Taxpayers Hear Facts On School Expansion

LWV Co-Sponsor of Panel
at H & S Meeting
Tuesday

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Likening the gathering to the town meeting called by Borough Council after the burning of Borough Hall several years ago, Moderator John W. Seybold said "The catastrophe is not so great but nevertheless a very pressing problem confronts us". He presented the four-member panel as "fact-finders, with no axes to grind".

Mrs. John M. Moore representing the L.W.V. listed characteristics she appreciated in Swarthmore schools: democratic attitude and policy, individual attention given pupils, general public's support of schools, fine quality of teachers, wide extra curricular program.

School Director Carroll P. Streeter used slides of maps and graphs to illustrate the findings of the population trends survey completed in January under his chairmanship. He estimated elementary school enrollment will increase 1/3 and high school enrollment 1/2 within the next five to eight years. He gave detailed reports on the exhaustive methods used by his committee to arrive at the most accurate prediction possible, and compared present and future class figures and areas of pupil residency. He paid tribute to the League of Women Voters members who "volunteered to help and trudged all over town getting data."

Mr. Streeter stated the School Board was not coming to town-folk with a program to settle but with a problem to explain, and in closing, "Whether you like the picture or not, there it is, and I think you'll agree that we've got to start doing something about it right now!"

To Dr. Samuel Carpenter, property chairman of the Board, fell the task of summing up present facilities, approximating temporary and permanent additions, and acquainting those who hold the pursestrings with the minimum and maximum involved. The College and Rutgers avenue plants and the Riverview Athletic Field comprise 17 acres now owned by the School District. The old high school building was built in 1911, a wing added in 1927, the Rutgers Elementary School in 1930, the College Avenue Elementary Building in 1932 and the gymnasium-cafeteria unit in 1934, all for \$532,000 including land. Recent appraisals set replacement of this present plant today at \$1,600,000. Dr. Carpenter claimed "we can't afford to abandon any of the present facilities but must improve and incorporate them into a plan for the future."

Pianist Composer Plays Here Sunday

Erno Balogh, noted pianist and composer, will play a concert in Clothier Memorial on the Swarthmore College campus on Sunday evening, May 4, at 8:15. Sponsored by the William J. Cooper Foundation, Mr. Balogh's program will include works by Weber, and Chopin, as well as a group of his own compositions.

Born in Hungary, Mr. Balogh made his first public appearance on the piano at the age of four. Later he studied with such masters as Bela Bartok and Kodaly. His formal debut was made conjunctly with the renowned violinist, Szigeti.

Since that time he has played concerts in Hungary, Germany, Holland, and Scandinavia, as well as the United States, where his first performance was at Town Hall in New York City. His recordings of the works of Bach and Schubert are highly praised.

Unit Bids Farewell To Brig. Gen. Fraser

New Brigade to Replace 108th at Harvard Ave. Headquarters

Brigadier General and Mrs. Joseph B. Fraser were honored at a banquet and dance last Friday evening by the officers and men of Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 108th AAA Brigade and the 151st AA Operations Detachment on Harvard avenue. General Fraser has relinquished command of the 108th AAA Brigade and on May 1st assumed command of the 48th Infantry Division of the Georgia National Guard.

Gen. Fraser will be replaced by Col. George J. Hearn. In the middle of May, Col. Robert J. Wood will assume command of the Brigade to be formed here, replacing the 108th Brigade. The 108th will be released from active duty and revert to the Georgia National Guard.

In a short address, General Fraser expressed his regret of leaving the command. He stated: "No commander could ask for any greater loyalty, or finer spirit of cooperation than you have always given me." 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

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Taxpayers Hear Facts On School Expansion

borough hall. This is included in a \$70,000 capital outlay already authorized and also covering a new heating plant in the high school.

Dr. Carpenter warned that further construction toward permanent remedy of the situation must be underway by June, 1953, if it is to be ready by September, 1954. Pointing out that the Board has made no final judgment or commitment in regard to new building, he stated however that there was no doubt new facilities are needed along with additional land.

Admitting there existed no need to expand if parents wanted 42 children in a room and one teacher, Dr. Carpenter's idea of changing the present 23 to 38 pupil class to the 28 to 30 one considered best would require 6 to 9 more elementary classrooms, a third of them at College Avenue. There are now eight at Rutgers and seven at College Avenue. He also advocated a number of all-purpose rooms, library, better arts and crafts accommodations, homemaking and visual education space as well as more adequate, fenced outdoor areas especially in consideration of a trend for greater community use of school property and the desirability of separation elementary and high school pupils—difficult at College Avenue but deemed necessary for group unity.

