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

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
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ENGAGEMENTS

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



An ordinance establishing a Pension Fund for certain policemen of the Borough of Swarthmore; designating the source of the money and property to be used in operating such fund; providing for the purchase of annuity contracts and the terms and conditions for participation therein.

The Council of the Borough of Swarthmore does ordain.
Sec. 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act of 1927, P.L. 519, its amendments and supplements collectively known as the Borough Code, and to such other statutes as are applicable in case of police pension and annuity contracts, the Borough of Swarthmore (hereinafter called "Borough") does hereby establish the following fund for the purpose of providing pension and disability benefits for qualified members of the police force of the Borough and dependents of such policemen, said fund to be known as the "Swarthmore Police Pension Fund."

Sec. 2. The Finance Committee of the Swarthmore Borough Council (hereinafter called "Trustee") hereby appointed trustee to administer said fund, and to make rules and regulations consistent with this ordinance and the relevant statutes, for the operation of said fund.
Sec. 3. Into said fund shall be paid the net balance of the liquidated police pension fund that was created by ordinance of this Borough, No. 492 approved November 21, 1945, and abolished by Ordinance No. 544, approved September 8, 1952. After deduction of all costs, fees and expenses in connection with said liquidation of the prior police pension fund (hereinafter referred to as the old plan) the balance remaining shall be turned over to the Trustee and applied as hereinafter provided. Into said fund shall also be paid all moneys hereafter received from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, or any department or agency thereof, and all sums paid or contributed to said fund from any other source. No assessments shall be made upon the police beneficiaries of said fund, and no deduction shall be made from the paychecks of such police but they may contribute to said fund as any other person, firm or corporation may contribute thereto.

Sec. 4. The net proceeds received by the Trustee from the old fund shall be used exclusively for the purchase of annuities of the kind and character to be selected by the Trustee, for the benefit of those policemen who were beneficiaries of the old police pension fund. The money and property received by the Trustee in addition to the old fund shall be separately accounted for and applied by the Trustee for the benefit of all qualified policemen of the Borough under the terms and conditions prescribed in this ordinance. It shall not be necessary to create separate trust funds, so long as the net amount of the old fund is applied exclusively for the benefit of the qualified policemen who were entitled to benefits therefrom at the time said old fund was abolished by Ordinance No. 544.

Sec. 5. In purchasing annuities with the proceeds of the old fund, the Trustee shall allocate to each qualified policeman entitled to participate in said old fund an amount or credit based on the number of years such policeman was a beneficiary under such old pension fund. The Trustee shall hold such contracts for the exclusive benefit of such policeman, subject to the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 6. With respect to new money and property coming into the fund, the Trustee shall purchase annuity contracts from time to time for policemen then employed by this Borough allocating the same in such manner as to provide retirement benefits to such policemen and their dependents upon a basis proportionate to such man's salary at the time of his retirement, after taking into account the benefits, if any, to be received by such beneficiary under Sec. 5 hereof, and any Social Security benefits receivable by such beneficiary.

Sec. 7. When the Trustee, in its sole discretion, deems it advisable to do so, it shall use the amount or amounts allocated to a policeman's account to purchase from any insurance company or companies which the Trustee may select, one or more annuity contracts for such policeman. Income, gains and losses of the fund shall be allocated among the several beneficiaries in proportion to the amounts standing to their credit as of the preceding December 31st.

Sec. 8. Upon retirement, a policeman shall be entitled to whatever benefits may be provided by the annuity contract or contracts purchased for him, together with any part of the fund allocated to his individual account which has not been invested in an annuity contract for him. The normal retirement date shall be the 65th birthday of a policeman. This date may be advanced not more than five years or postponed for any number of years with the consent of the Swarthmore Borough Council. Payment of benefits shall be made as provided in section 12 hereof.

Sec. 9. Upon becoming permanently disabled from continuing to perform services as a police officer, such policeman shall be entitled to the cash proceeds of any annuity contract or contracts purchased for him, together with any part of the fund allocated to him which has not been invested in an annuity contract for him. Permanent disability shall be determined by the Health Officer of the Bor-

Sec. 10. In the event that any policeman shall die prior to retirement leaving a surviving spouse or surviving minor children who are dependent upon said policeman for one-half or more of their support, the Trustee shall pay to such surviving spouse, or if there be no surviving spouse, then to such surviving minor children in equal shares, the death benefit of the annuity contract or contracts purchased for such policeman, together with any part of the fund allocated to him which has not been invested in an annuity contract for him. The term "children" shall include any adopted child or children of the deceased policeman. Payment shall be made as provided in section 12 hereof.

