2) My friend's dog was in its own yard. The owner opened the 8 PARK AVENUE door just as the dogcatchers were attempting to entice the dog out to the street to nick



The greatest single threat to our liberties lies in the tendency to look upon government as national pyramid club that can make everybody rich, Donald P Jones comptroller of Sun Oil Company declared last night.

Mr. Jones who lives on Swarthmore avenue warned that it is impossible to accept favors without incurring obligations and that no individual or group receives funds from government without first agreeing to whatever restrictive terms government imposes.

Mr. Jones spoke at the annua banquet of the Last Man's Club (veterans of World War I) of the Howard C. McCall Post of the American Legion in Philadelphia. Government handouts that do not result in the creation of goods or services merely succeed in pyramiding costs, adding to the money supply and stimulating inflation, he declared.

"The delusion we suffer." Mr Jones said, "is the idea that gov ernment can give us something for nothing-that government planners can give us more security than we can earn for ourselves."

Mr. Jones deplored the apparent willingness of certain segments of the American population to "sluff off their responsibilities" and a "barter a measure of their liberty for a few paltry subsidies. Among these people, he added individual stamina and reliance upon self-determination are di minishing at the very time when the burden of public expenditure is growing heavier---a process which destroyed many nations in the past.

Higher standards of living for all can be obtained only through the creation of more and more products. This requires, he said, maximum productivity from all of us both through our own physical efforts and through the greatest possible use of tools and machinery.




