MICHAELS BEGIN SHOP RENOVATION **ExtensiveRemodeling**

Proceeds at Drug Store

The first postwar remodeling project in Swarthmore's business district was started this week by Michael's College Pharmacy.

Now under construction at "the corner druggie" facing the railroad station is an Acousti-Celotex ceiling designed to absorb sound and alleviate to a great extent the noise at the various busy times of the day. This is only one of the many new features which will contribute to the shopping pleasure of the store's patrons and to the enjoyment of those who pause there for refreshment.

The installation of complete new fixtures will include new booths in the smaller section of the store and arrangement of fixtures which enable a better display of goods in the main section.

Those boroughites who find the Philadelphia area humidity oppressive will be hieing to Michael's for longer siestas when they hear about the cooling system which pumps fresh air through the store every three minutes and keeps it continually comfortable.

Completing the "ceiling to floor" improvement a whole new floor will be laid as a final remodeling gesture.

The Rev. Thomas A. Meryweather, of Haverford place, Rector elect of the Episcopal Church of the Advocate, 18th and Diamond streets, Philadelphia will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on Sunday, July 7, at St. Paul's Church, Chester, where he will conduct services during July and part of August. For the past two years Mr. Meryweather has been associate rector of the Church of St. Luke and the Epiphany, Philadelphia.

During his ministry he has been active in the fields of human relations and law enforcement. After his ordination in Philadelphia in 1921 he served in parishes in that city, Bucks County and in the State of Oregon. 




Glendale Project Has Enlarged Scope, Uses

Situated at Knowles Avenue and MacDade Boulevard in Glenolden the Glendale Child Care Center, formerly a government project operating on federal funds, is now under the Delaware County Child Care Association on funds appropriated by the Philadelphia Community Chest and is open to all county children from two to 12 years of age, who need some supplement to home care.

Mrs. Charles S. Paul, former director of the Institute Nursery School in Philadelphia and the Child Study School of Louisville, Ky.; was appointed director when the County Association took over the administration of the center on July 1. When the war ended and federal funds were withdrawn, parents using the center had such great need for its service that they formed the Glendale Nursery Association and operated it themselves for a while. This system was too expensive and members also lacked the time to give the center the kind of supervision they wished, since they were all working parents.

Through an appropriation by the Community Chest. a Red Feather Service, the association hopes not only to continue work kept going by these earnest and enthusiastic parents, but to broaden its scope so that it may serve more people in more ways.

The reasons for supplementary care are many and varied. Both parents may work: homes broken for various reasons often meansthat one parent needs assistance: there may be no children of the child's own age in his immediate vicinity: a child may present a problem which can be worked out with the group; the shy child who needs the contact of his contemporaries under an understanding adult. All these are situations where the center can be of help and service.

All parents wishing to use the center first discuss the situation with the director and plans are made with the parents for a program at the center and at home

which will be most helpful for that particular child. In the summer, a play and craft program is carried on for the older children for the entire day. In the winter, school age children are cared for before school in the

morning and after school in the afternoon The school is open from seven in the morning to six o'clock in the evening. This is to accommodate people who need to use the center at various hours. It is not advocated that children stay at the center for such long hours.

The charge is calculated on a sliding scale according to the in come of the parents. The day's activities include opportunity for both group participation and individual development.

A large playroom and playground provide ample space for the children to partake in both free and directed play. The group children are grouped for play according to their stages of development. Periods for hand work, music and stories are provided. A large covered porch on the side of the building makes an ideal spot for these activities.
