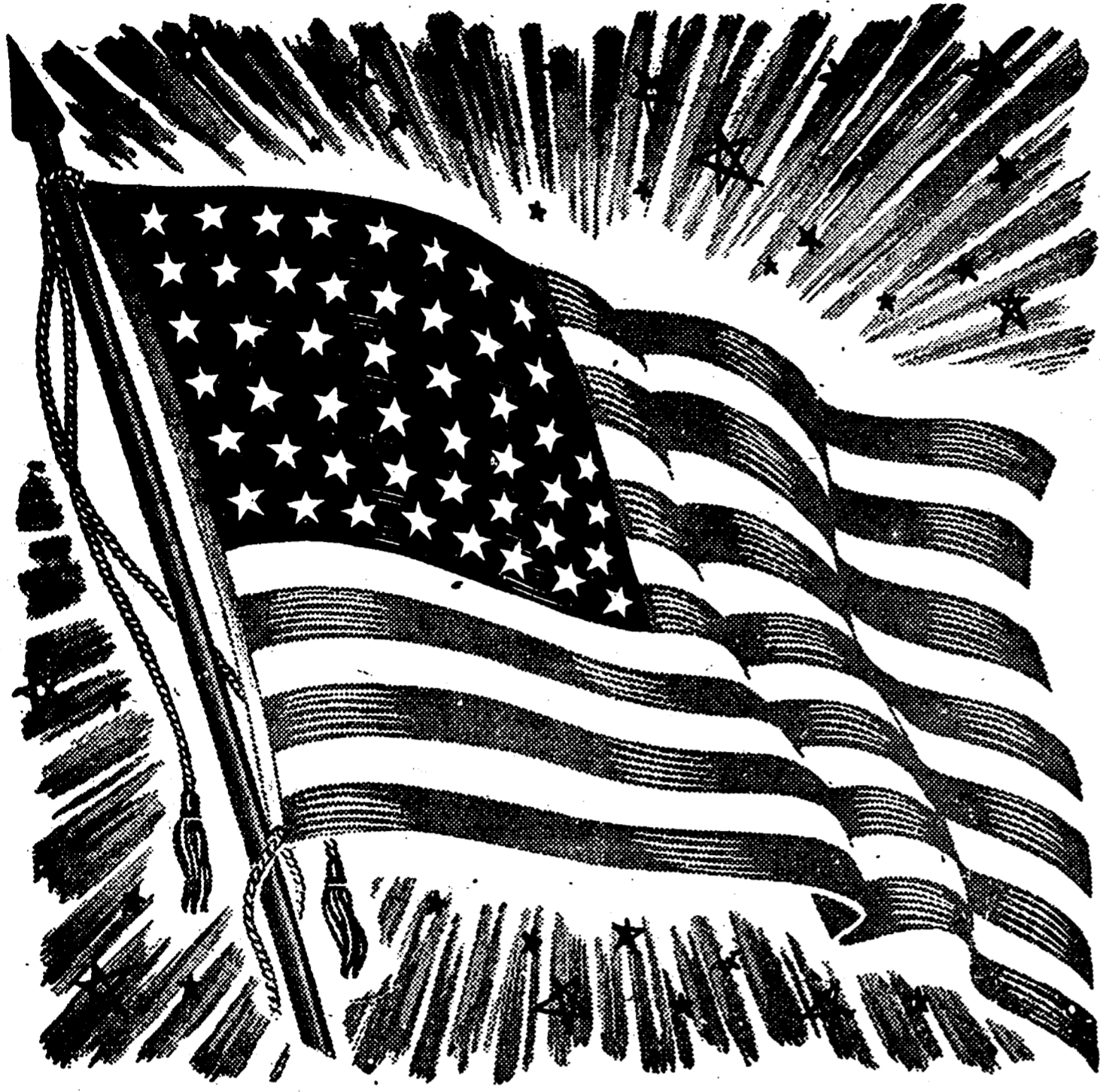

INSPECTS RIFLES ARMY WILL BUY

Company H Lieutenant Examining Old Firearms Offered Here for U. S. Use

Army Ordnance officials have approved a National Rifle Association plan by which a Swarthmore man has been designated to examine privately owned rifles which may be suitable for military use. The NRA plan was submitted in cooperation with a War Department request last month to civilians owning Springfield and Enfield rifles in serviceable condition to sell back to the Government those not too drastically altered for Army use.

Under the accepted plan the secretaries of the 2,200 NRA clubs and other officials of this nation-wide organization have been instructed to examine for suitability all rifles of those types which the owners may wish to return. Serving in the Swarthmore area is F. Norton Landon, 307 North Princeton avenue, secretary of the Swarthmore Rifle and Pistol Club.

In past years many .30 caliber Springfield 1903 and Enfield 1917 rifles have been purchased from the Government by sportsmen in this country and may have been radically altered so that it no longer would be practical to refit them to military standards.

