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Present Resolution To Teacher's Widow

A testimonial resolution, signed by 17 officials of the various Philadelphia Public High Schools, presented posthumously to Roy W. Delaplaine of Cornell avenue reads:

"Over the years, a man's personality and character develop by the manner in which he meets life's problems. To the degree he faces them and conquers them, so is his measure as a man. Whereas, Roy W. Delaplaine in his everyday life met all conditions honestly, sincerely, and vigorously, helped those who needed it most, kept counsel ever with the rightness of things, made decisions with an integrity that was as real as it was apparent, therefore: be it

"Resolved, that this resolution be inscribed on the minutes of the Supervisory Committee on Boy's Athletics of the Philadelphia Senior High School, and an engrossed copy signed by all members be sent to his wife, April 1948."

At the time of Mr. Delaplaine's death several months ago, he had served in the Philadelphia schools for three decades.

Heads Delta Gamma

Mrs. E. Tiel Smith of the Stone House, Strath Haven Inn returned Wednesday from Swampscott, Mass. where she was elected national president at the Delta Gamma convention which was attended by 500 delegates.

Mrs. Smith who is a graduate of Swarthmore College joined the fraternity here. She served as national treasurer for several years and was appointed by the Grand Council in 1947 to fill the vacancy left by the retiring president. This is the first time she has been elected to the office by the convention which represents the 40,000 college students and alumni in the United States and Canada who are members of Delta Gamma.

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The Service Committee program in Austria includes a supplementary feeding program of 600 calories daily for about 1,000 teen-age apprentices and the distribution of 6,000 food packages monthly to tubercular young people under 25 years of age. In addition to these relief activities, the Quakers are sponsoring two Neighborhood Centers and a day care center. The day care center is operated in cooperation with the Vienna Educational Department.

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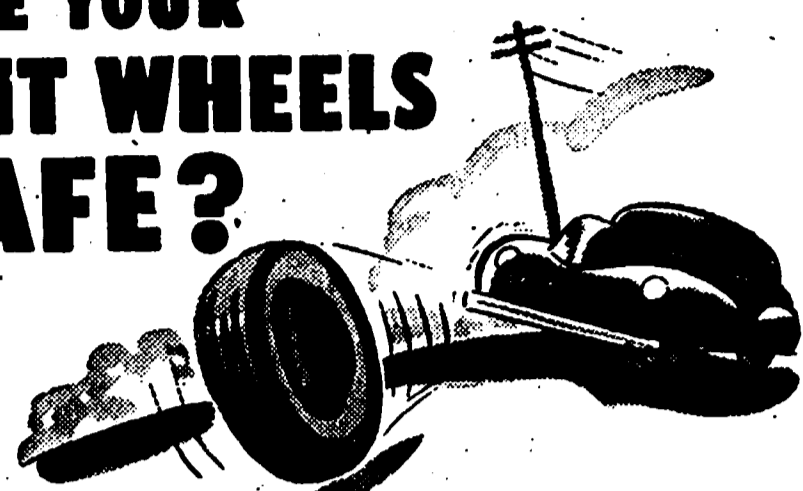

INSTITUTE OFFERS COLLEGE COURSES

Professional Standing Available for Realtors

Real Estate students have been enjoying case study courses offered at the college by the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers. The Institute, organized in 1934, has the two-fold purpose of putting appraisal of real estate on a scientific and professional basis and of identifying those individuals who have studied the science of value in real property. The organization is patterned after existing professional societies.

The Institute made great progress in the fourteen years since its organization and has undertaken an extensive program of education in the field. The course at Swarthmore College is one of several which are being given in cooperation with colleges and universities.

The Swarthmore program consists of two two-week courses, Course No. 1 is dedicated to the field of residential real estate; Course No. 2 which began June 28, is dedicated to the appraisal of income properties. Over 100 students, ranging in experience from men just starting in the business to seasoned assessors, lenders, managers and brokers, were registered for both courses.

This organization was largely the conception of Philip W. Kniskern of Riverview road. Mr. Kniskern served as Chairman of the Organization Committee and as the first President of the American Institute.