Sec. 11. In the event that a policeman shall be separated from the police force for any reason other than retirement, disability or death, he shall forfeit the amount of the fund allocated to him, other than any amounts which he may have contributed personally. Such forfeiture, if any, shall be reallocated among the remaining qualified policemen at the end of the current year in proportion to the amounts standing to their credit in a paid-up annuity contract or contracts for such policeman. Any amounts contributed by such separated policeman shall be returned to him together with compound interest at the rate of 2 1/2%.

Sec. 12. (a) Any of the amounts provided for in sections 8, 9 and 10 may be paid in cash or in kind and may be made in the form of a paid-up annuity contract or contracts, or in installment payments in such amounts and at such intervals as the Trustee may in its sole discretion determine, or in a lump sum. However, the Trustee shall treat all persons in the same manner as to time constituted, is hereby designated as the Trustee of such Fund.

Sec. 13. The Trustee shall have the following powers in addition to those in limitation of, any authority given to it by law:
(a) To hold uninvested such amount of cash as may deem wise and to hold such cash or deposit in any bank or trust company.
(b) To cause any securities or other property to be registered in the name of the Trustee or its nominee without indicating that they are held in a fiduciary capacity.
(c) To exercise any conversion privilege or the benefit of the qualified policeman or other property held in the fund, subject to the terms of this ordinance.

(d) To accept contributions and gifts to the fund in kind, and subject to such reasonable conditions as may be determined by the Trustee, without being required to convert said contributions and gifts into cash or legal investments.
(e) To vote directly or by proxy on all matters pertaining to all securities held in the fund.

(f) To sell, transfer, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange or otherwise dispose of any real or personal property held in the fund, and to sell any such property at either public or private sale or at such price and upon such terms as it may deem wise.
(g) To employ such agents, counsel, accountants, appraisers, or other persons as may seem advisable and to pay their expenses and compensation from the fund, subject to the approval of the Council.

(h) To buy, sell, surrender, assign, exercise options or otherwise deal in annuity contracts.
(i) To make settlements and compromises on such terms as it in its sole discretion may deem wise, without the necessity of obtaining any court approval.
Sec. 14. (a) All expenses of the Trustee, including taxes, if any, incurred in connection with this fund shall be paid from the fund.

(b) The Trustee and the individuals composing the Trustee shall be fully protected, indemnified, and saved harmless by the Borough from any liabilities, loss or damage incurred in connection with the administration of the fund, other than for willful misconduct.
Sec. 15. (a) The Borough does not guarantee any of the benefits provided for by this plan and shall not be responsible for the payment of any benefit provided hereunder.

(b) This plan may be amended, modified or terminated in whole or in part by the Borough at any time and from time to time.
(c) In the event of termination of the plan, the net present value of all expenses and proportional adjustments to reflect profits, losses and reallocations of the fund at the time of termination, such policeman shall be entitled to receive the amounts then allocated to him, subject to any future proportional adjustments for expenses and fund

profits, losses and reallocations and subject to forfeiture for separation from the police force for reasons other than retirement, permanent disability or death as provided in section 11 hereof. Payment of such amounts shall be made upon retirement, permanent disability or death as hereinafter provided.
(d) None of the benefits provided for herein shall be subject to anticipation in any manner whatsoever.
Sec. 16. All ordinances, or resolutions, or parts of ordinances, or resolutions, conflicting herewith, are hereby superseded and repealed.

modernizing the heating plant at the high school, taken from current funds last year.

Although it did not consider alternate bids submitted on such items as front entrance drive, flagstone terraces in front of classrooms, north blacktop area to connect with a new play area at the rear, and classroom reading corners with seats and shelves, the Board decided to meet again on September 11 to see if a stage at the end of the multipurpose room could possibly be included somehow by adjusting current funds to cover it in the original construction. The additional cost would be \$9800. Another alternate, a kitchen, might also be constructed for another \$7623 if done within a year of the rest of the building, Architect Howell-Lewis Shay estimated from bids received.

