# NATIVITY STORY OPENS SEASON

Community Will Share In 8th Presentation December 23

The Pageant of the Nativity will usher in the Christmas observance on Sunday evening, December 23, when it is to be presented for the eighth time since it was first given in 1938. There will be two presentations in Clothier Memorial, Swarthmore College, at 5 and at 7 o'clock for "all who come in the spirit of worship."

The Pageant of the Nativity is a spiritual interpretation of the Christmas story, entered into by the people of Swarthmore. It was conceived and directed by the late Charles D. Mitchell and made possible by the Donald Darlington Fund, created in memory of Donald Franklin Darlington by Miss Frances M. White.

It was first presented on December 18, 1938 under the direction Borough Councilman Is of Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell and added its benediction to the next four Christmastides before war regulations forced its postponement until 1946, when it was a part of the community's Christmas. Given again in 1948, this Christmas presentation will be the eighth.

in keeping with the spirit of


