## RENT CONTROLS STILL APPLYS

### Governor's Signature Not Yet Secured On Measure

Word has come to the Swarthmorean that some local landlords have raised rents in the belief that the recent application of Borough Council to the Governor for the lifting of rent controls here has become effective. Actually no such thing has occurred and the situation at the moments exactly the same as it was before Borough Council decided to seek rescinding of rent restrictions.

Governor Duff has so far withheld his signature which must be placed on the application before it can proceed to the Housing Expeditor and become effective. In a letter dated October 27 the Governor informed the Borough that he had received protests against the measure. He requested copies of the minutes of the public hearings upon which Council based its conclusion that rent controls were no longer necessary in the borough. These were duly forwarded to Harrisburg but to date nothing further has been heard on the subject.

Thus any increase in tenants' payments at this time are illegal except under conditions previously condoning such procedure.

## H.S. SCORES OVER LANSDOWNE 26-0

### Band Also Scores In Halftime Show

The Swarthmore High School football team climaxed what might be considered one of its finest seasons when it turned back Lansdowne High 26-0 on Thanksgiving morning. From the very outset there was no doubt as to the final result as the Garnet Boys set up their initial score in the first three minutes. In the first quarter no Swarthmore team ever played harder or with more determination.

Twenty-two seniors were saying farewell and it was evident that this was going to be their greatest game. Although touchdowns were scored by Barry Coleman on a 20 yard jaunt, Dana Swan on a quarterback sneak, John Snape on a 3 yard plunge, and Fetherolf on an alert fumble recovery in the Lansdowne end zone, as in all other games, it is very difficult to give any one person a lion's share of the credit. Swan has always been an outstanding feature as a field general, but only the nub around which the hard driving backs Coleman, Arrison, Snape, McGilberry, Dickinson, and Johnson operate.

Bird and McCray have been a rock of Gibraltar in the guard spots. Paul Tarr and Don Fetherolf, along with Reds Crowther have been giants at tackle, particularly on defense, along with Campbell, Terry, and Willis who share the end duties. There is no question that Willis played one of his finest games on Thanksgiving Day. Bill McHenry has improved steadily and this game marked him as one of the best around.

The Swarthmore High School Band presented a distinctive and unique routine between the halves.

A turkey day hunting scene was depicted complete with musical accompaniment. The atmosphere was set with the playing of "Harvest Moon" and as the band swung into the "Turkey in the Straw" a gigantic bird appeared on the field in the personage of Ted Carey. An old English hunting call announced the arrival of the Puritan Hunter Warren Gold. The anticipated pursuit ensued to the strains of appropriate music and finally concluded in an abrupt and surprising fashion as the turkey tripped the hunter causing his trusty six shooter to discharge and shoot himself instead of the turkey. Amid the clatter of bells and the wails of the siren the stretcher bearers raced on the field to carry away the casualty to the strains of the "Funeral March".

### Lafayette Coach To Speak In H. S. Auditorium Saturday

Maurice "Clipper" Smith, head coach at Lafayette, will be the speaker at the annual Football Night Saturday evening, honoring the all-victorious Swarthmore High School team. Not only is "Clipper" Smith one of the best known football mentors in this area but he is also noted for his gift of interesting and entertaining an audience. Taking no chances, the Swarthmore Citizens Athletic Committee made sure of getting him before the football season started.

The Football Night celebration will be divided into two parts. One will be the dinner, starting at 6:30 in the High School cafeteria. Because of the limited accommodations of the cafeteria this will be confined to members of the High School squad, the coaches and their wives, guests and families of the players. There will be no speaking at this part of the occasion. The committee in charge of food arrangements has given assurance that the eating will be good. Members of the Citizens Athletic Committee will serve as waiters and Superintendent Morey will be in charge of the carving.

