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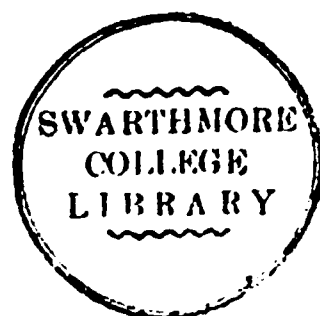

T. W. Andrew  
Dies At 91

Former Banker, Players  
Treasurer, Beloved  
In Boro

Thomas Winter Andrew died at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at his home, 624 North Chester road where he had been ill for the past three weeks.

Born in Shrewsbury, England on January 3, 1857 the son of a Congregational minister he spent his early childhood on the famous Wimpole street in London, and came to this country in 1868 with his parents and older brother. The family first lived in Washington but in 1871 Mr. Andrew left for Austin, Minn. where he learned the banking business. Eight years later he transferred to Boston where he married Harriet Louise Judson of Austin. Three children were born of the union: two sons who died in infancy and a daughter, Mrs. Frank V. Burton of Philadelphia who died on July 4 of this year. In 1887 Mr. Andrew was left a widower.

In 1889 he became associated with the Merchant's National Bank, of Philadelphia, being made assistant cashier in 1900 and cashier in 1907. When that bank merged with the First National Bank he became cashier and later, in 1920, was elected vice-president. Although he officially retired in 1928 he retained an active interest and an office in the bank for many years.

Moving to Swarthmore in 1903 Mr. Andrew was one of the founders of the Players Club of Swarthmore in 1911 and served as club treasurer for 25 years. A bronze plaque hangs in the lobby of the Fairview road clubhouse as testimony to his knowledge of finance which was a large measure was responsible for the club's ability to erect its own little theatre in 1931. During his active years with the club he also appeared several times on its stage. Even in later years when he journeyed from his home but little he was often seen renewing acquaintances and enjoying a club presentation from the audience.

Surviving are a grandson, W. Andrew Burton of Philadelphia, four granddaughters Jane Burton of Philadelphia, Marion Burton of Springfield, S. D.; Louise Burton of San Francisco; Mrs. Charles McKee of Hagerstown, Md. and two great granddaughters.

Funeral services will be conducted at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church of which the deceased was a member. Interment will be in Eastlawn cemetery. The Rev. Charles Robinson of the Rutledge Presbyterian Church will conduct the services both at the church and at the grave.

## Contents Bridged

Mr. H. W. Green of Yale avenue, operator of a federally licensed amateur radio station with the call W8DHM has been awarded the coveted WAC (worked-all-continents) certificate of the International Amateur Radio Union for having communicated with at least one amateur station in each of the six continental areas of the world: North America, South America, Africa, Europe, Asia and Oceania. To qualify for the award Mr. Green was in two-way radiotelephonic contact with amateurs in Arabia, Alaska, Algeria, Argentina, Australia and Austria, and he has his contact-confirming postcards proudly displayed on the wall of his radio room.

## Keep Boro In Trim

This week is apparently being observed as "gutter clean-up week" in Swarthmore. Borough workmen have been around blow-torching the weeds and shoveling out accumulated dirt and debris. This they do annually, contributing a clean-shaven look to local streets. Of course, a little occasional effort by individual householders would lighten the task and keep the tidy look more constant. The project might provide an afternoon's occupation for the small fry, a constructive lesson in civic improvement.

## RIVERVIEW AVENUE

by E. C. WALTON

Forty-two years ago, Riverview Avenue was a dusty, dirt road. There was one house along the way to ease the solitude. On completion of the houses now being built, it will be one of the borough's attractive residential streets.

V. S. Pownall and myself were the pioneers in this section. We purchased a lot from the Richard G. Park farm forty years ago and V. S. built the house now occupied by Penfield and I built the residence at the corner of Ogden and Riverview, which was my home for many years.

