Library Circulation Hits 3-Month Peak

Board Works to Fit Growth In Service to Tight Budget

Directors of the Swarthmore Public Library gathered in quarterly session Tuesday night, April 28, in the library, faced Librarian Bettina Hunter's report of the library's highest circulation totals, 14,295, for the first three months of 1953, and the consequent mounting strain on straitened income until early fall.

This figure is 1,068 higher than books circulated in the same period in 1952. Comparison of an annual figure (from April, 1952, through March, 1953) with the same period in the previous year—55,648 in contrast to 48,818—shows an increase of 6,830. The board considered all facts of the situation and determined to spend every effort to give the best service possible within its budget.

Miss Hunter reported 496 books added to the collection, 346 of these adult and 150 juvenile. One hundred and fifty-two new borrowers have received new cards during the quarter, 114 of these adults and 38 juvenile. The registration file has been revised and the total active membership numbers 2,790, 2,099 adult, 691 juvenile.

The Library Board expressed its appreciation of the volunteer service of Mrs. Everett Gerry, who contributes weekly typing help, and of Asa Don Dickinson's gift of his book, "The World's Best Books: Homer to Hemingway". The spring book festival will be observed at the library during the week of May 18 to 21.

Dr. J. Alfred Calhoun appointed Phillip H. Jewett chairman of arrangements for the meeting of the Delaware County Trustees Association at the local library on the evening of May 12. The business meeting will be held in the American Legion Room, followed by a tour of the library and a discussion on library practices by a panel composed of local board members. Directors Mrs. Thomas K. Brown, Jr., and Mrs. Peter E. Told will be in charge of refreshments.

Dr. Robert E. Spiller reported on the proposed summer survey and analysis of library practices and similar libraries within a reasonable area, to be completed by Mrs. Brown, Mr. Jewett and Dr. Spiller. The board voted to join the recently revived Pennsylvania Library Association.

All members of the board were in attendance at the meeting except for Secretary A. W. Bass, Jr., who is in Belgium on business. The next meeting of the board will be Tuesday, June 9.

Borough Health Officers To Discuss Progress In Polio Control

Dr. J. Albright Jones, Borough Health Officer, will talk on the control of polio to members of the Swarthmore Mother's Club at the final meeting of the season Thursday evening, May 14.

Dr. Jones is assistant professor of Pediatrics, Graduate School of Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, and is chairman of the Medical Advisory Committee of the Delaware County Chapter, National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis. He will discuss the present status of gamma globulin and its availability, etc., during this year's polio season.

Due to the public interest in the prevention and treatment of polio, a town meeting is being planned for early September, under the general auspices of the Mother's Club, with Dr. Jones and other authorities as speakers. However, the May 14th meeting is open to all interested residents as well.

Parking Meters

Borough Council will convene Monday night at 7:30 in the Council room of Borough Hall to consider, among other matters, the purchase of parking meters for the business district of Swarthmore. According to reports given at the April meeting by the Public Safety Committee, 200 meters at a possible cost of \$65 a piece, would be installed along both sides of the underpass on South Chester road; Rutgers avenue to Cornell; Park avenue to Harvard; Dartmouth avenue to Lafayette; and the Borough Parking lot. They would be paid for at the rate of 50 per cent of the receipts, a process that would involve about two 1/2 years. Cautious estimates reveal a possible income of \$50 per meter—about \$10,000 a year, beginning in 1956 when the bill is paid.

Those in favor of the proposal emphasize the parking relief which they believe to be inevitable once the meters are installed. They point to the persistent parkers, ones whose cars are a week-day landmark in the business section, a parking meter which must be fed nickles every one or two hours of the day will break these habits of leaving cars behind while they carry on their local businesses or enroute for Philadelphia, West Chester or points in between. By the meter system, they argue, these spaces will be released for commuters, resident or out-of-town drivers who would like to do their shopping, their marketing or banking in Swarthmore without an exhausting hike to and from their destination.

Real estate owners, some of them non-car owners, can add their bit with the objection to having their tax assessments going toward the cost of regulating motorist laws. Let those motorists pay their own way in the Borough through the parking meters. Proponents by no means guarantee this possibility, but almost certainly the revenue would go into the Borough's General Fund and in the long run would at least ease a higher tax burden. Extra revenue might be used for improving highway conditions, space, or other roadway needs.

Those who object to Parking Meters question the advantages to be gained by their installation. Chronic parking offenders, they contend, should be picked up by the police under the present parking ordinance, which generally speaking, permits a two hour limit. If the present force cannot under the present parking ordinance, they question the practicality of the same size force of meters without the addition of another man. Neglect of the hourly or two hourly checking tour would mean a cash loss to the Borough. The wages for the employment of another man to help police the parking under the meter system would eat into the meter care and upkeep of the meters, which are not self-perpetuating, would take another chunk, and collection of weekly yields would mean another slice. Then they add the initial cost of laying needed sidewalks in the Borough's parking lot, which would not be included in the company's contract.

An informal poll of business men of the Borough revealed that only three of the 15 asked were in favor of meters. There are, to be sure, about 40 business men, but not one of those 40 has stepped out to voice his or her opinion to Council. Of the approximately 5,000 citizens in the Borough not one at this writing, has formally indicated his opinion to the Councilmen who plan to take immediate action Monday night. Hindsightful citizens are a civic tragedy. Those who have an opinion on the matter, one way or the other, should notify some one of the seven Council members by letter, telephone Borough Secretary Elliott Richardson, Swarthmore 8-4899, or appear at the meeting Monday in Borough Hall and let their Borough Fathers know of it, or "forever after hold their peace."