Ordnance officials have indicated that owners who resell their guns will be reimbursed on a scale of prices based on a maximum of \$47.64 for Springfields and \$12.50 for Enfields of service pattern in excellent condition. Prices will be reduced according to condition, expected life of the weapon and the amount of labor and material required to put the rifle back into "as issued" condition. That payment will not be made, however, until the gun has been received at one of the specified Ordnance Depots. The decision of the preliminary examiner, whether an Army or recognized NRA official, is not to be regarded as official acceptance by the Army, nor is any preliminary examiner authorized to make an estimate as to probable payment. Official acceptance and the decision on payment will be made only at one of the following five receiving depots: Raritan Arsenal, Metuchen, N. J.; Augusta Arsenal, Augusta, Ga.; San Antonio Arsenal, San Antonio, Tex.; Benicia Arsenal, Benicia, Cal.; or Ogden Ordnance Depot, Ogden, Utah.

Gun owners are warned not to send their rifles in until preliminary examination has been made and certain special sporting attachments have been removed at the direction of the preliminary examiner.

GAS RATIONING HERE NEXT WEEK

School Asks Motorists to Follow Alphabetical Schedule Closely

An announcement from the Office of Price Administration in Washington has just designated Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 9, 10, and 11, as the days on which the new gasoline rationing books are to be issued. For Swarthmore this rationing will take place in the high school gymnasium during the following hours: in the morning 9 to 12; in the afternoon 2 to 5; and on Thursday and Friday evenings from 7 to 9.

The following schedule has been established and it is requested that motorists adhere to it very closely. Thursday morning, 9 to 12, those whose last names begin with A and B should appear. Thursday from 2 to 5 P.M., those whose last names begin with C, D, and E. Thursday evening, 7 to 9, those whose last names begin with E and G.

On Friday morning, 9 to 12, those whose last initials are H, I, J or K. On Friday afternoon, 2 to 5 P. M. those whose last names begin with the letters P, Q, R, and S.

On Saturday morning between the hours of 9 and 12, letters T, U, and V. Saturday afternoon between 2 and 5, letters W, X, Y, Z.

The owner of the car or his or her designated representative must appear, bringing with him the motor vehicle registration card. Only A and D books will be issued at this time, the A ration books for owners of passenger vehicles, and D owners of motor cycles or motor bikes. Applications for supplemental rations may be secured at this time, to be presented to the Rationing Board in the Elementary School at Clifton Heights. Also, owners of trucks, taxis, and other commercial vehicles may secure application blanks which must be presented also at the Ration Board headquarters.

The rationing will be in charge of local school officials, and the work will be carried on by the men and women of the community cooperating with the local Defense Council.

G. L. VAN ALEN FUNERAL TODAY

Retired Presbyterian Minister Brought Family Here 22 Years Ago

The Reverend George Leslie Van Alen died Wednesday evening July 1 from a heart attack at his home, at 211 Park avenue. He had been a resident of Swarthmore since December 13, 1922 when he brought his family here to live.

He was born on January 28, 1861 at Newburg, N. Y. the son of Timothy Oakley Van Alen and Ann Garretson Van Alen. He graduated from Princeton University in the class of '81 and from Princeton Theological Seminary. On June 26, 1889, he married May D. Henderson at Montgomery, Pa.

He served as pastor of Presbyterian churches at Watsontown, Pa., Mt. Airy, Pa., Blackwood, N. J., and Rutledge, Pa.

Since his retirement from the active ministry he had kept in close contact with the Church. He was a member of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church, of the Chester Presbytery, and of the Presbyterian Ministers' Association of Philadelphia and vicinity which elected him its president in 1931. In addition to these responsibilities he took a real interest in the life of this community, maintained a large correspondence, read omnivorously, enjoyed the garden in which he had worked on Tuesday, and found a new fruition in the lives of his children and his grandchildren.

Surviving beside his widow are two sons Oakley H. and Ambrose H. and a daughter Mrs. Fred N. Bell, and three grandchildren Nancy and Carol Van Alen and Frederick Neil Bell, Jr. all of Swarthmore.

Services will be held at his late home this afternoon, Friday, at 2 P. M. They will be conducted by Dr. James F. Carter of Lincoln University assisted by the Rev. David Braun. Interment will be private at Arlington Cemetery.