There was no gas or water on Riverview at that time and we had to run two pipes from Baltimore Pike at the expense of several hundred dollars. The gas company finally reimbursed us for their pipe, but the old three inch water main, which we put in, is still deep in the heart of Riverview.

Previous to this time, there was a stone barn on the east side of Riverview Avenue, which had been burned leaving the walls still standing. I purchased the walls as they stood and used the stone out of them to build my house. Ogden Avenue was a grassy lane between two rows of maple trees with no bridge across the little stream. Doty McCingley farmed the Park farm, collected the borough's garbage and fed it to a lot of pigs, which he kept in a pen on the south side of Ogden Avenue about opposite Percy Webster's house. There was no trouble to tell the pigs were there when the wind blew off the ice shore.

Several years later Mr. Emmons purchased the Park property, did much grading and laid out new streets. He and Mr. Thayer deserve much of the credit for the improvements in this section of the borough.

PILOTS ERCOUPE  
TO WASHINGTON

Piloting a small plane through rain and fog partly over mountainous terrain, was the unusual experience of Dick Danforth before returning to his home on Hill-born avenue from Buffalo last week. The existence of dual controls on his uncle's Erco Coupe enabled Dick to do most of the piloting and some navigating. Excitement was added by the unpredictable advent of a dense fog which soon turned to rain, blotting out grouse check points. In The Swim

Red Cross Benefits Many  
in Five-Day  
Course

A goodly number of local mothers ducked the family wash Monday morning to duck themselves in the Pennsylvania State College Extension swimming pool and along with their own or their neighbors small fry avail themselves of this week's free swimming lessons under the auspices of the Red Cross.

Less intrepid instructresses than Virginia Rath and Lora Blackman might have ducked out when they were faced with the little crowds which jammed each of the three groups: beginners, intermediate and advanced. On opening day the groups totaled 74 while on Tuesday 30 reported for instruction. Miss Rath who as women's physical education head at Swarthmore College and local chairman of water safety for the Red Cross, and Miss Blackman who recently won a scholarship to the Red Cross Aquatic School at Camp Greeley, dove into their task and set each pupil further on his way toward self-sufficiency in the water.

This is the first such course the Red Cross has sponsored here and the townfolk turned out in appreciation of the need for greater swimming ability among the general populace. It was given this week in connection with National Swim Week.

The beginners group from 9 to 10 A. M. numbering 27. Several of the youngest, aged 5, could scarcely touch the bottom in the shallow part but gamely clung along the pool ledge and learned to exhale under water, and propel themselves through the water by kicking their feet. Even a most timid had gained confidence by the second day. Two adult women were star pupils in this group. Miss Wistar Lukens, who has been a member of the Red Cross since the lessons appeared in the week by the 20 aquatic students enrolled in this division.

From 10 until 11, Monday through Friday, the intermediates consisting mostly of mothers brushing up on swim styles grown stale through long disuse improved daily in endurance and perfection of stroke, breathing, and kick. Those who preferred to spend part of the time learning to dive did so, their boring mostly the older boys and girls and the teen-age contingent. An easy and novel back stroke was among the styles mastered capably in the week by the 20 aquatic students enrolled in this division.

Always Room For Improvement  
The advanced class met from 11 until noon, specializing in dives and speed and variety swimming qualifying the participants not only to be capable of taking care of themselves in the water but possibly of assisting others in distress or need of swim pointers. This class numbered 14.

## Seybold Makes Final Plea For Action On Swimming Pool

John Seybold, president of the Swarthmore Swimming Pool Committee has made the following statement to the Swarthmorean so that all those interested will be informed as to the exact status of this project.

"Those who have followed community affairs will recall that last fall a group of residents became interested in exploring the possibility of building an outdoor swimming pool. Committees were formed and after various alternatives were discussed it was decided that private, non-profit membership arrangement was the most feasible.

"Accordingly, an option was secured on an excellent plot of land, centrally located, an estimate as to cost was prepared. An active solicitation of members was undertaken and a permanent committee was elected to carry forward the formative stages of the organization. It was essential that the membership be sufficient so that the initiation fee obtained would meet the full cost of construction and development of a modern, well-equipped pool, a wading pool and change houses.

