MEMORIAL SPEECH

DENOUNCES FEAR Braun Sets Standards

of Real Gratitude

A goodly number of boroughites turned out to honor fellow Swarthmoreans who served in two World Wars in a threefold program last Thursday morning. Among them, some in uniform and others in "civies," were a considerable number of veterans of both globe frays.

In his invocation at the 9:30 exercises at Borough Hall Plaza, honoring World War I veterans who have passed on, Dr. David Braun, Swarthmore Presbyterian pastor, denounced the prevalent doctrine of fear loose throughout the nation and world. This phobia, an aftermath of war, "is a denial of the honor we want to do those who gave their lives for us," said Dr. Braun. "We are living in an age when everybody is afraid; we are afraid of the peace, we are afraid of revolution, we are afraid of hunger, and of the threat of an_ other war." Stating that we do not Aonor our heroic dead only by oratory parades, monuments, and demonstrations on the village green, Dr. Braun proclaimed we must each overcome our complex fears and prove our worthiness of the lives sacrificed, by doing three things: "realizing our true national destiny, paying the price of our destiny, and understanding our own personal responsibility to that des-


After the placing of flags before the memorial monument, the High School Band, color guard and firing squad of local men in their service uniforms, Girl and Boy Scouts, Cubs and Brownies, and representatives of other town organizations formed into parade line and marched to Fairlawn cemetery at the end of Park avenue, followed by fire engines and many spectators. tor of Sproul Observatory and research professor of astronomy emeritus at Swarthmore College, died Saturday at his home at Kershaw road and Turner avenue in Wallingford. He was 86. A world-famed astronomer when

he retired from Swarthmore College in 1936 Dr. Miller, a native of Greenburg, Ind., graduated from the University of Indiana, attaining his doctorate at the University of Chicago in 1900 after a period of superintending Rockville, Ind. schools.

Becoming instructor and later assistant professor of mathematics at Leland Stanford University he numbered former President He bert Hoover among his students. It was there he began to achieve renown for his astronomical research. He also taught at Indiana University before coming to Swarthmore College as professo of mathmeatics and astronomy 1906. He continued in this capacity, also serving as vice-president of the College from 1914 to 1929, until he was made director o Sproul Observatory and research professor of astronomy in 1929. In 1910 he was instrumental in the installation of the largest telescope on the eastern seaboard at the Observatory. Dr. Urey listed three ways open to the world. First is continued re-arming and diplomatic jockeying which will lead to war and the complete destruction of civilization. Second is waging a huge war in a few years to conquer the world and rule it as we wish. This, he warned, may be a strict necessity. 



STATEAND COUNTY **WAR LOSS HIGH**

Complete list Issued By Army This Week

The first consolidated honor listing of dead and missing in World War II, just issued by the War Department, shows Pennsylvania bore 8.59 per cent of the total of those on Army service who failed to return. This state contributed 8.23 per cent of the total number who entered the Army though the 1940 census showed it contained only 7.37 per cent of the population of the United States and possessions (exclusive of the Philippine Islands). Of the Pennsylvanians who served in the Army 3.22 were lost.

Delaware County was fifth highest in the state listing 411 killed in action, 71 dead of wounds and injuries, 212 non-battle deaths, 55 determined to be dead, and 5 missing; a total of 754.

The entire national overall death and missing rate was 2.98 per cent. Of more than 10,000,000 men and women mobilized into the Army between the Presidential declaration of unlimited national emergency on May 27, 1941, and the concluding date of the study, January 31, 1946, a total of 307,554 had been killed in action, died of other causes or became missing, later to be determined dead. In addition, 1,424 persons were still car-

1946, bringing the total number of names in the list to 308,978.

Of the total, 57.1 per cent, numbering 176,432, were listed as killed in action. Other casualty breakdowns showed that 25,498 (8.25 per cent) died of wounds suffered in combat; 929 (0.3 per cent) died of combat injuries; 85,219 (27.6 per cent) died other than in battle. and 19,481 (6.3 per cent) were administratively determined to have died. The missing figure of 1.424 represented 0.45 per cent of the

Most of the persons who were determined to have died were carried for periods of at least one year in a missing status, and were declared, dead under Public Law 490, 77th Congress, after thorough investigation of each case.

The War Department is extremely reluctant to hold out hope to next of kin that any missing persons will be found alive. It is expected that after a reasonable lapse of time and after due investigation, most of these missing cases will be closed with findings of death.

The list was made up of 50 booklets, one for each state, one for the District of Columbia, and one for the Territories and Possessions of the United States. Each booklet contained a foreword explanatory of the methods of listing, a breakdown by counties and types of casualty, and an alphabetical listing by county of the name, serial number and grade of each individual and the manner in which he met his death. The Philippine Commonwealth was not included in the study.