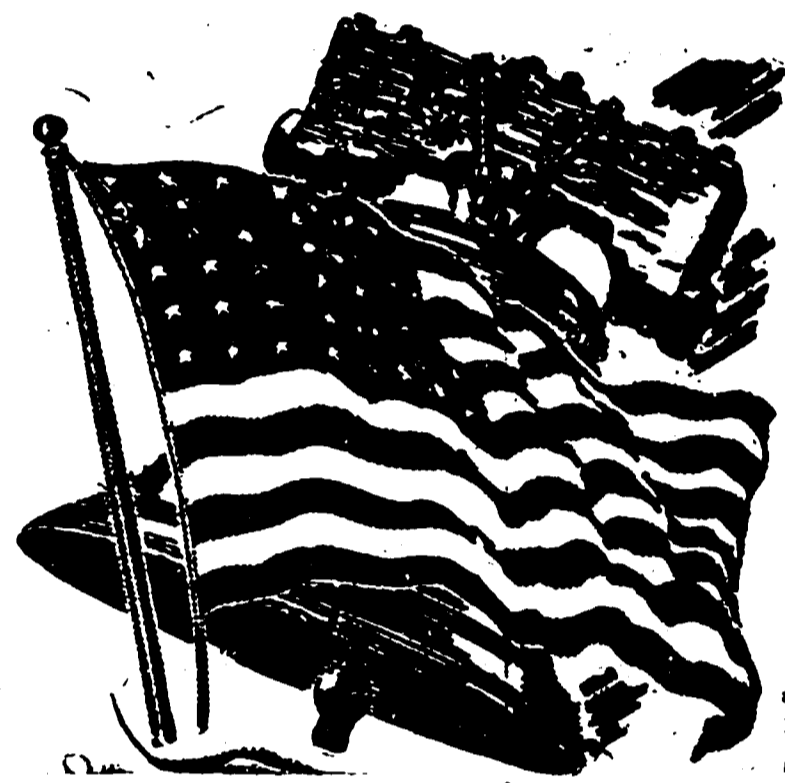

STUDY GROUP ON COUNTY GOV'T

Local L.W.V. Sponsoring Tuesday Sessions Led by Vernon O'Rourke

The first of a series of six weekly meetings on "County Government" was held at the home of Mrs. Daniel R. Goodwin president of the Swarthmore League of Women Voters on Tuesday, July 7, at 2 p. m. Mrs. Frank C. Pierson first vice-president presided. Mrs. Pierson and Mrs. William E. Pogram have worked with the leader Vernon O'Rourke in preparing the study outline for the series. At this initial meeting, one of the best attended the League has had, Mr. O'Rourke gave a stimulating presentation of the development of county government in this country with a brief review of its place in the government set-up.

The League was gratified to find great interest in our County Government in this community. It is certain that under such stimulating leadership, interest will continue to grow.

In the following meetings the study of the organization of Delaware county will be made and compared with conditions in other local units. Special studies of departmental organization and problems will be made by individual members.

Decision as to the current cancellation was made at a meeting of the local Country Week Picnic Association the other night, in consideration of sugar and gasoline rationing. It is felt too great difficulty would be encountered in making the many customary rice puddings, and in transporting foods and other materials and the picnickers themselves.

Council Makes Possible Red Cross Surgical Dressings Here

The Swarthmorean is indebted to Mrs. Martha R. Blessing for opportunity to print the following letter which she has received from a long-time friend whose home has been in Honolulu, Hawaii for many years.

"We are safe and sound and happily busy. And strange as it may seem to you, we are glad to be in Honolulu. We are in our own home and are sharing in the dangers and vicissitudes of those among whom we have lived for many years. Perhaps too we feel that we may be of a little more use here than almost anywhere on the mainland."

"Sunday, December 7 was one of Honolulu's loveliest mornings and was enjoying it from our porch when attention was held by the unusual amount of smoke over Pearl Harbor, the noise, and the number of planes. I was viewing the Japanese raid. Mr. Gregory and I, with two young friends, spent the morning on our roof watching the spectacle. We did not know enough to be frightened even when we heard missiles zooming over our heads. ONE TOUCH OF NATURE This is the twenty-sixth excerpt from chapters of a proposed book by C. Brooke Worth - Ed. H. Hoag. Heat or no heat - heart or no heart - Wither and I drove to the heron colony where Fred had picked up the dead fledgling. Thrashing through thickets of greenbriar, slipping at biting flies and mosquitoes, we penetrated a real jungle to a central clearing where the fish-eaters nested. On the ground we found another dead fledgling. Sighting the nest above us, I climbed the thin cedar trunk until I peered at the gangly surviving infants. Then came disappointment: these were young Little Blue Herons, not Snowy Egrets. At a mere few days of age, it is impossible to distinguish them from the downy young of related herons. I noticed that Wither panted much more heavily on the return trip than when his mind had been filled with Snowy Egrets. He forced me to share evening flight of flounder with him and his wife - not that I required abnormal persuasion. But I refused his invitation to stay the night for I was determined to sleep on a dune at Stone Harbor. Thus it transpired that at 8 o'clock I began trudging the three miles from the Coast Guard Station to the last dune of the Point. It was dusk when I deposited my duff-bag on the sand. But like a gull or tern or any other diurnal creature I immediately unrolled my sleeping bag and prepared to endure the long stretch of night in silent observance of its widely separated beginning and end. Promenading nuns from a summer convent were walking along the strand. By two and three they reached the ultimate limit of solid beach, and, probably confiding a prayer to the livid sky, they turned in a flutter of vestments to retrace their journey to Stone Harbor. As darkness settled over the Point, the last of the Sisters disappeared in the direction of distant lights, and I was finally left alone with the waves, the dunes, and the stars. I tucked myself warmly into my sleeping bag and stared for a long time at the multitude of worlds that circled above in mysterious orbits. One can forget the importance of astronomy except on the occasion of sleeping out-of-doors! How engrossed one is with the doings of our own selves and the superficial trust of our own small planet!