"The response from the community was most encouraging, but we did not secure our full quota of members. However, more than 100 families did apply for membership and sent to our Treasurer all, or a large part of, the cost of a family membership. And it was this group of families, augmented by 25 or 30 others, who then determined not to abandon the project, but to carry on in the hope that further effort on our part would bring about its realization for the summer of 1949.

"Consequently, the land under option was purchased by some of our most interested members on the basis of an agreement that it would be kept available to us until September 15 of this year. The money paid into our Treasury have, of course, not been touched, but have been held with the understanding that all sums would be repaid in full by September 15 the response was insufficient to permit the final formulation of plans for submission to the group as a whole for approval, with a view to the immediate letting of contracts for construction.

## MOSQUITOES GET IN A NIP

Having taken pretty much for granted the work of the Delaware County Mosquito Control Board in keeping the area practically free of mosquito annoyance thus far this summer, residents of the borough and neighboring communities were keenly shocked by the presence of several buzzing biter in their homes and gardens early this week.

This according to the Control Board, which is still using its manpower and equipment to the utmost in a regular schedule, is the effect of the five-day rainy period resulting in a three-inch fall early this month, combined with the current warm, humid days which make the order Diptera more active. The Board expected the current crop of insects and has been working indefatigably spraying ponds, streams and other breeding places as well as circulating through county streets with its three fogging machines which mean death to the adult mosquito and fly.

However, it anticipates a decline in the nuisances provided the weather man cooperates half-way.

## Football Squad To Assemble

**Training To Start At Camp Castle Friday**

The curtain will start going up on the 1948 Swarthmore High School football season next Monday, August 23. At 10 o'clock that day members of the squad will assemble at Rutgers Field, get their physical examinations, sign up for insurance and receive light equipment. At 2 o'clock the same day they will begin the first of a series of workouts before going to camp. The trip to Camp Castle near Downingtown, the familiar training ground for Swarthmore high teams, will be made immediately after noon Friday, August 27, and the squad will remain there until the afternoon of Thursday, September 2. Since three other high school squads will be at the M.C.A. camp at the same time, they hope to get in several scrimmages.

Swarthmore's 1948 football squad will be a large one, numbering around 45 players. Together with the coaches, the trainer and several devoted followers of the team it is expected that the camp contingent will total 50 or more. The team lost heavily by graduation last spring, especially in the backfield, and one of Coach Millard Robinson's tasks will be to find adequate replacements. However, a lot of new material is on hand and, judging by the postcards stating their intention to attend camp, enthusiasm is running high among members of the squad. ## Wins Special Award

In Photography Contest  
Lloyd Merritts of Elm avenue has been declared a winner in the second monthly awards of the "Popular Photography" prize photo contest. For his startling black and white print, "Mars in Ballet," he will receive a \$100.00 U. S. Savings Bond and a certificate denoting third prize in that division. The photo was published in the magazine's September issue which reached the newstands on Wednesday.

Although he has been actively interested in his camera for 10 years, Merritts, an agent of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, regards himself as an amateur photographer. During 1946-47 he engaged in medical photography at the Rochester, N. Y. General Hospital, where he made his prize winning photo.

Winning a special monthly award does not affect Merritts' chances of winning one of the two overall prizes of \$5,000 for a color or a black and white photo, which will be announced in March, 1949. Prints winning the major awards will be exhibited in Philadelphia and four other large American cities and sent abroad to tour the principal capitals of the world.

Merritts, who spent most of the current summer at Point Barrow, Alaska, helping to set up a scientific laboratory and a headquarters for the Department of Agriculture, was in Trincomalee and Kandy, Ceylon, for 15 months in the years 1944-45. He describes them as a photographer's paradise and hopes to return there.