The "death rate" in various states (which also includes missing) followed closely the proportions of their contributions to Army strength, although some dislocations were noted, especially in the case of New Mexico. which early in the war suffered heavy casualties in a National Guard unit in the Philippines. New Mexico, with four-tenths of one per cent of the nation's population, contributed .43 of one per cent of the Army's strength, and suffered .66 of one per cent of the Army's total deaths. The state's death rate in the Army was 4.77 per cent, as compared to the national average of 2.98 per cent.

The highest death rate was 5.05 per cent for the District of Columbia, but this figure included numerous Regular Army personnel who gave their home address as The Adjutant General, Washington, although they did not actually live in the nation's capital. Other high deaht rates were noted in Montana, with 4.53 per cent; North Dakota, 4.14 per cent, and Arizona, 4.01 per cent. The lowest death rate was in the case of the Territories, which lost only 1.18 per cent of their strength. Among the states, Maryland, with 2.20 per cent, had the lowest rate. Other states with low death ratios were Mississippi, 2.32 per cent; Louisiana, 2.36 per cent; Alabama, 2.54 per cent, and Florida, 2.63 percent.

New York State, with the largest population and the largest contribution to the Army's strength, lost 31,115 persons, the greatest number of any state. Other high death totals were found in the more populous states: Pennsylvania, 26,-554; Illinois, 18,601; California, 17,022; Ohio, 16,827; and Texas, 15,764. The least populous states generally had the smallest number of deaths: Nevada, 349; Delaware, 579; Wyoming, 652, and Vermont, 874.

The operation of the Selective Service System, which drew proportionately from all walks of life and all sections of the country, was noticeable throughout the report. An evidence of the democratic working of the draft was the fact that only three of the smallest of the nation's three thousand counties failed to suffer a casualty. These counties were King, in Texas; Esmeralda, in Nevada, and Yellowstone National Park, in Wyoming. The greatest losses among counties were in the most thickly populated areas: Cook (Chicago) Illinois, 9,723; Los Angeles, California, 6,674; Kings (Brooklyn) New York, 5,841. New York City, which is made up of the five borough-counties of Bronx, Kings, New York (Manhattan), Queens and Richmond (Staten Island), suffered 16,112 deaths. Other city totals were not available except in such cases as San Francisco (1,-\$65), Philadelphia (4,893), Baltimore (2,031) and St. Louis (1,636), where city and county are coex-

To insure greatest accuracy in preparation of the lists, The Adjutant General's office in Washington used punch-card tabulating and printing machines which automatically printed from coded cards the information appearing in the books. The lists were proofread after preparation and were reproduced to printing plates by photo-offset process, which reduced the possibility of error in composition.

In releasing the booklets, the War Department pointed out that the listing was a preliminary one, and might because of its scope contain errors which would be corrected when determined.

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



EXCERPT FROM A SOLDIER'S LETTER

"... So once again I view the saga of history and places. Beyond a doubt all States hold interest in their history, development and scenery, but I shall never tire of Pennsylvania. It alone embraces variety and romance that no other State can boast.

"I have found, in meeting men from all over the United States, that too few know much about their native States. I have recalled a hundred times the many trips we took as if they were yesterday. When I think of Pennsylvania, I see its very outline in my mind. The part that holds my interest for the moment is not just a name or a city; to me it is a picture, a scene in history, industry, a familiar road or mountain. It is a river or valley with a story that gives it a place in my memory.

"Who from somewhere else can say they saw and know where Marie Antoinette planned to make a home, Asylum! I climb again the steep winding stairs of Ephrata's Cloisters. I stand at night on Mt, Washington and look down at Pittsburgh's Golden Triangle and watch the great steel mills belching

fire and smoke. I tour Philadelphia, walk in Independence Square, and touch the Liberty Bell.

"Valley Forge ... Gettysburg ... Fort Necessity . . . they made history-books come alive! Oil wells against the sky; coal mines . . . coal, hard and soft . . . and learning what goes on to bring it as a lifeproduct to man.

"I think about Big Valley and see the Amish and Mennonite farmer folk with their queer clothes and recall stories of their strange customs.

"Pictures arise—the winding streams that challenge the fisherman; Lake Scranton, still as glass; looking for deer in the twilight woods; sleeping on a mountain top in Cook's Forest and watching the sun dispel the valley fog at daybreak; camping in the summertime, picking huckleberries, and seeing teaberry leaves pressed into wintergreen oil.

Who could be as lucky as I ... to have been shown what beauty was in my own back yard! . . . And yet, so many, even from Pennsylvania, don't know these things