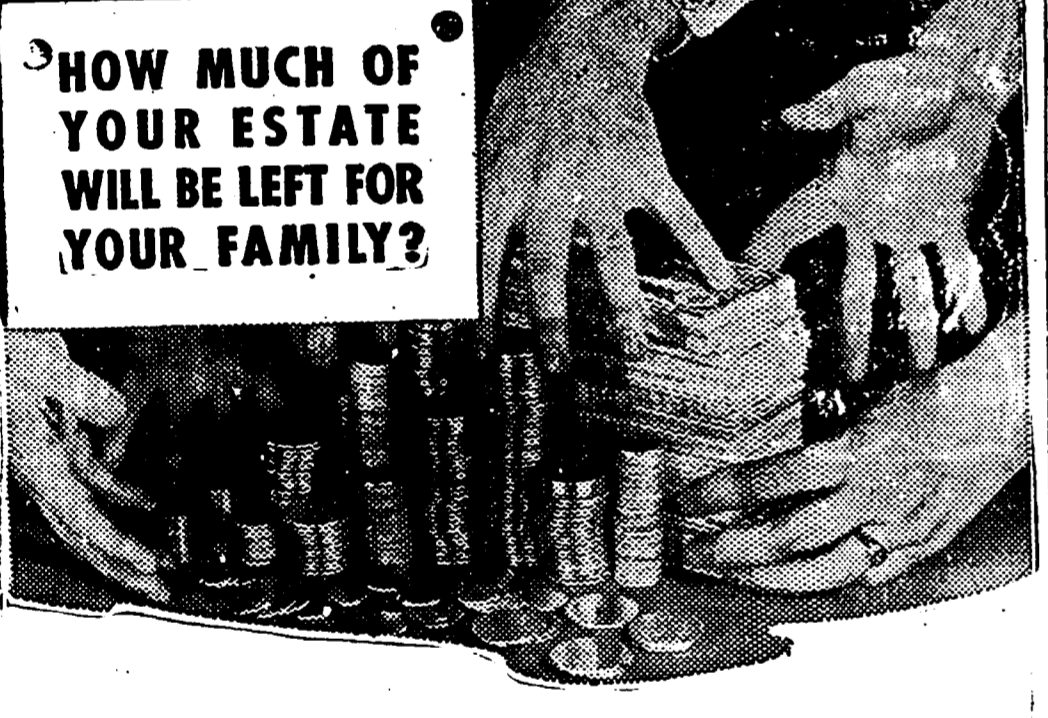

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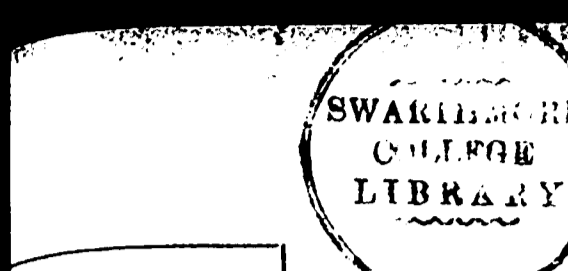

An Ordinance authorizing cooperation with the Pennsylvania Department of Highways in the widening and draining of the roadway of Chester Road from Yale Avenue to Westdale Avenue, authorizing the proper Borough officers, at the expense of the Borough, to be relocated where necessary; and prohibiting parking upon said highway.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1. The proper Borough officers are hereby authorized to cooperate with the Pennsylvania Department of Highways in the widening of the roadway of Chester Road, from Yale Avenue to Westdale Avenue, Southwardly to Westdale Avenue, to a total width of twenty-six (26) feet, and the proper draining of the same, said improvement to be made by and at the expense of the said Pennsylvania Department of Highways.

Section 2. The proper Borough officers, in cooperation with the said Department of Highways, shall at the expense of the Borough, cause proper curbs to be laid and sidewalks to be relocated where necessary. Existing materials shall be installed at the expense of the Borough where necessary.

Section 3. Contracts for doing the Borough's share of the foregoing improvements shall be let in accordance with law and there is hereby appropriated out of general funds of the Borough available for such purpose, and amount sufficient to defray the expense thereof.

Section 4. The parking of vehicles upon any portion of the said section of highway, except for the purpose of loading and unloading, is hereby prohibited under penalties provided by existing Borough ordinances.

Section 5. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the widening of the present legal limits of said section of Chester Road or changes in the lines and grades thereof.

Section 6. Authority is hereby given the Highway and Public Safety Committee of the Borough to authorize all incidental acts and incur any incidental expense in connection with the completion of the foregoing project.

Lunch prepared by the children before setting out, was eaten on a large pile of logs and when they reached the end of the trail, a rest on the log cabin's front porch was enjoyed by all. While at school, clay modeling and easel painting are most popular of the activities in which the children engage. Four year old's parents are invited to come for inspection next Tuesday morning.