J. S. Cornell and Son of Philadelphia were low bidders on the general contract with their quotation of \$159,825 for the base bid and \$43,024 for the multipurpose room. American Heating and Ventilating Company's bid on hot air heating was low at \$28,500 base, plus \$1500 for the multipurpose area. Jerry R. Smith of Drexel Hill received acceptance of his low plumbing bids of \$28,569 and \$1466. Bates Brothers of Lansdowne were low electrical bidders at \$29,000 for the base unit and \$3810 multipurpose. David and Reed Larchmont, were granted the transformer work.

Elementary, High Schools Open Thursday Morning

from 1 to 3:15 p.m. In the high school the hours will be from 8:45 to 12:15 in the morning and 12:55 to 3:20 in the afternoon.

As heretofore, the high school cafeteria will serve nutritious lunches at a reasonable price, which will be available to all pupils who do not have time to go home for lunch. The school, however, feels it would be better for the children to get away from school during the noon hour and go home for the lunch if and when such a plan can be arranged. The price of the full Federal lunch will be 30 cents.

On the first day of school each child will be given a letter from the school to the parents, covering a number of items of mutual interest including the school calendar for the year and plans for various special classes and health instruction.

During the early part of next week the teachers will be meeting in workshop conferences and also preparing their rooms for the receiving of children on Thursday. Special attention is being placed upon the work of the various committees of the faculty.

Final registration for the new school year must be completed today. Entrance for kindergarten is available to children born prior to January 31, 1949 and admission to first grade is available to children born prior to January 31, 1948. All registration must be completed in the School District office in the high school building and not in the classrooms.

Where there have been changes in the schools which any elementary children will attend, whether it be Rutgers or College Avenue, notices of the changes have gone out to parents. Cards have been sent out to all parents of kindergarten children informing them which session and school their children are to attend.

Parents are urged to mark and label children's clothing, so that articles that are lost or mislaid may be promptly returned to the owners. At the end of each year, many unclaimed articles are left at the school, which might have been returned if they had been properly labeled and marked with the children's names.

Dr. J. A. Jones to Lead Polio Panel

Woman's Mothers Clubs Co-Sponsors of Facts Giving Meeting

A meeting on the prevention and treatment of polio will be held at 8 p.m. next Thursday evening, September 17, under the general auspices of the Swarthmore Woman's Club and the Mother's Club, at the Woman's Clubhouse, 118 Park avenue.

Dr. J. Albright Jones, Borough Health Officer and chairman of the Medical Advisory Committee of the Delaware County Chapter, National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis, will be in charge of the meeting and discuss the general picture of polio with comments on the use of globulin.

Dr. Jones is Assistant Professor of Pediatrics, University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Medicine, and Chief of Pediatrics, Philadelphia General Hospital and Taylor Hospital.

Also featured on the program will be Dr. Burton Chance, Jr., of Philadelphia, Orthopedic Consultant for the Delaware County Chapter and the five-county area for the National Foundation — Montgomery, Philadelphia, Bucks, Camden and Delaware. As director of all the physiotherapy and follow-up care for the Foundation, Dr. Chance will talk primarily about his work and accomplishments. He is on the staff of Children's Hospital in Philadelphia, the University of Pennsylvania and other institutions.

A film in color, "Facts Fight Fear," will be presented by Dr. Mary L. McKinley, executive director. (Continued on Page 8)

School Enrollment Up 101 Since June

Teachers Hear Fulbright Fellow Dr. Enders on Asia

Swarthmore Schools opened on schedule Thursday morning with all the teaching staff on duty and with all room space occupied by classes. Even the former playroom at Rutgers school has been converted into a classroom for the sixth grade, taught by Myrtle McCall.

The elementary school with an enrollment of 571 shows a rise of 70 over one year ago. In the high school, an opening enrollment of 529 is a gain of 48 over a year ago. The total enrollment of 1106 is a summertime increase of just 101 over last June.

In the elementary schools, the largest grades are the kindergarten with 94, and the fifth grade with 101. The largest classes of the high school are the ninth and tenth grades with 110 each. The senior class registration is 64 members.

