THE SWARTHMORE SUFFRAGE LEAGUE CHANGES NAME AND FORM

Its Birth in 1888

The annual meeting of the Swarthmore Woman Suffrage League was held at the home of Mrs. Pusey on May 18th.

The county chairman, Mrs. C. E. Martin, was present, also Mrs. L. L. Smith. They spoke of the advantages of the party form of organization, resulting from the close union and interdependence of State, county and local organizations. The State is able especially to push publicity and political work better than the locals can do.

The State is now planning much new work for the locals.

The league then adopted unanimously the following amendment: That the Swarthmore Woman Suffrage League be merged into the Woman Suffrage

PRIZES GIVEN FOR PEACE ESSAYS

The Woman's Peace Party of Swarthmore recently offered two prizes to the students of the Swarthmore schools for the best essays on the "Brotherhood of Nations." Twenty essays were handed in on May 18th, which was Peace Day. Eight were from the Swarthmore Preparatory School, ten from the Mary Lyon School and two from the Swarthmore Public School. The essays were all good and reflected credit upon the English departments of the schools. The decision of the judges is as follows: Prize of five dollars to student of high school age, winner, Mary Kerney, of the Mary Lyon School; prize of three dollars to student of grammar grade, winner, Dorothy Tomlinson, of the Swarthmore Preparatory School.

Another essay was so close to that of Mary Kerney that the Woman's Peace Party decided to award another prize of two dollars. This prize goes to Ambrose A. Arnold, of the Swarthmore Preparatory School. Honorable mention is made of Sarah E. Bidler, of the Swarthmore Public School.

BACCALAUREATE SERVICES AT SWARTHMORE COLLEGE

Swarthmore College feels that it is fortunate this year in having the Director of the American Red Cross, Ernest B. Bicknell, to deliver the Baccalaureate address to the class of 1916. The address will be delivered in Parish Hall at 11:30, Sunday, June 11th. The Red Cross work represents applied Christianity, much needed in this generation. His topic will be "The Ideals of the American Red Cross," a most fitting one for the day. Mr. Bicknell was born in Vincennes, Indiana. He was engaged in newspaper work chiefly in Indianapolis, was secretary of the Indiana State Board of Charities, general superintendent of the Chicago Bureau of Charities, and has been National Director of the American National Red Cross, Washington, since 1906. He has participated actively in many reform movements in Chicago and elsewhere. He represented the American National Red Cross at San Francisco in 1906, Sicily and Calabria in 1909, registered at U. S. at International Red Cross Congress, London, England, 1907, was president National Conference on Prisons and Correction 1908-09; director of National Association for Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, Washington; member of Prisoners' Association; member of American Prison Association.

Commencement week at the college is to be marked by a number of interesting events that will make the occasion a memorable one to all who participate in the exercises. On Class Day, which will be Friday, June 9, the presentation of the "The Merry Wives of Windsor" will follow the regular Class Day exercises.

Party of Pennsylvania, and he made auxiliary to the Delaware County Women Suffrage Party.

Under this new and more democratic form of organization it is hoped in the near future to enroll all Swarthmore's suffragists.

Officers were elected as follows:
Leader, Mrs. R. C. Brooks; vice leader, Mrs. Jesse H. Hilditch; honorary vice leaders, Dr. William J. Hill and Dr. George Kusel; treasurer, Mrs. Thacher; recording secretary, Miss Ashton; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Marriott; enrollment chairman, Mrs. Robinson; finance chairman, Mrs. Porter; press, Miss Sellers; literature, Mrs. Marot; meetings, Mrs. Bellies; study class, Mrs. Plass.

Beginning in September, monthly meetings will be held, and an interesting study course pursued.

The league, which has thus ended its existence as a league, was founded in 1888, almost at the birth of the village itself. Swarthmore was little more than a group of houses on the hill when the call came for a meeting at the Lowndes Free Church to discuss the formation of a suffrage society.

The progressive spirit was even then strong here, and seventeen earnest-minded women—a large number for the small population—gave their names as members of the new society. The quiet uniting efforts of the league, thus founded, large credit is due for the splendid results at our polls last fall.