The pre-school group has been enjoying quite a social whirl with two parties and two trips in as many weeks. Shirley Little and "Miss Betty" each had a birthday at "recreation", complete with candy baskets and birthday hats made by the children.

Their current study deals with Indians, so last week on their trip through the woods they were quite thrilled at actually meeting two "braves" about eight years old, in full headdress, stripped to the waist and carrying bows and arrows. This week the group was entertained at the home of Betsy McKee, where the children played in the sand, enjoyed the wading pool and had a lovely tea party in the garden. Flower Service Has Thirty Year Record

Buckets and containers are still being placed on the Woman's Club porch for flowers to be sent to the wards of the Philadelphia General Hospital, by Mrs. D. Reed Geer and her garden committee. Contributors may bring their bouquets any time Wednesday afternoon or evening and up until Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

A traditional summer activity in Swarthmore for over thirty years, the Flowers for the Flowerless service was first brought here by Mrs. George Zimmer former chairman of the Garden section of the Women's Club. Mrs. Zimmer made it the responsibility of each church in town for a month, to send the flowers to the Philadelphia General Hospital. At first the flowers were merely sent to 69th street where they would be left in water before an ambulance from the hospital could come to pick them up. This as the flowers had lost most of system proved to be unsatisfactory, their freshness by the time they reached the wards. It was then decided that the flowers would be sent in individual jars, about 350 small bunches in appropriate jars and vases being driven in by volunteer drivers directly to the wards.

Many of the young people of Swarthmore collected and arranged these flowers and helped place them in the various wards of the hospital the following day.

With the coming of the war and the consequent gas rationing the flowers could no longer be driven to the hospital directly, as it took several cars weekly, and no one had the gas to spare. Of necessity therefore, the flowers were expressed in cartons to the hospital where the Grey Ladies arranged and distributed them in the wards.

The Grey Ladies are still doing this service, but for the past year the responsibility has been returned to the Garden Club of which Mrs. D. Reed Geer is now chairman.

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS MEETING

J. A. Christian Resigns From Teaching Staff

At a mid-summer meeting on a hot July night, the Swarthmore School Board had before it a number of items of routine business in addition to several concerning changes of staff. A resignation was received from J. A. Christian, teacher of mathematics in the high school to take effect immediately. To succeed him, the board elected Charles Klemmer of West Chester, who is teaching for the second year in the summer school. Mr. Klemmer, a native of Reading, attended the Wyoming Polytechnic Institute and West Chester State Teachers College. For several years he worked with the Textile Machine Company of Wyoming and during the war was at the Navy Yard apprentice school at Pearl Harbor, as an instructor in trade mathematics and supervisor of the adult evening vocational school. Mr. Klemmer has proved himself an able teacher and a fine leader of youth.

To teach art in the elementary school the board has elected Anne Jane Cleaver of Conshohocken, graduate of the Phila. Museum School of Industrial Arts. For a number of years, Miss Cleaver has been counselor at a summer camp in the Pocono mountains and during the last year when she was taking her graduate work at the museum school, she taught high school pupils on Saturdays. She also has had a number of years teaching at the First Day School, where her contacts were with the younger children. Miss Cleaver will carry on the work taught by Mrs. Plattenberger, prior to her recent resignation.

Mowing Deadline

Borough Ordinance No. 303 requires all grass and weeds on Swarthmore lots be cut at least twice during the summer. If an owner neglects to comply with the regulation the Borough has the work done, billing the property owner for the cost plus a 20 per cent penalty.

Two weeks ago the Borough Secretary's office issued notices that the first cutting must be achieved within a 15-day period from that date. In addition to this current cutting, another will be necessary between August 15 and September 15.

It's a hard push if you happen to be the owner of a nice large vacant lot and nothing but a manual mower but for the protection of boroughites in general from excess ravages of hay fever, poison weeds, and obnoxious insects to say nothing of the unsightliness of a neighbor's overgrowth next to your own carefully cut lawn, sending hardy weed seeds into the garden you've so painstakingly weeded, it is a very necessary measure.

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THE LONDON PLAGUE

This great Plague swept over London in 1625. It was called "London's Calamitie and Misericie." More than one-third of the population died.

