Day Celebration

The heat wave may have brought its woes but it has done its part to get the Midget and Clipper ball teams in perfect playing form for their holiday afternoon crowd.

Then in the dusk, after the backyard picnics have freshened and relaxed relatives and friends, there will be a community square dance on the station plaza to bring the day's fun to a close.

All this and a parade, too, to set the day off to its proudest start. Certainly the sight of the youngest residents in their patriotic best is a sight to cheer every resident whether parent, neighbor or just the watcher with an eye to the borough future. FIRE CO. MAKES  
DEAL ON ENGINECouncil Contributes  
Low Bid  
Share

In special session Monday evening Borough Council considered the purchase of a new fire truck. The public safety committee reported on its meeting, attended by representatives of the Fire Company, on June 15.

Low bid for the truck was \$14,300 net. However, the Fire Company preferred another make whose bid was \$2300 higher, since the firemen were more familiar with the equipment on the higher priced truck.

Council decided in the interest of goodwill and at the suggestion of the Fire Company apparatus committee, to reject all bids and appropriate the amount of the low bid to the Fire Company with the understanding that the Company will purchase equipment substantially according to specifications of the public safety committee, at no additional cost to Borough residents.

The Fire Company in turn agreed to pay cash for the new engine selected and give the title to the Borough.

LEGION NINE IS  
TRIPLE WINNERLads Defeat Sharon  
Hill, Upper  
Darby

During the past week, the Swarthmore Legion team has scored three decisive victories, defeating Sharon Hill twice by scores of 6-3 and 3-1 and Upper Darby by 11-0. Dalton started last Wednesday's game at Sharon Hill and was relieved by Poole in the fourth inning when Sharon Hill tied at 3-3. Poole pitched his usual steady, effective game and held his adversaries scoreless from then on. A strong three-run rally sewed up the game in the top of the sixth. Tonight the team travels to Aldan for one of the most decisive games of the league season.

## Summer Library Hours

From July 1 to September 8, the customary summer schedule will be followed at the Swarthmore Public Library. The library will be closed on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday afternoon during this period, but will be open for business at the following times: Monday, 2-5:30 and 7 to 9; Wednesday, 2-5:30 and 7 to 9; Friday, 2-5:30; Saturday 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon.

The Library will be closed on July 4, on Labor Day, and on the Saturday before Labor Day.

It is expected that many Swarthmoreans will avail themselves of the very liberal summer loan privileges, which have been so popular in the past. To make it possible for holders of library cards to have a good supply of vacation reading matter, adults may take out eight books and children four (twice the usual number that may be withdrawn at one time), including anything except seven-day books and new accessions that are in great demand. All books taken out between July 1 and September 8 will be stamped for return on September 12; but it is hoped that the holders, once they are through with them, will bring them back to the Library at their early convenience, so that others may make use of them.

PETITIONS OUT  
ON LIQUOR SALEGive Residents Chance  
To Protect  
Choice

In view of an occurrence in its neighboring borough, Lansdowne, local residents interested in protecting Swarthmore from the same predicament are circulating petitions to have the question of alcoholic beverage sale in Swarthmore placed on the ballot so that borough residents may evidence their desire in this matter and adequate protection can be established in the event they wish to maintain the present "dry" status.

Lansdowne found a zoning ordinance unenforceable when the State Liquor Board granted a license to the owner of an establishment there and the Delaware County Court refused to uphold the local ordinance which had been designed to prevent liquor sale.

A referendum on saloons or the issuance of liquor licenses is necessary if the borough wants to maintain its local option. The only way this can be accomplished is to have 25 per cent of the voters sign petitions requesting the County Commissioners to place the questions involved on the ballot for vote in September's primary.

Those who wish Swarthmore to be governed by the will of the majority of its people in this matter should contact The Swarthmorean, the ministers of the local churches, President John Nason of the College, President George Ewing of the Borough Council, or any other resident who is in possession of the petitions to be signed. The petitions must be filed with the Commissioners before July 13.

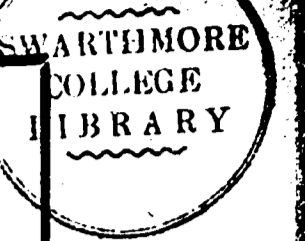



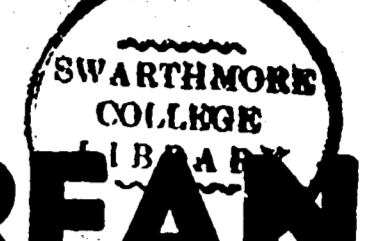

## CHESTER ROAD TRAFFIC STUDIED

**Special Committee Asks Council To Erect Lights**

## Marshall Honored

**By duPont Company**

John Marshall of West Chester, for many years a resident of Lincoln avenue, was honored Tuesday at the ground breaking for the new duPont fabric and finishes department research laboratory in Philadelphia by the surprise announcement that the new laboratory would be named the Marshall Laboratory.

Scheduled to be completed next year at a cost of \$2,000,000 the new building will replace laboratory facilities now located in three different buildings on the grounds of the company's Philadelphia plant.

The tribute to Mr. Marshall came after many years of service to the company. A graduate of the University of New Mexico with graduate study at the University of Virginia, Mr. Marshall went with the explosives department laboratory in 1913 continuing until 1927 when he became director of the Philadelphia laboratory, greatly enlarging its research facilities and helping to plan the building now to be erected. In 1933 he transferred to the Wilmington headquarters as director of the chemical division of the fabrics and finishes department.
