The Swarthmore High School commencement exercises next Tuesday night will feature a choral reading of selections from Job XXVIII, as presented by the class. Mary Knabb and John Steinfeld will be the solo speakers. Musical numbers will include a soprano solo, a selection from Madame Butterfly, by Margot Bowie, accompanied by Margaret Croco on the piano. There will be a brass quintet, consisting of Clarence Franck, Richard McCray, John Chapman, Frederick Sales, and John Steinfeld, playing Wagner's Chorale.

Three boys of the class will present essays on "Education for Citizenship." The subject will be introduced by Raymond Denworth. Richard McCray will discuss "Character," Whitworth Bird "Leadership," and Raymond Denworth will end with "Patterns for progress."

BORO. HONORS ITS WAR DEAD

Sweney Asks All To Strive To Remove Prejudices

Swarthmoreans turned out in goodly numbers Tuesday to pay their annual tribute to the men and women who fought and died in two World Wars that this nation might enjoy peace in a free world.

Sponsored by the Ainsworth-Werner Post of the American Legion the exercises at Borough Hall plaza and subsequent parade to Eastlawn cemetery drew uniformed contingents of Legionnaires, Legion Auxiliary, ex-service men, Red cross, Girl and Boy Scouts, Brownies and Cubs, as well as many citizens with a touch of red, white and blue in their day's garb.

The stirring strains of the High School Band, the devout prayers of Chaplain Joseph P. Bishop, the placing of flags and wreaths to the roll call of war-dead, complemented the fine address given by Judge Henry G. Sweney of the Delaware County Courts.

A well-known and popular speaker Judge Sweney in his Memorial Day words issued a reminder that men and women fought and won wars as united Americans, with disregard to race, color and creed. Returning home they found the old prejudices still rampant. He commended the few who are trying to remedy the situation, but claimed equal rights for all can't be secured by passing laws alone, it requires living tolerantly with all people and learning to know and understand them.

The jurist recalled the American inclination to feel each person is entitled to do as he pleases, whereas if everyone followed this policy complete chaos would result. Therefore it is necessary to temper one's behavior in accordance to the law.

Thomas B. McCabe, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, will be the speaker at the annual Alumni Day program of Swarthmore College, to be held at 2:45 p. m. Saturday, June 10, in the Scott Outdoor Auditorium on the college campus.

Mr. McCabe, who has served two years in his present government post, has been president of the Scott Paper Company since 1927. During the war, he served in several government offices. A graduate of Swarthmore in 1915 and a member of its Board of Managers, he lives at 607 North Chester road.

Mr. McCabe's address is one highlight of the general Alumni Day program, which begins at noon with a meeting of the Alumni Association in the Friends Meeting House. However, every effort has been made to keep all charges as low as possible.

NURSING BOARD FACES DILEMMA

739 Home Visits Made in Area in April

Directors of the Nursing Service, the Community Health Society of Central Delaware County met on Thursday, May 25, in the Director's Room of the Swarthmore National Bank and Trust Company.

Board President, Mrs. Walter A. Schmidt presided over the meeting. Mrs. Theodore Smithers, chairman of the Finance Committee outlined a four point program recommended to meet the deficit facing the agency next year. Because the Community Chest Campaign failed to reach its goal last fall the nursing agency's allocation will be decreased. Every effort will be made not to curtail service.

Reports of standing committees were proof that the Board has met the Fire emergency with the appreciated help of individuals and organizations from the area served. Mrs. Charles W. Lukens reported that the repairs and replacements were now practically completed, with new storage space being rented in the rear of the Swarthmore Co-Op. Mrs. Charles Fischer reported the 532 garments collected by the Needlework Guilds to replace those destroyed by fire already in use with new linens, sickroom supplies, and materials for replacing others purchased from the Needlework Guild's gift of money. She thanked the Friendly Circle for its generous gift.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Groff, supervising nurse of the Agency, reported 739 home visits made by the nursing staff during April. In referring to the grave financial emergency faced by the Agency, Mrs. Groff stated, "I am glad our various committee members have supplied our answer. Our reserves lie in our belief that our services are needed. We can't fail our sick, our aged and our kiddies. We will find a way to be our brother's keeper. Twenty nine years ago a small group of women had this belief and their faith produced this agency. This same faith and enthusiasm is at this meeting today. We will go forward. The going may be rough but we will explore every opportunity."