Eight new staff members are beginning their work in Swarthmore this week: Thomas A. Boyle, Elementary School Principal; Bettejo Goodall, Vocal Music Supervisor; Alice Hornaday, First Grade Rutgers; Mrs. LeVina Hurst, Second Grade College; Mrs. Jean Parrish, Third and Fourth Grade College; Mrs. Roxanna Jackson, Fourth Grade Rutgers; Joyzelle Peck, Guidance Counselor; and Mrs. Grace Warbeth, Cafeteria Manager. These eight added to the 10 newest members totals 18 or about one-third of the staff new to Swarthmore in the last two years, a large turn-over.

The teachers returned Tuesday for workshop conferences. The morning conferences for new staff and for the entire staff were presided over by Frank R. Morey, Supervising Principal. Dr. Robert K. Enders of Swarthmore College, who spent last year as a Fulbright Fellow in Pakistan, addressed the faculty on the educational social and political trends in Asia, as he observed them at first hand. Professor Samuel T. Carpenter, Secretary of the School Board, brought a message of greeting from that body. Henry F. Hofmann, president of the Teachers Association, conducted a brief general meeting.

At noon, the entire school staff of 65, had luncheon at the Inglenook, at which time they greeted Mary S. Spiller, the new School Board member as the guest of honor. After luncheon, William Bush, high school principal, had a planning conference with the high school teachers and Thomas Eglye, elementary school principal had a meeting.

The Club will be a busy spot from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. when entry exhibits will be received but busier still in the afternoon as all with an eye for beauty visit the Show. 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

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



BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE NO. 859

An Ordinance providing for the construction of an 8" vitrified terra cotta pipe sewer in Michigan Avenue and providing for the assessment and collection of the entire costs and expenses thereof from the owners of property abutting upon each side of Michigan Avenue, including properties outside the Borough limits, equally by the foot-front rule.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1. An 8" vitrified terra cotta pipe sewer shall be constructed in the bed of Michigan Avenue, commencing at a man-hole approximately 1800 feet northeast of Fairview Road and extending thence northwesterly 486.2 feet to a manhole to be constructed in the bed of Michigan Avenue at said point, as more particularly shown on a plan thereof prepared by G. D. Houtman, Borough Engineer, dated August 12, 1953, and in accordance with Borough specifications on file in the office of the Borough Secretary. Said sewer shall include all necessary manholes, Y-branches, and accessories for house connections.

Section 2. Said sewer shall be for the benefit of properties on both sides of said avenue, including properties in Ridley Township, abutting thereon. All said abutting and accessible properties are hereby permitted to use said sewer upon payment of the customary fees for permits. Said sewer shall become part of the public sewer system of the Borough of Swarthmore.

Section 3. The proper Borough officers are hereby authorized to enter into such contract or contracts as may be required for the construction of said sewer and accessories in accordance with law, and all contracts heretofore signed and all action of the said officers heretofore taken are hereby ratified and confirmed. There is hereby appropriated, out of the funds of the Borough available for such purpose, an amount sufficient to cover said contract or contracts.

Section 4. Upon the completion of the work, and the ascertainment of the entire cost thereof, including advertising, surveying and engineering and legal services, assessment by the foot-front rule shall be made as provided by law, upon all assessable prop-

erties, including properties in Ridley Township, abutting Michigan Avenue, for the entire cost thereof, actually, according to the foot frontage of such assessable abutting properties; and due notice of such assessments shall be given the owners of such assessable properties.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall not be paid within thirty days after completion of the work, interest shall be added at the rate of 6% per annum from the date of completion, and, if not paid within five months after such completion, the Borough Solicitor shall cause liens to be filed against the various properties in front of which said sewer has been constructed, for the respective amounts of such assessments, together with lawful interest from date of completion, together with an attorney's commission, and 6% penalty, as allowed by law. The Borough reserves the right to enforce collection from the owners of such abutting properties by such additional lawful methods as the Borough Council may subsequently prescribe.

Dr. Carpenter said he had asked Borough police to apprehend anyone who by illegal speeds or unprotected wheels constituted extra threat to life and limb. He also sought aid from the press in securing maximum safety precautions from vehicle operators.