Beginning at 8 o'clock the main part of the celebration will be held in the High School Auditorium and will be open to all residents of Swarthmore. The High School Band will be present on the stage and will play several numbers. The cheer leaders will lead the yells and singing. Pat Malin, known equally for his wit and his public services, will be chairman. "Clipper" Smith will give the one and only talk of the evening. Members of the three Junior High School squads, the largest in Swarthmore's history, will be introduced. **R. G. E. ULLMAN SERVICES HELD**

30-Year Resident Was Active In Boro Affairs

A Memorial Service was held in the Friends' Meeting House on Sunday afternoon, December 4, at 3 o'clock for Roland G. E. Ullman who died Thursday evening, December 1, at his home "Applebrook", Park avenue. Mr. Ullman had been a resident of Swarthmore since 1919 and during the past 30 years had taken an active part in community affairs.

A member of the Religious Society of Friends, he had served as assistant Clerk of the Swarthmore Meeting and as Clerk of the Concord Quarterly Meeting. He taught a class of boys in the First Day School for 11 years and served on many committees of the Meeting.

For 30 years Mr. Ullman had belonged to the Swarthmore Players' Club where he worked with characteristic enthusiasm in all phases of play reproduction, acting, directing, and writing. He was a member of the Board of Governors for 20 years and each season for 15 years had directed a play.

He had also served as president of the Swarthmore Home and School Association. Mr. Ullman's fluency in language led him to take an active interest in the local French Club.

Born at Lockes-sur-Ouise, Burgundy, France, on January 26, 1888, he was the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. Gyula Ullman for many years residents of Chester, Pa.

Mr. Ullman was graduated from Chester High School in 1904 and after a year of study and travel abroad received his engineering training at the University of Colorado. He later did graduate work at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania where he also for several years conducted a seminar for seniors in Advertising and Marketing.

Mr. Ullman inaugurated a course in Marketing, Merchandising, and Advertising at Cornell University and for a number of years served on Cornell's staff of lecturing professors.

He practiced civil engineering for eight years throughout the Rocky Mountain area from Yucatan to the Arctic.

In World War I Mr. Ullman served as a Lieutenant in the Air Corps of the United States Army and was instructor in the School of Military Aeronautics at (continued on page eight)

Latest Fire Truck Almost Doubles Boro Pumping Power



**BOOKMARKS WORK FOR SEAL SALES**

Readers who borrow books from Delaware County Libraries will find a bright "seasonal" bookmark in each volume supplied by the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association to serve as reminders of the 1949 Christmas Seal Sale, conducted by the Association from November 21 to December 25, to raise funds for its 1950 health program.

Inside the folded bookmark is a brief quiz that will help the readers determine whether they are doing all they should to keep a check on the health of their lungs. The quiz points up the importance of periodic chest x-rays for every adult.

Chest x-ray surveys are among the major functions of the Association. To date over 82,000 County residents have been x-rayed by the Association and this program is entirely supported by the sale of Christmas Seals in the County.

The chest x-ray project of the Tuberculosis Association is one many services it offers Delaware County residents. Other major projects include: rehabilitation of the cured patients; emergency hospital care and special relief for the patients and their families and the very important all year round health education program in the schools and communities of the County.





NINE APPROVE SCHOLARSHIP Next Meeting Planned For Early In January

Nine of 17 Swarthmore organizations have given their approval of the general idea of the KENT scholarship in social sciences.

Many criticisms and suggestions were offered, from which a better program should develop when the working committee meets in January.

Dr. John Nason of the College has suggested as a name for the scholarship the Swarthmore Scholarship in Social Sciences. Frank R. Morey of Swarthmore Schools proposes that Education be added to the social sciences list. Stuart Chase, author of "The Proper Study of Mankind" and inspiration for the idea of this scholarship, has given the tentative plan his blessing. Mr. Chase's new book "Roads to Agreement," now in outline form, seems to have merit in that it assembles for laymen's use the various effective techniques available for reducing friction between individuals and peoples.

Although contributions have already started coming in even before the campaign has opened—one dollar bills from individuals and a check for ten dollars from the Woman's Club, the campaign for dollars from each citizen has been tentatively set for March, as the money will not be needed until the end of this college year. 

