

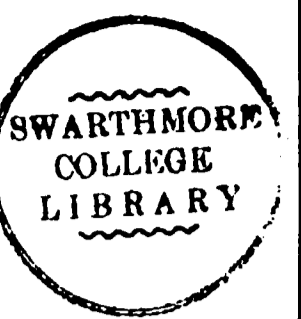

## NATIVITY STORY OPENS SEASON

Community Will Share In  
8th Presentation  
December 23

The Pageant of the Nativity will usher in the Christmas observance on Sunday evening, December 23, when it is to be presented for the eighth time since it was first given in 1938. There will be two presentations in Clothier Memorial, Swarthmore College, at 5 and at 7 o'clock for "all who come in the spirit of worship."

The Pageant of the Nativity is a spiritual interpretation of the Christmas story, entered into by the people of Swarthmore. It was conceived and directed by the late Charles D. Mitchell and made possible by the Donald Darlington Fund, created in memory of Donald Franklin Darlington by Miss Frances M. White.

It was first presented on December 18, 1938 under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell and added its benediction to the next four Christmastides before war regulations forced its postponement until 1946, when it was a part of the community's Christmas. Given again in 1948, this Christmas presentation will be the eighth.

Three times the Pageant has been given memorially, in 1940 and 1941 in memory of its founder and director and in 1946 in memory of all persons in this vicinity who lost their lives in the last war. Several of its scenes brightened a Christmas for patients in the former Harvard Avenue Annex of the Philadelphia Naval Hospital.

## NAME PEARSON BANK DIRECTOR

Borough Councilman Is  
Also Distinguished  
Scientist

John M. Pearson, 219 Cornell avenue, was named a Director of the Swarthmore National Bank and Trust Company at a meeting of the Directors Tuesday afternoon, December 4, at the Bank. Dr. Pearson steps into the vacancy created by the death of Dr. William Earl Kistler.

A member of Swarthmore's Borough Council, Dr. Pearson is Director of the Physical Division of the Sun Oil Company's Research and Development Department with offices at the laboratory at Newtown Square which he helped to plan.

Dr. Pearson holds 15 patents on electrical instruments for measurement and control and is the author of various articles on electrical measurement in corrosion, static electricity, electronics, and cathodic protection engineering.

In 1948 he received the Dr. Frank Newman Speller Award made annually by the National Association of Corrosion Engineers in recognition of outstanding contributions in science and engineering in the field of corrosion.

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**PANEL POINTS MOTHERS TASK**

Teachers, Mothers View Value Early Home Preparation

An informative panel on how parents and teachers can cooperate in helping the child get the most out of school was heard by members of the Swarthmore Mother's Club last evening at the club's regular monthly meeting at the woman's clubhouse.  
R. Mildred Kidd, Elementary Supervisor of the Swarthmore Public Schools, prefaced the panel with an explanation of present day educational theories. Mrs. Oliver E. Rodgers, member of the school board, acted as moderator.  
Mrs. Peter Coste opened the discussion with a talk on how parents can train children in the simple skills for their school experience while they are still at home. 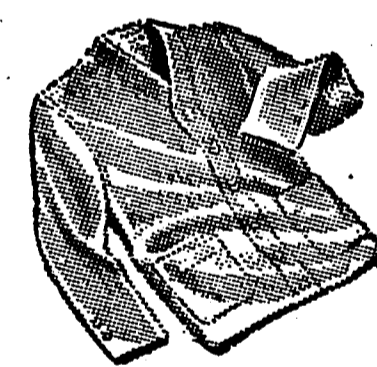

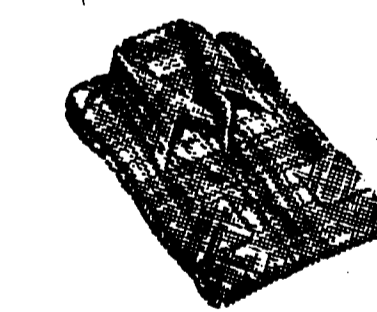
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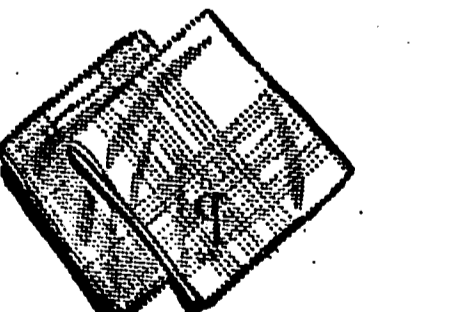

**GROUPS OPPOSE PECHAN BILL**  
Both School, College Boards Send Protests

Both the District Board of School Directors and the College Board of Managers passed unanimous resolutions condemning those sections of the proposed Pechan Bill which, to them violates American principles of justice and traditional civil liberties.