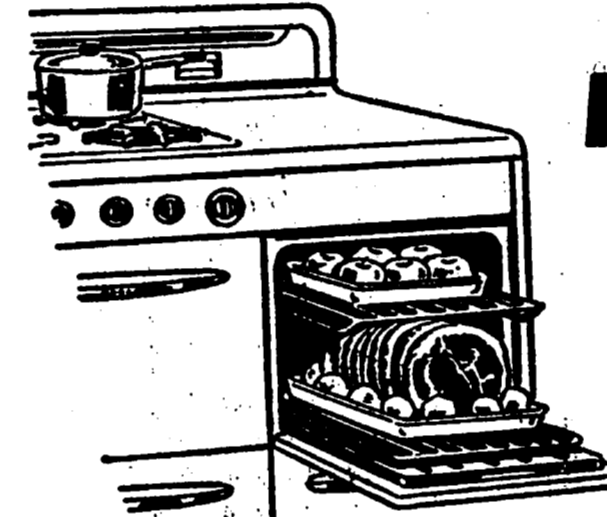

Dear Editor:

As president of the Swarthmore Teachers Association I am writing in regard to a quotation you printed on Friday, April 24, 1953. The Swarthmorean quoted Mr. Carroll Streeter "Although we aren't paying the highest salaries of any school in Pennsylvania, the variation is slight, for instance in an area commonly used for comparison, we are second only to Lower Merion and that represents a difference of a mere \$60.00 or so." This is a misquote. Mr. Streeter said, "The median salary of our elementary teachers was second only to Lower Merion." As a school district we rank fourth by \$433.00. Our Secondary School teachers rank seventh by \$740.00 in the study of the "Suburban Nine" made by the University of Pennsylvania for 1952-1953. This is more than "a mere \$60.00 or so."

This letter is written with no attempt to use the public press as a propaganda device for teachers' salaries but, for the benefit of the members of the community who did not attend this meeting the facts should be correct.

The median salary of elementary teachers in Lower Merion according to the University of Pennsylvania's 1952-1953 study of nine suburban schools is \$991.11 as compared to Swarthmore's \$385.00. For Lansdowne, the nearest school to our own, the Survey lists a median elementary salary of \$315.00.

Edwards Cites Quakerism of Today

Earle Edwards, giving the third and concluding lecture in the Quakerism series at Whittier House, cited comparative statistics and procedures under the heading "Contemporary Quakerism — Its Significance, Nature and Extent."

The "disciplines" of the Society of Friends cover business of the Meeting, set tone and moral guidance. Some groups like the Five Yearly Meeting, numbering 70,000 and including 14 Yearly Meetings coast to coast, have pastors. Since it is necessary to count largely on Nazarene groups for pastors and this results sometimes in conversion toward Nazarene practices there is now a trend away from pastors in some areas. Other Meetings have established the Bible as an important authority. Some have undertaken a strong missionary movement to Africa, Japan and like areas. Some felt outward forms of the sacraments detract from the inwardness. The Swarthmore Hicksites, members of the Friends General Conference group and numbering 19,000 in six Yearly meetings in the eastern United States, stress inwardness.

Mr. Edwards is not hopeful for "one" Society of Friends. He considers it important to have the right spirit toward all who differ; to grow toward each other but retain that which led them to Quakerism. Divisions are only organizational and sensing the many things all have in common, Friends are developing a discipline to unite. Swarthmore will some day be faced with other Friends' questions, although it is not now, Mr. Edwards stated. He sees a greater interest in theology now than at any time within the past 50 years. There remains a give and take, quite a mixture, and no conflict between Quakerism and the latest findings of science.

Widespread concern about expanding the membership is apparent. He suggested prospective Friends should attend Meetings and learn particular procedures, like consensus replacing majority vote, for a year or so before being invited to join. Membership should be on the basis of the individual's seeking to live a life guided and empowered by God, his ability to gain help in Meeting-ship and to unite, in general with the beliefs and ways of Friends.

Mr. Edwards feels Quakerism offers the world not so much Truth itself but methods, practices and experiences of seeking Truth — not alone in solitary meditation but together in cooperate worship, doing business together, planning and carrying out worship in different parts of the earth. He said Friends can offer their peace testimony though not as strong as it once was; their lay movement especially in day to day life, equality of men, spiritual significance of sacraments, and the place of silence in worship. Friends, however, he continued find other religions absent of them in these ways. Keeping the lead in work camps, giving to people according to need instead of racial or religious background, humanitarian concerns, and projects such as Swarthmore's is seeing if the Meeting can do for its people what pastors do for others. Mapping out a program of self-education, should recover radiance of faith more than would, while ping up enthusiasm, he concluded.