Anticipating any attempt to move the dividing line farther north and shift more pupils to Rutgers Avenue would be protested by parents of children who thus had to travel eight blocks to school instead of stepping across the street, he recommended elementary additions at both schools. Translating needs to a time schedule, Dr. Carpenter thought a new College or Rutgers elementary building should be ready by September, 1954, the remainder by '56 or '57 and an expanded high school by '57 or '58. As taxpayers began to fidget, he predicted a College Avenue wing could be added by 1954 at a minimum cost of \$280,000, or \$385,000 for the entire program. He estimated the maximum cost would be \$510,000 if Rutgers was increased first as it would necessitate a larger building. The maximum estimate if done in 1956 or '57, though not including high school or lighting improvement, was set at \$800,000. Money was set aside in the proposed budget for the new year because any expected expenditures are required by law to be budgeted in advance. Dr. Carpenter explained to any who might be concerned over the 59 per cent increase in the budget for the next school year on which the Board is about to act. He cautioned, "Children only go to school once. Shall they be handicapped by interior education? Changes in operative and other costs are unpredictable. All depends on the educational standards the people want." He invited citizens to attend Board meetings or communicate their thoughts by official letters to the Board.

R. Bruce Miller gave a rapid fire picture of financing land purchase and buildings in various years of the near future, boiling down to the fact that the borough's 7 per cent borrowing capacity on its assessed valuation of over \$6,000,000 less \$99,000 standing indebtedness would be ample to carry the suggested program. He predicted however that operating costs would double to \$80,000 in several years so that more income would be needed despite adequate borrowing capacity, possibly meaning a 6, 9 and 12 mill increase over three years.

Mr. Miller skimmed over a per capita tax as productive of only \$25,000, insufficient to meet the need; sales taxes as apt to send folks out of town to shop; wage tax as highly unpopular especially with those already taxed on Philadelphia earnings; and amuse-

ment tax as "no tax can be derived for the type of amusement available in Swarthmore". Stating "quality of teachers should not be sacrificed for plant, yet teachers should not be handicapped by inadequate plant," Mr. Miller recommended that every avenue be explored to secure temporary space and defer further program until present debts are reduced, new home assessments increase, possible reclassification of district occurs, and it is ascertained that future operational expenses can be met without sacrificing teacher quality." He felt revision in assessment values might help.

High School Principal Robert Amsden was asked to resolve the question of tuition pupils. He estimated that if the \$60,000 income derived from this source was removed, only \$30,000 reduction in expense would result. Illustrating by announcing the intention of setting up a fourth ninth grade group next term with an additional teacher costing only \$2500 to \$3500 of \$7,700 tuition income, with other services already ample, he corroborated Dr. Carpenter's

earlier statement that tuition pupils enable the school to offer broader courses. Mr. Amsden said present high school educational facilities are adequate for 600 pupils but physical science and special service rooms in general are inadequate even for local pupils alone. In addition he said "Swarthmore is a tight little community and needs the contexture of surrounding neighborhoods like Morton, Rutledge, Media, Chester. It has served well only one kind of student—the Academic Preparator. Others won't get the kind of education they want until their numbers increase and they can demand it."

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



School Board Votes \$15 Tax on Bor. Adults

The Swarthmore School Board, meeting in the High School Building on May 5 at an adjourned meeting under the chairmanship of the Vice President Carroll P. Streeter, voted to advertise the Board's intention to levy a \$15.00 head tax on each adult resident of the Borough.
The Board spent some time discussing the budget; they regretted the necessity of levying this additional tax but felt it to be an unavoidable step necessitated by the needs of expanding the services of the District due to the growth in pupil population, the increased costs of materials and services, and the fact that as a fourth class district, Swarthmore cannot increase its present real estate levy of 35 mills.
The Board also voted to continue the real estate transfer tax of 1 per cent which will return an income of about \$14,000 this year.
To all the position of President from which Dr. David McCahan resigned last month due to ill health, the Board elected as President, Carroll Streeter, who lives on Columbia Avenue. Mr. Streeter is the editor of the Farm Journal, a Curtis publication.
To be vice president of the Board, Donald P. Jones of Swarthmore Avenue, was elected to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Streeter. Mr. Jones, who is Comptroller of the Sun Oil Company, is presently treasurer of the School District.