The faculty and administrative group of the public schools passed a resolution asking the defeat of the Bill and together with the College and School Boards sent its resolution to all members of the State Legislature, all important civic leaders and newspapers. Individuals and groups from the College faculty and administration have testified against the Bill at Harrisburg and have contributed leadership and financial aid to prevent the measure from passing.

The High School Office sent two releases to all public schools in Delaware County which analyzed the dangers in the proposed legislation and provided guide-posts for action. Tuesday of this week a delegate of educational leaders called on Delaware County legislators at Harrisburg and called on Governor Fine. All Delaware County representatives supported an amendment proposed by the minority party Tuesday which

would have stripped the Bill of all its provisions save the Loyalty Oath. The amendment was defeated 95 to 82.

The League of Women Voters in Swarthmore has gone on record about 10 to one in opposition to the measure. Borough residents have given leadership in the University of Pennsylvania faculty, the Civil Liberties Union and organized labor councils in opposition to the Pechan Bill.

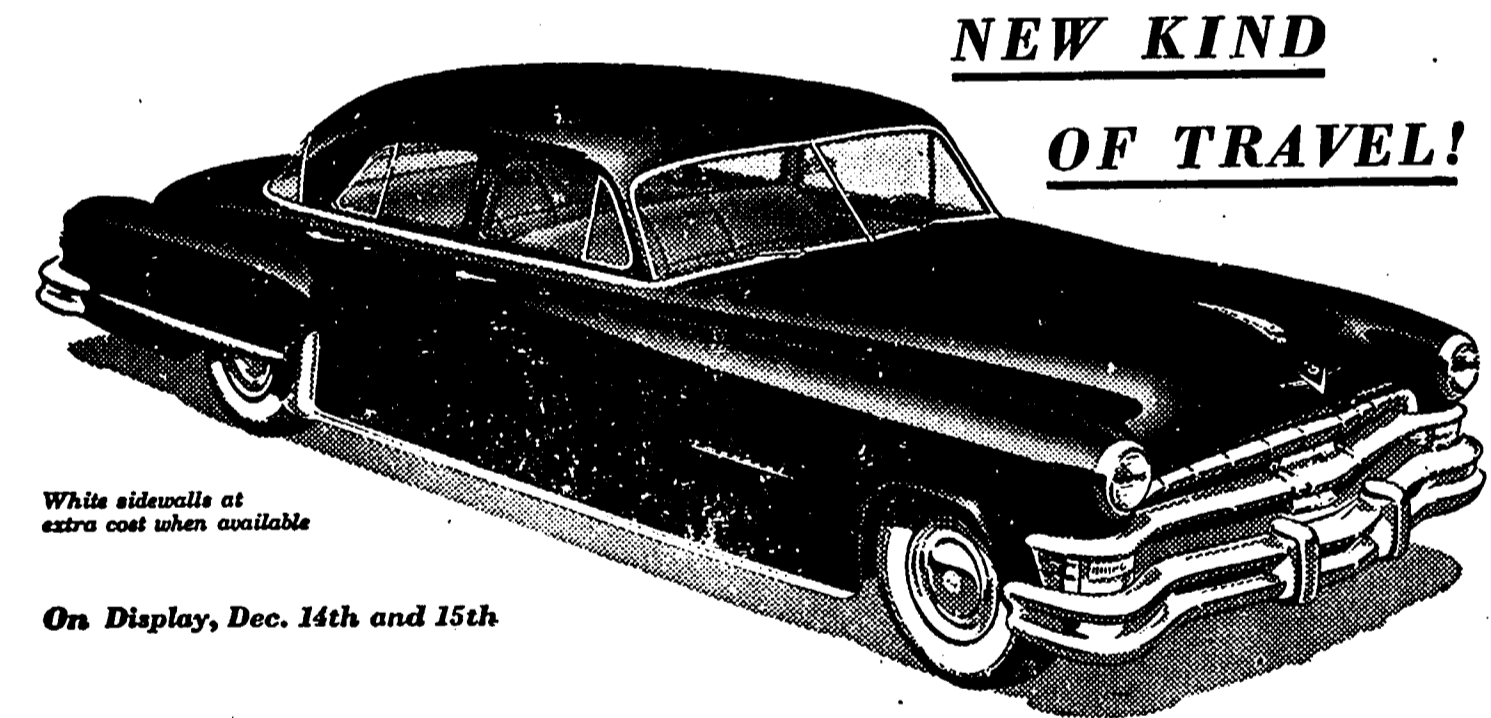

## DEATH CLAIMS MRS. A.F. JACKSON

### 40-Year Resident Noted For Community Service

Elenita Mather Allis Jackson, wife of Dr. Andrew Francis Jackson well-known Philadelphia orthodontist, died suddenly of a recurrence of atherosclerosis at 2 a.m. Monday at her home 228 Park avenue.

