1903 and Enfield 1917 rifles have been purchased from the Government by sportsmen in this country and may have been radically altered so that it no longer would be practical to refit them to military standards.

#### School Asks Motorists to Follow Alphabetical Schedule Closely

An announcement from the Office of Price Administration in Washington has just designated Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 9, 10, and 11, as the days Swarthmore. on which the new gasoline rationing books are to be issued. For Swarthmore this rationing will take place in the high school gymnasium during the following hours: in the morning 9 to 12; in the afternoon 2 to 5; and on Thursday and Friday evenings from 7 to 9.

The following schedule has been established and it is requested that motorists day from 2 to 5 P.M., those whose last summer. names begin with C, D, and E. Thursday evening, 7 to 9, those whose last Independence Week-End at Inn names begin with E and G.

On Friday morning, 9 to 12, those whose last initials are H, I, J or K. On Friday afternoon, 2 to 5 P. M. those whose last names begin with the letters P, Q, R, and S.

On Saturday morning between the hours of 9 and 12, letters T, U, and V. Saturday afternoon between 2 and 5, letters W, X, Y, Z.

The owner of the car or his or her designated representative must appear, bringing with him the motor vehicle lawn during the day. registration card. Only A and D books will be issued at this time, the A ration books for owners of passenger vehicles, and D owners of motor cycles or motor bells will entertain guests and their bikes. Applications for supplemental rations may be secured at this time, to be traveled all over the United States on presented to the Rationing Board in the Elementary School at Clifton Heights. Also, owners of trucks, taxis, and other commercial vehicles may secure application blanks which must be presented also at the Ration Board headquarters.

The rationing will be in charge of local school officials, and the work will be carried on by the men and women of the community cooperating with the local Defense Council.

#### G. L. VAN ALEN **FUNERAL TODAY**

#### Retired Presbyterian Minister Brought Family Here 22 Years Ago

The Reverend George Leslie Van Alen died Wednesday evening July 1 from a heart attack at his home at 211 Park avenue. He had been a resident of Swarthmore since December 13, 1922 when he brought his family here to live.

He was born on January 28, 1861 at Newburg, N. Y. the son of Timothy Oakley Van Alen and Ann Garretson Van Alen. He graduated from Princeton University in the class of '81 and from Princeton Theological Seminary. On June 26, 1889, he married May D. Henderson at Montgomery, Pa.

He served as pastor of Presbyterian churches at Watsontown, Pa., Mt. Airy, Pa., Blackwood, N. J., and Rutledge, Pa.

Since his retirement from the active ministry he had kept in close contact with the Church. He was a member of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church, of the Chester Presbytery, and of the Presbyterian Ministers' Association of Philadelphia and vicinity which elected him its president in 1931. In addition to these responsibilities he took a real interest in the life of this community, maintained a large correspondence, read omnivorously enjoyed the garden in which he had worked on Tuesday, and found a new fruition in the lives of his children and his grandchildren.

#### CONCERNING THE MOSQUITOES

The perennial pest, the mosquito has been a source of great discomfort and annoyance, as usual, of late. And judging from reports emanating from adjacent sections of Delaware County, the people of Swarthmore have ample company. An interview by the writer with Mr. James F. Conner of the Delaware County Mosquito Control Board was held recently. It was learned that an inspection of the Swarthmore territory is made at least every 10 days, and spraying for mosquito larvae is made as indicated. Also spraying will be made on request, through Mr. Con-

The above procedure is undoubtedly valuable in decreasing the multiplication of mosquitoes. But many residents, and often the most critical ones, fail to realize that a good deal can be accomplished in any community by the elimination of mosquito breeding places. Inadequately draining gutters, and pipes; old tin cans and jars; pools that drain poorly, and containing no fish; old flower pots etc. Tall grass may harbor an old can etc. In other words, anything that allows water to collect can account for the breeding of mosquitoes. A thorough search for places and containers where water can collect should be made by every home

It should be remembered, too, that many mosquitoes are blown into any given area by strong winds. The swampy areas near Swarthmore must contribute a goodly number of the mosquitoes that plague us each summer. J. ALBRIGHT JONES, Borough Health Officer.

ago most owners of canines were immediately and sensibly cooperative, keeping their pets securely confined to their own properties or on leash when However there are several dogs, very

often but not always the same ones, which are seen wandering about town with absolute freedom every day, and especially after dark (the most dangerous time of all). It is surprising that any resident of the borough can be so evidently unin-

formed on the law in regard to a state of quarantine, especially when it is placarded in detail on public posts. It is further amazing that anyone who feeds or in the least harbors an innocent animal would willingly expose it to the provisions of this law: that a policeman or other officer of public safety shoot on sight any dog found a large within a quarantined area whether the animal be licensed or not. A. which normally notifies owners of licensed dogs which are brought to its shelter is now overcrowded and cannot afford to take chances with dogs from a quarantined section and therefore at once disposes of any such animals taken there.
