MICHAELS BEGIN SHOP RENOVATION

Extensive Remodeling Proceeds at Drug Store

The first postwar remodeling project in Swarthmore's business district was started this week by Michael's College Pharmacy.

Now under construction at "the corner druggie" facing the railroad station is an Acousti-Celotex ceiling designed to absorb sound and alleviate to a great extent the noise at the various busy times of the day. This is only one of the many new features which will contribute to the shopping pleasure of the store's patrons and to the enjoyment of those who pause there for refreshment.

The installation of complete new fixtures will include new booths in the smaller section of the store and arrangement of fixtures which enable a better display of goods in the main section.

Those boroughites who find the Philadelphia area humidity oppressive will be hieing to Michael's for longer sestas when they hear about the cooling system which pumps fresh air through the store every three minutes and keeps it continually comfortable.

Completing the "ceiling to floor" improvement a whole new floor will be laid as a final remodeling gesture.

ACTIVATE NAVAL RESERVE HERE

Wallingford Man Is C. O. of New Local Unit

Commander William H. Collins, USNR, of Brookside road, Wallingford, temporary commanding officer of Division 11 (organized Naval Reserve) under appointment of Vice Admiral J. L. Kauffman, USN commandant of the Fourth Naval District, announces the results of the unit's activation meeting held Monday evening in the Legion Room, Borough Hall.

A selection board of six officers sat from 7:30 until 10 o'clock to interview Naval Reserve Lieutenants (junior and senior grade) and ensigns, not over 35 years of age, and within the D, DE, C, E, SC, DET, MC, C or suffix R, X, or N classifications. A recommendation for the Division 11 staff was made to Admiral Kauffman and will be announced upon his approval.

Monday's session followed one ten days earlier in Chester and two held at Collins' home last week by senior Reserve officers of the area to review papers of interested junior officers and preliminary screenings.

Commander Collins told The Swarthmorean reporter the Division is happily reflecting the possibility of using the Mary Lyon School gym as an armory.

Lt. John B. Muskat who has been on duty with the Military Police in the Philippines for a year, has received his discharge and has joined his family on North Chester road.

Seek Memorial

The Swarthmore Post War Service Committee will meet at 7:30 next Tuesday evening. The committee is anxious to have all veterans of World War II attend and express their views on the type of memorial to be erected in honor of those men and women of Swarthmore who gave their lives.

To date the ideas suggested include: adoption of a town in France and care of all kiddies in that town; erection of a recreational building to be used by Swarthmoreans; outdoor swimming pool.

The Recreation program for younger children is in full swing at Rutgers avenue. Resident's 87 Years Spanned World Changes

Services were conducted here at 2:30, Tuesday afternoon, for Mrs. Maria Heyburn Marshall, widow of Henry Cooper Marshall, who died at her home on South Chester road Sunday night, June 30.

Mrs. Marshall was born in Birmingham Township, Delaware County, in 1859, the daughter of the late John Brinton Heyburn and Sarah Gilpin Heyburn. She and her husband came to Swarthmore in 1912 to make their home at Youghal on South Chester road. Eight years ago Mrs. Marshall removed to the residence at 312 South Chester road.

She is survived by four grandchildren, David Ham Marshall of Louisville, Ky., Mrs. Malcolm David West Irving of London, England, Mrs. Allan Hunter, Jr., of Bryn Mawr, and Miss Marianna Chapin Marshall of Philadelphia, and by a great grandson Alan Maurice Marshall Irving.

The Rev. William J. Alberts, Rector of Christ Church, Media, officiated at the services at Mrs. Marshall's home. Interment was in the Burial Ground of the Birmingham Friends Meeting.

COUNCIL METES BORO DECISIONS

Weighs Current Requests of Residents

Sitting in Summer session Monday evening Borough Council refused the request of Mrs. Walter Scott to convert her third floor at 306 North Chester road into an apartment for her son; and also denied H. M. Fricke of the Keystone Plastics Company, Princeton avenue, permission to pump water from the Little Crum Creek for a cooling system.