Few people have or will ever contribute so generously of themselves to their community as did Mrs. Jackson. Unsparring of time, energy and finances in a call of civic or individual need Mrs. Jackson's exceptional ability as head of the Woman's Association of the Presbyterian Church, and president, 1941 and 1942 of the Community Health Society of Central Delaware County, and a former active member of the Woman's Club during her forty-years' residence will long be remembered by those who have watched the molding of the Swarthmore of today. She came to Swarthmore right after her marriage in Youngstown, Ohio in December of 1911 and after living three years on Yale avenue moved around the corner into the Park avenue house. Recently she had derived much pleasure from a ceramic workshop in her home.

Surviving besides her husband are a son, Dr. John Mather Jackson of Haverford, an orthodontist with his father and in Ardmore; a daughter Mrs. Paul Hadley of Elshah, Ill.; and six grandchildren, Priscilla Ellen, Andrew Francis, II, and Elenita Mather of Haverford; James Francis and Bruce Hadley; and Judith Andrea Jackson of Springfield daughter of another son James Livingston who died in 1947.

The Rev. Joseph P. Bishop conducted funeral services at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon in the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church. Private interment followed in West Laurel Hill Cemetery.

## MASS SUNG FOR HENRY MICHELL

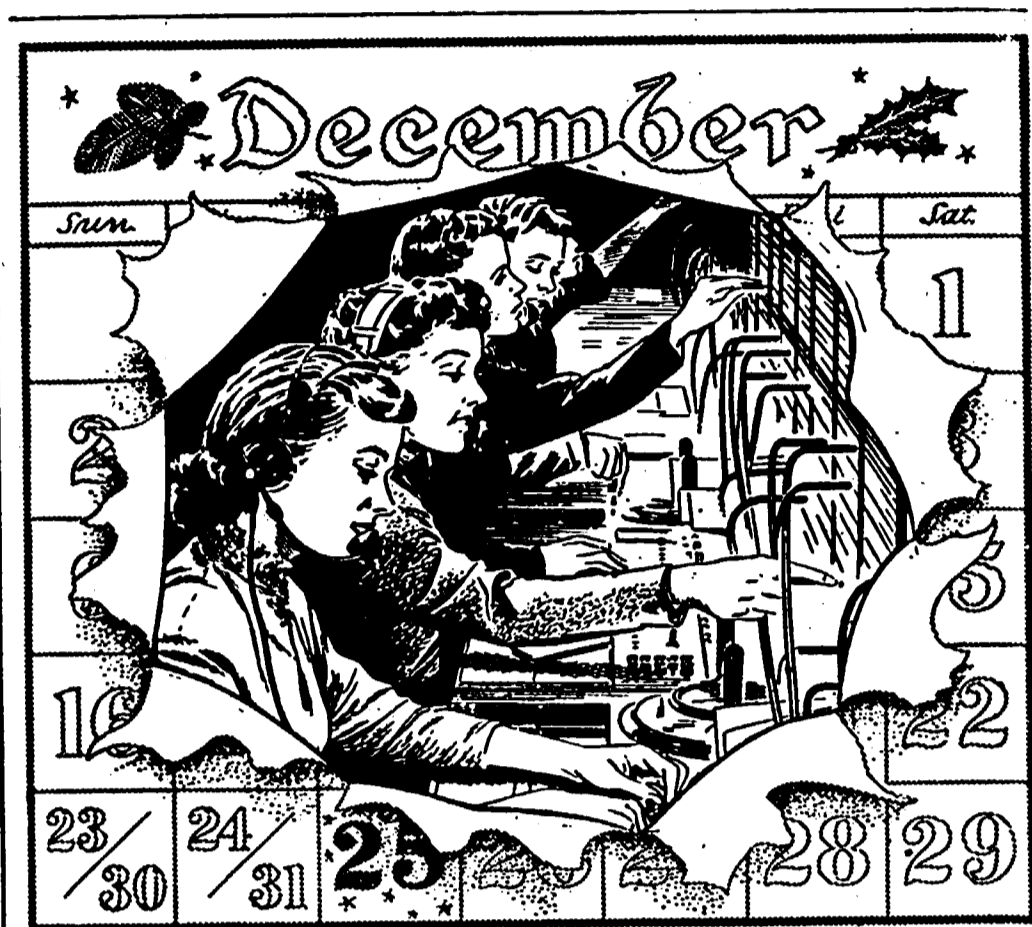
Then along come selfish, greedy people, who ask for personal gifts, not because they are in need of financial or physical charity, but just because they have a bad case of the "give-me's."