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In addition to offering the regular activities, which consist of the pre-school and primary groups, summer club and league baseball, the Recreation Association wishes to bring to the community's attention the opportunity to enroll for Duck Club Swimming and Duck Club Swimming Instruction, which will be offered independently of the Association by Penn State Center. Arrangements have been made with Penn State to take registrations for swimming and swimming instruction through the auspices of the Association at the aforementioned times and places.

Pre-school groups, for threes, fours and fives, will be held at the Rutgers Avenue School and Playground, Monday through Friday, for six weeks beginning June 19. Mrs. J. Francis Taylor is in charge and she will have ample and expert assistants.

The Primary group will also meet at Rutgers during the same six weeks, and is also under Mrs. Taylor's supervision. It is open to children who have completed the first and/or second grades. Both pre-school and primary groups will meet from 9 a.m. until 11:45 a.m.

Summer Club, under the direction of Theodore Purnell, will be held at the College Avenue School and Playground each week-day morning for six weeks beginning June 19, and a number of activities will be offered, giving the opportunity for play and instruction in all kinds of sports. Handicrafts are also available. Mr. Purnell and his assistants will also feature special events on Friday mornings.

League baseball, coached by Russell Snyder and others, involves practice week-day mornings during part of the Summer Club hours. Children will also be free to take part in the regular Summer Club program. This year practice will not be held in the afternoon, although usually EDCO games will take place in the late afternoon and early evening. Midgets, Clippers and Hornets all have an active schedule ahead of them.

Children may utilize the facilities of the Swarthmore Recreation Association in order to register for the summer swimming activities of the Duck Club at Penn State Center. This program has no connection with the Association, but it is brought to the community's attention so that parents may plan their children's summer schedules with full knowledge of the variety of opportunities available.

Seedling Covers Disappear To the Editor: I began gardening this year with six "heliocaps" - helmet-shaped glass covers, about a foot in diameter, used for the protection of seedlings. 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### P.E.O. SISTERHOOD HEARS DR. DOW

Dr. Blanche Hinman Dow, president of Cottey Junior College, Nevada, Mo., spoke to 150 members and guests of the P.E.O. Sisterhood Wednesday following a luncheon of the Rolling Green Golf Club, Springfield. The meeting was arranged by the P.E.O. Reciprocity Board, representing nine Philadelphia chapters, including Chapter P, Swarthmore. Mrs. W. B. Jackson, Havertown, is president of the board and Mrs. George Sargisson, Ridley Park, president of the local group.

Cottey Junior College is owned and operated by the Sisterhood. Dr. Dow, a graduate of Smith College, the School of Expression, Boston, Mass., with her masters and doctor's degrees from Columbia, is an outstanding educator. She accepted the presidency of Cottey college in 1949. She expressed her firm belief that junior colleges are becoming more necessary in the educational field. She hopes to make Cottey the leading school of its kind in the country. The school has an operating budget for the current year of \$133,000, and has 165 students from 30 different states. Plans are underway to bring foreign students to Cottey on a scholarship basis to promote better international relations.

The P.E.O. Education loan fund of nearly \$1,000,000 was discussed at the meeting. From this fund \$2,750,000 has been loaned to 9,400 girls. There are 34 active loans, 58 of them for graduate study now. A \$3,000 fund has been established recently by P.E.O. for granting international scholarships to bring foreign students to this country. Deans of girls from local schools were invited to attend the luncheon. Virginia Allen, of the Swarthmore high school, Mrs. Peter Told, chairman of the Swarthmore Woman's club Education committee, and Miss Reese, Nether Providence dean of girls, were guests of the local chapter.