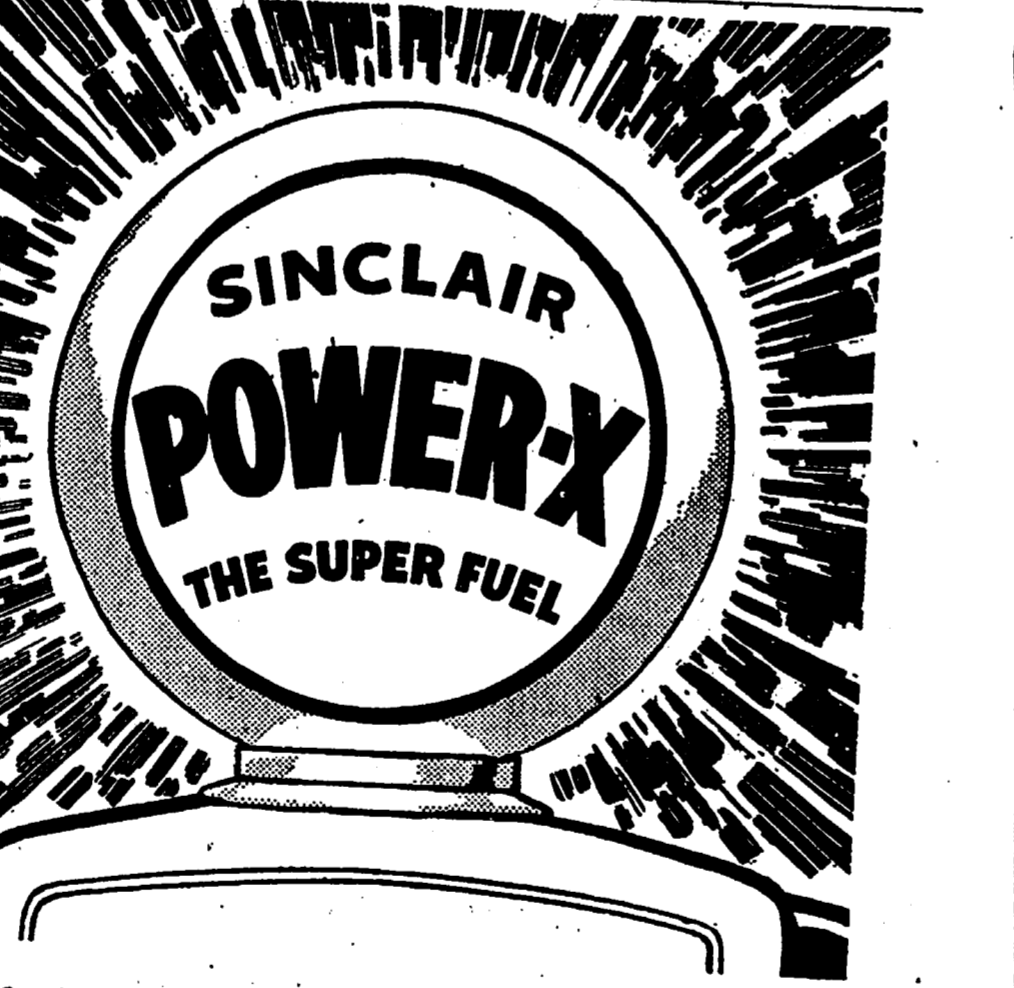

The actual census figures closely coincided with the figures previously estimated by Carroll Streeter, School Board President. In 1953, for instance, the census figure of kindergarten enrollments came to 84, while Mr. Streeter's figure was 85.

Stronger UN Awaits U.S., Harrington Says

Speaker Addresses 400 at UWF Dinner Monday

"The world has a strategy for war, but none for peace," said the Rev. Donald Harrington of the Community Church, New York, addressing over 400 members and guests of the United World Federalists Monday evening. The talk was given on the occasion of a successful educational and fund raising dinner at the Aronimink Golf Club.

The speaker began by saying that he had three biases; he is against Communism, he believes in peace, and he is for law and order. Speaking on the topic, "More Power to the United Nations", he gave credit to the U N for its many accomplishments. He then showed how, with support, it could achieve greater results in relieving the pressures of misery and need which cause the neglected peoples of the world to embrace communism as their only hope. The government's annual support to the U N is only 16c per person while it spends over \$400 a year for war, he said.

Realizing that the U N Charter would not be a perfect instrument, the late Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg insisted on a provision that it be possible after a period of 10 years. Such a review conference is automatically placed on the agenda of the General Assembly for 1955. The beginnings of a world federal government, with limited powers adequate to assure peace, may take place at that time. But, Mr. Harrington pointed out, our government officials must feel that they are backed by strong public opinion if they are to take a stand for a stronger United Nations. The federal principle, so basic to our American democracy, must be applied to a world government, the speaker said.

In conclusion, Mr. Harrington emphasized that each individual must get rid of his apathy toward world events at a time when the hydrogen bomb threatens to destroy all civilization—as we know it. "The U N can become a peaceful bridge to a peaceful tomorrow; America must supply the moral and spiritual leadership in a long range strategy for peace."

May Day Audience Hears Stimulating Talk

Noted anthropologist and author Dr. Margaret Mead delivered a stimulating talk last Friday afternoon to an audience that filled McCahan Hall at the Presbyterian Church. Speaking on the subject "The Civilized and the Uncivilized Child," Dr. Mead pointed out that the basic difference between a primitive society and that of our own is the attitude toward change and choice. A primitive society is bound by traditions of one kind or another, while our own is characterized by change and a highly developed concept of choice—in marriage, in home, community and career which makes for a mobile world.

One of the problems our society has today comes from saving so many children who, in a primitive culture would never have been born. We have such marvelous techniques of pre-natal and post-natal care that many children who never wanted to live are forced to survive through the skills of modern science, and the "new allergies" in some children are one of the resulting problems. The primitive society is also relatively free of critical parent-child relationships, for the large (Continued on Page 4)

LILACS BLOOM, PEONIES ABOUT TO BURST AS COLLEGE CAMPUS UNFOLDS IN COLOR

Gardeners living in Swarthmore will find a great many flowers in bloom on the College campus during this coming week, according to the Scott Foundation. The Lilacs on the Meeting House Walk are already in full bloom and if the weather remains cool, should give a good display for nearly a week. This collection of Lilacs is one of the finest in this country. At present it contains about 75 varieties, all of them chosen as the best in their respective colors and types in the survey conducted by the American Association of Botanical Gardens and Arboretums in 1941. The great range of color and type is a constant surprise to visitors who do not realize the great strides in Lilac breeding which has taken place in the last quarter of a century.

On College avenue near the Worth Dormitory there will be in bloom the greatest collection of Tree Peonies in any public garden in this country. There are approximately 200 plants in this collection, and they range in color from purest white through pinks and scarlets to crimson, maroon and purple. These Peonies, which are shrubs rather than herbaceous plants, flower before most of the herbaceous species, but there are already in bloom in the Iris and Peony garden by the railroad station some of the early herbaceous hybrids, which are still very rare and little known. In this same garden some of the Intermediate Iris are also beginning to bloom, and are making quite a color display.

The Ghent hybrid Azaleas in the Azalea Garden near the President's house at Cedar lane and Elm avenue, are just coming into bloom, and there is a color mass of Japanese Torch Azaleas in the Crum Woods beyond the outdoor auditorium. Through these woods below the outdoor auditorium there are beginning to bloom some of the new hybrids between our American Rhododendrons and some rare Chinese species. These are mostly pale pink in color, but there are some deeper pinks, and scarlets among them and some of them are very fragrant. This new group of hybrids blooms at least two weeks before the better-known Rhododendrons, and the Scott Foundation collection of them is probably the largest in this country.

THE RESPONSIBILITY OF A VOTE

(Reprinted from the files of The Swarthmorean, May 2, 1914)

In view of the coming county elections and of the fact that in many relations of life we are called upon to cast a vote, it may not be amiss at this time to refer to an interesting and significant decision handed down recently in an Illinois court, when the judge took occasion to severely scold an individual who had cast a vote in direct opposition to his judgment because he had been approached and asked for his ballot by a near relative and dependent of one of the candidates. In the course of the hearing it developed that this vote was the one which controlled the result.

The office in question was a minor one but the Court averred that the principle involved was one of vast importance. The solicitation of a vote under these circumstances was more than questionable, but the person approached lacked the courage of his convictions to the extent that he acquiesced rather than to express and stand by his opinion. In Court, however, he did not hesitate to say that all the while he believed the defeated candidate was eminently more fitted to fill the office than the one for whom he voted.