## Home From Botany Tour

**Wildflower Collector Author Covers 30 States**

Dr. Edgar T. Wherry of Oberlin avenue has returned from a four month botanical trip on which he drove 14,200 miles and collected plants in 30 western and central states under the auspices of the Academy of Natural Sciences and the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Wherry, who is professor of botany at the University, is the author of the recently published "Wild Flower Guide Northeastern and Midland United States" which is dedicated to and owned by the Wild Flower Preservation Society and which sold 10,000 copies in the first four months following publication. This book which was quickly acquired by the Swarthmore Public Library is unique in its having directions for cultivation of several hundred species. This is Dr. Wherry's third book on wild plants, one on ferns and another on the wild flowers of Mt. Desert Island having been published some years ago.

The current issue of Pennsylvania Park News mentions the Edgar T. Wherry Trail named in Dr. Wherry's honor in Bowman's Hill State Wildflower Preserve at Washington Crossing Park, Bucks County. Bowman's Hill is a living illustration of what can be done in wildflower conservation. It is limited to flowers of the Keystone State and at present has growths of 500 species native to Pennsylvania. On about 1,000 feet of the Edgar T. Wherry Trail there are more than 75 species of ferns constituting one of the finest collections of native ferns in the country.

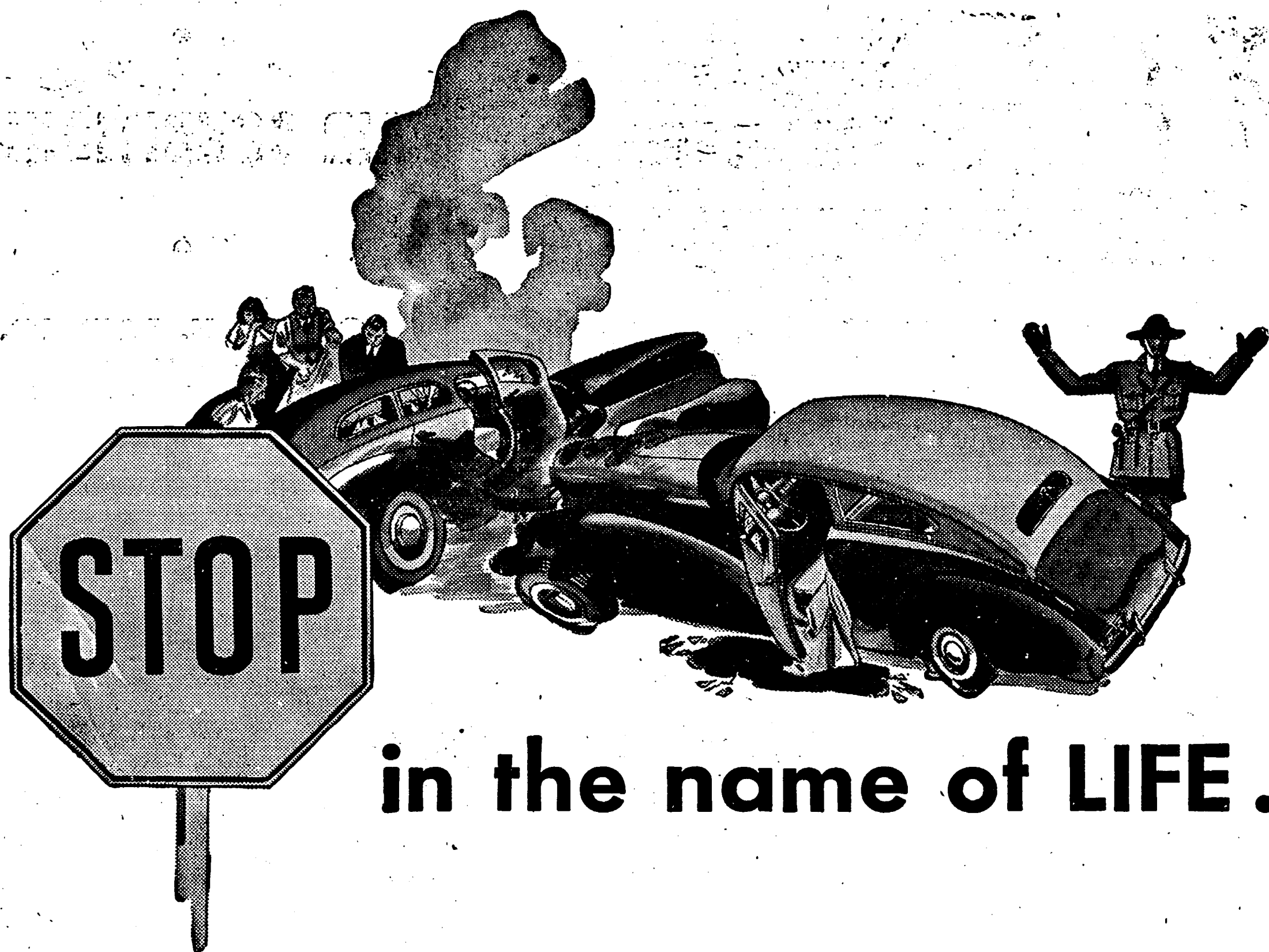

**Scott Lilly Dies In Wallingford**  
College Professor's Busy Life Ends At Home

