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Glen-Nor never was in the ball game last Saturday, as they fumbled on the opening kickoff. After Swarthmore had a play called back because of a penalty, they surrendered the ball to Glen-Nor.

The red and gold of Glen-Nor didn't manage to hold it very long, as John Bernard crashed through from left tackle and blocked a Glen-Nor punt, which was recovered in the end zone by left end Frank (Smackover) Smith for a touchdown. The newly found and truly remarkable extra point kicker, Jack Thompson, converted to make it 7-0.

In the second quarter after a Glen-Nor fumble was recovered by Don MacElwee, mixed passing and running set up the second touchdown. Clem Malin made the last six yards to register the T.D. So there it was, 14-0 at halftime.

At the beginning of the second half, Swarthmore again found it rough going against the big Glen-Nor line. With this combination clicking, they moved the ball 58 yards in 7 plays to the Glen-Nor six yard marker. After a line buck failed, Carted coolly faded and hit End Ken Wright in the end zone to make the score 34-0.

Later in the quarter, Carter duplicated this feat hitting Bruce Gemmill in the end zone, climaxing a 41 yard march to register the final touchdown. Thompson converted the sixth extra point to make the final score read 42-0. One of the highlights for Swarthmore was Gemmill's exceptional kicking which twice sent the ball out of bounds inside the ten yard line.

Swarthmore is looking forward to a great game with a tough Yeadon team on Saturday. Game time is 2:15 on the Yeadon field.

CO. SOCIAL SECURITY HEAD OFFERS ADVICE

Employers of household help in Delaware County should keep a careful record in permanent form, of each employee's name, actual dates worked, and cash wages paid according to Herbert W. Gruber, manager of the Social Security Administration's office in Chester.

No particular form is required but a careful record may help to avoid misunderstandings and safeguard her said. If household employees work on at least 24 days in a three month period ending March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31, and are paid \$50 or more in cash, their wages must be reported for Social Security purposes.

Gruber urges employers to be sure to obtain Social Security numbers from all such employees and keep them in their record for use in filing their social security reports. Household help includes maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, furnace-men, chauffeurs and in some cases practical nurses. However, people who do housework on a farm are considered farm employees and are covered by different rules.

SENIORS HEAR COLLEGE REPS.

College Night To Be Held Nov. 13 At Upper Darby High

Although it has been scarcely two months since the opening of school and June graduation seems some distance in the future, the senior class has been making future plans. On October 11, Captain H. R. Stevens of the N.R.O. T.C. visited the school to talk with the boys interested in investigating that program. Several boys applied. On October 16, John Daffin of Mary Baldwin College in Stanton, Virginia, visited Swarthmore to talk with several of the senior girls. Mr. Schaffer from Cornell University spoke to 12 boys and girls at the High School on October 24. Also present at this conference were students from Lower Merion and Haverford High Schools. Several seniors took advantage of the two day vacation, while the Delaware County Teacher's Institute was being held, to visit colleges which they are considering. Seven members of the Class of '52 participated in a career conference for those considering teaching as a profession. This was held at the State Teacher's College at West Chester last Friday. Plans have been completed to have Mr. Morse, a representative from Earlham speak on November 6, at 3:15 to those pupils and their parents who are considering Earlham. Also, Marjorie Darling from Beaver College will speak with those interested, on November 27 at 3:15. On Saturday, November 10, Temple University is sponsoring its 10th Annual Career Conference. Panel discussion groups will represent 37 different careers. A sizeable number of eleventh and twelfth graders have indicated their desire to participate in this conference. "College Night" will be held on Tuesday evening, November 13 at the Upper Darby Senior High School. This affords pupils and parents an excellent opportunity to talk with many college representatives from New England, the Middle Atlantic States, and the Midwest. In past years, Swarthmore students have found this an outstanding opportunity to talk individually with these representatives. Eleventh and Twelfth grade students are urged to attend. Plans will be made for the representatives of many more colleges to visit Swarthmore High School. Announcements will be made as these plans are completed. The High School invites the parents of Swarthmore pupils to attend these meetings so that they may share and benefit with their sons and daughters in this experience. These plans are being made and supervised by Henry Hoffman, Counselor for the senior class. Parents are invited to consult with him should any additional information be desired.

90% For! 10% Against Time to settle... END THIS QUIBLING! Railroad workers are represented by 23 standard unions. By mutual agreement, 20 of these unions—comprising about 1,200,000 men, or more than 90%—are working under wages and rules agreed to by them and the railroads. But leaders of three unions—with only about 130,000 men, or less than 10%—still refuse, after more than a year of negotiations, to accept similar wages and rules agreements. These are even more favorable than the terms recommended by the Emergency Board appointed by the President. Yes, it certainly seems to be finally about time that the leaders of the three unions stop their delaying tactics—their quibbling. But the leaders of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors continue to refuse. They continue a course of dillying and dallying. It is definitely time to END THIS QUIBLING!

