3 Vacancies on **Library Board**

Circulation 'Hits Peak; Christmas Plans Underway

A. W. Bass, Jr., secretary of the Swarthmore Public Library Board of Directors, announced at the quarterly Board meeting Tuesday night in the Library that three vacancies will exist on the Board in January, due to the expiration of the terms of Dr. J. Alfred Calhoun president of the Board, Mrs. Russell L. Snyder, and Mr. Bass. The Board hopes that residents of the Borough who are interested in the Library will file applications for election to the Board. Blanks may be secured from Librarian Bettina Hunter at the desk in the Library. Application must be filled and filed with Mothers Christmas the Librarian before midnight, December 31.

Miss Hunter reported 181 new reader registrations in September. October, and December, 127 adult. and 53 juveniles. In the same period 761 new books were added, 561 adult titles and 200 juvenile. The three month circulation total was 14,003 with the total from January through November running 15 per cent ahead of the same period in 1951.

Nason Resigns from Swarthmore College

12 Years Prexy Accepts Presidency of Foreign Policy Ass'n

The resignation of John W. Nason as president of Swarthmore College to become president of the Foreign Policy Association was announced jointly yesterday by the Swarthmore College Board of Managers and the Board of Directors of the Foreign Policy Association. Dr. Nason will remain at his Swarthmore post in a part-time capacity until June while learning his new duties with the FPA.

In announcing Dr. Nason's election to the presidency of the Foreign Policy Association, Eustace Seligman, chairman of the FPA Board of Directors, stated in New York yesterday that the Association's program for the development of community organizations devoted to the extensive education in world affairs will be rapidly expanded under the new president, This will be possible under a substantial grant recently received from the Ford Foundation's Fund for Adult Education, which has undertaken a nation-wide program of community World Affairs Councils, forums and committees similar to those already active throughout the country.

Dr. Nason has been president of Swarthmore College since 1940 when he was picked from the ranks of the College's philosophy department to succeed Dr. Frank Aydelotte, who had resigned to head the Institute for Advanced Studies at Princeton.

During his 12 years tenure Dr. Nason piloted Swarthmore through the difficult years of World War II and the continuing period of adjustment since that time. Under him the College successfully launched a building and fund raising program, subjected the curriculum for freshmen and sophomores to a thorough revision in line with the now famous Harvard Report on Higher Education, and increased the endowment of the College from nine to 13 million dollars.

Since his inauguration Dr. Nason has been increasingly active (Continued on Page 7)

Six years ago the Underhill Trophy, symbolic of Thanksgiving victory, was entered into competition by the former Lansdowne School Board President, Fred Underhill. Last year Swarthmore captured the trophy by routing the Lords 38-19 in the highest scoring game of the modern series. Lansdowne has had possession of the trophy only once, winning the 1950 game 26-0.

Lansdowne, who went into this year's game with a record of three wins and five losses, surprised an over-confident Garnet by taking an early lead. The Lords scored twice in the first period, the Garnet only once, to give Lansdown a 12-7 half-time edge. Their first TD resulted from a Garnet fumble. on the opening kick-off.
