LOCAL ATHLETES DISPLAY SPIRIT

Schedule Is Planned For August Games

Swarthmore's boys baseball team continues to show steady improvement as it moves into its August schedule.

Playing almost literally between the rain drops, the local nine was able to complete eight games. Only two of these were won, but the team spirit failed to sag and in not one of the six losses did the opponents carry off the honors without a hard fight.

The team now counts an even dozen men sponsors and has played before increasingly large crowds both at home and away.

On July 15, the Swarthmoreans traveled to Upper Darby where they bowed 6 to 4 to Upland, a team composed of Upper Darby and Lansdowne players. The boys themselves and those who traveled along feel they should have won that one and are anxiously waiting for next Monday when Upland visits Swarthmore for a return game.

Manoa brought its league-leading veteran nine to Swarthmore on July 18 and went back the winner by a 10 to 5 score. Larchmont won on the 25th at home, 6 to 5. On the 27th, the local team traveled to Ardmore and before several hundred fans, lost 11 to 4. Here, although up against one of the better boys baseball teams of the suburban areas, the younger Swarthmore boys put up a great scrap. They threatened every inning and played some of their best defensive ball of the season. Ardmore will visit Swarthmore on August 13.

Rutledge returned to the local diamond and grabbed a 7 to 0 decision last Monday.

In Marianas

S/Sgt. Norman H. Borden is now located on Tinian in the Marianas Islands with the 58th Bombardment Wing, pioneer Super-fortress unit which was transferred recently from the India-China Theaters to the Pacific to join with the XXII Bomber Command in the intensified aerial blows at the Japanese mainland.

S/Sgt. Borden is a bombsight mechanic in one of the air service groups which performs the maintenance and supply work necessary to keep the big bombers in perfect condition for their long range operations. He has been serving overseas with the 58th Wing, formerly a unit of the XX Bomber Command, since the B-29's went into action against Japan more than a year ago.

Finds Rare Species

In his studies of the flora of Swarthmore, Dr. Samuel C. Palmer, emeritus of the College, has found among the plantings around the college buildings a small pink and white morning glory. This plant almost duplicates a somewhat larger native species, but it can readily be identified by its small size and somewhat different leaves. Not being able to find a description of this plant in his books, Dr. Palmer took a specimen to the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia. From there it was forwarded to the Gray Herbarium in Boston. The plant was there identified as *Convolvulus Wallchiana*, a native of China. The statement from the Gray Herbarium was to the effect that this was the first time this plant had been collected in America. The character of the plant is that of a troublesome weed, and therefore very undesirable for transplanting like many other introduced plants.

GEORGE F. FENNO DIES SUDDENLY

Phila. Engineer Was 17-Year Boro Resident

George F. Fenno, 60, of Swarthmore avenue died suddenly Monday morning as he was leaving the Commercial Trust Building, Philadelphia.

Mr. Fenno, a partner in the engineering firm of Fenno-Fischer and Company, Philadelphia, was a graduate of the College of the City of New York in 1903 and received his M.E. at Cornell University in 1906.

Mr. Fenno, who served as a captain in the Army Air Corps during World War I, was formerly a test inspector for the Bell Telephone Company and an insurance inspector for the Middle States Inspection Bureau. He served as vice-president of the Kissick-Fenno Company from 1919 to 1932 before forming the firm of Fenno and Fischer.

He was a member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, the Engineers' Club, the Rolling Green Golf Club, and the Cornell Club. A resident of Swarthmore for 17 years, Mr. Fenno was an active member of the Players' Club.

He is survived by his wife, Ada V. Fenno.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday from his late residence. Burial was in Arlington Cemetery. The services were conducted by the Rev. J. Jardin Guenther, former minister of the Episcopal Church.

LT. WM. L. THORPE REPORTED KILLED

Air Corps Navigator Missing Since March, 1944

The War Department has advised Mr. and Mrs. Walter L. Thorpe of Dickinson avenue that the absence of their son, Lt. William L. Thorpe, reported missing in action on March 3, 1944, has been terminated by a presumptive finding of death.

Lt. Thorpe graduated from the Swarthmore High School in the class of 1940 and completed his freshman year at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, where he was a member of the Alpha Chi Rho Fraternity.