Many of its charter members are deceased, but its officers are all living, and two of them are still Swarthmore citizens.

President, Mrs. H. E. Price; vice president, Mrs. Rachel W. Hillborn; secretary, Miss Beatrice Magill; treasurer, Mrs. Mary L. Kent.

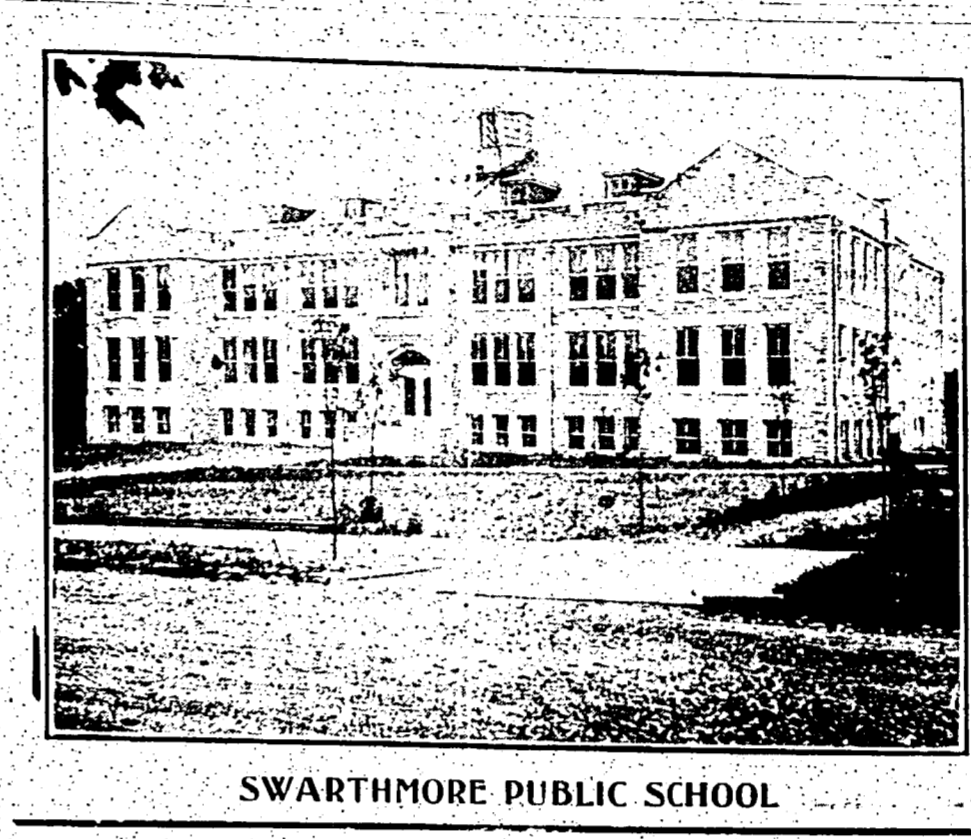

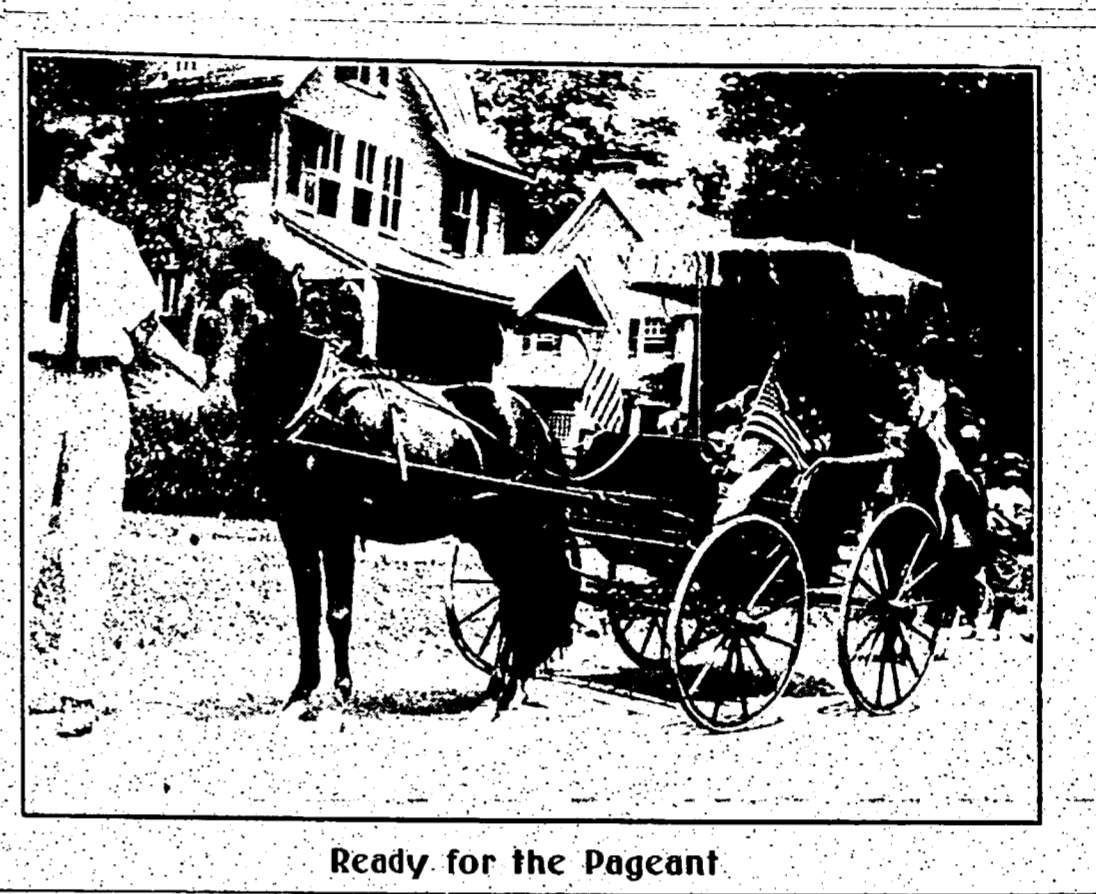

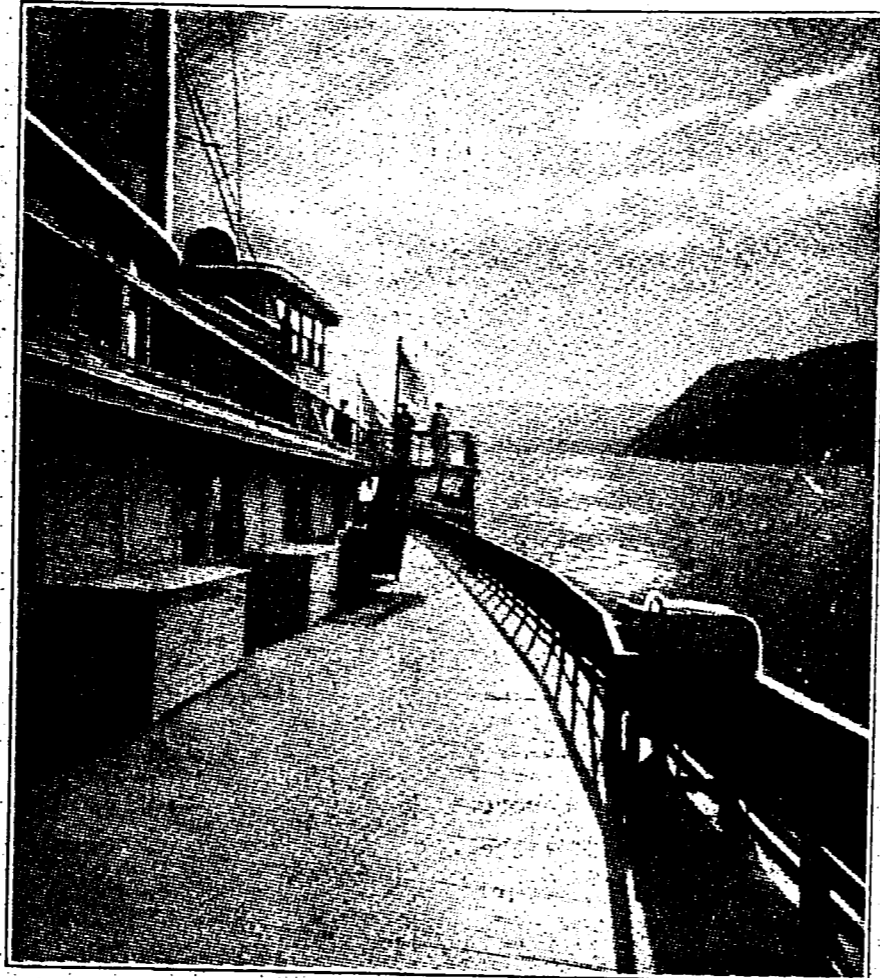

A MOSQUITO ENEMY

There are a number of small private ponds around Swarthmore which have been thought to form breeding places for mosquitoes. These ponds have been thoroughly inspected and found to be free of any stage of mosquito life. This is due to the presence of a few fish, which eat the larvae. Some experiments in connection with the work showed also that the fish pounce upon