**SCHOOL NEWS**

Twenty-five of our school had the fortunate opportunity of visiting the United Nations on Friday, December 9. The group, composed of tenth, eleventh, and twelfth graders, left early in the morning and was guided directly to Flushing Meadows by the railroad. The full day trip was engineered by Mr. Yokum who, along with Mr. Morey, accompanied the students.

The General Assembly was scheduled to wind up this session on Friday. The topic which the delegates were discussing was the problem of Jerusalem. The delegates had already heard the report of the ad hoc committee investigating the problem and a resolution proposed by Sweden and the Netherlands. The students heard speeches for and against these proposals. During these speeches, translations were made into five languages and sent to ear phones which each seat was equipped with. There was an hour break in the proceedings for lunch.

The report of the ad hoc committee was to set up internationalization of Jerusalem whereas the Sweden - Netherlands resolution called for functional representation in the holy city. The United States opposed the committee's report and cast their vote against the plan. Also feeling the same way were Britain, Haiti, South Africa and Norway. Norway stated that the report was not favored by both parties and that the United Nations could not back up their commitments by force if it was passed. Speaking in favor of internationalization were Greece, Peru, Australia and Pakistan.

After lunch spokesmen from Iraq, U.S.S.R., Uruguay and Syria favored the report of the ad hoc committee. Iraq threatened to declare war if Jerusalem was given to the Jews. The U.S.S.R. delegate said that the United States and Britain were trying to control Palestine. Yugoslavia, giving the shortest speech, was against internationalization.

The group left at 4:45 o'clock before a final vote was taken. It turned out to be a very scintillating and inspiring trip. All the students thought that much had been learned from the rare educational experience.

## WHOSE CHRISTMAS?

Tomorrow night in all the Gregorian calendared countries of the world carolers will sing out the familiar, ancient choruses which have followed the first glad angel cry upon the Christ-Child's birth, almost two thousand years ago in Bethlehem.

"Jesus, our Brother, kind and good,  
Was humbly born in a stable rude,  
The friendly beasts around Him stood,  
begins one traditional song. From every land there come others until the less well-known Phillip Brooks carol, "Everywhere, everywhere Christmas tonight," rings truth.

The stars in their courses have looked down upon many Christmases since that first one birthed a new star, for shepherds and kings alike to follow, and heard the angel chorus which has never quite faded away.

"The Christ-child lay on Mary's lap,  
His hair was like a light,  
(O weary, weary were the world,  
But here is all aright.)

The Christ-child stood at Mary's knee,  
While innocence endured,  
And all the flowers looked up at Him,  
And all the stars looked down."

It would be incredible that each Christmas Eve brings a renewal gift of love to the world of men, if we did not see it with our own eyes, feel it with our own hearts. There is not too much outward change since then and now. Bethlehem was filled on that first Christmas Eve with annoyed people wrangling about too much taxation. Tomorrow night the entire Christian world will read again the story in the second chapter of St. Luke beginning, "And it came to pass in those days that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed."

Family gatherings on Christmas 1940 will discuss heavy taxes, too. There were tyrants and dictators then as now and the tyrants and their oppressed subjects were each one afraid. There was treachery, and greed, and selfishness, and fighting, and false witnessing, and poverty, and wealth, and discrimination, and death, and people were living with fear. The difference is that the idea of men living as sons of God beside their brother sons of God in freedom and goodwill was fresh and new, then. Today it is as old as the first Christmas, and that is very old indeed. We who play our link in the human chain, can easily trace and face the reason for the laggardly development of Christ's world of brotherhood if we will.

Ogden Nash wrote a "Carol for Children" to which the compulsion of this sense of failure must have driven him. Of nine stanzas, the final three conclude:

"Two ultimate laws alone we know,  
The ledger and the sword—  
So far away, so long ago,  
We lost the infant Lord.

Only the children clasp his hand;  
His voice speaks low to them,  
And still for them the shining band  
Wings over Bethlehem.

God rest you, merry innocents,  
While innocence endures,  
A sweeter Christmas than we to ours  
May you bequeath to yours."