He enlisted in the Army Air Corps and was inducted July 27, 1942. He reported for duty February 8, 1943, and on September 25 of that year was commissioned a Second Lieutenant at Selman Field, Monroe, La. In January of the following year, Lt. Thorpe was sent overseas from Tonopah, Nev., with the 755th Bombardment Squadron, 458th Bomb Group and arrived at the Eighth Air Corps base in England, February 2.

Lt. Thorpe was the navigator of a B-24 (Liberator) bomber which the adjutant general, in his letter, states "departed its base, 3 March 1944, on a combat mission to Berlin, Germany, and was last seen going down over the English Channel."

In addition to his parents he is survived by his brother, Lt. (jg) Robert J. Thorpe, U.S.N.R.

New Ration Books for Food and Gas Before Christmas
Before Christmas rolls around you will have your new War Ration Book Five and the new "A" gasoline ration book. Distribution of these books will take place at school houses or other public buildings throughout the nation from December 3 through December 15. Actual dates to be announced later. The new "A" gasoline book will go into use December 22 but War Ration Book Five will not be used before January 1, 1946.

War Ration Book Five will be smaller than a dollar bill, containing half as many stamps as the last book issued. It will be as long as Book Four but only half as wide. The stamps will carry a number but not a letter.

The Department of Agriculture and the War Production Board has told OPA that meats and fats, canned goods, sugar and shoes all will be in tight supply for some months to come and so it looks as if a ration book will be needed throughout most of next year. To be on the safe side and avoid the expense of having to get out still another book later, OPA has set up Book Five so that it can last from 10 to 15 months if it is needed. War Ration Book Five is expected to be the last in the series of wartime ration books.

The last full set of five blue stamps in War Ration Book Four will become good on September 1. The final set of five red stamps will be validated a month later, on October 1. Since War Ration Book Five, containing the new red and blue stamps, will not go into use before January 1, it will be necessary to use other stamps in Book Four as substitutes for processed food and meat-fats stamps during the interim period of shoe and sugar stamps will not be necessary, since sufficient stamps are provided for these items in Books Three and Four.

The new "A" gasoline book, the third issued under rationing, will differ from the present book only in color. The book will contain five sets of coupons, six coupons to a set numbered A-18 through A-23. Each set of six coupons will cover a different validity period. The first set—the coupons numbered A-18—becomes good December 22.

Gas Cooking and Heating Stoves Now Ration-Free

Gas cooking and gas heating stoves including combination ranges, except oil-gas types, may now be purchased without a ration certificate. Oil cooking, heating, combination oil-gas stoves and oil conversion burners for stoves remain.

Your Rationing Calendar

MEATS AND FATS—Q2 through U2 are invalid after August 31. V2 through Z2 are valid through September 30. A1 through E1 are valid through October 31. F1 through K1 are valid through November 30.

PROCESSED FOODS—Y2, Z2, A1, B1, C1 are invalid after August 31. D1 through H1 are valid through September 30. J1 through N1 are valid through October 31. P1 through T1 are valid through November 30.

SUGAR—Stamp 36 is valid through August 31 for five pounds. GASOLINE—Stamp 16 in the "A" book is valid for 6 gallons through September 21.

SHOES—Airplane stamps 1, 2, 3, and 4 are valid indefinitely. FUEL OIL—All 1944-1945 period stamps and 1945-46 Period 1 stamps are now valid. The unit value is 10 gallons.

RENTS—Landlords renting for the first time must register within 30 days with the Area Rent Office, Suburban Station Building, Philadelphia.