### BOROUGH HALL STILL "ON FIRE"

Council's Mind Not Yet Definite On Action

Not having arrived at its ultimate decision regarding a completely new or a rebuilt and modernized town hall, Swarthmore Borough Council in June session Monday evening authorized advertisement for bids to place an adequate though temporary structure on the old building, gutted by fire March 15. Borough fathers estimated that a replacement of the current rainproof tarpaulin arrangement could be effected for around \$1400.

Council also entered into a contract with George Ewing, architect to submit plans and recommendations on rebuilding or replacement of the structure. A plot plan of the ground available (including the newly purchased Kistler lot) submitted by the Borough engineer was studied as to possibility of improved placement.

It was announced that the old siren, damaged by the fire, was in process of being repaired and would be reinstalled atop Borough Hall soon. A temporary siren on the Co-op roof across Dartmouth avenue has been in service the past three months.

### H. S. SENIORS GRADUATE TUES.

Set School Record In Scholarship Achievement

The graduating class of 1950, Swarthmore High School, led an ovation to C. Baker Thompson at its commencement exercises Tuesday night. The audience of family and friends of the graduates which filled Clither's Memorial joined heartily in the salute to Mr. Thompson who leaves the school after 19 years of service.

Mr. Thompson declared his pleasure to be leaving with the class which teachers had long considered one of the most capable ever to be graduated from the school. "They will be hardy missed in the school and they leave a challenge to the classes to come," he declared. Possible purchase of a leaf loader for fall use was discussed, approximate cost \$3000. The recent suggested revision of the local building code also came up but was postponed for further study with possible adoption at the next session.

A letter from a Connecticut and a Mississippi girl, Columbia University seniors who plan to visit Europe this summer, requested Council to prepare a scroll for delivery to Swarthmore's adopted town of Stade, Germany. Since the Stade project has been conducted by the school children of the borough, Council will consult the school system as to its desires in the matter.  
Current bills amounting to \$6,204.84 were approved for payment, along with refund of \$123.23 retained due to John Haney and Son upon completion of resurfacing work on streets, and \$38 to Maguire Construction Company.

## NEED A NURSE? CALL SW 6-3498

The local Nursing Service of the Community Health Society received radio publicity Saturday morning when its story inaugurated Mrs. Conway Zirkle's "Treasure Chest" set at 10 a.m. over WPWA, Chester.

Mrs. Zirkle told of the Society's long its headquarters when the Borough Hall burned and stressed the fact that nurses' phone SW 6-3498 was the only phone still ringing the morning after the fire and that in response to its call a nurse was at the scene of a near-by accident to a school child at 8:30.

She related that in the Society's temporary, gratefully accepted, hurriedly set-up headquarters in the Celia Kitchen the typewriter was first kept in the oven and the adding machine in the broiler.

Her story of the response of Nursing Supervisor Mrs. Elizabeth Groff, called from rites preceding her father's funeral services to rescue the Society's papers from burning, made dramatic recital. Mrs. Groff saved case histories first, since "those are private records."

Next, she rescued the nurses' bags in order that work might be carried on without cessation, and finally the "poor fund" to which the nurses contribute any donated change in order that a family discovered in their visits to be without enough food can be given five dollars to stay them over the time when application to the proper channels can be made.

Mrs. Zirkle explained that the Society does not solicit funds for this purpose but that donations to it may be made and that its present total of seven dollars is inadequate for the demands made on it.

She stressed that the Society exists to provide nursing care in the home, that it is not charitable but accepts fees in part payment as they are possible. Insurance and school contracts for nursing service are added sources of income to the funds supplied by the Community Chest. She listed the area served by the agency, Swarthmore, Springfield, Ridley Park, Ridley Township, Morton, and Rutledge, and advised all in the area, "When you need a nurse, call SW 6-3498."

Mrs. Zirkle's broadcasts will provide information about Health and Welfare agencies in Delaware County.

(Continued from page one) alive anywhere in the world, war is not inevitable, problems are not insurmountable."