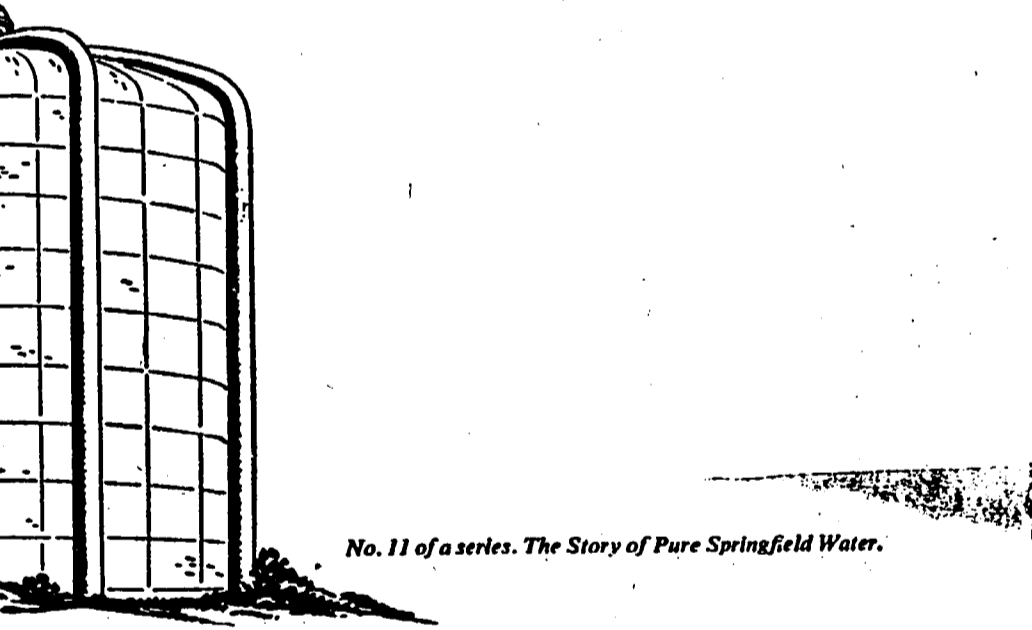

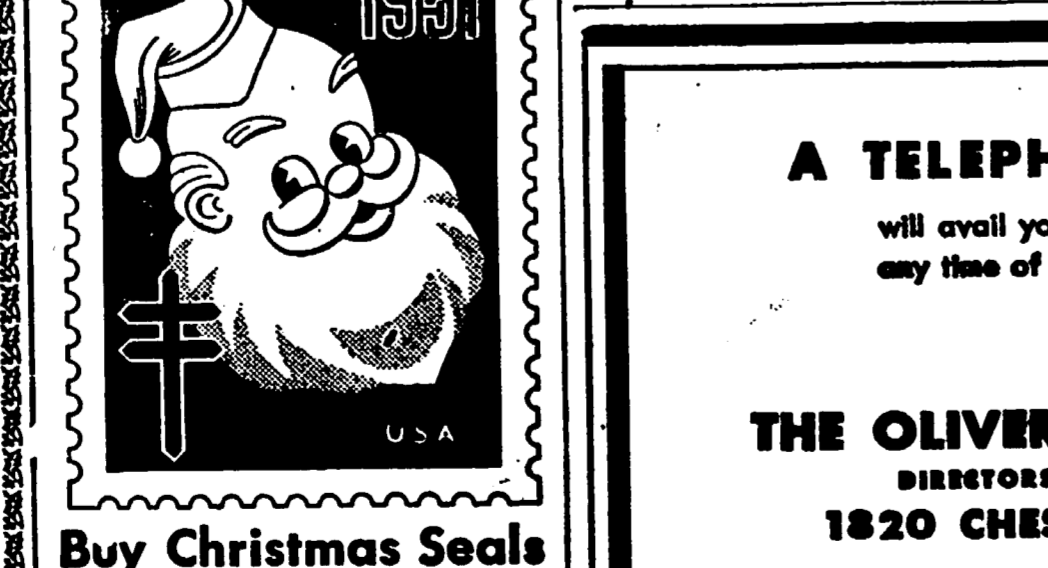

METHODIST CHURCH TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY, MORTGAGE BURNING

Rev. Harold D. Flood, Former Pastor Samuel MacAdams Will Preach In Services Of Thanksgiving Dec. 30, Jan. 6

On Sundays, December 30 and January 6, the Swarthmore Methodists will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of their church and burn the mortgage. Rev. Harold D. Flood, who entered the ministry from this church and is now pastor of the Trinity Church, Philadelphia, will be the preacher on the first Sunday, and the Rev. Samuel MacAdams, a former pastor of the church will preach on January 6.

On the last Sunday in December the Union Church ceased, and on Tuesday, December 31, 1901, the first church service of the Swarthmore Methodist Episcopal Church was held at the Watch Night meeting. On the following Sunday, three services were held under the direction of Dr. A. G. Kynett, presiding elder.

## SEAL RETURNS

## REACH 80 PERCENT

Christmas Day may be over, but the Christmas Spirit still prevails at the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association, 8th and Edgmont Avenue, Chester, according to Robert W. Bernhardt, Executive Secretary, who reports that Seal Sale returns continue to come in the mails this week.

"Returns to-date have only reached 80 per cent of the minimum amount needed for the next year's program of work," Mr. Bernhardt pointed out. "We are hoping that everyone who did not do so will get his returns as soon as possible."

Many County residents explained in letters with their delayed returns that the rush of Christmas and the inclement weather had prevented them from acknowledging their Seals sooner.