A ballot is a sacred weapon and should be cast in accordance with the convictions of the voter, to thus express his preference after he has thoroughly investigated the merits of the respective issues involved. The day is not far distant when the solicitation of a vote will be made a misdemeanor and the Court held in the above case that such a pledge is never legally or morally binding. The casting of a ballot is a privilege and a moral obligation, and a voter should never be hampered in any way in the expression of his choice.

The principle involved in this decision is far-reaching and applies just as much to the filling of a high national office as of one in any municipal, borough or social organization.

A pledged ballot should no more be a source of pride or consolation to the one responsible for it than can be the honor of the office attained by such questionable methods.

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Troop 3 Scouts in Canoe Thriller

An unseasonably high water condition on the Brandywine Creek furnished the Scouts of Troop No. 3 Methodist Church with a very exciting canoe trip last week-end. family units of aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents, provide a wide intimate community for child development; mothers in these groups frequently nurse each other's children. Dr. Mead remarked that our society, stamped it is by adult freedom of choice, sometimes overlooks the fact that the child might also have a choice in its willingness to be born, or to continue living and in the parents it would like to have. The mother-rejecting-the-child situation, one recognized in psychology today, works both ways. The Nursery School takes the place of the large family unit by giving the child a chance to make its own decisions in a bigger group.

Dr. Mead also commented on the influence a child has on its mother, and used as her illustration some of her experiences with the Balinese, an extremely relaxed people. A mother from our society, caring for a Balinese baby, would be more relaxed, while one of our babies would cause its adopted Balinese mother to become more tense. Here again the nursery school, the speaker said, allows the child a trial and error period to experiment at will, without disrupting the small family unit.

The danger of both primitive peoples and the large families of our own culture is the stereotyping of children. Once labeled the lazy one or the cruel one, the child, returning 30 years later as an adult is still the lazy or cruel one, or, as Dr. Mead summed it up, "Susie always liked pickles." Again, schools permit an interchange for the child, and let him develop in a group that does not remain fixed. Records carried on from year to year should be kept, Dr. Mead felt, but referred to and used judiciously, and not necessarily by the teacher.

A one-time Swarthmorean, Dr. Mead gave her talk in the Presbyterian Church where she had attended Sunday School, on a date when she had formerly delivered May Baskets on "the hill." She came to Swarthmore last Friday at the invitation of Mrs. Pemberton M. Dickson, director of the Presbyterian Nursery Day School.

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

old building) Authority approvals are not moving at present. Swarthmore's in particular could not be considered until the Delaware County Board of Education's overall plan for future area consolidations has been examined and approved by the state. No accurate date for achievement of this step can be predicted.

The overloaded condition of electrical circuits at College Avenue was brought to the attention of the Board by the Philadelphia Electric Company. It was decided to have George Ewing review a 1951 architect's survey of the electrical set-up and to attempt to arrive at a remedy at the next meeting.

The Board extended a vote of appreciation to the local League of Women Voters for the aid its recent census had given the school population forecast and per capita tax listings.

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BOND ISSUE vs. AUTHORITY

As a Property Owner, You Are Interested in Learning Which Method of Financing Will Be Least Offensive

HERE ARE THE FACTS:

A. A Municipal or State Authority is a legal method for avoiding the Statutory limits placed on the School Board both in levying taxes and creating indebtedness. By financing through an Authority, it is possible to exceed the 7% borrowing limit and also to exceed the 35 mill tax rate in an amount, approved by the State, to help pay the "rent" to the Authority.

B. This "rent" includes interest, amortization, legal fees and costs of operating the Authority.

C. Under an Authority, the type and size of the building will be largely dictated by Harrisburg.

D. The School District will not own the Building until it has been paid for. In the meantime, the Authority is the boss, in the relationship of landlord and tenant.

E. The interest rate on Bonds of a School District Authority is from 1% to 1 1/2% more than a School District Bond Issue. The latter would save at least \$58,000. for the term of the Bond Issue.

F. The cost of operating an Authority would exceed the cost of operation by the School Board under a Bond Issue. We want less, not more Government control as would be the case under an Authority.

G. At the public meeting sponsored by the Home and School Association on April 21st, Mr. Carroll P. Streeter, President of the School Board, made a clear and frank statement of the proposed building program. The Board is asking for approval of a Bond Issue of \$312,000. of which \$40,000. will be required for repairs to the present

Rutgers Avenue building. The remaining \$272,000. will be used to construct an addition to the present building, consisting of seven classrooms with Administrative and Health suites. This is Unit one on the Architect's plan. It is hoped that there will be sufficient funds to include an All-Purpose room which will be Unit two.

H. Donald P. Jones, Chairman of the Board's Finance Committee, says that it is his "firm belief that any and all necessary facilities can be made available through the use of a Bond Issue."

I. By approving the Bond Issue, the Taxpayers will save money and retain their freedom of action. An inevitable increase in taxes may be deferred for two or three years.

J. At the primary election on May 19th, we will vote on the Bond Issue and also for six candidates for election to the School Board. John Spencer is un-opposed for a six-year term. Donald Jones, Mrs. Spiller and Mrs. Bass are candidates for a four-year term (two to be elected) and Mr. Martin and Mr. Wilson are running for the two-year term (one to be elected).

K. We have written to the six candidates, asking that they state their position on the question of a Bond Issue vs. an Authority. All of them are in favor of the Bond Issue provided the funds available are sufficient. If the Bond Issue is not approved, it is quite likely that the Board will infer that the people of Swarthmore are opposed to new construction at this time. On the other hand, they might be forced to resort to the use of an Authority and this would mean an immediate increase of the School Taxes.

