SWARTHMORE SCHOOLS OPEN MON. H.S. PLANT SEES INTERIOR CHANGES

New Rooms Constructed, | Homeroom Assignment Renovations Made

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On the first floor directly across from the main outside entrance, a school district reception center is being constructed. This unit includes a waiting room for the supervising principal, registrar and treasurer's offices; the telephone switchboard; receiving room for all instructional materials and routine. Half day sessions will supplies, mimeograph work area, and storage.

A new and larger study hall is being provided at the east end of the second floor by combining a class room and a locker room. Adjacent to the study hall is a seminar room, constructed from a locker area at the end of the corridor. This room will house eleventh and twelfth grade social studies seminar; faculty, student,

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School Announces

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to parents and students have been made in the Swarthmore High School daily and weekly schedule.

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2. To make up the time missed by omitting first period Tuesday, the seventh period Friday (2:30-3:15) has been returned to the schedule. Except for certain activities, it was dropped experimentally this past year.

3. To improve cafeteria service and to eliminate crowding and long lines, the staggering of lunches has been increased. During the first semester junior high school students will be excused for lunch at 11:53 and senior high students at 12:07. At the beginning of the second semester the order will be reversed. College Avenue elementary childrn will eat about 15 minutes before the first high school serving.

4. In the past on Fridays when home football games have been played, the need to excuse about a third of the student body early (squad, band, cheer leaders, food venders, tag salesmen, etc.) seriously affected the efficiency of the two afternoon class periods. This year to avoid this, all class periods (except activity period which will be omitted) will be shortened 10 minutes and will be held before lunch. 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Elementary classes open at 9 a.m., but for junior and senior high school students, classes will begin at 8:30

The first day will be a half day session for elementary and high school classes. Tuesday junior and senior high classes will begin full schedule. By Wednesday the third through the sixth grades will be on the regular full day continue for the first and second grades through the entire first week. A rush of enrollments in the last few days has brought the size of some of the classes to a nearcrowded condition. Comparing figures with last June, there are now 947 in the schools as compared with 908 at that time, a gain of 39 over the summer.


Most of the gain is in the elementary schools where the nummbers have risen from 439 to 465, a gain of 26. In the high school the numbers have risen from 459 to 482, a gain of 13.

The largest grade in the school system is the third grade with 33 in the College Avenue third and 32 in the Rutgers Avenue third grade and 16 in the partial grade taught by Mrs. Garrahan.

The largest class in the high school is the ninth grade with 89 pupils and the next largest is the eighth grade with 84 pupils. The senior class this year numbers 76.

Figures are still tentative, although it is believed that practically all resigtrations are now in.

Professor's Wife Dies **Enroute From** Vacation

Mrs. Julia Adrienne Shero, of 651 North Chester road died suddenly of heart failure Thursday evening, August 30 in western Ohio. At the time of her death ner of Springfield. she and her husband and eldest daughter were returning home as follows: from a vacation in Wisconsin.

Mrs. Shero was born in Janesville, Wis., on February 28, 1889. and was the daughter of the late Joseph B. Doe, a prominent Milwaukee attorney, Assistant Secretary of War during the second administration of President Grover Cleveland. She was graduated from Bryn Mawr College in 1909 and received the degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy not less than 5 blooms. from the University of Wisconsin. She was a member of the Kappa Alpha Theta sorority.

She had a long teaching career, having taught at Milwaukee-Downer Seminary, the University of Wisconsin, the University School for Girls in Chicago, Macalester College, St. Stephen's College, the Mary Lyon School, the Phebe Anne Thorne School, (Bryn Mawr), the Holman School, (Ardmore), and during the war at Pennsylvania Military College.

Mrs. Shero came to Swarthmore with her family in 1929 from Annandale-on-Hudson, N.Y. and had been active in the affairs of the Swarthmore Cooperative Association, of which she was for some time a director, and of Trinity Episcopal Church. For several years past she has been associated with Bookways.

She is survived by her husband Dr. L. R. Shero, professor of Greek and chairman of the division of humanities at Swarthmore College, her three daughters, Caroline, Adrienne and Frances, and by a sister, Mrs. Kate Fish, of Milwaukee. Funeral services were held at Trinity Episcopal Church Wednesday. Interment followed at Hiram Memorial Park.

A recent study revealed that heavy exertion in the early stages of the disease resulted in more severe and extensive paralysis.

Don't get chilled. Reason: Because research has indicated that chilling and physical exertion seem to lower body resistance to the virus, once it has entered the

Don't have mouth or throat op-Reason: Because recent surveys have demonstrated that tonsillectomies performed at this time increase risk of getting bulbar polio (most serious form) by 11 times.

Avoid having children mix with new people. Reason: because once polio has appeared in a community, scientists say the virus probably is widespread. Your children probably have come in contact with it already and developed a degree of resistance to that particular virus. A stranger may introduce a different virus to which your child is not resistant or may himself succumb from contact with your child. There are at least three different types of polio virus known to scientists.

Keep clean. Reason: Because hands may carry polio infection into the body through the mouth Scientists have determined that large amounts of virus are excreted from the bowel and throat of a patient as well as from healthy carrier during seasonal