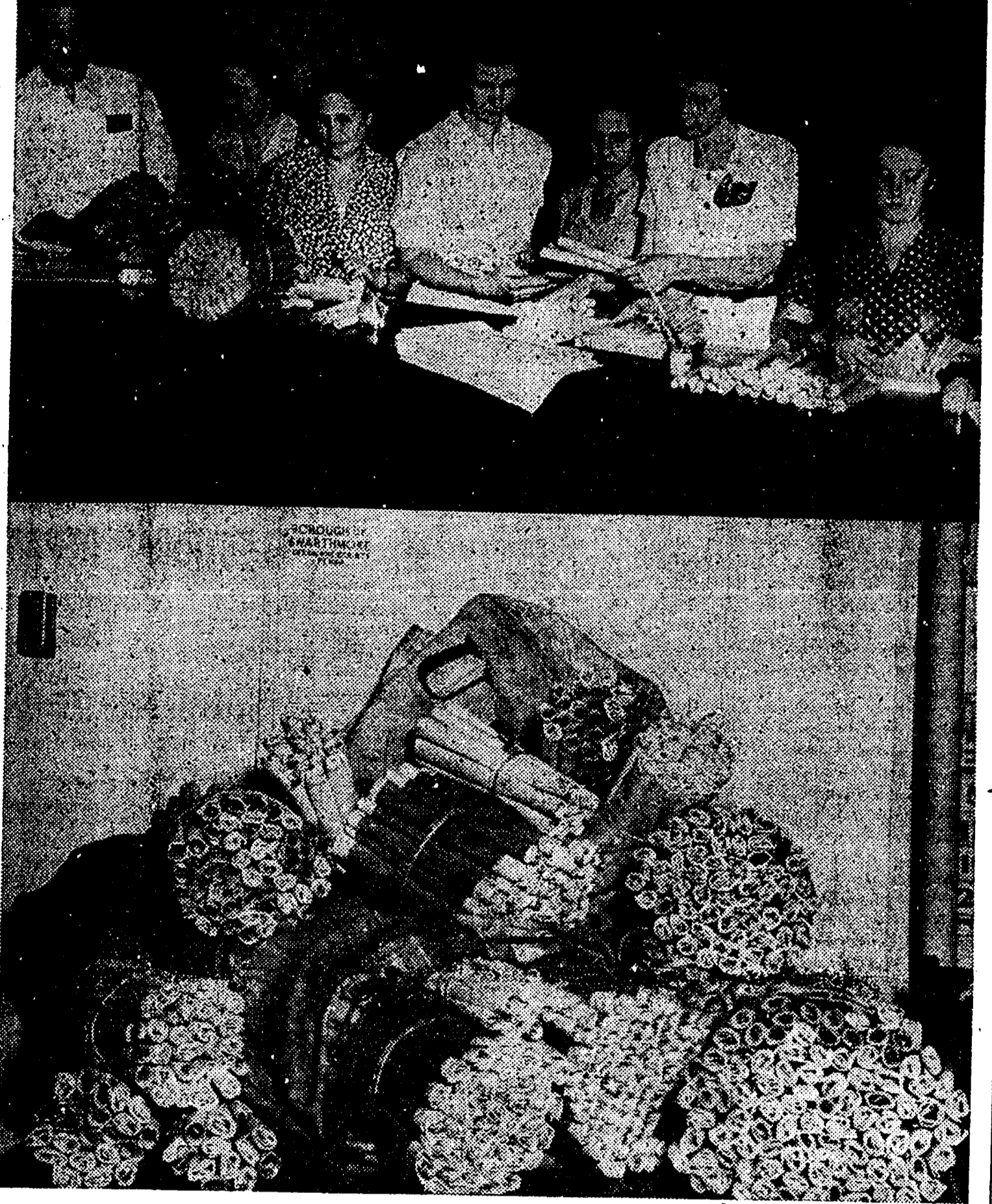
MRS. BRANNAN BURIED MONDAY

Applications Must Be Sent Before Sept. 29

The Delaware County Election Bureau, Media, Pa., will send military ballots for use in the November 6 election to all servicemen and women who request such ballots by letter. The request may be written by the person in service or by anyone else who can attest to his or her voting qualifications.

Information must include the name, home address, military address with rank and serial number, age, and voting precinct of the person in service. No formal application is necessary for a ballot. It does not have to be sworn to. The provisions apply to all military personnel, Red Cross, and civilian services attached to the armed forces and to members of the Merchant Marine.

The Commonwealth will not make an official drive this fall to persuade Pennsylvanians in the armed forces to vote for local or statewide candidates in the November election. Ballots for the election will be forwarded but must be requested by letters on or before September 29.