The large audience heard with interest President John Nason's annual review of the academic year which he termed "the most normal in a long time." Of the extra-curricular program, he singled out the varied musical offerings of the year for favorable comment. He reported the reintroduction of courses in Religion and described the status of the program of Russian studies in which the college joins with Haverford and Bryn Mawr.

"Today," Nason said, "marks the end of the 'era of veterans'. Five hundred and seventy-seven have been enrolled in the college since November, 1944. Four hundred and four have graduated, 93 have departed elsewhere, 75 will be left in other classes."

As the beginning of the future campus, he referred to the grading of the new athletic field at the Field House, and listed the campaign begun in April for the science building to be erected on the old field, adding his belief that the first building to be erected would probably be a new women's dormitory on a site still to be selected.

Dr. Nason listed with regret the retirement of Ethel Silz after 21 years of service to the college, of Carl Delmuth after 11 years, and of Vice-President James Perkins after five years. He announced the election of William H. Ward, Strath Haven avenue, to the Board of Managers.

Five graduates received awards from the college for graduate study: Jerry Ravett, the Galloway Fellowship; Christopher Fried and Sidney Mitchell share the Joshua Lippincott Fellowship; Arthur Butts the John Lockwood Fellowship; and Polly Plinkner the Lucretia Mott Fellowship.

President Nason presented Miss Pinksner with the Oak Leaf Medal for "loyalty, scholarship, and service." Samuel Barol the Ivy Medal awarded "The man in the Senior Class who is judged by the faculty to have shown the highest degree of leadership based upon character and scholarship," and E. Allan Van Deusen with the McCabe Engineering Award given annually to the "outstanding engineering student of the senior class."

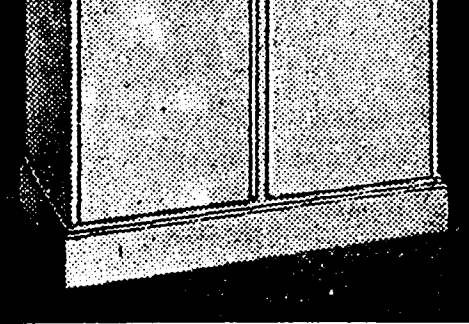

## SRA ENROLLMENT HITS NEW HIGH

Personnel Prepares For A Busy Season

A new high in enrollment was experienced in all branches of the Swarthmore Recreation Association's summer program, based upon preliminary registration figures and attendance at the first few days of classes. Facilities were so taxed as to require a good many last minute arrangements and the employment of additional personnel, but by June 19, the first day of the program, the major problems incident to the conduct of the more important activities had been ironed out.

Approximately 70 boys have signed up for baseball. Reds Barr, Dana Swartz, Clark Allison have been secured to help Russell Snyder with the coaching of Midgets, Clippers and Hornets. Reds and Dana are prominent athletes from the local high school. Mr. Allison, who will assume responsibility for many aspects of the entire program, was formerly Recreation Director at Camp Dix, and made an outstanding reputation for himself in athletics at Swarthmore High School and Westchester Teachers' College.

Preliminary figures for the summer club show that 72 are enrolled. Theodore Purnell, director, Mrs. Purnell, head of arts and crafts, Teal Dunn, general play supervisor and Majorie Elizabeth Lewis, tennis and archery instructor, are back again this year. Thomas M. Hopper, who will help with general play, and Mildred McCowan, who will assist with handicrafts, are both new this year, as is Mildred Magee, who will handle office and secretarial work as well as to assist wherever required.

**Pre-School Program**  
The biggest surprise of all came in the enrollment for the pre-school and primary program at the Rutgers Avenue School. Twenty-seven three-year-olds, 45 four-year-olds and 26 five-year-olds have been admitted to the pre-school groups, and 48 are registered in the primary section. 253 Pupils To Study

Two hundred and fifty three students are taking 387 courses at the Summer School currently in progress at the Swarthmore High School. One third of this number is from Swarthmore, with the balance of pupils coming from nearby vicinities.