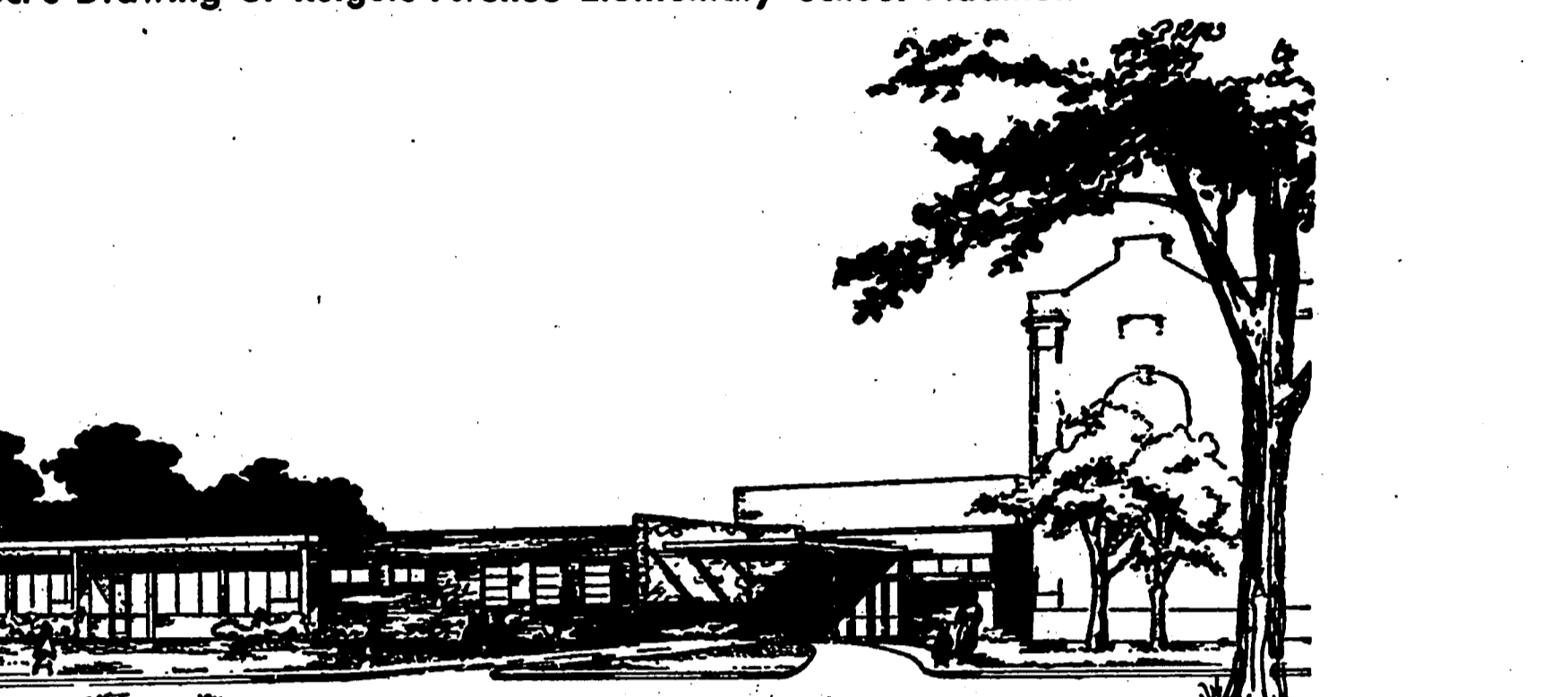

The building is needed to bring classes down to the 25 to 30 pupil state standard. Although necessitated by today's borough children it has adequate leeway to absorb the borough's normal rate of growth for several years. Additional classrooms can be added later if future need justifies. It has been generally agreed the building should be financed by a Bond Issue if possible, because this method permits a democratic voice of the people to be heard; it keeps local matters in the hands of local people; it provides the most economical means of financing; it staves off the immediate tax rise which financing under an arbitrarily established Municipal or State Authority would bring; and it is the only method by which it now appears the building can be ready with any certainty by the September, 1954, deadline. 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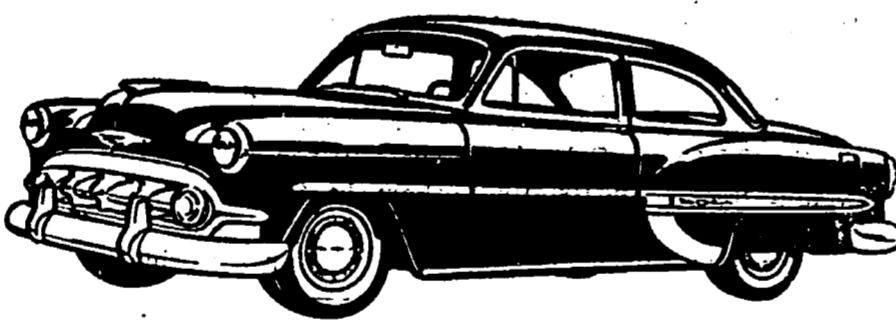

Democracy in Action

The future of public school education in Swarthmore faces a crucial test in Tuesday's Primary Election. Voters will decide for or against a Bond Issue to support expansion of existing elementary school facilities, already overtaxed by the Borough's increased population. They will also elect four school directors, one to a six-year term, two to four-year terms, and one to a two-year term. The contested terms are the two and four-year terms.

Passage of the Bond Issue will assure the maintenance of the State standard in the Swarthmore schools. Should the Bond Issue fail, this generation of Swarthmore children will be penalized by voters who took their own public school education, under less crowded conditions, pretty much for granted. The cost of education is admittedly high, but its worth to borough, state, and nation is incalculable. The Swarthmorean urges your support of the Bond Issue.

Important referendums such as this and the election of school directors to serve in one of the most critical periods ever faced by local schools deserve the deliberation and sensible forethought of each voter. This means studying the qualifications of all candidates (these are listed elsewhere in The Swarthmorean), and weighing them to discover the contestants whose ability, experience, judgment, integrity, independence and courage fit them for good public service.

It is a matter of satisfaction that people of high calibre and principle stand for election in the Borough. It is a matter of community concern that rumor campaigns can work lasting damage, that the consent of a candidate to run does not give a free license for stone throwing. Candidates are to be appraised on their own merits rather than on the powers of persuasion of their ardent supporters. Is it too quixotic, too quaint and old fashioned to insist that a community such as this admit an obligation of noblesse oblige to neighbors who offer to carry a larger share of the public load? This obligation would be discharged by bringing a thorough study to each vote, and standing firm against the barrage of last minute circulations which permit no refutation.

The School Board must face grave decisions. It seems to the Swarthmorean that candidates uncommitted by pledges, but willing and able to face each decision firmly and fairly will best serve the Borough's future, and what else is that but its educated youth?