On June 15, 1950, an Emergency Board appointed by the President under the terms of the Railway Labor Act—an Act largely fathered by the unions themselves—made its recommendations on certain wage and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employees and the railroads. More Than 90% of Employees Accept Since then, terms equal to or better than the Board recommendations have been accepted by 1,200,000 railroad employees—more than 90% of the total of all workers. They are represented by 20 of the 23 standard railroad unions. Less Than 10% Refuse But three unions—with about 130,000 men, or less than 10% of the total—have refused to accept, even after months of negotiations. These three unions are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors. These are three of the so-called "operating" unions. Already the highest paid men in the industry, their leaders demand still further advantages over other workers. In all, there are about 270,000 operating employees. But not all of them, by any means, are represented by BLE, ELFE, or ORC. As a matter of fact, less than half—132,000 to be exact—are in these three unions. More than half—about 140,000—are in other unions, principally the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. What makes the whole situation so hard to understand is that these 140,000 operating employees are working under wages and rules which the leaders of the other 130,000 say they cannot agree to. What Do the Railroads Offer? They offer these three unions the same settlement which was contained in a Memorandum of Agreement signed at the White House on December 21, 1950, by four brotherhoods and the railroads. Later these brotherhoods sought to repudiate this agreement. But on May 25, 1951, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen signed a complete agreement carrying out the principles of the Memorandum Agreement of December 21. They have been working under this agreement since May 25. What About Wages? Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$3.34 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving an increase of 19 1/2 cents an hour (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agreement is carried out, will be paid promptly. What About "Cost of Living" Increases? The White House Agreement includes an "escalator" clause under which wages will be geared to changes in the Government's cost-of-living index. Two such increases—April and July, 1951—have already been paid to the 90% of railroad employees covered by signed agreements. What About the 40-Hour Week? The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employees in yard service. The employee can have it any time after January 1, 1952, provided the manpower situation is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitration by a referee appointed by the President. What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand? The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with rules changes, which have already been agreed to by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Of these, the principal one seems to be that, having to do with so-called "interdivisional service"—runs which take in two or more seniority districts. The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the industry, and better service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily stop a railroad from establishing such interdivisional runs. The carriers propose that if a railroad wishes to set up an interdivisional run, the railroad and the unions should try to agree on such run and the conditions which should surround its establishment, and if the railroad and the unions can't agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration. But the three union leaders still refuse. Rules Can Be Arbitrated The railroads have not only offered these three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to submit such rules to arbitration. The Industry Pattern Is Fixed With the pattern so firmly established in the railroad industry, it seems fair to suggest that the leaders of BLE, ELFE, and ORC stop their quibbling and take action to make the railroad labor picture 100% complete. Certainly today's economic and international situation calls for a united front. And certainly no good reason has been advanced why these three unions should be preferred over all other railroad employees.

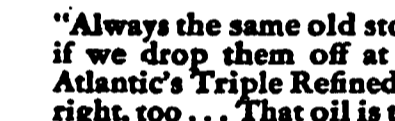

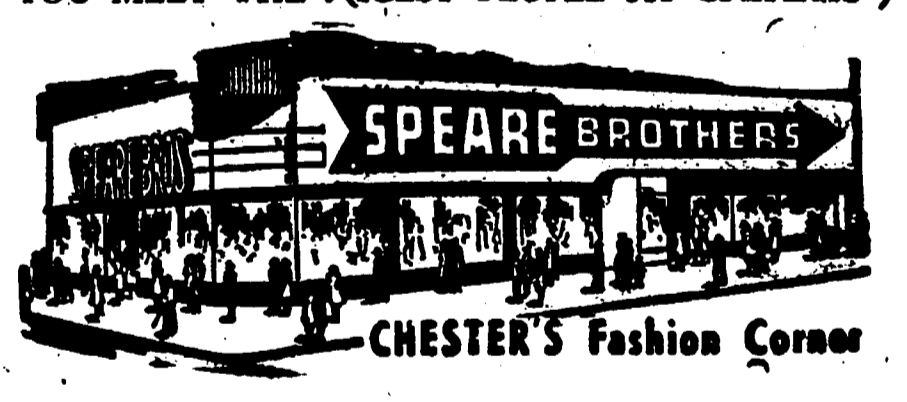

The Swarthmore-Yeadon football game proved to be a see-saw battle in the first half with the Garnet taking a slight edge of 2 points. However, in the second half, a greatly inspired Garnet team took the field and threw Yeadon to a 16-0 defeat. Late in the first quarter Swarthmore had Yeadon hard-pressed on the Eagles 22. On their last down Yeadon attempted to punt, but the kick was blocked by a hardcharging Garnet line led by Jim Tucker, Dick McCormack, Swarthmore guard, recovered the ball for an automatic safety.