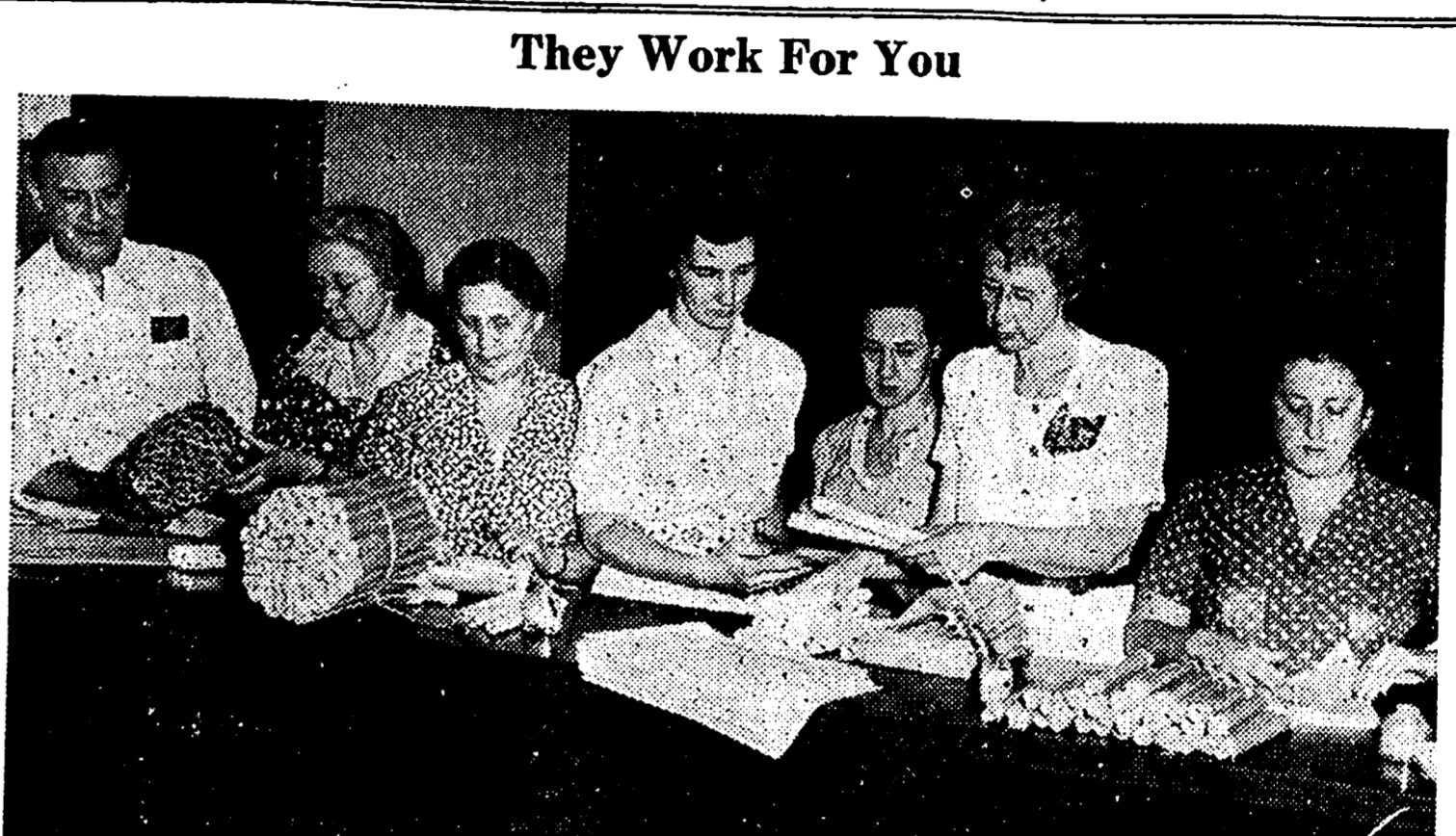

(Continued from Page 1) record of all such trainees gives an academic casualty of 10 to 15 per cent. The future of the unit at Swarthmore continues uncertain, he reported. Prior to the peace, the college had been notified that it would continue throughout the year with a quota larger than the original one.

Second, Dr. Nason listed the training of the 49 Chinese Naval officers, who came in 1942, and for whose warm welcome by the community he expressed appreciation. In the wake of this training, "and a kind of consequence of manner in which that task was accomplished," there has come a steady stream of foreign students to the campus to be taught English and helped in the adjustment to American ways of life. Nineteen of these were in residence this summer. Third, was the E.D.T. or E.S.M.T. program for the training of engineers, in which the college enrolled 4800 men. Fourth, Dr. Nason listed the direct contribution made by members of the faculty, who are also citizens of Swarthmore, by which 41 out of a normal faculty of 100, made vital contributions in posts of importance to victory.