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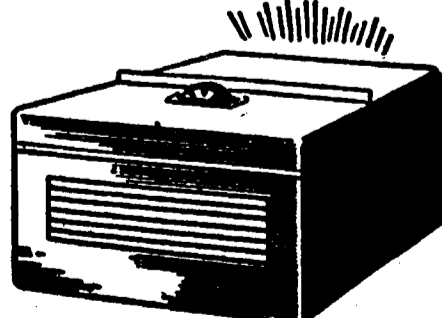

Scott Paper Co. Gives Swarth. Scholarship

College Soph. Harry Bode First Recipient of \$2,000 Grant

Scott Paper Company, Chester, has announced the establishment of an experimental scholarship at Swarthmore College on a modest basis "to determine if the company and the college can benefit mutually through corporate support of private institutions of higher learning."

The grant, made known by Thomas B. McCabe, Scott President and a graduate of Swarthmore, will be called the Scott Award at Swarthmore. It will be given each year for the next five years to a sophomore student who plans to enter business after graduation. The Award will provide the recipient with \$1,000 for each of his last two years in college.

Along with the scholarship, which honors Arthur Hoyt Scott, one time Scott president and an 1894 graduate of Swarthmore, Scott Paper Company will contribute \$1,000 each year to Swarthmore College.

It was made clear that if this limited experiment produces the results which Scott and Swarthmore anticipate, the scholarship program will be extended to certain other colleges and universities whose graduates have had successful records with Scott.

In announcing the scholarship, Mr. McCabe said that "Scott Paper Company will offer each recipient summer employment while in college, but that acceptance of summer employment was voluntary and not mandatory on the part of the recipient." He said further that "the company is naturally hopeful that upon graduation sufficient recipients of the award will join its organization on a permanent basis to make the experiment productive", but said that neither the Company nor any recipient is under obligation with respect to employment after graduation. He emphasized that the program is entirely voluntary.

Mr. McCabe said that "Scott Paper Company has become increasingly aware of the difficulties faced by private colleges and universities in meeting the rising costs incident to a sound program of advanced education. These institutions are certainly an integral part of the American way of life and they constitute one of the strongest factors in contributing personnel, its very life blood, to the American competitive enterprise system."

The first recipient of the Scott Award at Swarthmore is Henry J. Bode, Jr., of Rumford, R. I. He is president of the sophomore class, co-captain-elect of the varsity wrestling team and is a member of the varsity football and track teams. He was vice-president of his class during his Freshman year. Bode is a member of Delta Upsilon national fraternity and is a holder of a National George F. Baker Scholarship. He plans to major in mechanical engineering.

Bode was selected by a committee which included members of both the faculty and student bodies. It was made up of two Vice-Presidents of the College, the Dean of Men, Dean of Women, the President of the Student Council, the Women's Student Government Association, the Men's Executive Committee and the presidents of the Junior and senior classes.

B. Y. Morrison Receives Scott Gold Medal

The Arthur Hoyt Scott Gold Medal and a prize of \$1,000 have been awarded to Benjamin Yoe Morrison, former Head of the Division of Plant Exploration and Introduction of the United States Department of Agriculture, it was announced by John W. Nason, President of Swarthmore College and Chairman of the Arthur Scott Prize selection committee.

Dr. Morrison was graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of California in 1913, and received a Master of Landscape Architecture degree from Harvard two years later. He spent 1916 in the Orient as a Sheldon Fellow in Landscape Architecture for Harvard. In 1920 Morrison entered the Department of Agriculture from which he finally retired in 1952.

Morrison has been active in the American Horticultural Society and has held various offices in the Society, including the Presidency. He has served several times as secretary and president of the American Iris Society, and was acting director of the National Arboretum from 1937 until 1952. In December, 1941, Mr. Morrison was awarded the Velthe Memorial Medal of the Royal Horticultural Society for his work in horticulture both in the United States and Great Britain. He is one of the two honorary vice-presidents of the Royal Horticultural Society in this country.

He has contributed articles on horticulture to various magazines, and has served as editor of the "National Horticultural Magazine" since 1926. This journal is one of the most authoritative magazines in the field, and for many years has consistently carried plant illustrations that could be found nowhere else in this country. It is felt by many horticulturalists to represent Mr. Morrison's greatest achievement.

Among members of the committee who participated in the selection were Mr. Nason, Robert Reed College avenue, editor, "Country Gentlemen"; and John C. Wister, director of the Arthur Hoyt Scott Foundation.

The award was made last year to the National Council of State Garden Clubs.

Examination Open for Borough Postmaster

The first examination for Postmaster at Swarthmore, \$5870 a year, under new, more exacting eligibility requirements recently agreed upon by the U.S. Civil Service Commission and the Post Office Department will be open for receipt of applications until June 9, the Commission announced this week.

All previously existing postmaster examinations for first-, second-, and third-class post offices and lists of eligibles were cancelled recently and higher standards of eligibility prescribed for the filling of the more than 1,700 vacant positions throughout the country.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in the Borough must have at least two years of experience showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Applicants who pass a written test will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability and character. There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 25 years of age and must not have passed their sixty-third birthday.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be received in the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. not later than the closing date.

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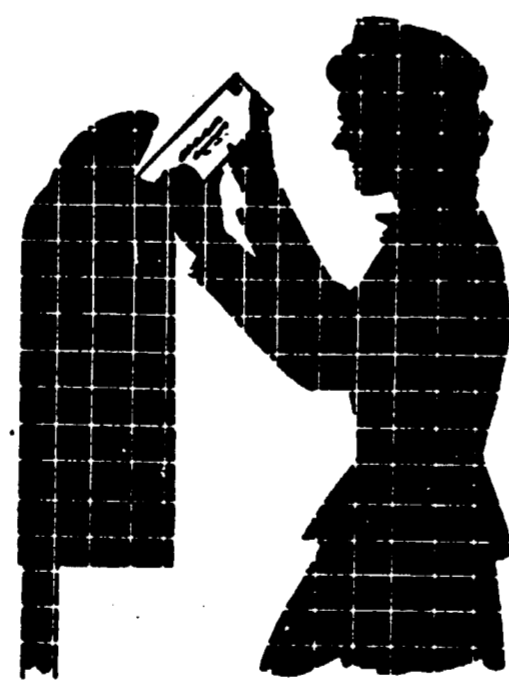

BOND ISSUE vs. AUTHORITY

As a Property Owner, You Are Interested in Learning Which Method of Financing Will Be Least Expensive

HERE ARE THE FACTS:

A. A Municipal or State Authority is a legal method for avoiding the Statutory limits placed on the School Board both in levying taxes and creating indebtedness. By financing through an Authority, it is possible to exceed the 7% borrowing limit and also to exceed the 35 mill tax rate in an amount, approved by the State, to help pay the "rent" to the Authority.