In the second quarter Swarthmore's backs, led by Bill Kaufman and Andy Schroder, plus the passing attack from Jim Carter to ends Bruce Gemmill, Bob McHenry, and Don MacElwee, pushed Yeadon deep into their own territory several times. However, Yeadon's defense held, preventing the Garnet from scoring.

The second half was a different story. The Garnet scored twice, once in the third period and again in the last, with Jack Thompson making both placements. Their first touchdown was made after the Garnet recovered a Yeadon fumble in the Eagles territory. Bill Kaufman, after several plays, carried the pigskin down to the goal line and finally plunged over for the score.

Yeadon showed real strength for the first and last time early in the final period. However, their passing attack was halted abruptly on an interception by linebacker Jack Thompson. From this time on the game was in Swarthmore hands. Late in the quarter the pigskin was carried down to the 1 yard line by Bill Kaufman and Andy Schroder on successive ground plays. Then Jim Carter, talked on a quarterback sneak. The game ended shortly after with the Garnet taking home a 16-0 victory.

Captain Jack Thompson, by virtue of his two extra point place-kick conversions, has now run his streak to 10.

The Garnet travels to Prospect Park tomorrow afternoon, game time 2:15. The Blue and Gold has dropped two games but these defeats were administered by two of the strongest teams in the County—Eddystone and Upper Chichester. This particular game has become a "must" with the Prospectors. Last year's 19-19 tie was one of the most exciting ever witnessed on Rutgers Field.

The accepted bid, amounting to \$7700, will resurface the present tennis courts and a nearby hard court play area and connect them with similar paving. Basketball backstops, inserts for tennis poles, and a ten-foot high fence to keep pupils out of bordering driveways and field mud are also included. The improvement for use during recesses, physical education classes and organized games has long been desired by the teaching staff.

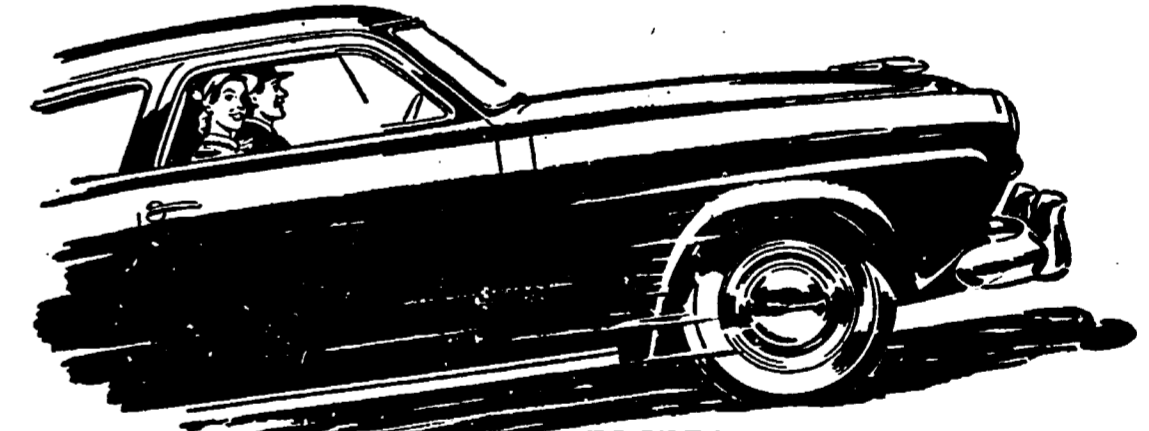

## ANTI-BIOTIC LAB. IN OLD PRES GYM

Encouraging Results  
Reported By  
Sponsors

The Lincoln Foundation will open its new anti-biotic research laboratory in the old Swarthmore Prep School gym on Harvard avenue next week. The non-profit organization secured Borough Council's approval three weeks ago to rent the quarters for a year. Leases were signed with Swarthmore College, present owner of the building, and Horace Rhee, builder, has engineered extensive alterations under the direction of Charles E. Lincoln of 801 Westdale avenue, technical advisor and trustee of the Foundation. On Monday several leading bacteriologists will begin work on the viral filtrate developed by Mr. Lincoln's brother, Dr. Robert E. Lincoln, five-and-a-half years ago and credited with amazing results in some types of malignancies, arthritis and tuberculosis during the interval when it has been produced in a Boston University laboratory.