Here we are brought into this inner children's circle by the miracle of Christmas, a miracle just as real and true today as any miracle that ever was. In the light of the manger, we are reduced in heart to the tenderness, the inclusiveness of childhood. The Christ-child "speaks low to us," too, as we fall on our knees in wonder and praise, and in dedication to its symbol of a loving, unselfish world. It is our Christmas, if we wish it.

"You must remember this, for it is as true as that I see you and you see me. It is not revealed by the light of lamps or candles, and it does not depend upon sun and moon; but that which is needful is, that we have such eyes as can see God's glory."

## FRANK LAUBACH COMING JAN. 5

### World Literacy Head Speaks At Night

The lecture by Dr. Frank C. Laubach to be given on the evening of Thursday, January 5 in the high school auditorium is an event of major importance to the community. Dr. Laubach is recognized throughout the world as the pioneer and leading specialist in world literacy.

Although his literacy campaigns among the headhunting Negroes in the Philippines and the natives of Singapore, Ceylon, India, Ceylon, China, Syria, Turkey and Africa have been written up in Time and Reader's Digest, he says in his book "The Silent Billions Speak," that his work is better known throughout the world than in the United States.

An editorial in the New York Times of July 22, 1949, praises his public service as an adult education specialist in campaigning against illiteracy throughout the world, and praises also Dr. Laubach's deep conviction "that the lot of the individual human being can more easily be bettered as his means of helping himself are expanded."

When Dr. Laubach began his work in 1915, there were no materials available, no funds to supply materials if he could master new languages thoroughly enough to set up key words for quick and effective teaching, and the task of a single-handed effort to turn illiterates into literates would have daunted any lesser man.

The story of how the teaching spread by the "each one teach one" method and the organization in New York in 1935 of the Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature to support his work, and the tremendous part this literacy program can now play in the job, essential to world peace, of breaking down barriers between groups, will be told on Thursday, January 5.

Dr. Laubach is a graduate of Princeton University, with a Ph. D. from Columbia. His best-known books are "Teaching the World to Read," "The Highway of Print," "You are my Friends," and "Letters of a Modern Mystic." In 1946 at the request of the United Nations Educational, Cultural and Scientific Organization (UNESCO), he helped prepare recommendations for a world plan for fundamental education.

The lecture in Swarthmore, which is presented without charge to the community by the Woman's Club, will be Dr. Laubach's last speaking engagement before he leaves immediately for French Africa to conduct another literacy project.

The meeting will begin at 8:00 when Dr. John W. Nason will introduce Dr. Laubach to the audience. Swarthmoreans are asked to come promptly since many people from out of town are requesting the privilege of attending the meeting.

William Penn's common sense probably saved Pennsylvania from a terrifying witch hunt. Eight years before the infamous trials in Salem, Massachusetts, Penn sat in judgement of a certain Margaret M—— who lived on Crum Creek. Another testified she had used certain "unseemly expressions" when she remarked it was better to boil the bones instead of the heart of a calf supposed to have died by witchcraft.

A memorial service will be conducted by the Reverend Joseph P. Bishop, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, at the home Saturday at 2 p. m.


## GARDEN COURSE AT ARTS CENTER

## LAUBACH WILL SPEAK JAN. 5

### World Educator At High School Aud. Thursday

Dr. Frank C. Laubach, head of the Committee on World Literacy, will speak in the High School Auditorium Thursday night, January 5, at 8 p. m. There is no charge for the meeting and the Woman's Club, which is bringing Dr. Laubach to the community, invites all within this vicinity to hear the challenging story of how the world's tremendous possibilities which the achievement brings.

Dr. Laubach's story is a true "success" record, marked by his Christian humility, his love and faith in the untaught millions of this world, and the soundness of his training and work. After a quarter of a century of pioneering in the field of teaching ABCs to adults whose languages had never been in print, his program is called "Lighting Literacy," and such institutions of teacher training as Columbia Teacher's College pay tribute to the effective accuracy of his methods.