George C. Wagner, of Benjamin West avenue, asked relief from the flash storm floods which harass homeowners along the creek in his neighborhood. Borough Fathers decided to have Borough Engineer Gus Houtman make a survey of the condition and submit a report to Council.

A Board of Adjustment report revealed permission granted Paul Banks for conversion of the second floor of his garage into an apartment.

Council closed with the authorization of the employment of an additional radio operator in order to reduce the policemen's hours from 54 to 48 per week.

O. E. Rodgers of Riverview road was appointed manager of development and research engineering of the Westinghouse Aviation Gas Turbine Division at Lester, Pa., on June 27.

Mr. Rodgers has served with the company since 1938. He was a research engineer and later design engineer on the gas turbines.

Clamp Prices Here

Robert Honeyford, president of the Swarthmore Business Association, in a statement to The Swarthmorean announces that local merchants have pledged cooperation in President Truman's effort to keep prices down.

Although in some branches town business folk have been forced to increase charges to patrons by rising costs during the war years, a number have steadfastly refused to move them up even at an economic setback themselves.

The town is now determined to do whatever is in its power locally to confine prices to their present level as long as it is possible.

PHOSPHORUS SETS SCHOOL AFIRE

Luckily Chemical's Bark Is Worse Than Bite

The lesson of "an irresistible force meeting an immovable body" would have been illustrated most explosively to local high school students had classes been in session on Monday of this week. As it was, scholars recessing on summer vacation also missed the opportunity to put their fire drills into real action at the scene of the spontaneous combustion.

At about 3 o'clock in the afternoon phosphorus in a cabinet in the school's chemistry store room ignited, undetermined gases existing in the room, blowing out a window with a loud noise and shaking the entire building. Phosphorus fires are extremely difficult to control but the Borough Fire Company chipped out the storage cabinet and kept the blaze checked while of necessity, allowing it to burn out. Used to make smoke bombs phosphorus lacks combative agents.

Although dense smoke traveled through the whole building actual damage was slight.

New Library Hours

Woman's Club Head Gave Valued Service

Memorial services were conducted Wednesday night in the Presbyterian Church by Dr. David Braun for Mrs. Frank R. Morey who died suddenly at her home on Yale avenue, Tuesday morning. The President of the Woman's Club of Swarthmore, she had completed one year of a two year term of office. During her faithful administration the club had reached peak membership and activity.

Born Edith Swan in Buffalo, N. Y., Mrs. Morey graduated from Teacher's College, Columbia University, and remained there to teach. She maintained a deep interest in nutritional problems and studies throughout her life. She came to Swarthmore 16 years ago when her husband was appointed Supervising Principal of the Swarthmore Public Schools from Camp Hill, Pa. Her interest and friendliness have been generously spent in the community.

Mrs. Morey was a member of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church active in its Church School and in its Women's Association in which she had just ended two years as corresponding secretary. She was the Historian of the American Legion Auxillary and had served that organization in many other capacities. She was a former officer of the Swarthmore Music Club.

She is survived by her husband and two sons Frederick, 19, Aviation Machinist's Mate, USNR, stationed at Charleston, R. I., and David, 17, a senior in Swarthmore High School; and by a sister Mrs. W. H. Bulman of Belleville, N. J., and two brothers William H. Swan of Newark, N. J., and H. Judson Swan of Jersey City, N. J.

Meryweather To Celebrate at St. Paul's

The Rev. Thomas A. Meryweather, of Haverford place, Rector elect of the Episcopal Church of the Advocate, 18th and Diamond streets, Philadelphia will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on Sunday, July 7, at St. Paul's Church, Chester, where he will conduct services during July and part of August. For the past two years Mr. Meryweather has been associate rector of the Church of St. Luke and the Epiphany, Philadelphia.

During his ministry he has been active in the fields of human relations and law enforcement. After his ordination in Philadelphia in 1921 he served in parishes in that city, Bucks County and in the State of Oregon. In 1923, he with others, organized the Crime Prevention Association in Philadelphia, and was the executive head of this work from that date until 1944.