Until its recent adoption experimentally by doctors in 18 states expenses of the medicine's production were met by patients who came to the outpatient clinic at Dr. Lincoln's office in Medford, Mass. Reportedly as many as 90 patients a day have applied for the aerosol treatment to which Dr. Lincoln and other prescribers, including one prominent physician in the Swarthmore area, attribute the successful treatment of many cancer, multiple sclerosis, asthma and tuberculosis cases. Awaiting national Food and Drug Act approval the product at present is only distributable for research purposes, through physicians who as research fellows of the Foundation quietly test its worth.

Taking his pre-medical studies at Tufts College and his doctor of medicine at Boston University, Dr. Lincoln has been practicing in Medford for 25 years. He developed his bacteriophage by isolating and removing two key viral organisms from the system of human sufferers at the height of their affliction with diseases he sought to combat. By propagating these viral bodies he produced an especially virulent viral filtrate small enough to be taken into the system through the lungs but capable of absorption and multiplication in the body to a degree where it is capable of destroying infection.

First used as a sinus treatment the discovery soon appeared to be relieving other ailments, the Lincoln report. Charles W. Tobey, Jr., now a trustee of the Foundation, says Dr. Lincoln successfully treated him for lung cancer. Tobey is the son of New Hampshire's Senator Tobey who acts as chairman of the organization's advisory board.

In Washington last month to seek Veterans Administration and Public Health Bureau permission to demonstrate his methods on volunteer patients, Dr. Lincoln contended almost all diseases caused by filterable viruses thrive in humans on the common germ, hemolytic staphylococcus aureus. He claimed the potent viruses he developed thrive in these germs and when introduced into the sinus cavities and lungs, enter the body and destroy host bacteria and any existing virus, thereby leaving no host for viruses which might enter later from other sources.

A native of Boston like his brother, Charles Lincoln graduated from Lowell Textile Institute and was manager of the William D. Sykes textile mill in Manayunk before joining forces with his brother 18 months ago. He states the research group plans eventually to build a medical center in this area. Next Friday he will explain the Foundation's work to the Swarthmore Rotary Club.

Swarthmore College retains over half of the gym building for storage of furnishings and miscellaneous supplies. The Swarthmore Rifle and Pistol Club will continue to maintain a range in the west end of the structure.

Conversion of the roof-high

basketball area and several ante-rooms of the gym to a working laboratory involved installation of a false ceiling, partitions, lighting, plumbing, a heating system, and alterations to the east-end entrance nearest Chester road.

Council approved the use on the basis of the Foundation's non-pro-

fit research nature and when convinced its operation would in no way create noise, odor, or other objectionable condition. Income in excess of maintenance and salary costs is spent on research and medical scholarships, a spokesman said.

BURGESS REVISES PARKING RULE

Most South Underpass Space Unlimited Again

Acceding to protests over the two-hour parking restrictions placed southwest of the underpass two weeks ago, Burgess Charles R. Russell announces he will throw the 32 spaces along the college campus open to all-day parking again on Friday. The ten spaces parallel to the underpass will be kept under the two-hour regulations.

In addition to many complaints regarding the attempt to provide space for local shoppers, it is reported that the 32-space area was nearly deserted. Meanwhile the railroad parking square at the north platform was so congested that one woman returning from Philadelphia at 4 o'clock was unable to extricate her car until 6 o'clock. Another resident having driven five blocks from his home to the station had to park three blocks away before boarding his train. Police also found vacant spaces occasionally existed in the erstwhile crowded spaces along streets in the business section.

Considering the experiment created a new problem and proved the additional space provided was not actually needed by short-period parkers, Friday's revision was settled upon. Burgess Russell hopes a solution satisfactory to local business houses, their patrons and train commuters will be realized, at least temporarily by strict enforcement of the two-hour regulation on South Chester road, Rutgers, Park, and Dartmouth avenues and the addition of the west wall space to the restricted area.

H. S. Committee Ponders Choice Of Overseas Project As Klaus' Letter Spurs Interest

A letter from Klaus Lange who is once again at school in his home city Stade, Germany, spurs the current planning of the subcommittee on overseas projects of Swarthmore High School's United Charities Committee.

Klaus studied in Swarthmore High last year, his presence made possible by funds raised in a community drive led by a committee of school students. While he was in Swarthmore a clothing drive, also led by student committees gathered 3000 pounds of clothing which was sent to Stade through the help of the American Friends Service Committee. High School students sorted the clothes here and 20 of them worked one Saturday last April at the organization's city warehouse on the final packing.

Now Klaus writes to Ogden avenue residents Mr. and Mrs. Steven M. Spencer; "Many poor people in Stade got much clothing out of the shipment from Swarthmore High. I went to the Worker's Welfare Organization and saw those nice pieces of clothing which were collected by your High School and I must say I am proud that I was the guest of such a nice and helpful school."