Although one of Swarthmore's oldest inspection stations found no specific allusion to presence of fenders on its official inspection requirement list, a local police officer said the State Vehicle Code requires that vehicles be equipped as manufacturer in cases of reconstructed automobiles. Section 1009 of the Code limits vehicles to a maximum speed of 15 miles per hour while passing through recess periods and during times when pupils are going to and from school. The officer said the law is similarly construed in connection with school crossing signs such as appear on Chester road 100 feet north and south of College Avenue intersection, on Swarthmore avenue near Elm and Princeton, on Yale near Rutgers. The Borough restricts normal speed limit to 25 miles per hour even on that portion of State Highway 330 which journeys through the town under the guise of tree bordered Chester road.



CARPENTER ASKS ARREST OF SPEEDING PARENTS, FENDERLESS HOT RODS

He said several hot rodders apparently put fenders on their vehicles to pass state inspection and afterward removed them. He also doubted the legality of a very small fender used on one local lad's car which recently "cornered him." Others at the meeting also seemed familiar with the car mentioned.

Dr. Carpenter said he had asked Borough police to apprehend anyone who by illegal speeds or unprotected wheels constituted extra threat to life and limb. He also sought aid from the press in securing maximum safety precautions from vehicle operators.

Although one of Swarthmore's oldest inspection stations found no specific allusion to presence of fenders on its official inspection requirement list, a local police officer said the State Vehicle Code requires that vehicles be equipped as manufacturer except in cases of reconstructed automobiles. Section 1002 of the Code limits vehicles to a maximum speed of 15 miles per hour while passing a school building during recess periods and times when pupils are going to and from school. The officer said the law is similarly construed in connection with school crossing signs such as appear on Chester road 100 feet north and south of College avenue intersection, on Swarthmore avenue near Elm and Princeton, on Yale near Rutgers. The Borough restricts normal speed limit to 25 miles per hour even on that portion of State Highway 320 which journeys through the town under the guise of tree bowered Chertney road.

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
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Com. Health Society Summer Recess Ends

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

He was on the staff of St. Paul's School in Tokyo and established and edited the news magazine, "Japan Missions." He and his wife and two small children are in Reading, on an extended furlough.

New Grade School Will Not Be Stageless

Directors See Complete All-Purpose Room As Best Buy

After juggling building figures and features back and forth for an hour Friday evening Swarthmore's five-member School Board unanimously authorized an additional \$8,739 expenditure for a front entrance drive and a stage end to the multi-purpose room which along with seven classrooms and administration areas it had decided September 2 to build on the present Rutgers Avenue Elementary School at a construction cost of \$307,269. The new figure of \$316,008, with architect and legal fees, contingency allowance and furniture reaches a grand total of \$351,508 for the complete project, including \$11,775 to replace inadequate electrical transformers in the High School.

By dropping 11 folding tables from the multi-purpose room plan at a saving of \$4509 and \$400 worth of filters from the heating contract the Board gleaned \$3945 for the safety, and bad-weather convenience of a circular main entrance driveway plus a \$1066 cut in the previous week's estimate of \$317,074 for merely including the stage in the original job. Neither tables nor filters seemed a necessity and both could be added at any time at no premium. It was also noted the \$4000 allotted for furniture would not have to be spent until the building was ready for use in the next school year. A probable change to a smoother type of blacktop than at first planned for play areas could result in a saving of another \$500 to \$700, Architect Howell Lewis Shay, Jr. said.

With current resident elementary enrollment standing at 571, only a couple of pupils below the figure predicted for this year by a survey conducted under School Board direction two years ago, the Board concurred in Architect Shay's recommendation to proceed with such phases of the proposed building as would grant the

greatest utilization and effect the maximum ultimate saving. Thus the platform was given priority over a kitchen which would have cost \$7,623 unequipped, and which, it was mentioned, could be added at any time, possibly through lunches in the multi-purpose room without a kitchen, it was stated, while a temporary wall at the end of an unfinished multi-purpose room would not only mar the appearance of the building and limit its use in the school's program but would be a sheer waste and contribute to the considerably higher cost of adding the stage at a later date. Extra cost for delayed stage construction might run \$3000 it was estimated. The formation was converted into a classroom this fall when no other space could be found to accommodate the additional class which an increase of 70 elementary pupils over last fall's enrollment made necessary. Even so it was possible to divide the record breaking fifth grade, totaling 101 pupils, into only three classes.