B. This "rent" includes interest, amortization, legal fees and costs of operating the Authority.

C. Under an Authority, the type and size of the building will be largely dictated by Harrisburg.

D. The School District will not own the Building until it has been paid for. In the meantime, the Authority is the boss, in the relationship of landlord and tenant.

E. The interest rate on Bonds of a School District Authority is from 1% to 1 1/2% more than a School District Bond issue. The latter would save at least \$58,000. for the term of the Bond Issue.

F. The cost of operating an Authority would exceed the cost of operation by the School Board under a Bond Issue. We want less, not more Government control as would be the case under an Authority.

G. At the public meeting sponsored by the Home and School Association on April 21st, Mr. Carroll P. Streeter, President of the School Board, made a clear and frank statement of the proposed building program. The Board is asking for approval of a Bond Issue of \$312,000. of which \$40,000. will be required for repairs to the present

Rutgers Avenue building. The remaining \$272,000. will be used to construct an addition to the present building, consisting of seven classrooms with Administrative and Health suites. This is Unit one on the Architect's plan. It is hoped that there will be sufficient funds to include an All-Purpose room which will be Unit two.

H. Donald P. Jones, Chairman of the Board's Finance Committee, says that it is his "firm belief that any and all necessary facilities can be made available through the use of a Bond Issue."

I. By approving the Bond Issue, the Taxpayers will save money and retain their freedom of action. An inevitable increase in taxes may be deferred for two or three years.

J. At the primary election on May 19th, we will vote on the Bond Issue and also for six candidates for election to the School Board. John Spencer is unopposed for a six-year term. Donald Jones, Mrs. Spiller and Mrs. Bass are candidates for a four-year term (two to be elected) and Mr. Martin and Mr. Wilson are running for the two-year term (one to be elected).

K. We have written to the six candidates, asking that they state their position on the question of a Bond Issue vs. an Authority. All of them are in favor of the Bond Issue provided the funds available are sufficient. If the Bond Issue is not approved, it is quite likely that the Board will infer that the people of Swarthmore are opposed to new construction at this time. On the other hand, they might be forced to resort to the use of an Authority and this would mean an immediate increase of the School Taxes.

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CD Air Raid Test Set for Tuesday

An air raid test for the personnel of the Civil Defense Councils of Swarthmore and Springfield Township will be held Tuesday, May 26, between the hours of 7:30 and 9:30 p. m. In announcing the test, the cooperating Councils emphasized the facts that traffic will not be stopped, and the public will not be asked to seek shelter.

Sirens used in the test alert will vary from the regular air raid signals to avoid confusion for neighboring communities not participating. The special signals will be as follows:

RED SIGNAL: Siren will rise 4 seconds, fall 26 seconds, through 6 complete cycles. Duration normal at 3 minutes, but cadence different.

ATTACK SIGNAL: At some time between the Red Signal and the All Clear, the siren will sound 4 seconds up and 4 seconds down, repeated through 6 cycles. Duration about 1 minute.

ALL CLEAR: Siren will rise 20 seconds, one minute to die down, repeated through three cycles. Duration 3 minutes. Normal would be 7 minutes.

Swarthmore voters supported a debt increase of \$312,000 for the erection of a new elementary school and repairs to the existing elementary school building by an over 10 to one margin Tuesday. The vote for the bond issue totaled 1072, against 94.

Interest in the Primary Election Campaign in the choice of School Directors with John F. Spencer running unopposed for a six year term receiving the highest vote of 1082 and Donald P. Jones polling 1037 assents for a four year service. Mrs. Robert E. Spiller won the woman's post on the Board for four years by a 200 margin, carrying 756 votes as against 556 cast for Mrs. A. W. Bass, Jr. In the only other local contest Charles W. Martin led his opponent Robert H. Wilson by a vote of 702 to 445.

Evidence of voter eccentricity is to be found in the fact that the vote on the bond issue was comparatively light, 244 more Republicans voted in the woman's race than the entire two party vote for the bond issue where the total vote was 1068 as opposed to a total of 1312 Republican tallies for Spiller and Bass and the Republican total of 1207 votes for Martin and Wilson.

The write-in vote was the heaviest in recent years, giving the school directors nominated by Republicans nomination on the Democratic slate as well.

All other candidates on both party tickets running without opposition received the nomination of their party.

CD Air Raid Test Set for Tuesday

An air raid test for the personnel of the Civil Defense Councils of Swarthmore and Springfield Township will be held Tuesday, May 26, between the hours of 7:30 and 9:30 p. m. In announcing the test, the cooperating Councils emphasized the facts that traffic will not be stopped, and the public will not be asked to seek shelter.

Sirens used in the test alert will vary from the regular air raid signals to avoid confusion for neighboring communities not participating. The special signals will be as follows:

RED SIGNAL: Siren will rise 4 seconds, fall 26 seconds, through 6 complete cycles. Duration normal 3 minutes, but cadence different.

ATTACK SIGNAL: At some time between the Red Signal and the All Clear, the siren will sound 4 seconds up and 4 seconds down, repeated through 6 cycles. Duration about 1 minute.

ALL CLEAR: Siren will rise 20 seconds, one minute to die down, repeated through three cycles. Duration 3 minutes. Normal would be 7 minutes.

Borough Votes 10-1 For Bond Issue

Spencer, Jones, Martin, Mrs. Spiller Elected to School Board

Swarthmore voters supported a debt increase of \$312,000 for the erection of a new elementary school and repairs to the existing elementary school building by an over 10 to one margin Tuesday. The vote for the bond issue totaled 1072, against 94.

Interest in the Primary Election centered in the choice of School Directors with John F. Spencer running unopposed for a six year term receiving the high vote of 1082 and Donald P. Jones polling 1037 assents for a four year term.