"I go back to school since the 11th of last month. Everybody in school was so interested in my trip to Swarthmore and the U.S.A. that I had to make two speeches already, one in English and one in German. I also talked to interested friends about Swarthmore. The new camera which I got over there is very fine. I got myself here an enlarger and now my brother and I are doing photo work for other people. We once earned some money by taking pictures of a women's club in our town."

Acts of overseas friendliness are not new to Swarthmore High School. Four years ago, through the aid of CARE, Stade, a town in the British Zone of Germany, was adopted and a CARE week planned by students to culminate in an Activities Night at Clothier Memorial and a total fund which was sufficient to send over 300 CARE packages to Stade.

When these were distributed an active correspondence started. Pictures and recordings of their distribution were received by the school and later a film of life in Swarthmore was sent to Stade. Several Swarthmoreans have had a chance to visit the city and receive demonstrations of the warm feeling between Stade and Swarthmore, a relationship brought about by a student goal which received community support.

The present student committee headed by Liz Forsythe includes Mary Ann Thompson, Bina Booth, Gimny Bevan, Don Guthrie, Barbara Harrison, and has the valued advice of officers of the school's United Charities Committee, Roger Gilmour president, Rob Wright vice-president, and Peggy McKee secretary. Bina, another secretary of the general committee and Gimny, its treasurer, serve in double capacities. The plan will be announced soon.

## L.W.V. PANEL DISCUSSION HELD

At an open meeting of the League of Women Voters, held Monday evening in McCahan Hall of the Presbyterian Church, more than 100 persons head a panel discussion of civil liberties, with particular emphasis on the Fechan bill now pending in the State legislature. Advocates of the Fechan bill were John King, assistant District Attorney of Philadelphia, and Joseph L. Polya, commander of the Philadelphia County Council Veterans of Foreign Wars. The bill was opposed by the Reverend Joseph P. Bishop, pastor of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church, and John O. Honnold, Jr., of the University of Pennsylvania Law School. Robert L. Amstern, principal of the Swarthmore High School, served as moderator.

The panel discussion was followed by a half-hour in which members of the audience had an opportunity to question the speakers. A vote was then taken to determine audience reaction to the proposed legislation. Of these present, 94 voted.

On the question: "Should the League of Women Voters of Swarthmore take a stand against the Loyalty Oath (Fechan) Bill now pending in the State Legislature?" 86 voted that the League should take such a stand; 7 that it should not. Of the 86, 33 were League members; of the 7, 2.

On the question: "Would you favor the proposal of an alternative bill requiring the public employees, including teachers, take an oath of allegiance to the Commonwealth and sign a statement to the effect that they belong to no organization advocating overthrow of our government?" 12 people voted in favor of such a bill; 49 opposed it. Two of the 12 were League members, and 16 of the opposition.

Many reasons were offered on the ballots in support of the vote. Chief among them were that the laws already on the statute books provide adequate protection against Communists; that loyalty oaths have proven ineffective; and that the proposed laws violate civil liberties and democratic rights.

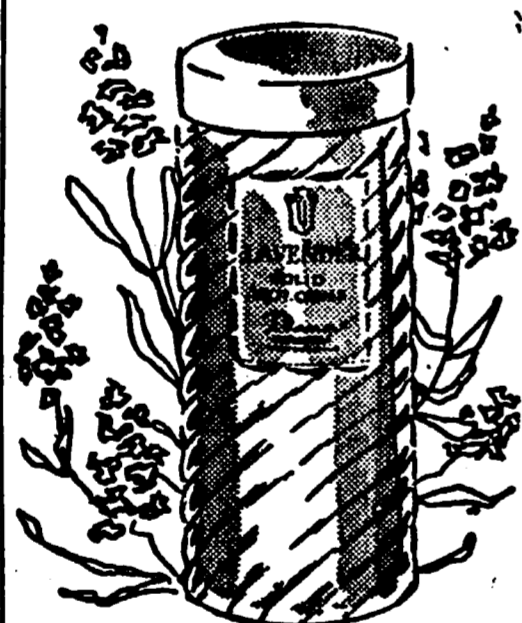

Georgene E. Bowen, director of recreation for Philadelphia's older people, a department of the Education and Recreation division of the Philadelphia Health and Welfare Council, came to Swarthmore on Monday, November 12 to speak to members of the Friendly Open House and its Sponsors Committee. The group met at the Presbyterian Church, as usual.

Interesting statistics given by Miss Bowen about the social and recreation clubs for older people in the Philadelphia area, of which Delaware County is a part, show that there are now 80 such groups, numbering 3700 members, all working for the welfare and increased happiness of our elder age.