To Carry On

In the absence of Mrs. Sewell W. Hodges, head of the Red Cross through the war, Chairman Ward introduced the vice-chairman, Mrs. W. H. Dickinson, to relate the active part which Swarthmore played. She referred to the 1944 campaign, under Walter A. Schmidt, which raised \$23,728.29 and to the over-500 residents who have worked on the various Red Cross projects since Pearl Harbor. Some of those engaged in the Prisoners of War packaging and in the Blood Donor Service are now inactive, but other branches must increase their work to meet post-war needs. One of these, the Camp and Hospital Red Cross channel, through which the desires and needs of the armed forces are met, was represented capably by Mrs. Theo. Saulner for Chairman Mrs. Roy Coleman. Listing the outstanding projects of her committee, Mrs. Saulner stated that every member of the borough had aided them in some way. She reminded Swarthmoreans that all desires of the Convalescent Annex are cared for here and asked them to remember that though they are away from the work of Camp and Hospital must go on, since boys in hospitals become more discouraged and boys overseas become more homesick. Mrs. Phoebe C. Kestel was commended in absentia for her valiant work as Blood Donor chairman. Mrs. J. Paul Brown, chairman of Nurses' Aides, took a bow.

We Bought Bonds

H. VanAlen, former Scout leader and head of salvage drives in the borough; Mrs. Robert N. Hilker for the Girl Scouts, and William F. Hanny, head of the Victory Gardeners.

Clarence G. Myers, secretary of the Swarthmore War Service Committee, read the list of its members. Listed in the services the Service Flag, the Honor Roll, the letter of greeting to community personnel in the services, the Christmas packages to each of these, and the sending of "The Swarthmorean" to all service personnel. This Is Our Victory

Joyously we are dropping second letters from designations of victory days. First it was "E" from VE Day, and now it is "J" from VJ Day. Then there will be left just the one glorious letter "V"—"V" for Victory!

We have celebrated the dropping of those letters with rejoicings. Now sober second thoughts crowd upon us. What is this victory? Evil forces that threatened destruction of the things we count dear—freedom to plan our own lives, think and speak our own thoughts, worship the highest reality we know and to be uplifted by that worship—these evil forces have themselves been broken and destroyed; and that is good! The foe has been crushed before he could ravage our land and our homes with the ruin he has brought upon nearly the whole world; and that is good!

We rejoice in those accomplishments, but our rejoicings are subdued as we ponder. Our joy is not unconfined. Though victory has come, how can we be wholeheartedly glad in the midst of so much destruction? The excitement of battle is over and the clash of arms is stilled; now we begin more seriously to count the terrible cost—the millions of graves, the ruined and devastated cities; vast areas once productive now trampled and made unfit for cultivation; myriads of people cold, unsheltered, famished, dying; the intolerable burden of debt binding the race in a gruelling slavery for generations; the monstrous threat of the atomic bomb—can that be victory which thus terrifies, wounds, and wrecks the world?

No, that is not victory. All that was but the preparation for victory. Victory is yet to be won! Brave men and women on the battlefronts have, with heroic devotion, crushed the immediate threat to our liberty-inspired ideals. Now all of us, with the help of them as they return to civilian life, must carry those ideals to the triumph which, alone is victory. Victory—the triumph of right and justice and human kindness—is an ideal we believe in but have not yet attained to.

There comes to memory from early training a dictum of St. John's, which becomes intelligible only in a setting like this. "This is the victory which overcometh the world," he said, "even our faith."—"This is the victory . . . even our faith."

Because of VE Day and VJ Day, we can have faith, for the old perils are destroyed. Now we can have faith, and that is the victory!

Faith: That is what is expressed in the United Nations' Charter—faith in a juster world and a kinder world. The realization of that world is the victory for which we all long. The heroes who have beaten down the barriers which so obviously separated us from that victory are now in process of being discharged after a dread task nobly performed. The struggle, however, is a continuing one. "There is no discharge in that war."

The war goes on—only the battlefields change. Not now are the fields earthen, trodden, and sodden with the blood of martyrs, but fields of human relations. Here the principle of cooperation was against exploitation; here mutual helpfulness contends against the selfish use of power and of wealth. Here the whole system of rewards for human labor cries for rectification by a juster and less wasteful process than that of strikes and boycotts. Here a system must be devised whereby the normally abundant supply of natural resources and of food may be more fairly distributed. On these fields, victory will be won, if ever it really is won—the victory for which VE Day and VJ Day have prepared the way. And on these fields, each of us is a warrior, either volunteer or drafted, with our personal philosophies, principles, and practices.

