Rev. Warren To Head Tougaloo

Resigns Pastorate to Lead Negro College

The Rev. Harold C. Warren, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Warren, Pa., for the past nine years, is resigning his pastorate to accept the presidency of Tougaloo College, Jackson, Miss. Former Swarthmorean and brother of Dr. George P. Warren of South Chester road, Rev. Warren will assume his duties as head of Mississippi's only accredited college for negroes on September 1.

Rev. Warren told his congregation Sunday morning that he had accepted the position because it presented "an opportunity in the field of education, church related and Christian in character, which is at the spearhead of progress in race relations." Graduates from Tougaloo College have made an outstanding record as professional leaders and the college occupies a strategic position in negro education and indirectly in the progress of white education in Mississippi.

Tougaloo has a campus of 500 acres. Its many buildings include a newly completed dormitory and a large, modern gymnasium to be dedicated in September. A grade school, high school, and college are operated under the same administration, with students majoring in education practice teaching in the lower schools.

While operated under an independent board of trustees, some from the south, others from Chicago, New York, and New England, Tougaloo is closely related with the Congregational-Christian denomination. Rev. Warren will remain a Presbyterian minister but will become also a minister in the Congregational Church. Most of the institution's income is derived from the national United Negro College Fund and the General Board of Christian Education. The president of the board is president of the Jackson, Miss., Bar Association.

The Warrens, who have recently visited the college report that Jackson is a modern, progressive city which gave them a warm, cordial welcome. Rev. and Mrs. Warren have been active in the community life of Warren, serving it in many capacities and express themselves as valuing highly the friendly relations enjoyed in church and community. In the years of Rev. Warren's presidency of the Warren Ministerial Association the Warren School of Week-day Religious Education was begun, largely as a result of his investigation of similar work in Pittsburgh.

Rev. Warren's formal education was pursued at the Swarthmore Preparatory School, Princeton University, McCormick Theological Seminary, and New College (University of Edinburgh, Scotland), with graduate work at the University of Chicago and the University of Pittsburgh. His first year in the ministry he was Assistant Pastor in the National Presbyterian Church, Washington, D. C., then pastor of churches in Walla-Walla, Wash., Detroit, and Chicago. In the first World War he was a YMCA Secretary with the 29th Division, AEF.

Lost Items on Display at H.S.

With one look at the domestic science room in the Swarthmore High School where six large tables, one desk and sixteen chairs sit, all covered with articles collected from a year at school, it is hard to see why Miss Cannon's, Miss Chadwick's and Miss a'Becket's hairs haven't turned white. For there, in room 106, is the Happy Hunting Ground of all the jackets, rubbers and caps that ever had the misfortune to be lost.

The statistics of the thing go something like this: two tables of sweaters, shirts and blouses, one table of scarfs, belts and handkerchiefs, one table and five chairs of galoshes and rubbers, two tables of mittens and caps, and the backs of eleven chairs hung with jackets and coats. This list so far has not mentioned the brief cases, the lunch box, camera and jump rope, the slide rules, four pairs of glasses, innumerable glasses cases, pens, rings and bracelets, a catcher's mitt, two umbrellas, and a deflated silver football.

As one weary worker put it, how can the families afford to lose so much? But to others the burning question is: Where are the mates to the 16 rubbers and one galosh? Are they home in their closets, or no use to themselves or anyone else? Have they gone to the trash heap in despair of reunion? Nobody knows. But it is easier to grieve with the one little galosh that is alone all alone, than the 16 rubbers alone all together.

Miss a'Becket seems depressed by the whole situation, Miss Cannon wishes people would be more careful. But Miss Chadwick repeats, "How can they afford to lose them? For Miss Chadwick still remembers the winter coat that turned up at the office one year with no owner and no home. Miss Chadwick undertook to take care of it, but summer came and with it the gnawing appetite of the moth, (genus Tinea). So the coat spent the summer in Mrs. Samuel Dodd's cedar chest for protection. Finally, in the fall and cold weather, its shivering owner came to claim it.