Miss Bowen represented these groups at the world conference on older age in St. Louis recently, to which 52 countries all over the world sent delegates. This was only the second time that such a widespread conference has been held.

From the many ideas brought out at these meetings, what seemed to Miss Bowen most inspiring was Dr. Martin Gumpert's thought: that in the course of years people may attain, or at least work for, three different peaks in life. First there is the energy, or physical, prime. Then comes the thinking, or intellectual peak. Last is the understanding or spiritual maturity, a goal which may be lived for by those of any age, and without limit.

Asked by Miss Bowen for any ideas concerning these groups, the Friendly Open House voted that Miss Bowen be requested to have a large meeting of the groups in this area sometime this spring. This would give members the opportunity to meet each other, and better know what other clubs are doing.

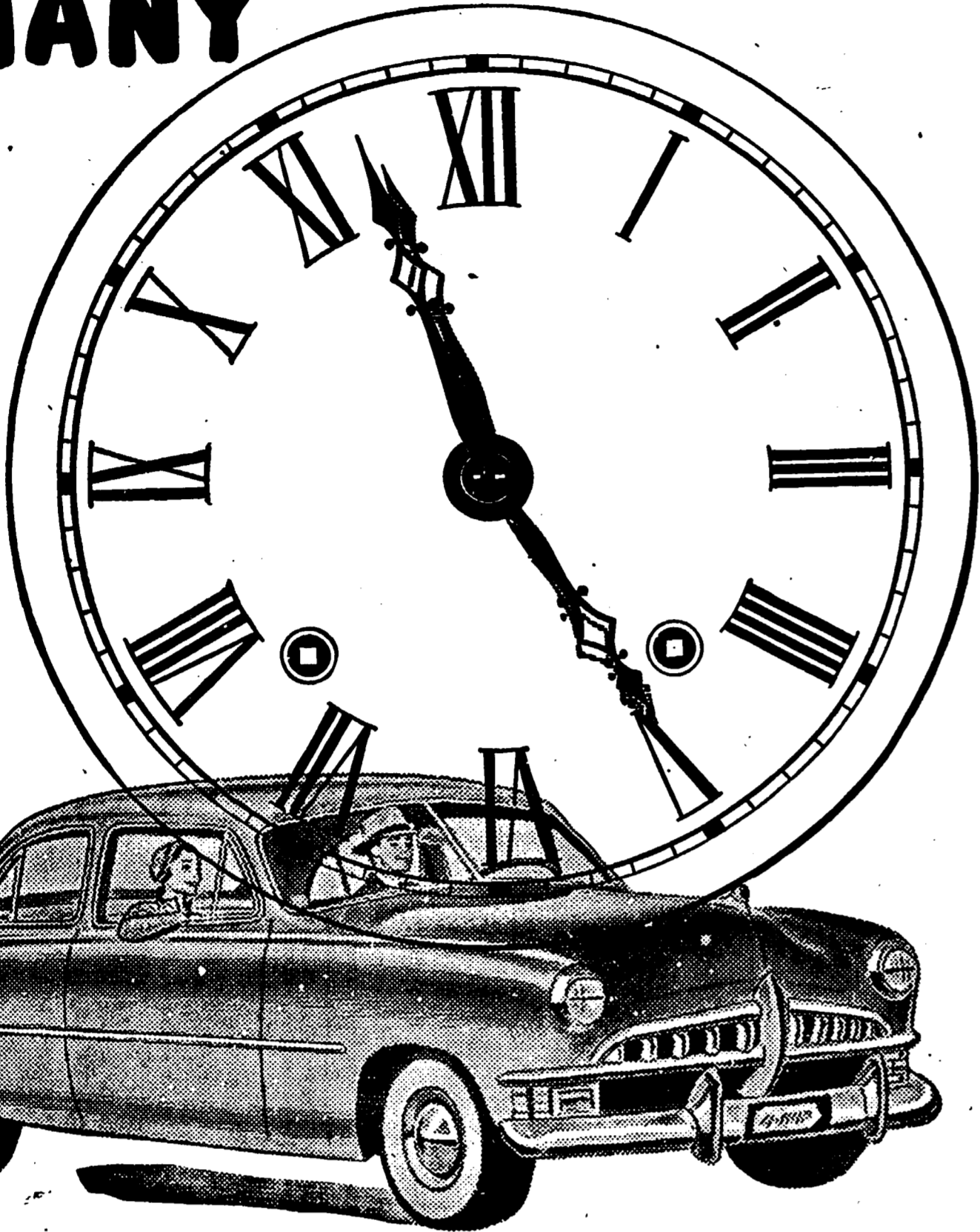

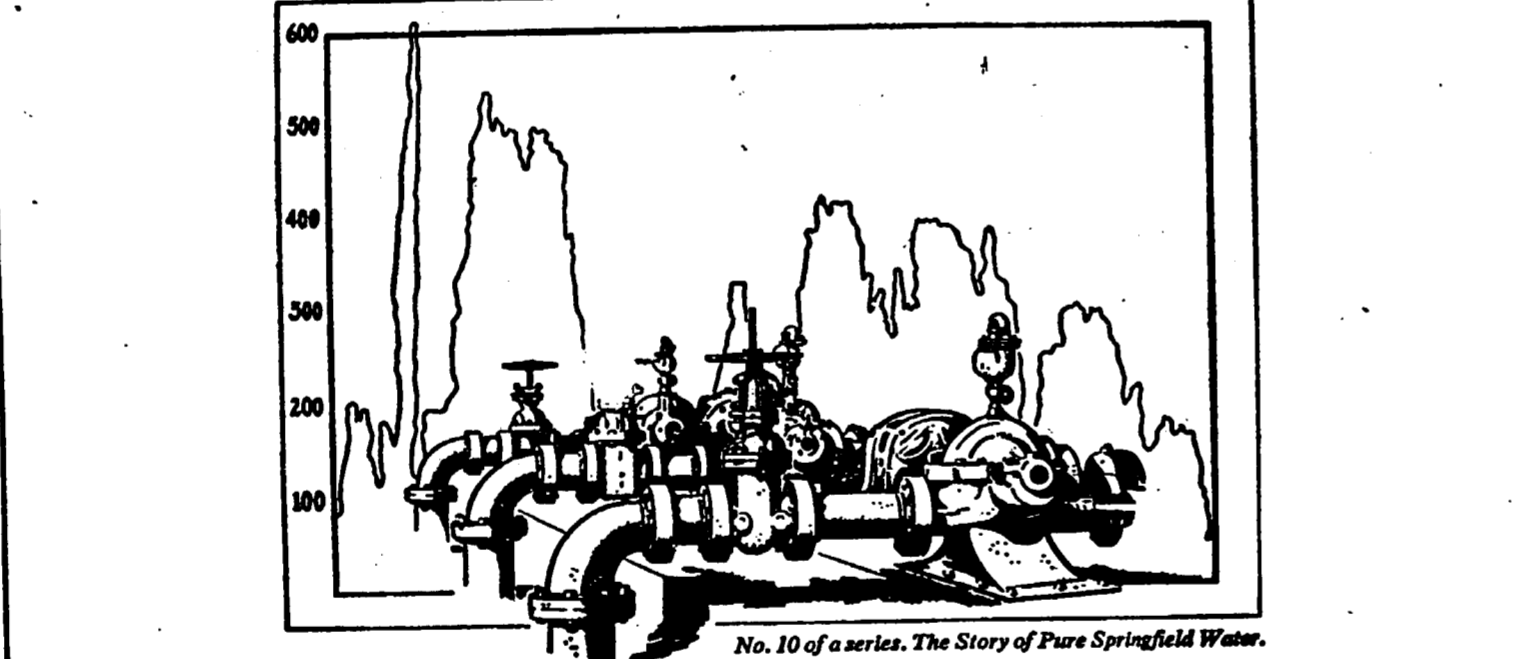

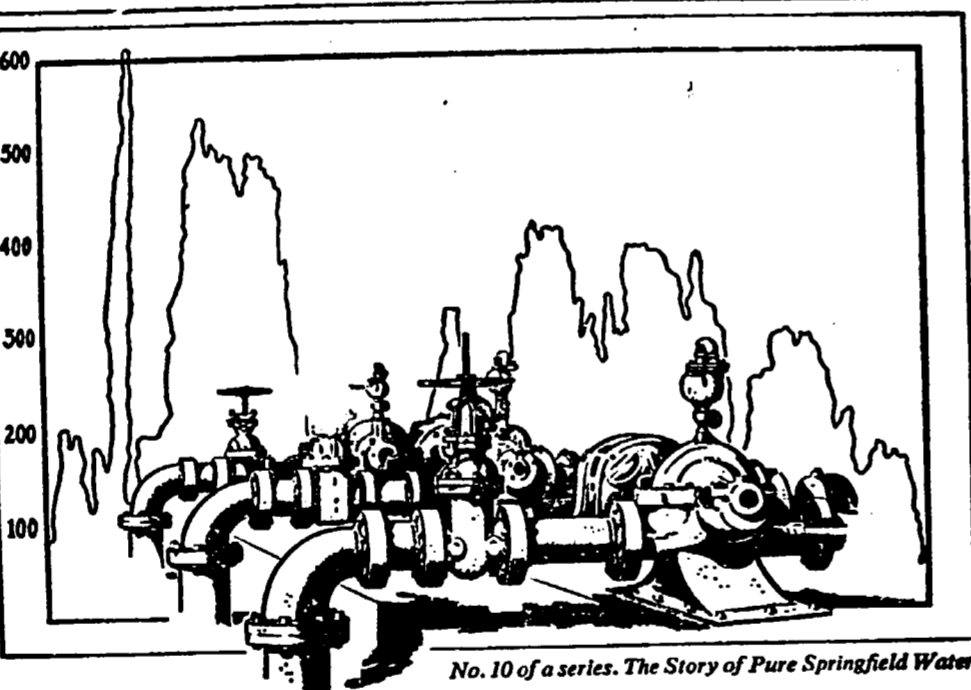

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The amount of the community's contribution will help to decide where and how it is to be used. It will demonstrate community backing of student originated and executed projects which have led this community in working for peace and understanding.

