

Banding Experiences Related By Noted Naturalist

A unique feature in the modern life of American nature study is to be shown in Swarthmore. Wed. evening, November 12, at the College, under the auspices of the Zoological Society. Mr. Charles L. Broley of Delta, Ontario, will portray the romantic story of the banding of young eagles and the mass of important information which has resulted. Mr. Broley is a retired banker of Winnipeg and a self-taught naturalist. In behalf of the Canadian and the American Governments Mr. Broley has undertaken to band all of the eagles of the Eastern seaboard. Until his advent the total government banding was in the thirties. Alone, by incredible feats of personal prowess, he has scaled the high trees containing eagle's nests, from Maine to Florida. Mr. Broley has a record of having banded more than nine hundred, showing the range and flight, the food and the habits of the American eagle. He has shed new light on its distribution and upon its habits of Curiously, Mr. Broley's most thrilling adventures have come in the form of attacks by other birds such as goshawks, rather than



Most serious is that of peak-hour traffic. This problem was lessened somewhat during the war by the staggered hours program which spread the peak traffic load.

Now, without the benefits of staggered hours, peak-hour traffic is more concentrated, with half the system's 3,200,000 daily passengers riding between 7 and 9 AM and between 4:30 and 6:30 PM. This tremendous volume of riding, funneled into a few hours, is graphically illustrated by the chart at left. PTC is working constantly

on this problem, and we hope that our efforts will keep overcrowding at a minimum during these hours of heaviest travel. You can help by avoiding the morning and afternoon trave peaks if you can choose the time you ride.

Final Panel Concerns Immigration Laws And Quotas

A five-women panel from the Media League discussing the displaced persons problem in Europe today was the feature presentation of the final meeting of the International Relations Study group of the Swarthmore League of Women Voters held Thursday November 13 at the home of Mrs. William Huey at 303 Dickinson avenue.

The panel, composed of Mrs. Joseph Marin, Mrs. Leon Saul Mrs. Frank Royce, Mrs. Isaac Dornblum, and Mrs. Clyde Shuler analyzed suggested solutions to the problem, emphasizing that failure to reach a solution would be one of the most serious dangers to the peace so dearly won. The Stratton Bill and the Ferguson Bill, now before Congress, would not alter the basic quota law governing immigration nor permanently change the present immigrations laws. The panel closed with an appeal to individual citizens to write congress men supporting these bills.

Dr. Frances Fussell then discussed the tariff acts of the Recriprocal Trade Agreements United Sates of the past, and the group series closed with the an-Act, and explained that our prosperity depends upon expanding world trade and establishing a sound world econmoy.