Tax Rise Called Inevitable

Finance Officer Donald P. Jones agreed with his colleagues on the Board as to what should be built now and expressed a belief that the School District had sufficient financial resources to build it, despite the fact that a mailed communication from the School office had arrived at his home with postage due that week. However, he pointed out that the \$351,508 project would no doubt require a raise in taxes if Swarthmore is restricted third class—possibly next year. Former estimates of a

probable two or three mill increase two or three years in the future to carry increased operational costs were thus expanded by the possibility of another mill, and that maybe next year.

Board President Carroll P. Streeter replied that a tax rise was certain in any event and he expected to participate in paying it. "If the Board agrees the items are needed and can manage them with reasonable degree of safety within this budget year it should do so," he stated. "If it requires a mill more to build what is needed I feel, as a taxpayer as well as a Board member, it is justified." Streeter concluded. The complete Board voted favorably on the deciding motion made by Mr. Jones.

A motion to proceed immediately with transformer changes in the high school was passed in order that this work might be completed before peak loads further endanger the old set-up at the end of next month.

At the request of Solicitor A. David Speers the Board authorized payment of bills of Freas B. Snyder at \$125 for appraising land for the Rutgers addition, \$45 to Title Abstract Company of Pennsylvania for title search, and authorized purchase of title insurance on the land at a cost of \$130.

High School Principal William Bush invited Board members to a dinner on October 12 to hear the local faculty's presentation of pre-

liminary area evaluations of the high school, to a dinner for visiting evaluators on the 19th, and to a report session of the latter on the 22nd. This reappraisal, occurring every 10 years, is necessary to maintain an accredited status for college entrance and to gain suggestions for improvement it was explained.

At 9:30 the Board adjourned until September 30.

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1st Arthritic Clinic In Del. Co. Opens Wed.

The first arthritic clinic in Delaware County will be opened at Fitzgerald Mercy Hospital, Darby, at a ceremony at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, September 22.

Space for the clinic, which will be open every Wednesday from 1 to 3 p.m., is being provided through the hospital's \$3,000,000 expansion and improvement program. The clinic is sponsored by the Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation. The Federated Women's Clubs of Delaware County raised the money to help establish the clinic.

New Term Begins Thursday With 920 Students Enrolled

Courtney Smith made his first appearance to the student body in his role as president of Swarthmore College at 7:30 p.m. last night when he addressed the College in Clothier Memorial Hall. The 1953-54 term opened officially yesterday morning, with an enrollment of 911 students, only a few less than last year when there were 920 students.

The freshman class which arrived on Monday for a three day orientation program numbers 241 eager scholars from 30 states and 14 foreign countries, which include Arabia, Austrig, China, Canada, Germany, Jerusalem, Korea, Lebanon, Nigeria, Thailand and South Africa. There are 128 men as against 113 women in the freshman class.

Among the new students will be 21 men and 12 women transfers from institutions including Harvard; the Universities of Maryland, Chicago, Rochester and California; Bucknell, Drew, The Philippine Women's University, and Cologne University of Germany.

For Conversation Only?

Gentlemen:

I have read with great interest the boxed page one article in this week's issue in connection with Sam Carpenter's School Board Vehicular Traffic Report. It seems that the general content of the report has "reared its ugly head" far too many times for too long a period with nothing happening but conversation.

Do we, or must we Swarthmoreans wait until a child is killed, or there is another Swarthmore avenue accident before something constructive is done?

Driving habits of both natives and those just passing through are a disgrace. Although "fining mills" are generally abhorred, the logical solution would seem to be either regulation or regular periodic strict enforcement of all traffic, parking, driving regulations regardless of who might be hurt. Either enforce or take down all STOP signs, Speed limit signs, and blinking traffic signals rather than lull the careful drivers into a false sense of security. In fairness post each end of Chester Road as to the existence of strict traffic enforcement, (and mean it), and patrol the highway regularly and consistently. Certainly some traffic will be diverted for which there would be no regret, there might be some adverse publicity that I think for the safety of our children and families we can take, and undoubtedly the fines could be used for a very useful purpose.