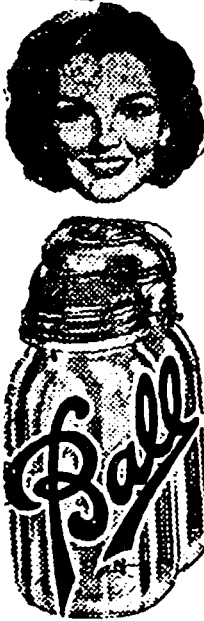

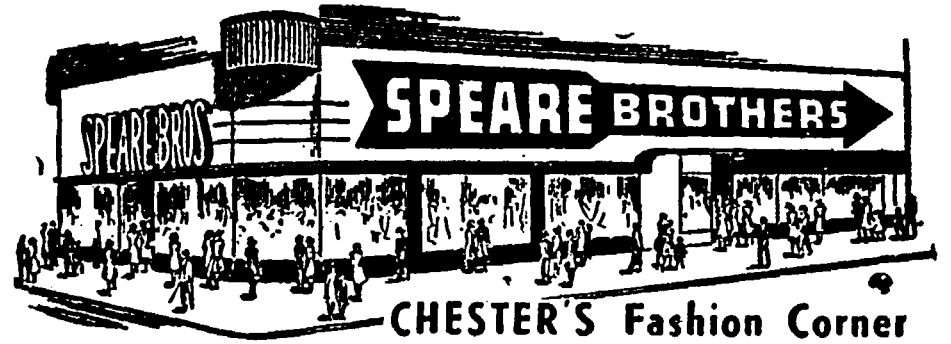
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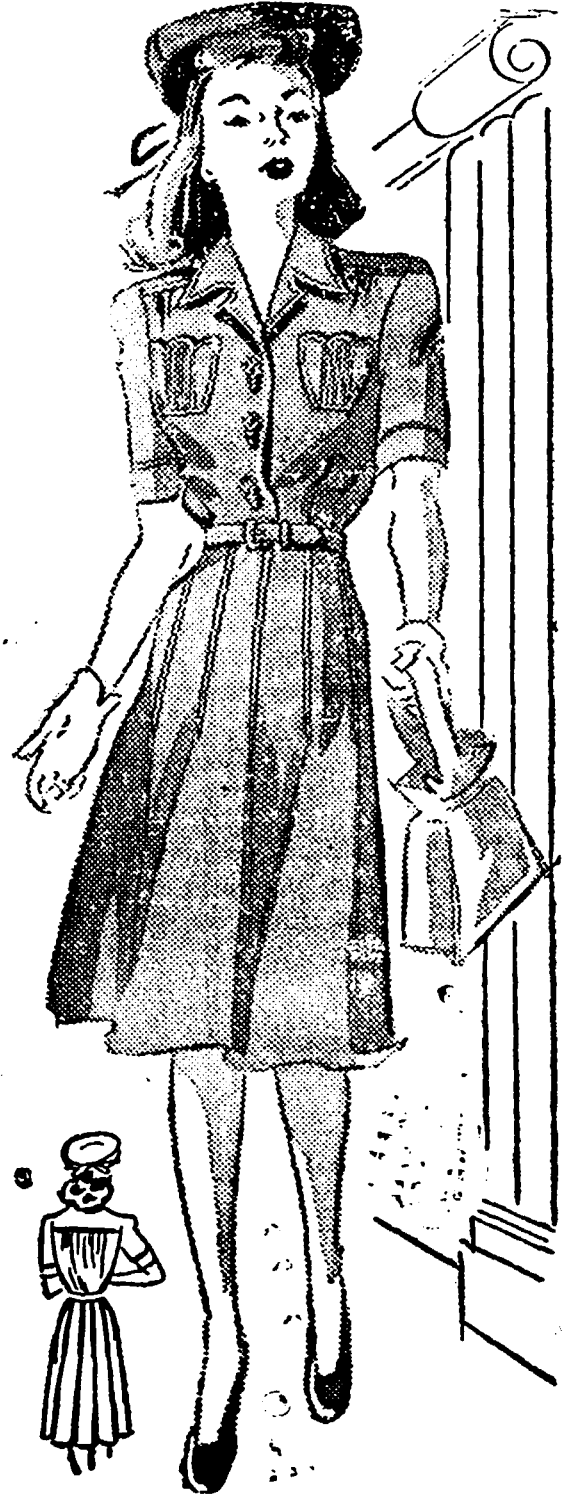