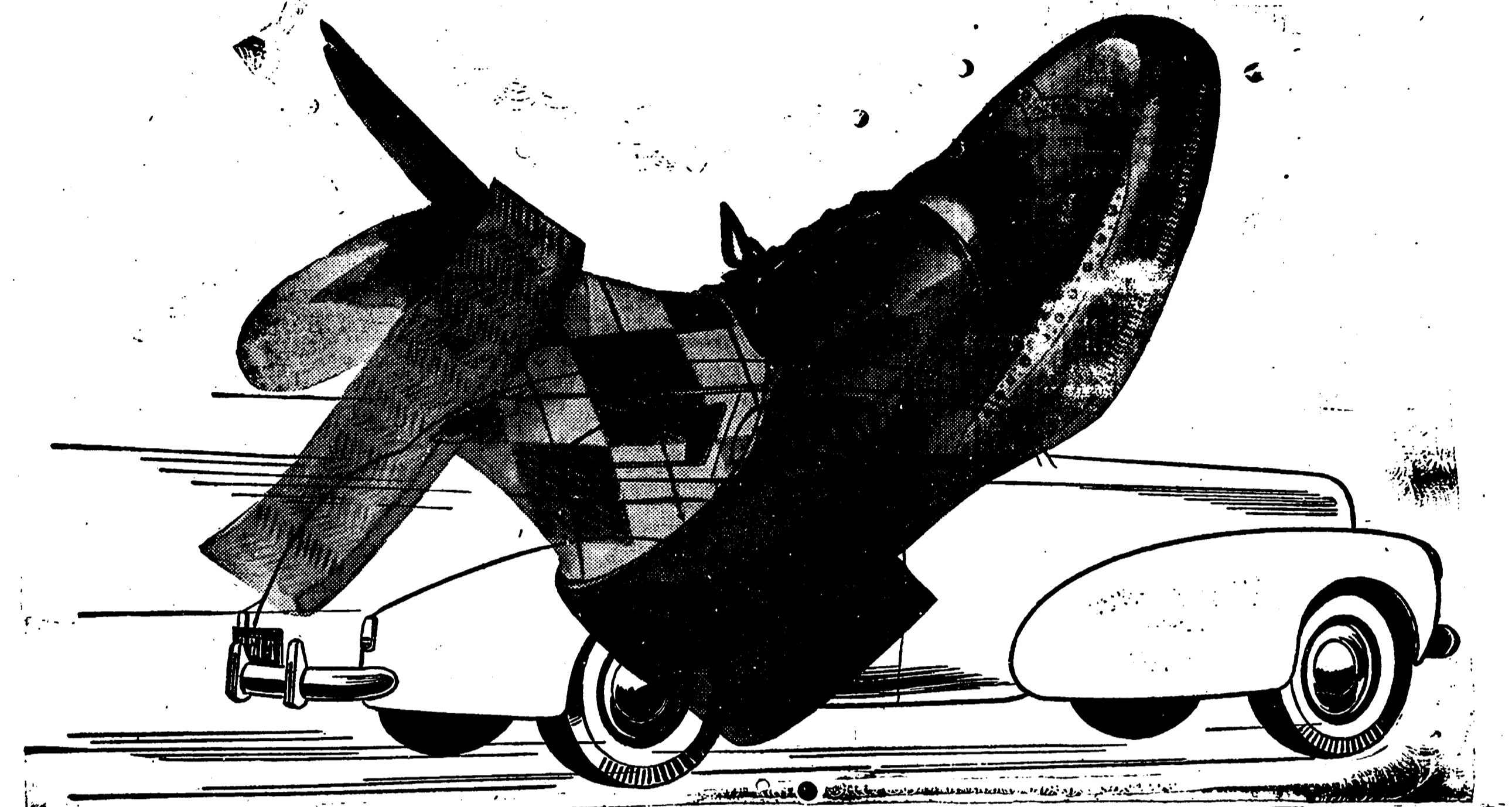

School Board Meets

by H. B. Green permitted the school district to purchase and pay for coal before the recent price rise went into effect.

On the basis of actual costs for the school year 1947-1948, using the formula provided in the state school code, the school board set the tuition rate for 1948-1949 as follows: in the kindergarten and elementary school, \$187.00 per annum. In the junior-senior high school grades 7 to 12 inclusive, the rate will be \$266.00, per annum. The board authorized also the payment of interest and redemption of bonds, series B, in the amount of \$5,956.00, due August 25, 1948.