A veteran of World War I, he assisted in the organization of the 1st Regiment, Pennsylvania State Guard in 1941, serving as staff officer and later as company commander. During World War II he served as civilian chaplain to Army troops stationed in Philadelphia, and for a short time was executive secretary of the War Commission of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania.

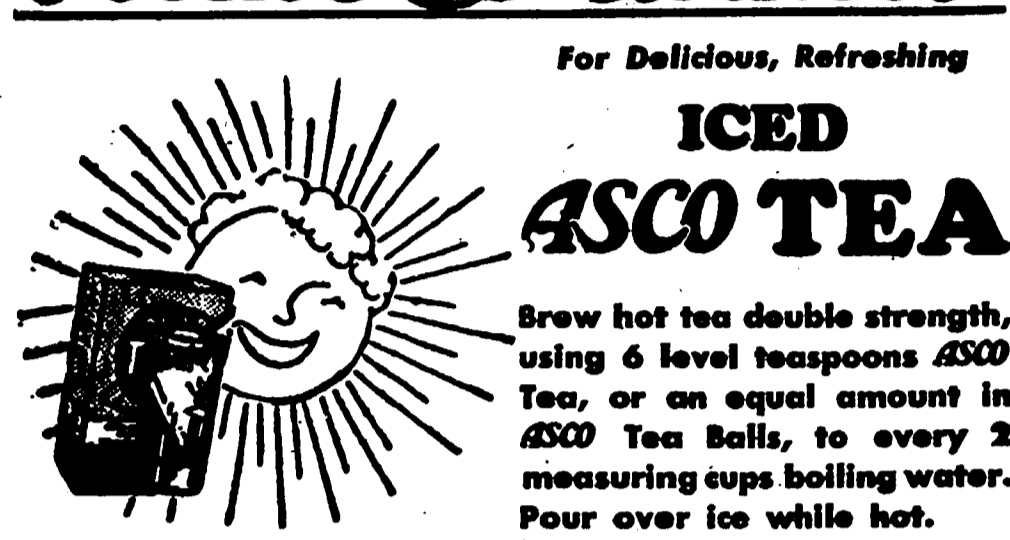

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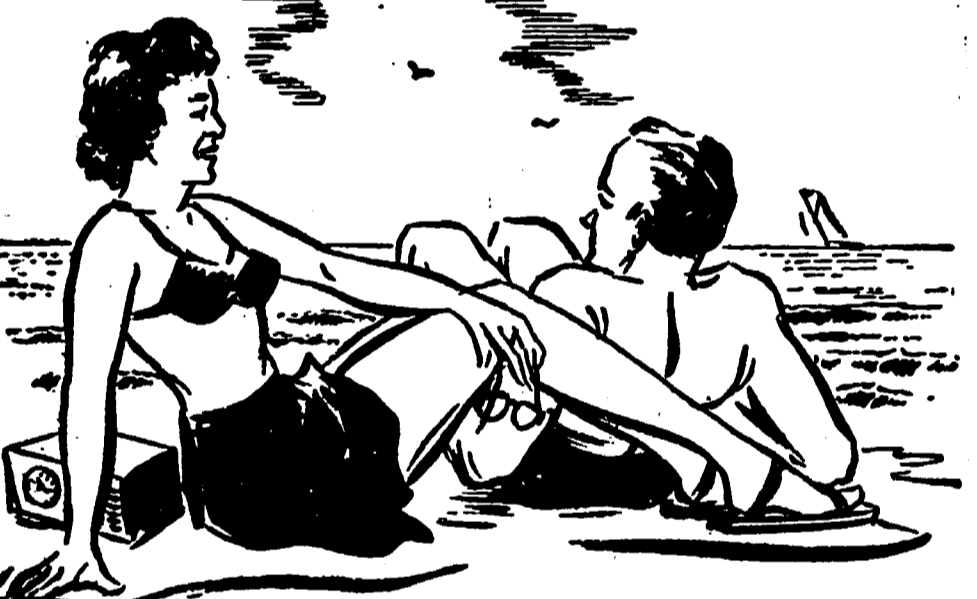

Highlights of Regular Army Enlistment

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
4. Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
5. Consult your Army Recruiting Officer for other furlough privileges.
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