H. S. Sweeps Lansdowne Meet; Stars Penn Relays

Having defeated both the Alumni and Springfield, Swarthmore went on to sink Lansdowne, 78-32 last week. The marks set during the meet were greatly dictated by a very slow, wet track. Lynn Doherty and Steve Snyder, both of Swarthmore, tied for first place in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.8 seconds. Doherty went in to win the 440 in 54.3 seconds while Snyder captured the 220 in 24.2. The only other track event won by the Garnet was the mile, which Dave Cox captured in 4:53.

On an equally muddy field the Garnet took all but one event. Charles Scott put the shot a distance of 42 feet 5 inches and the discus was hurled 121 feet 5 inches by Jim Tucker. In each of two events, the high jump and pole vault, Swarthmore entered a three-way tie for first place jumping to a height of 5 feet 1 inch. Walt Leach, John Bernard and Lonny Stalon shared honors. Walt Leach also won the broad jump with a distance of 18 feet 5 inches. In the pole vault, another Swarthmore trio, consisting of Dick McCormack, John Maschall, and Vance Tucker, tied at a height of 8 feet.

Lansdowne captured but three events, the javelin, 120 low hurdles, and the 800. Tom Jackson threw the javelin 148 feet 8 1/4 inches while on the track Ed Henrie ran the 120 low hurdles in 15.0 seconds and Tom Jenkins won the 800 with a time of 2:12.4.

Win at Penn
The Garnet also made a brilliant showing in the Penn Relays. Swarthmore High School placed second to Downingtown in the first race of the Greater Philadelphia Area Class mile. Darby was third, Ridley Park fourth, and Sellersville-Perkasie fifth. Upper Moreland also ran. The winning time was 3:41.7.

Swarthmore took the Suburban Class B mile with ease in 3:41.9. Darby, Ridley Park, and Springfield placed in that order. The Garnet sweepsters were Steve Snyder, Bob Terry, Dave Cox, and anchorman Lynn Doherty.







Library Asks \$1,000 For Operating Expenses

Dr. J. Alfred Calhoun, president of the Library Board, asked Council at their regular meeting Monday night, to consider the possibility of increasing the 1952 library tax of 1 1/4 mills to 1 3/4 or 2 mills for the year of 1953. He also requested that Council appropriate \$1,000 to enable the library to meet expenses of operating for the next four months.

Mr. Reynolds also suggested that the present fire siren on Borough Hall be placed on the Methodist Church Steeple as a possible means of avoiding the purchase of the new sirens.

Council ordered installation of sidewalk on the southeast side of Dartmouth avenue from Oberlin to Swarthmore avenues. The walks are to be completed within the next 90 days.

The inquiry of the School Board regarding the possible use of the American Legion Room for a class room for one of the lower grades in the elementary school was not acted upon at this meeting.

On motion of Thomas Hooper, the Borough will pay its share (88 percent) of the cost of a survey by the Central Delaware County Sewer Authority for new sewers from Cresson lane to McDade Boulevard. Ridley Township and Springfield will also participate in the cost of this survey.

In discussing the growth of school population and the large enrollment contemplated in the intermediate grades next year, particularly, grades 3, 4, and 5, the Board has decided to eliminate the mixed third and fourth grade and to employ two additional teachers so that the grades may be full grades of one class each. The Board felt that classes of 25 pupils which are in the third grade this year are entirely too large and cannot accommodate the influx of new pupils anticipated from the families that will be moving in the new houses now being built.

To fill these positions, the Board elected as a fourth grade teacher next year, Martha E. Shaw, graduate of Mansfield State Teachers College and the University of Pennsylvania, who taught in the schools at Walkersboro, Pa., Dover, Delaware and Girard College Elementary School. To teach in the fifth grade, the Board elected Margaret Yeatman, who graduated from West Chester State Teachers College and who has taught at Kennett Square and also at Girard College. Both of these teachers will take up their teaching duties at school in September. Both are residents of Lansdowne.