Scott B. Lilly, educator, civil engineer and chairman of the Division of Engineering at Swarthmore College, died Thursday afternoon at his home on Plush Mill road, Wallingford. He was 63.

Born in Powershok County, Iowa in 1885, Mr. Lilly graduated from Michigan State College in 1908. He received his civil engineer degree from Cornell University where he held an instructorship from 1907 to 1910. He held the Henry C. and J. Archer Turner professorships of Engineering at Swarthmore where he was an assistant professor from 1910 and 1917.

After this time Mr. Lilly worked as an engineer for private companies until 1929 when he returned to the college as a full professor of engineering. He had been chairman of the division of engineering here since 1938.

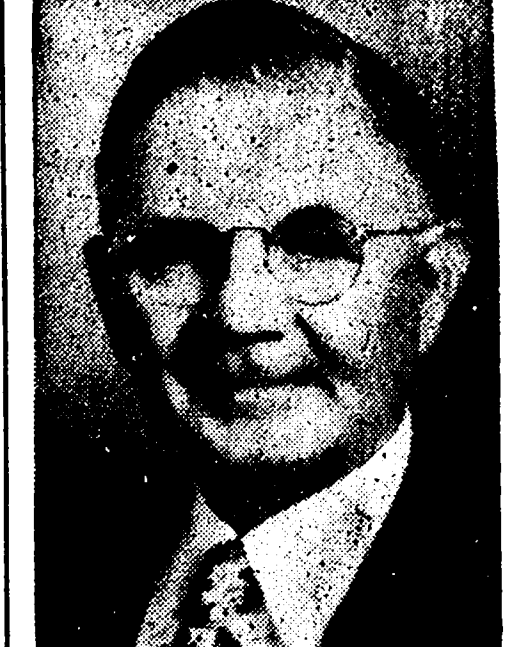
Mr. Lilly was the co-author of "Analytical Mechanics." He was a past National Director of the American Society of Civil Engineers and chairman of the Committee on Professional Training of the Engineer's Council for Professional Development and held memberships in the American Arbitration Association, the American Association of University Professors, the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education, and the American Concrete Institute. He was also a member of the honorary engineering societies Sigma Tau, Sigma Xi, and Tau Beta Pi.

In 1946 he served as consultant to the Baldwin Locomotive works and was instrumental in getting for the engineering department at Swarthmore a 600,000 pound testing machine, used in research work on the field of structures.

Mr. Lilly is survived by his wife, Jean McCoy Lilly, a son, Scott, Jr., and a daughter Mary Alice.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the Trinity Church.