Literacy campaigns directed by him have rapidly increased readers in the Philippines, Siam, China, India, Africa, and South America but the problem is still great and the additional problem of furnishing material of worth to the new world readers is acute.

Dr. Laubach knew and worked with Ghandhi, who first opposed his work but later aided it. Nehru praises the literacy campaign in India and aids Dr. Laubach's work actively. Dr. Laubach leaves for the Belgian Congo immediately after his lecture here.

Known throughout the world as the "Miracle Man of the Moros", Dr. Laubach is a native Pennsylvanian having been born in Benton, graduated from the Perkiomen (continued on page 10)

## World Literacy Head Speaks At Night

The lecture by Dr. Frank C. Laubach to be given on the evening of Thursday, January 5 in the high school auditorium is an event of major importance to the community. Dr. Laubach is recognized throughout the world as the pioneer and leading specialist in world literacy.

Although his literacy campaigns among the headhunting Moros, in the Philippines and the natives of Singapore, Ceylon, India, Cairo, China, Syria, Turkey and Africa have been written up in Time and Reader's Digest, he says in his book "The Silent Billions Speak" that his work is better known throughout the world than in the United States.

An editorial in the New York Times of July 22, 1949, praises his public service as an adult education specialist in campaigning against illiteracy throughout the world, and praises also Dr. Laubach's deep conviction "that the lot of the individual human being can more easily be bettered as his means of helping himself are expanded."

When Dr. Laubach began his work in 1915, there were no materials available, no funds to supply materials if he could master new languages thoroughly enough to set up key words for quick and effective teaching, and the task of a single-handed effort to turn illiterates into literates would have daunted any lesser man.

The story of how the teaching spread by the "each one teach one" method and the organization in New York in 1935 of the Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature to support his work, and the tremendous part this literacy program can now play in the job, essential to world peace, of breaking down barriers between groups, will be told on Thursday, January 5.

Dr. Laubach is a graduate of Princeton University, with a Ph. D. from Columbia. His best-known books are "Teaching the World to Read," "The Highway of Print," "You are my Friends," and "Letters of a Modern Mystic." In 1946 at the request of the United Nations Educational, Cultural and Scientific Organization (UNESCO), he helped prepare recommendations for a world plan for fundamental education.

The lecture in Swarthmore, which is presented without charge to the community by the Woman's Club, will be Dr. Laubach's last speaking engagement before he leaves immediately for French Africa to conduct another literacy project.

The meeting will begin at 8:00 when Dr. John W. Nason will introduce Dr. Laubach to the audience. Swarthmoreans are asked to come promptly since many people from out of town are requesting the privilege of attending the meeting.

## Campaigners Prepare For March Of Dimes Jan. 16

Development of a method for growing polio virus in non-nervous tissue in a test tube marks a "scientific first" for that disease and brings a preventive polio vaccine one step closer to realization, it was disclosed today by Dr. John W. Nason, Swarthmore College President, director of the Delaware County March of Dimes campaign.

Citing a resume prepared by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis outlining the past year's accomplishments in polio research, Dr. Nason said financial obligations imposed by last year's record polio epidemic threaten to retard these studies, unless the March of Dimes campaign January 16-31 meets with an overwhelming response from the American people.

The March of Dimes campaign director reported that during 1949, a group of scientists headed by Kansas-born Dr. John F. Enders of the Children's Hospital, in Boston, and Harvard University, "had succeeded in doing what other scientists had failed to accomplish"—growing human polio virus in non-nervous tissue. For years, Dr. Nason recounted, scientists have sought unsuccessfully to do this.

Previous to the Harvard scientists' accomplishment, he continued, polio virus could be grown only in the living nerve cells of human beings and certain laboratory animals. On one occasion some years ago, two scientists were able to grow the polio virus in a test tube, he explained, but the virus grew only when the culture medium used was brain tissue.

Virus grown in brain or other nervous tissue, Dr. Nason went on, is not satisfactory for use in a vaccine because it may produce degenerative changes in the brains of those individuals injected with the vaccine.

If a polio vaccine is achieved, there will be a tremendous demand for it, the March of Dimes