Mrs. Robert E. Spiller won the woman's post on the Board for four years by a 200 margin, carrying 756 votes as against 556 cast for Mrs. A. W. Bass, Jr. In the only other local contest Charles W. Martin led his opponent Robert H. Wilson by a vote of 702 to 445.

Evidence of voter eccentricity is to be found in the fact that the vote on the bond issue was comparatively light, 244 more Republicans voted in the woman's race than the entire two party vote for the bond issue where the total vote was 1068 as opposed to a split of 1312 Republican tallies for Spiller and Bass and the Republican total of 1207 votes for Martin and Wilson.

The write-in vote was the heaviest in recent years, giving the school directors nominated by Republicans nomination on the Democratic slate as well.

All other candidates on both party tickets running without opposition received the nomination of their party.

The Swarthmore Property Owners Association, which reports a recent 70% increase in membership, has named two new directors G. P. Pilgrim to represent the northeast section of the borough and Mrs. Anthony M. Fairbanks, southeast. 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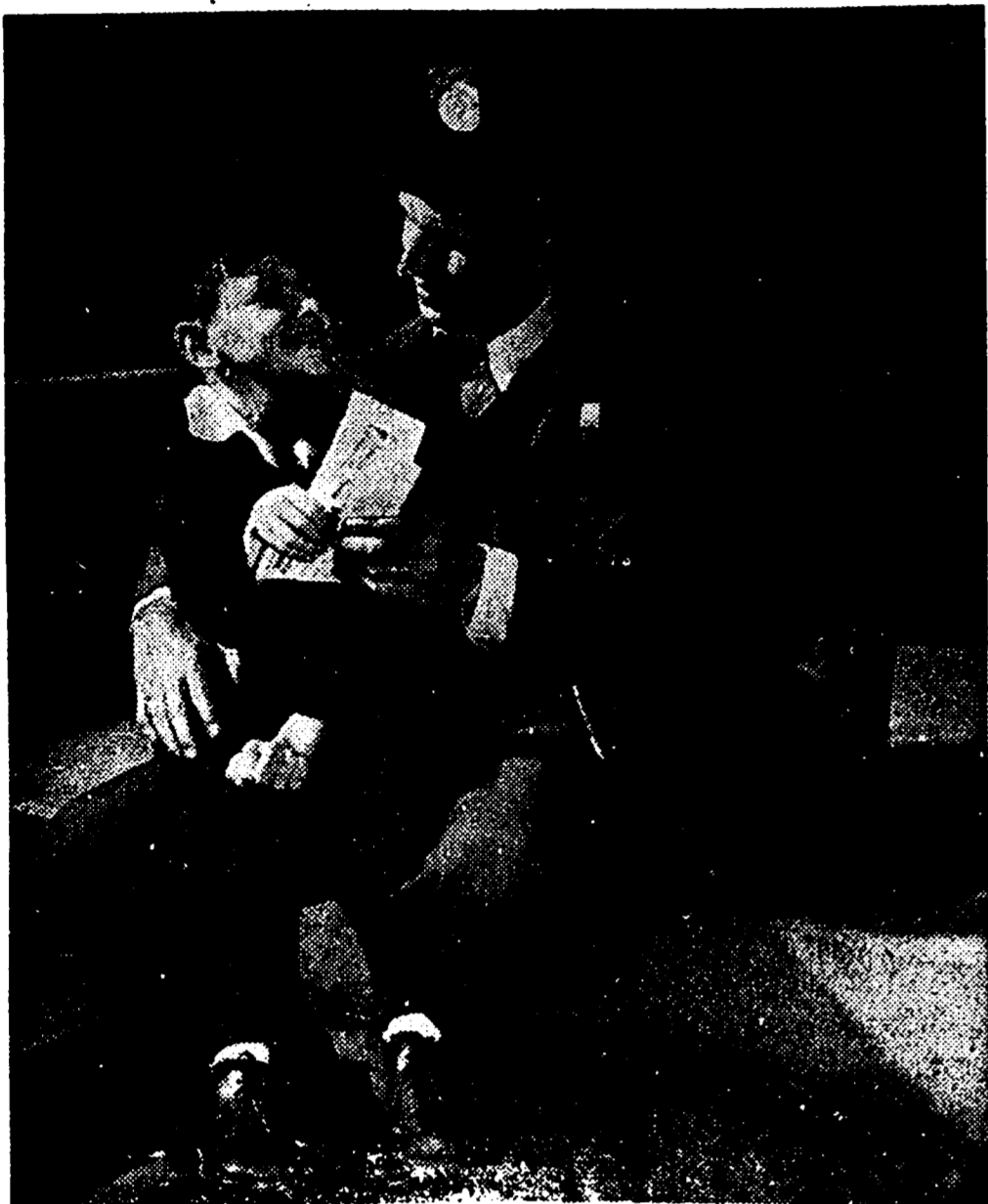

Wister to Speak in New Jersey Exercise

In 1951 he registered 34 goals and five assists in 11 games; last year he checked for 38 tallies and 15 assists in 10 games. Although at 160 pounds Snape isn't big enough to bore his way past burly defencemen, he's got all the other attributes of lacrosse greatness. During the season just ended, Snape shepherded the greenest team Hobart's had in years to a winning season. The Statesmen won four of seven starts as Snape scored nearly half of their 72 goals.

This summer, John will attend a 30-day advanced Air Force ROTC training camp. A Cadet Captain in the Hobart Air Force ROTC unit, he will report to Langley Air Base, Va., June 22. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Roy Snape, Harvard avenue.

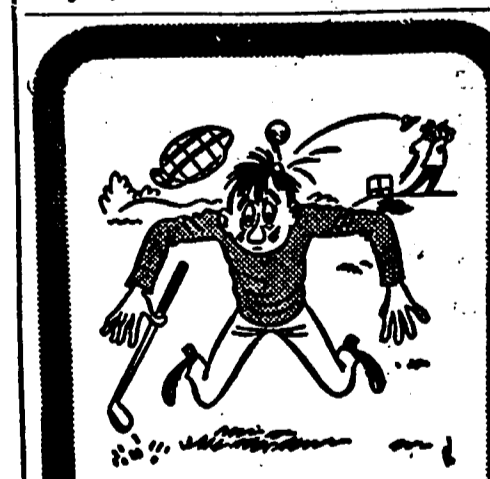