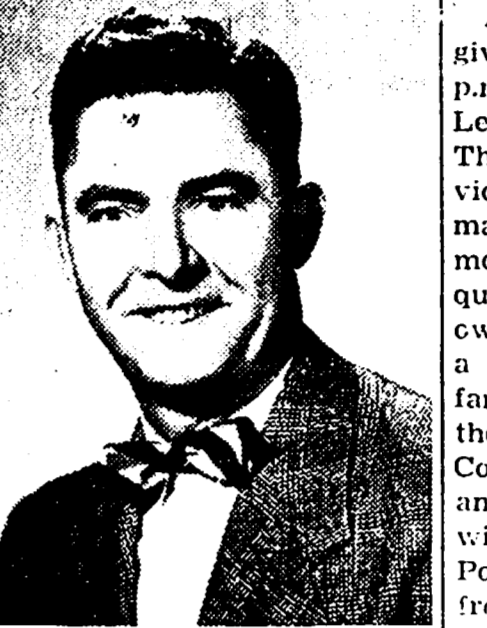
The plans for its use will be announced when completed and will be made after consultation with such organizations as CARE and the American Friends Service Committee, which have aided the student committees in the past.

**Garnet Takes  
Turkey Day Game**

Swarthmore High School's high powered offensive aggregation ran up against a stubborn Lansdowne outfit before the Little Garnet managed to subdue the "Lords" 38-19 before a packed Swarthmore College stadium on Thanksgiving Day.

The first time Swarthmore got the ball they marched 52 yards in 11 plays, for a touchdown with Bill Kauffman plunging over. Thoroughly reliable Jack Thompson's placement was wide. After the kickoff by Swarthmore, the "Lords" tallied on a dazzling 67 yard scamper by their shifty half-back Frank Aldan. Their placement, also, was wide. The second time the Swarthmore lads received the ball they marched 62 yards in 10 plays with Lyn Doherty taking a pitchfront from quarterback Jim Carter, and dashing 5 yards around left end for the second garnet and white touchdown as the quarter ended. Thompson again missed converting.

However, the Lansdowne judgment didn't say "uncle". They took Swarthmore's kickoff and were momentarily stopped. Again Aldan showed his fine running ability as he broke away from would-be tacklers time and again, on his second 67 