The Board had before them the contract with the American Heating and Ventilating Company for the heating plant renovation, to be undertaken during this coming summer. Officers of the Board were authorized to sign these contracts which provide an outlay of \$35,742.00. It also authorized the Secretary to file with the County Department of Education and the State Department of Public Instruction an application for the approval of the building project contemplated for the coming summer which will include an addition to the school shop and also the alteration of two rooms on the ground floor of the high school to be used as elementary school class rooms.

Letters To The Editor

Report from Tokyo—April, 1952 To the Swarthmorean: 80% of Tokyo (six million people) and of the city of Mito (sixty thousand), we are credibly informed, was burned to the ground. In seven years practically all the devastated area has been recovered with thousands of frail wooden houses and shops. An occasional factory or mansion ruin stands against the sky, but all rubble has been removed and many burned walls used as parts of new structures. Where the Japanese got the wood or the finances is a mystery. Undoubtedly Government and private credit by increasing the supply of money, greatly increased inflation—a way of taking buying power from everyone who has insurance or annuities, for those who get the assistance. Steel, coal and woollens are reported now adequate for the demand. There is temporarily now a slump in trade. Several foreign countries have "pulled in their own belts" from so much purchasing from Japan. Wholesale prices recently have dropped; retail prices will follow. Deflation can be a dread symptom of unemployment, but it can also, as we think here now, be a sign of greatly increased supply. Lower prices will increase domestic buying and soon demand will increase orders. It is the way a country shows that it is restoring the buying power of its currency.

All shops we see are full of merchandise, staple foods, fruits, clothing, stationery, fountain pens, tin ware, electrical equipment. Alas, much merchandise is still beyond the reach of Japanese buyers. Clothing seems to us (in dollar equivalent) more than half the cost in USA, also eggs about half, milk about 2/3 USA, and very little of it used. Rice (alone still rationed) and flour, very cheap, also street car and railroad fares. But wages are "terrible"; the lowest factory wages about \$10 a day; union wages and white-collar workers both about \$20 a month! They must, and of course will, rise, which will raise prices. There seems a very big spread between low wages and selling prices; partly absorbed by the very high cost in Japanese money of everything imported; partly by the very low efficiency of work—too many people in each shop or job—and the Government "lives" off the profits tax. The first requirement after a severe war is to replace equipment, houses, factories, bicycles, trucks, railroad equipment, street paving, etc. It's like the small manufacturer who kept his family on \$15 a week until he had accumulated \$50,000 for his factory! Occupation costs have been heavy. Everywhere there are too many people. They seem all to have clean neat clothes; no beggars; many children, for the nearly incessant rainy days in March and April, have new rubber boots.

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Probably, however, family wardrobes are very slim. Streets are crowded; main "bois", narrow side streets; city streets, country and village streets; schools and colleges are crowded (15 universities in Tokyo alone and one in each Province); railroad trains, trolleys and busses are crowded; very uncomfortable for Westerners. In the old pre-Registration days (18-68), starvation, abortion, infanticide and disease kept the population down; Japan will have to do something modern about too many children. If the standard of living can rise quickly, that seems always to reduce family size as parents see the possibility of expensive opportunities for fewer children and do not need so many children to ensure their own old age care.

Flowers are coming; the wheat, planted and cultivated by hand in neat rows is two feet high. A second crop will follow it in the summer; we would think all the farmers would die of pneumonia or have arthritis for working all day knee deep in the cold mud of the rice fields, turning the mud with big hoes and soon to plant the rice seedlings, working in the rain under their straw raincoats and wide straw hats! A most interesting country and many lovable people.

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Is There A Price on Your Head?

The proposed levy of a \$15 head tax by the local School Board has been the prevalent topic of conversation in the Borough this past week.

Fully aware of the importance of good schooling and of the responsibility of citizens enjoying the privileges of a democratic government to furnish such schooling the Swarthmorean proposes to examine the schools' financial predicament without bias and report to its readers.

The preliminary school budget can now be seen at the school office by any interested citizen. The following facts underline its formation:

The study of the three-year trend in growth of the schools shows that costs and school population have risen sharply, while income and property assessments, the base of local tax support, have risen but slightly. From 1949-50 to 1952-53, expenditures rose 27 per cent, and pupil enrollment gain is 21 per cent. Income, however, will rise an estimated 12 per cent and the property assessment rise is 9 per cent for the three years. Thus the income base is not keeping up with the growth of the schools. Increasing enrollment, school growth, and higher prices have caused expenses to advance twice as fast as income, and three times as fast as property assessment values.