It is the earnest hope of the office force mentioned above that the owners would come to claim the various articles displayed in room 106. schools, Agnes Brady, commercial teacher at the Haddon Heights high school in New Jersey being one, and the other, Miss Strouse, who is teaching Latin as well as supervising French. The other twelve are cadet teachers from various Colleges including West Chester State Teachers' College, and experienced out-of-state teachers chalking up hours for their Pennsylvania State certificates. The majority of the out-side stu-

dents attending the school are making up failures. The majority of the Swarthmore pupils are jacking up grades and conditions or getting a firmer foundation in their low subjects before taking the advanced courses. A third and smaller group are previewing courses they plan to take in the fall. The school does not discourage this last group, but it has found that previewing works better in science and history than in languages or math where the ground is covered too quickly for a beginner to follow.

However, the next two weeks cannot go by too quickly for any one of the groups, for, while even the students can be forced into admitting that summer school is a good thing, no one will be happier than they when August 1 hits the town—unless it's the teachers.

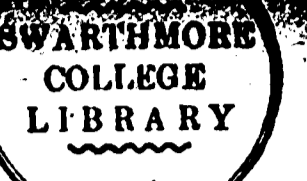

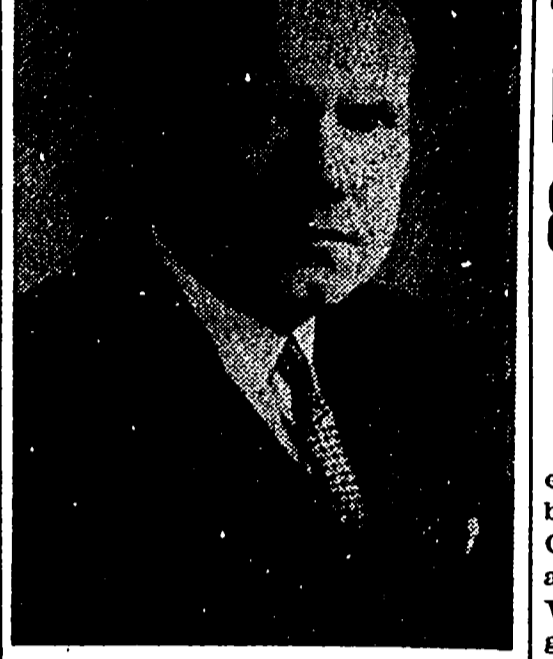
Flowers Cheer Flowerless

MCCABE HEAD OF CHESTER DRIVE

Thomas B. McCabe of North Chester road, president of the Scott Paper Company, Chester, is general chairman of this fall's Community Fund Drive in Chester.
Mr. McCabe announced yesterday that Chester and Philadelphia will join in the next cooperative campaign and cooperatively raise money for Delaware County welfare agencies.
While maintaining their separate identities, the strength of the Community Fund of Chester and the Community Chest of Philadelphia will be pooled.
There are 21 health, welfare and youth guidance agencies in Delaware County participating in the Community Fund of Chester. Another 11 agencies operating in the county receive their funds from the Philadelphia Chest. Six agencies receiving funds from the Chester Fund also are aided by the Philadelphia Chest.
Because both the Chester and Philadelphia funds in past years have solicited separately in county communities, and among the industries, with occasional friction and duplication, the decision to operate jointly is hailed by leaders and workers as a forward step.
Chairman McCabe points out that both Chester and Philadelphia have strength to offer each other in a co-ordinated campaign.
"Chester has accomplished much in its house-to-house solicitations, while Philadelphia has been successful in obtaining the maximum support of industry, labor and the people of substantial means," he said.

SUPERVISED SWIMMING

Twenty patients last Friday, in various stages of recovery were paddling in and about the pool in corresponding stages of activity. The mildest cases dived and swam in the deep end of the pool with only a life guard or two keeping a wary eye out for trouble. The youngest children and the severest cases were concentrated in the shallow end, each with a person to help or encourage him with the exercises.
Louise, a little girl of eight or so, hung from the edge of the pool and kicked her feet the best exercise possible for abdominal muscles still paralyzed from the disease. In the green chair, Bobby, a wife and mother of two children, exercised her legs. Stricken two years ago, and paralyzed from her neck down, Bobby spent the early part of her recovery in a respirator. She now has control of her arms and trunk, and is working on her legs and feet.

ment of course is carried on throughout the year, but what the foundation values so highly in a pool is the number of patients that can be cared for at one time. As many as 20 were being treated in the two-hour period last Friday afternoon, and the chapter is expecting more. Not even the old-fashioned bathtub can accommodate more than one at a time.