Trying to cross Chester Road at anytime is a major problem for child or adult. If one is unfortunate enough to have a driveway leading into Chester road he can practically sell his automobile. Speed limit here doesn't appear to mean anything. Frequently I have seen children after waiting more than a reasonable period, finally dash across in desperation, sort of playing tag with the automobiles and trucks. The driver's slogan on Chester Road, and less frequently Yale avenue, is "get out of the way, here I come."

On South Chester Road there is generally a steady stream of traffic, first one way, then the other as first the Yale avenue light changes and just about as that traffic clears a given point the traffic from the Fairview road light arrives, thereby generally keeping at least one steady traffic stream across intermediate crossings.

Speed limit or white traffic lines on Chester road are meaningless. Drive on Chester road at the legal limit, 25 miles per hour, and you will have almost a constant blowing of horns behind you, and receive more than black and ugly looks as trucks, trailers and even pleasure cars finally "barrel" around you, naturally bucking

traffic in the other lane. It is nothing when driving on Chester road to suddenly see a vehicle come at you in your lane from the opposite direction generally daring you not to give way. It appears to be a new game without rules or officials. There is little difference as to time of day. So-called quiet off-peak periods, rushing to get to work, rushing to return home, or just plain rushing.

Disregard of the Golden Rule while driving, although most common on Yale avenue and Chester road is not the exclusive property of the transient visitors but adherence could be practiced more diligently by all of us natives.

I repeat, what kind of a catastrophe must we have to Swarthmore children, tax-payers, or visitors before we do something about it regardless of how distasteful or unpleasant our action might be.

Thanks to Sam Carpenter for starting the ball rolling — may he have courage to keep it moving.

For Conversation Only?

Gentlemen:

I have read with great interest the boxed page one article in this week's issue in connection with Sam Carpenter's School Board Vehicular Traffic Report. It seems that the general content of this report has "reared its ugly head" far too many times for too long a period with nothing happening but conversation.

Do we, or must we Swarthmoreans wait until a child is killed, or there is another Swarthmore avenue accident before something constructive is done?

Driving habits of both natives and those just passing through are a disgrace. Although "fining mills" are generally abhorred the logical solution would seem to be either regular, or regular periodic strict enforcement of all traffic, parking, driving regulations regardless of who might be hurt. Either enforce or take down all STOP signs, Speed limit signs, and blinking traffic signals rather than lull the careful drivers into a false sense of security. In fairness post each end of Chester Road as to the existence of strict traffic enforcement. (and mean it), and patrol the highway regularly and consistently. Certainly some traffic will be diverted for which there would be no regret, there might be some adverse publicity that I think for the safety of our children and families we can take, and undoubtedly the fines could be used for a very useful purpose.

Trying to cross Chester Road at anytime is a major problem for child or adult. If one is unfortunate enough to have a driveway leading into Chester road he can practically sell his automobile. Speed limit here doesn't appear to mean anything. Frequently I have seen children after waiting more than a reasonable period finally dash across in desperation, sort of playing tag with the automobiles and trucks. The driver's slogan on Chester Road, and less frequently Yale avenue, is "get out of the way, here I come."

On South Chester Road there is generally a steady stream of traffic, first one way, then the other as first the Yale avenue light changes and just about as that traffic clears a given point the traffic from the Fairview road light arrives, thereby generally keeping at least one steady traffic stream across intermediate crossings.

Speed limit or white traffic lines on Chester road are meaningless. Drive on Chester road at the legal limit, 25 miles per hour, and you will have almost a constant blowing of horns behind you, and receive more than black and ugly looks as trucks, trailers and even pleasure cars finally "barrel" around you, naturally bucking

traffic in the other lane. It is nothing when driving on Chester road to suddenly see a vehicle come at you in your lane from the opposite direction generally daring you not to give way. It appears to be a new game, without rules or officials. There is little difference as to time of day. So-called quiet off-peak periods, rushing to get to work, rushing to return home, or just plain rushing.

Disregard of the Golden Rule while driving, although most common on Yale avenue and Chester road is not the exclusive property of the transient visitors but adherence could be practiced more diligently by all of us natives.

I repeat, what kind of a catastrophe must we have to Swarthmore children, tax-payers, or visitors before we do something about it regardless of how distasteful or unpleasant our action might be

Thanks to Sam Carpenter for starting the ball rolling — may he have courage to keep it moving.