Although the actual cash income next year will increase by about \$8,500 over 1951-52, there is a total of \$24,000 less, available for spending, due to the drop in the cash balance for the fiscal year beginning July 1; a drop from \$387,472 in 1951-52 to \$363,478 in 1952-53.

At the same time costs will rise due to required additions to staff and equipment, and expenses incidental to planning for the extension of school grounds and buildings. From a cost of \$367,472 in 1951-52, costs in 1952-53 are estimated at \$381,962, a rise of about \$14,500.

Thus with a drop in available funds and an increase in expenses, there is at present an apparent shortage of \$48,500 according to the proposed budget. This does not include non-mandated merit salary increases for teachers, which must be made to keep Swarthmore salaries in line with salary gains of neighboring districts where every teacher is being granted from \$200 to \$400 salary increase. Nor does it include as yet an amount for financing, borrowing or "rentals" which may later be required by reason of construction of new buildings or purchase of additional ground. Such sums will yet have to be determined and added.

To gain more income, additional tax sources must be used. To effect savings, some school offerings and services may have to be eliminated; some larger classes continued.

Norman Brown is very good as the goateous Wilfred, but it is a dreary part. Carl Jeglum in his first role for the Club, works hard in a character which stays nebulous, Roland Wayne. Wilbur O. James as Corder is happily free of ordinary butlerisms.

The play's name is as zany as the rest of it, but it all adds up to tears of laughter and those sudden seizures which rock an audience into a whale of an evening.

Boyd C. Conklin Retires After 40 Years

Swarthmore's Railway Express Agent Boyd C. Conklin retires June 1st after 40 years of continuous service with his Company.

It has been only since 1947 that Mr. Conklin has supervised the shipping of packages and parcels to and from Swarthmore's distant friends and relatives and out-of-town customers—a paltry five years—but his record reaches back over four decades with the Railway Express and boasts an additional four years with the Adams Express Company, begun in 1904 in Merchantsburg, Pa.

A MATTER OF DOGS

Some dogs seem to think they've been liberated. Emancipation, it is said, was proclaimed May first, and since then some dogs, at least, have been asserting their "rights" with a zest and enthusiasm that is alarming to small children, lap dogs and pedestrians, devastating to neighbors' gardens and lawns, and downright exasperating to leashed dogs and their owners out for the daily walk.

Alarm, devastation and exasperation may be typical of Communists celebrating the Russian Revolution, but it should not, it does seem, be the general run of events in Swarthmore which would enjoy its peaceful location, its green trees, friendly neighbors, and gentle dogs if it possibly could. The fact that the Dog Quarantine was lifted May first, 1952, has nothing to do with May first, 1917. The concurrence of dates is a mere coincidence.

And anyhow, even though the quarantine is off, there is STILL a dog ordinance. The difference between the quarantine and the ordinance may be slight to dog

owners and non-existent to the dogs, but the difference remains, nevertheless:

A quarantine confines the dog at all times—he must always be penned up, locked in or tied on—never free to run.

The ordinance says that the dog must be under the control of the owner at all times, even at night. Consequently, as it was only the Quarantine which was lifted, dogs who roam around in the uninhibited fashion reported recently by unimpeachable sources, are violating the law. And any irate dog who doubts the essential truth of this statement has a cordial invitation to visit Borough Hall and glare at the books for himself. It's Ordinance No. 470, approved April 24, 1943.

Ordinance or no ordinance, it is not fair that dogs, snoring peacefully on their own verandahs or taking a decorous stroll with their owners, should be disturbed by unescorted pooches out looking for trouble. And no matter how warmhearted a dog may be, he is still big and woolly to the youngsters of the neighborhood who don't understand cold noses, long pink tongues and playfully wagging tails. So, the dog who tours the neighborhood sneering at all his stay-at-home buddies, is not only breaking the law but is rude and unfair too.

As a matter of fact, the literal minded canine who stays at home because he still believes in the Dogcatcher is not as dumb as he looks. For there is indeed a dogcatcher, hired last year to enforce Ordinance No. 470, and he is still in the employ of the Borough.



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

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

ders: Craft Builders Company on a base bid of \$29,810 for general contracting; Harold H. Blaney, \$1290 for heating; Irwin English, \$1275 plumbing and drainage; McGee Electric Company, \$3250 electrical work. This project is covered in the 1951-52 budget.