What makes even the borrowing the pools so difficult is the anathema most owners have to the word "polio" or "Infantile Paralysis." In the first place, by the time a person's illness can be diagnosed as polio, the carrier stage is over. In the second place polio patients are not permitted to swim or use the pool for several months after they have first contracted the disease, for medical reasons.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Meanwhile, the treatments are to continue at the Morrow pool until the middle of October. Anyone wanting to join the volunteers helping informally at the pool on Wednesdays and Fridays from two till four in the afternoon, should contact Miss Palmer at the Delaware County headquarters in the Crozer Building in Chester, telephone 2-3564. People with cars are urgently needed to help with the transportation.

A NATIONAL FOUNDATION

The National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis, organized just ten years ago, was planned to aid financially and medically any family needing or wanting help as a result of polio being in the family. The foundation's policy is that no family's standard of living shall be lowered as a result of this virus disease, for polio is the most expensive illness a person can contract. Not only is it the immediate expense of the illness, but it is lingering disease often requiring braces, crutches, and constant medical attention. In caring for their rather large family of 93, the chapter uses funds collected in the January March of Dimes campaign. Last January Delaware County managed to garner \$30,000, a half of which went to New York for the Research and the Emergency Epidemic Funds. The \$15,000 remaining to the chapter for running expenses for the entire year was spent last month on equipment and medical care. This means that the County must draw on the Emergency fund in New York, set up for such situations. It has been estimated they could run the chapter at an

approximate \$100,000 a year, including the 50% for the New York fund. Compared to the amount collected last January, Delaware Co. is receiving far below its Foundation needs.

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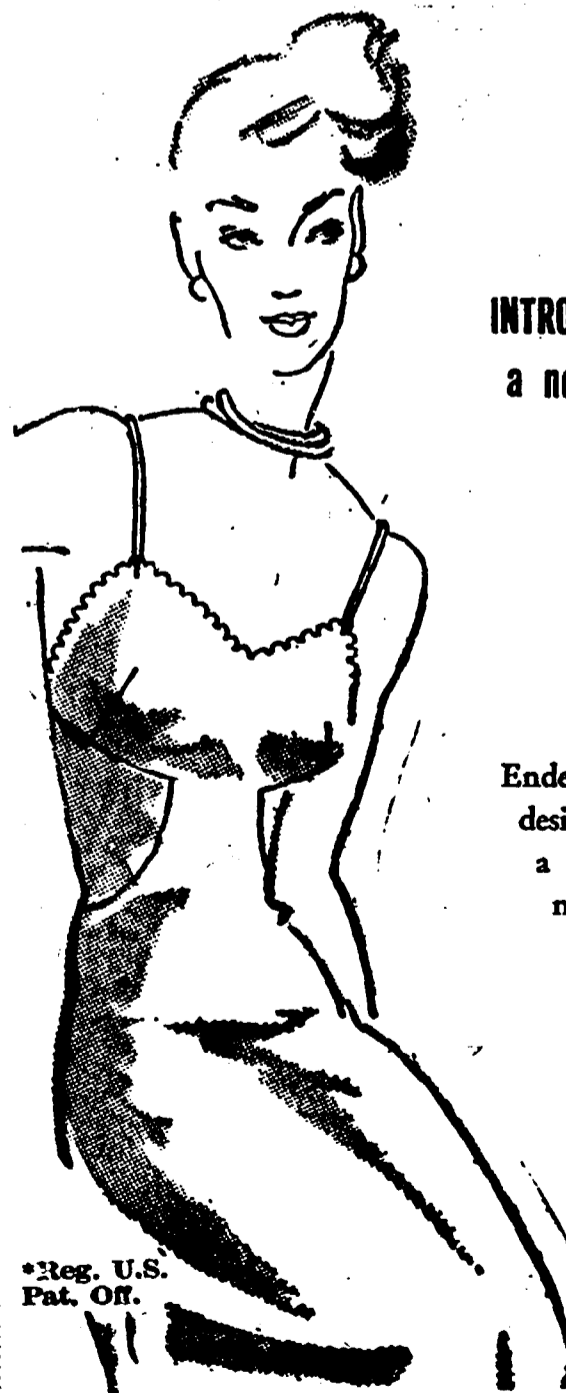
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