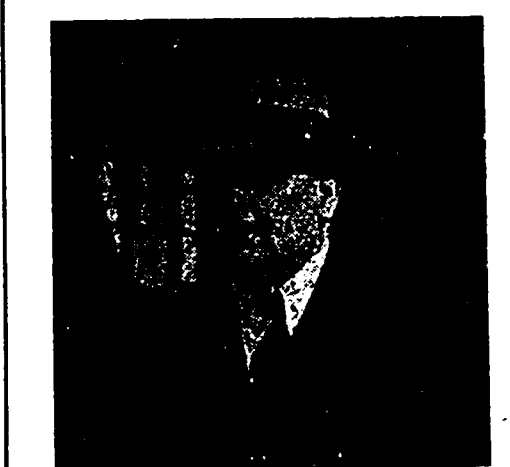

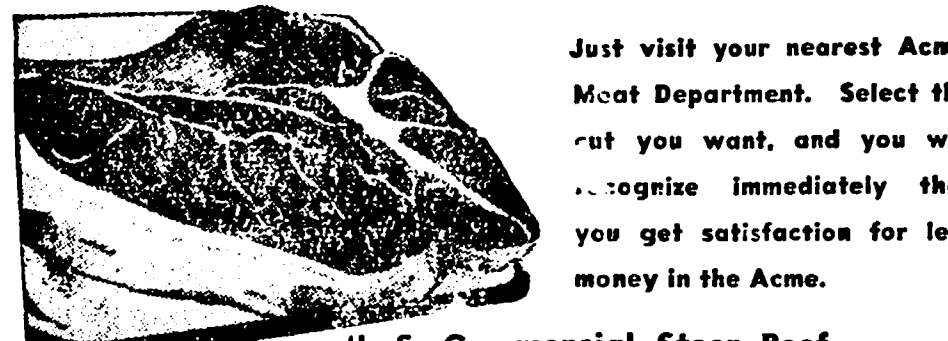

Scott Lilly Dies  
In Wallingford

College Professor's Busy  
Life Ends At  
Home

Scott B. Lilly, educator, civil engineer and chairman of the Division of Engineering at Swarthmore College, died Thursday afternoon at his home on Plush Mill road, Wallingford. He was 63.

Born in Powershiek County, Iowa in 1885, Mr. Lilly graduated from Michigan State College in 1906. He received his civil engineering degree from Cornell University where he held an instructorship from 1907 to 1910. He held the Henry C. and J. Archer Turner professorships of Engineering at Swarthmore where he was an assistant professor between 1910 and 1917.

After this time Mr. Lilly worked as an engineer for private companies until 1929 when he returned to the college as a full professor of engineering. He had been chairman of the division of engineering here since 1938.

Mr. Lilly was the co-author of "Analytical Mechanics." He was a past National Director of the American Society of Civil Engineers and chairman of the Committee on Professional Training of the Engineer's Council for Professional Development and held memberships in the American Arbitration Association, the American Association of University Professors, the Society for the promotion of Engineering Education, and the American Concrete Institute. He was also a member of the honorary engineering societies Sigma Tau, Sigma Xi, and Tau Beta Pi.

In 1946 he served as consultant to the Baldwin Locomotive works and was instrumental in getting the engineering department at Swarthmore a 600,000 pound testing machine, used in research work on the field of structures.

Mr. Lilly is survived by his wife, Jean McCoy Lilly, a son, Scott, Jr., and a daughter Mary Alice.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the Trinity Church.