"We want to remind everyone that the work of the Delaware County Tuberculosis Association, which is financed solely through the sale of Christmas Seals, goes on 365 days of the year," Mr. Bernhardt continued. "Christmas Seal dollars will be invested during 1952 in such tuberculosis prevention and control projects as mass chest-x-ray surveys, rehabilitation of the cured patient, emergency assistance to the patient and family, health education and support of medical research.

I feel that we cannot emphasize too strongly the fact that there is still time to make payment for Christmas Seals. Contributions are as welcome now as they were in the early weeks of the campaign.

## LAUNCH MARCH OF DIMES JAN. 2

Under the slogan "This Fight is Yours" the 1952 March of Dimes will be launched two weeks earlier than usual—on January 2—and continue for an entire month in Delaware County and throughout the United States.

This year, as last, the Delaware County Campaign will center around the January 22 Mothers March on Polio. But the entire month has been set aside to highlight the need of more money to combat the disease as its victims number more each year.

John G. Pew, Jr., chairman pointed out that the last four years have brought the nation the four worst polio outbreaks since 1916. Consequently, he said, the Foundation has been indebted each year for patient care—both new and old.

He went on to outline that there have been more cases of polio in the past four years than over the previous 10. Again he pointed out that four out of every five people stricken with polio need and receive help from the Foundation.

This year the 10,000 volunteer workers in Delaware County who will concentrate their collection efforts in the now famed one-night two-hour, house-to-house drive January 22 will be making every effort to top last year's record of \$82,000.