If the 253 so far registered are viewing the close of the first week at 12:30 p.m. today with considerable interest, so too are the practice teachers and their Swarthmore supervisors.

Secured by the West Chester State Teachers' College, the summer teachers, largely seniors or graduates, come from colleges as far as the University of Arizona, although the majority were trained at West Chester.

Rosemary T. McGraney comes from Chestnut Hill College to teach English 8 and 10, Polly Metzger comes from Dickinson College for English 7 and 11, and Spanish 1, and Malcolm Simpson, of Dartmouth, teaches algebra 1 and plane geometry.

From Swarthmore College comes Henry P. Richardson to teach algebra 11 and biology, from Wilson Katherine Haller, teaching social studies 7 and English 10 and 11; Joseph S. Carter of Guilford College is teaching practical math 3 and plane geometry, and Mrs. Sarah H. Fraser of the University of Arizona, teaches geography 8, American History and English 7.

Mrs. Frank Mader, a borough resident and regular teacher in French and German 1, with the supervisors rounds out the summer school faculty.

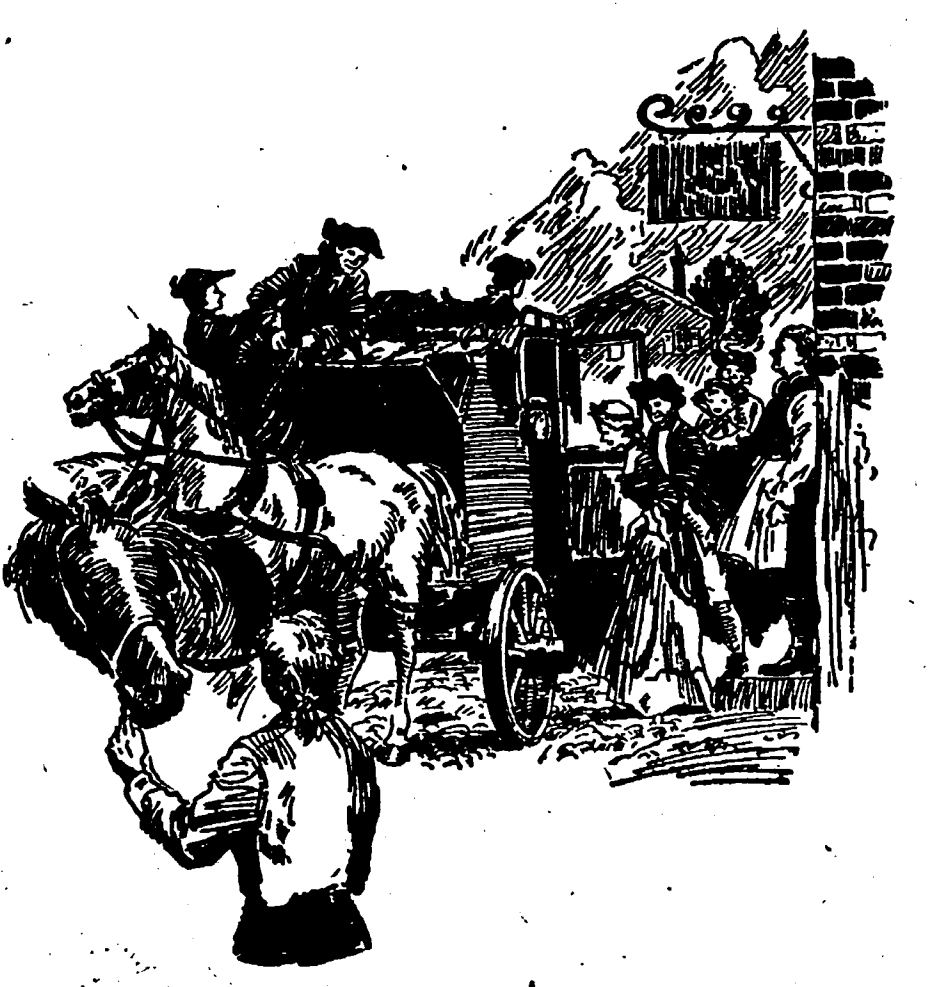

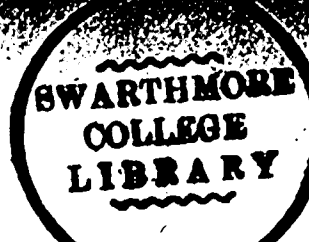

BOROUGH HALL IS COMING DOWN

New Civic Building To Be Erected On Kistler Lot