yard jaunt, for a touchdown. Schumacher converted and for the first time during the season Swarthmore was behind; 13-12. They quickly rectified that by taking Lansdowne's kickoff and with the aid of Jim Carter's passing and a 15 yard unnecessary roughness penalty, moved the oval to the 8. From there Lyn Doherty again took a pitchout, and scored unmolessted. Thompson finally converted making the score 19-13. Late in the first half Dick McCormack grabbed a Lansdowne pass on his own 25, and raced 52 yards to Lansdowne's 23 before being hauled down by Aldan. Lyn Doherty raced around right end to the 6, from where Bill Kauffman rammed it over. At halftime the score stood in favor of Swarthmore 25-12.

In the third period Swarthmore added its fifth T.D. when they recovered a Lansdowne fumble on Lansdowne's 42. In seven plays Kauffman scored from the one. Lansdowne fought back and scored its final touchdown after recovering a Malin fumble. The touchdown was a 28 yard pass. As the quarter ended Swarthmore led 31-19.

In the fourth quarter the Little Garnet added insurance when Bob Doherty galloped around right end from six yards out to make the score 37-19, and Thompson's placement made it 38-19. Lansdowne made one more drive to the Swarthmore 7 yard line where the Garnet line held.

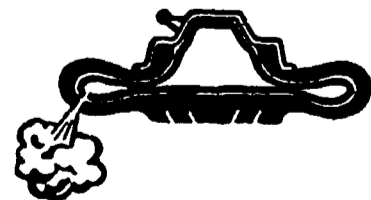
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