The Swarthmore Fire and Protective Association was granted permission to use the Princeton Avenue Athletic Field for softball on Monday and Wednesday evenings. The Board also granted the American Legion Post use of the Riverview Avenue Field for baseball. A letter addressed to the Board by the Swarthmore Property Owners Association asked why the School District couldn't avoid purchase of more land by using the Riverview Field for all athletic activities thereby releasing land now used for this purpose at both College and Rutgers Avenues for building increases. It also asked several questions regarding the proposed means of levying the new \$15 per capita tax.

Appointment of lay finance and building committees was placed in the hands of the Board's finance and property chairmen. President Carroll P. Streeter reported a meeting of the joint Board-Faculty Salary Committee at which teachers asked \$20,000 merit increases. It was the opinion of the Board that no action could be taken until the new budget was settled.

Mrs. Marguerite Seymour, of 315 Dickinson avenue, was hired to teach a new section of the ninth grade at a salary of \$3200. This grade which has an enrollment of 101 pupils, 16 of them tuition students, will be divided into four instead of three sections next term.

Before adjourning at midnight the school directors adopted a 185-day calendar for 1952-53 beginning September 8 and closing June 17.

School Board Reviews Possible '52-'53 Budget

Total expenses including debt service and capital outlay come to \$397,800. Provision is made for an additional \$375,000, \$300,000 of which would take care of any new land purchase and building, the remainder covering projects now in progress such as the two-room increase to the shop building.

Upon advice of the solicitor the tax rate should be officially set and the budget adopted on Saturday, June 7.

A Sidney Johnson, Esquire, appeared before the Board to represent owners of land on Rutgers avenue at Westdale about which the Board had made inquiry. Mr. Johnson stated that the owners, E. L. Noyes, C. E. Fischer, D. P. Jones, R. P. Kroon, F. S. Chambers, A. J. Jones and himself, had purchased the property several years ago and are developing it. In fact one of the lots involved under consideration had been ready for settlement when the Board expressed interest in it.

Three hundred and ten feet fronting on Rutgers avenue north from Westdale, adjacent to the present school property with varying depths are being considered. All plans involve closing Westdale avenue as extended if the Borough approves. Two appraisals by Stanley Hibberd and H. Leonard Parot were the basis for prices ranging from \$22,000 for a small part of choice front land or larger acreage including a low, rear, wooded section. Mr. Johnson proposed that final figures should have the approval of a court-appointed jury of view.

John F. Spencer was appointed chairman of the salary committee. The Board interviewed candidates for high school principal and went into executive session to discuss teachers' salaries.

Jermain Creighton, Edmund Allen Professor of Chemistry; Arnold Dresden, Edward H. Magill Professor of Mathematics and Astronomy; and Ross W. Marriott, also Professor of Mathematics and Astronomy. Doctors Creighton and Marriott have been at Swarthmore for 40 and 46 years respectively, while Dr. Dresden has been a member of the faculty for 25 years.

They were honored by a tea given by President John W. Nason May 28, at the President's house, Elm avenue and Cedar lane. It was attended by about 75 members of the faculty and administration of the college.

Mrs. John H. Pittman, Mrs. Peter van de Kamp, Mrs. Duncan G. Foster, and Mrs. Charles Shaw, all faculty wives, presided at the tea.

Dr. Creighton came to Swarthmore College in 1912 and served as chairman of the department of Chemistry from 1928 to 1948. He received his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Dalhousie University, Nova Scotia, Canada. Following this, Dr. Creighton took advanced degrees at the University of Birmingham (England), Heidelberg (Germany) University and the Polytechnicum in Zurich, Switzerland.

In 1918, for work on the effect of salt water on reinforced concrete he received from the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, the Longstreth Medal for particularly meritorious work in industrial research.

In 1939, he received again from the Franklin Institute, the Horace N. Potts Gold Medal, for the development of a commercial process for the electrolytic reduction of simple sugars. The following year the National Association of Manufacturers awarded him their Modern Pioneer Medal, saying "This work (reduction of sugars) has been responsible for the development of a new large-scale industry and is distinguished as a pioneer development in the large scale use of any electrochemical organic reduction process." For the same project he received in 1946 the Acheson Gold Medal and \$1,000 from the Electrochemical Society for outstanding contributions to the field of electrochemistry.