The seven members of Council accepted plans for an entirely new Borough Hall, at a special meeting held Monday night. The plans, which supersede the three other much discussed proposals, call for a one story building to be located on the south side of the Kistler lot, next to the Methodist Church; the old Borough Hall will be torn down and the space used for a parking lot for 66 cars.

The reason for the decision on the new building was the fact that at a relatively small increase in cost, the borough would get a modern building which would handle all facilities such as the fire department, the library, the police, the Borough Offices, the Community Health Society, and the American Legion. The upkeep of such a building would be cheaper than the upkeep of the old building repaired.

The present plans drawn by Borough Architect George M. Ewing, allow for a 4000 square foot library - considerably more space than it has now in the Old Telephone Building, or had in its former quarters in the old Borough Hall. The main entrance will face Dartmouth avenue. The Fire Department entrance, opening out at Lafayette avenue, will necessitate widening that street.

During the meeting, permission was granted the Woman's Club to build an extension on the western side of their property in order to make the building more convenient for the use of the general public.

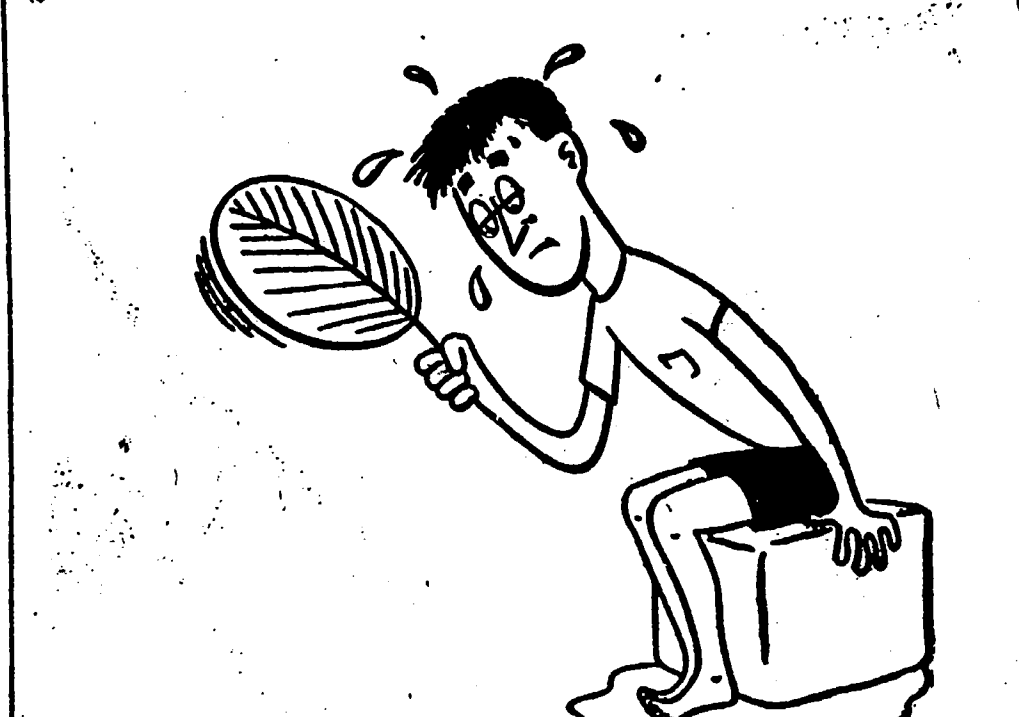