any unlucky adult mosquito which falls on the surface of the water.

Following this idea, a number of minnows and small fish will be placed in the various streams about Swarthmore. Such streams should not be used as fishing places for a few years until the fish have a proper length of time to multiply.

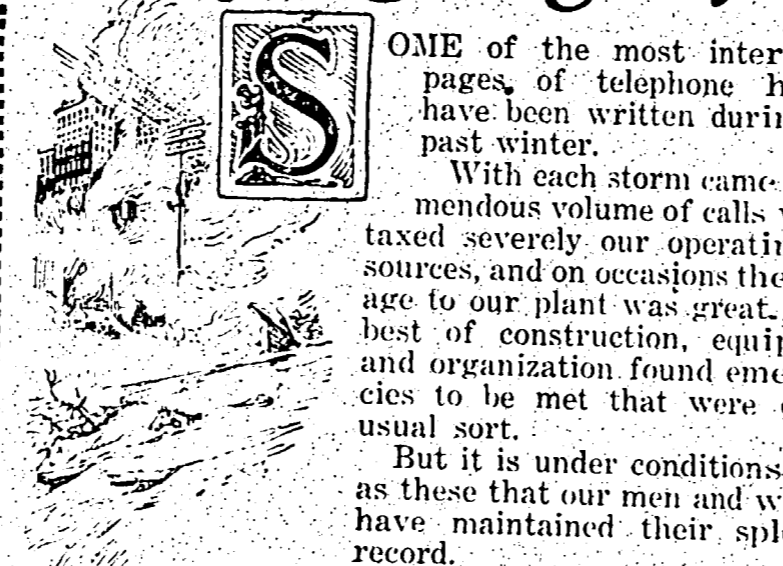

Meeting the Emergency



SOME of the most interesting pages of telephone history have been written during the past winter.

With each storm came a tremendous volume of calls which taxed severely our operating resources, and on occasions the damage to our plant was great. The best of construction, equipment and organization found emergencies to be met that were of no usual sort.

But it is under conditions such as these that our men and women have maintained their splendid record.

Many times during the past twelvemonth, linemen have battled with the havoc in the wake of a storm and they have met those emergencies with stout hearts and grit and ready hands, and almost unbelievable records for restoring service have been established. At "strategic" points, extra equipment, sufficient to replace several complete central offices are kept in "emergency" store rooms, awaiting that moment at high noon or midnight when the call for relief may go out.

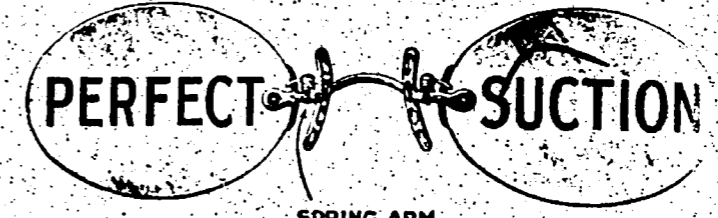