The secretary's report for the year on the financial condition in the district shows that the current receipts for the fiscal year amounted to \$258,668.00 in addition to a balance of \$31,022.00, giving a total income of \$289,690.00. Expenditures for the year were \$262,746.00 leaving a balance of \$26,944.00 for the fiscal year beginning July 6, 1948.

LEARN TO SWIM WEEK AUG. 9-13

Safety Classes Held At Penn State Pool

"Learn to Swim" week from Monday, August 9 through Friday, August 13, is being conducted by the Water Safety division of the American Red Cross at the Penn State Extension pool on Harvard avenue. There is no charge for the course. Penn State has given the use of the pool free.

Almost half the people who go "swimming" can't swim at all. To remedy this and to cut down on the terrific death rate from drowning each summer the Red Cross has been carrying on an extensive program teaching beginners to swim, teaching those who can swim a little to take care of themselves in deep water, and teaching the advanced swimmer life saving.

Classes will be held in the mornings from 9 to 12. Non-swimmers at nine, intermediate swimmers at 10, and advanced swimmers at 11. There is no age limit for the classes, mothers, fathers and children may all attend. But due to the depth of the pool swimmers must be at least four feet tall. This course is being offered primarily for instruction and is not for recreational swimming.

Virginia Rath, Swarthmore Red Cross Chairman of Water Safety and Instructor of Physical Education for Women at the College will give the course. She will be assisted by Lora Blackman of Swarthmore, winner of the Scholarship to the Red Cross Aquatic School at Camp Greeley, Pa.

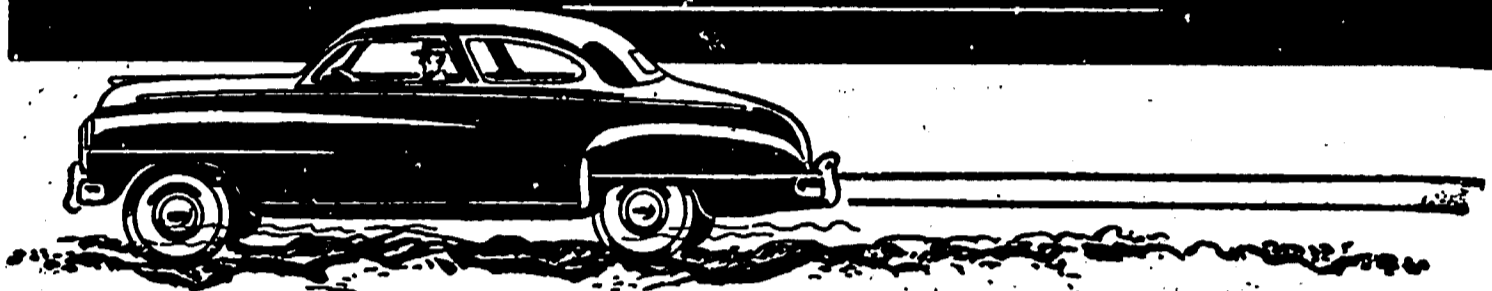

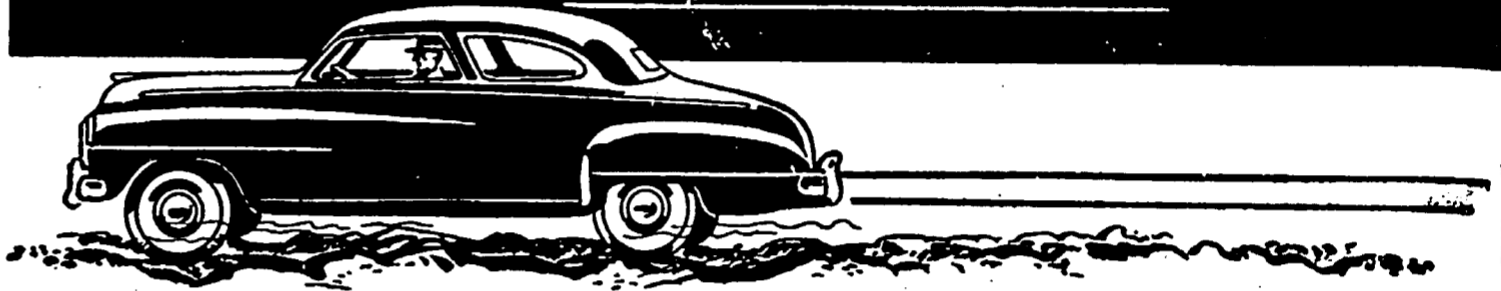