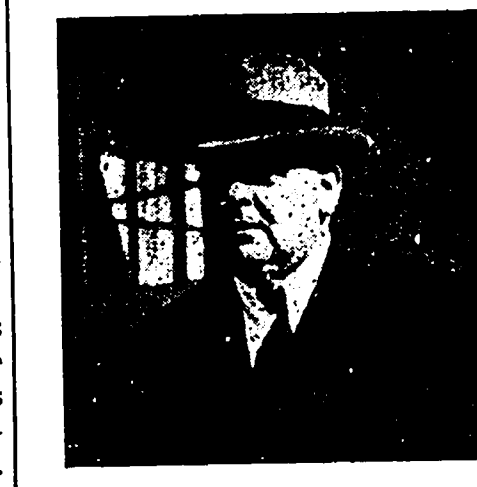

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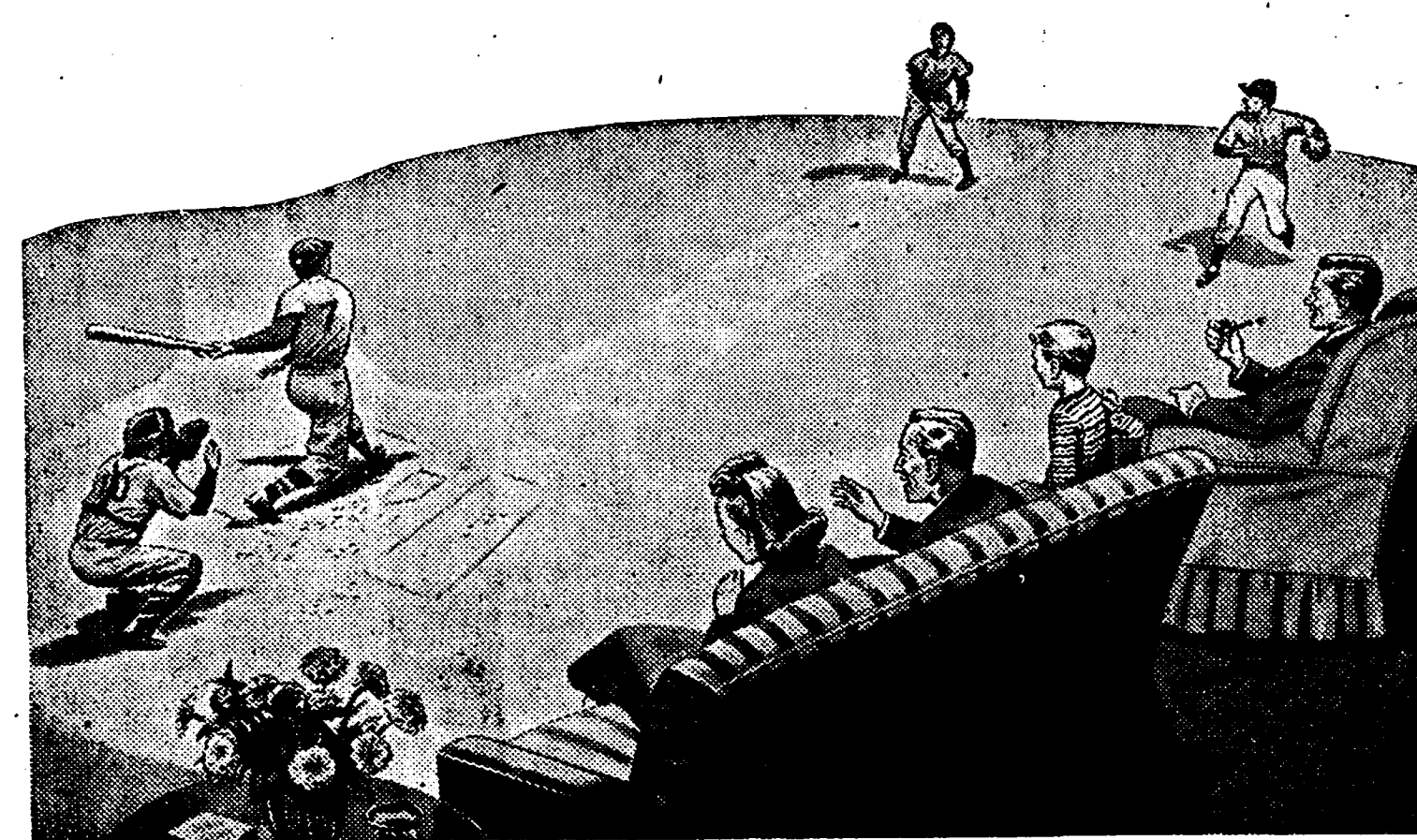