During World War II Dr. Creighton was connected with the famed Manhattan Project at Columbia University, which worked in the field of nuclear research.

Dr. Creighton is a past president and vice-president of the Electrochemical Society, and was former chairman of the Philadelphia Section, American Chemical Society. He has also been an active member of the Franklin Institute, serving as chairman of the Medal Committee since 1933.

He is also a member of Sigma Xi, The New York Academy of Science, the Chemical Institute of Canada, and the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron of Halifax.

Department Chairman
Dr. Dresden, Chairman of the Department of Mathematics and Astronomy, came to Swarthmore College in 1927. He is the son of Frank Aydelotte, then President of Swarthmore, who was gathering outstanding professors for the rapidly expanding honors program. Born in Holland, Dr.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. Dickinson, of College avenue, attended the week-end festivities at Earlham College, Richmond, Ind. Their daughter, Mary Fell Dickinson, was a member of the graduating class.

Dr. Dresden received his undergraduate training at the University of Amsterdam. He came to this country in 1903 and received his Ph.D. at University of Chicago in 1909. After 18 years as a teacher at the University of Wisconsin, Dr. Dresden came to Swarthmore.

He is the author of four books on mathematics, including "Invitation to Mathematics," written for the layman and attempting to show mathematics, not merely as a tool for science, but as a philosophy and discipline in its own right.

Past President of the Mathematical Association of America, he is also a member of the American Mathematical Society, the Academie de Macon France and the Societe Mathematique de France. He is also a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Completes 46 Years
Dr. Ross W. Marriott, a member of the Department of Mathematics and Astronomy for 46 years, is surpassed in length of service at Swarthmore by only one other man in the history of the college. A graduate of Indiana University he came to Swarthmore in 1906 as a research assistant at the Sprout Observatory, then still in the planning stage. Meanwhile he earned his M.A. at Swarthmore in 1907 and his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania in 1911.

In addition to teaching Mathematics and Astronomy, Dr. Marriott has been active in astronomical research. From 1923 to 1932 he and the former Professor John A. Miller, then chairman of the department of which Dr. Marriott was a member, led Swarthmore College expeditions to observe eclipses in Mexico, three times to Sumatra, and the South Pacific, to Vermont and Connecticut. These expeditions yielded a valuable set of photographs of the sun's corona.

Dr. Marriott is a member of Sigma Xi, the American Mathematical Society, the American Mathematics Association, the American Astronomical Society, the Royal Astronomical Society of England, and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Dr. Marriott is also a member of the Rittenhouse Astronomical Society, a local group.

While the Fund Raising Campaign closed short of the quota allotted to Swarthmore, the amount raised (approximately 72 percent of the allotment) put the Borough in third place in record of accomplishment in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Chapter.

This year, for the first time in its history, the Swarthmore Branch opened its own office. It is staffed by local volunteer workers and open three days a week (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) from 1 to 3 p.m. All business incident to the operation of the Branch is conducted from this office, which is located on Dartmouth avenue over the Swarthmore office.

Reports of Volunteer Services Chairman given at the meeting presided over by Retiring Chairman indicated a busy and successful year. Gray Ladies, Nurses' Aides, Staff Aides, members of the Motor Corps, the Canteen Service, the Entertainment Instruction and Supply Committee and the Home Service Committee gave assistance at the Service Hospitals in the area, at Headquarters in Philadelphia, at the Home Service Office in Chester and at the convalescent centers in the area throughout the year.

The Water Safety Program of the Branch was successfully carried out. The aquatic scholarships provided by this Service enabled Junior Red Cross members to become proficient in life saving and other phases of water safety, which in turn were able to integrate into the Junior Red Cross program.

Swarthmore College has had an active Red Cross group this year, and one which has given valuable assistance working through the Swarthmore Branch.

The Junior Red Cross assisted with the Blood Donor Program and with the Fund Drive, and also carried out an extensive program of assistance at Taylor, Chester and Crozier Hospitals at holiday times. The nature of their work was generally to take cheer into the children's wards of these hospitals by making gifts, decorations and refreshments for the patients. They also conducted a social relations program by corresponding and exchanging pictures with young people in foreign countries.

There were four Blood Donor Days this year—two for the College and two for citizens of the Borough. On each occasion the Bloodmobile Unit was assisted by the Local Branch Services. The response to the call for blood has been most gratifying, and the quantity requested has been given.



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


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
