## Public Hearing Apparently 100% for Pool— But Many Close Neighbors Want It Elsewhere

Residents who filled the high school auditorium for Borough Council's public hearing on the proposed Swarthmore Swim Club pool Wednesday evening represented the 433-Swarthmore-family Club membership and an apparently well-organized group of residents of the immediate neighborhood who approved the pool but actively opposed the chosen site.

Called to the platform, where sat Councilmen, Burgess and Borough Solicitor, Frederick Van Urk, president of the Swim Club, traced the six-year-old movement of local residents toward a community swimming pool. Van Urk said, whereas the 1948 project to build a pool on the tract at Riverview avenue and the railroad had fallen short of the required membership, the movement revitalized last September.

Has resulted in a current list of paid subscribers totaling 454, including 21 non-residents of the borough who have been accepted on a preferred basis of having children in Swarthmore schools. Van Urk stated the club's board of directors had closed the membership campaign at this point in order that room might permit pool area residents, not now members, to join without exceeding the 500-family limit. Van Urk said the Swim Club's only aim is to do all the good it can do. The club feels benefits to be derived by Swarthmore families from such summer recreation are great, and that the many-fold objectives along this line, such as convenience of a pool in the home community providing fun and relaxation for the entire family, become more and more worthwhile.

He described the proposed pool as L-shaped, with a diving area at the toe roped off from the 42-foot wide, six-lane general swim area in the upright of the L. He said the pool's length would be 108 or 150 feet according to bids being received for its construction. Locker rooms would be as prescribed by State requirements and would be placed at the railroad side of the pool which would be at the far rear of the plot, at a distance of 476 feet from Riverview avenue and over 300 feet from the nearest house. An original parking area to accommodate 58 cars is deemed more than adequate following studies of attendance at similar nearby pools. However, the parking area can easily be extended if needed to provide space for another 50 to 100 cars, the spokesman said.

Mr. Van Urk read letters from residents whose homes, 150 feet distant from a neighboring pool, had been purchased because of the pool whose location they consider an advantage rather than a detriment, and which they find is an asset to the property value.

He said the club, definitely restricted by its non-profit corporation charter granted by the Delaware County Court last week, would operate no refreshment concession. If refreshments were desired by members they would be arranged by the pool manager as a pool operation, at cost and as a convenience to swimmers.

Considering some Borough residents labored under misapprehension as to the number of people who would use the pool at any one time, Van Urk reported a survey of the Aronimink and Marple-Newtown pools revealed 279 as the peak number at the former (which averages 850 dues-paying families annually), and 115 at the latter which has a 400-family membership.

Traffic could be controlled by requiring members to use the road along the railroad as the only access to the pool, said Van Urk. Richard Enion, of Riverview

## Ludlow Clayden Dies, Retired Mgr. Sun Lab

### Service Held Monday for Park Avenue Resident

A. Ludlow Clayden, former head of Sun Oil Company's Automotive Laboratory at Marcus Hook, died Tuesday, February 23, in Halifax Hospital, Daytona Beach, Fla.

An authority on fuels and internal combustion engines, Mr. Clayden retired last July after 31 years with Sun Oil Company.

Born in Bath England, in 1883, Mr. Clayden studied mechanical and electrical engineering at Bristol University in Bristol, England. In England he was associated with Daimler Motor Company, affiliated with various trade publications for eight years, and worked as consulting engineer for Wright-Martin Aircraft Corporation in Europe. Immediately prior to joining Sun he was general consultant to the United States Cartridge Company in Lowell, Mass.

He was a member of the Society of Automotive Engineers, Coordinating Research Council, and American Society for Testing Materials.

Mr. Clayden, who made his home at 304 Park avenue, is survived by his wife, the former Henrietta Tredwell, and a daughter, Mrs. Lawrence Traynor, wife of Cmdr. Traynor, U.S.N.

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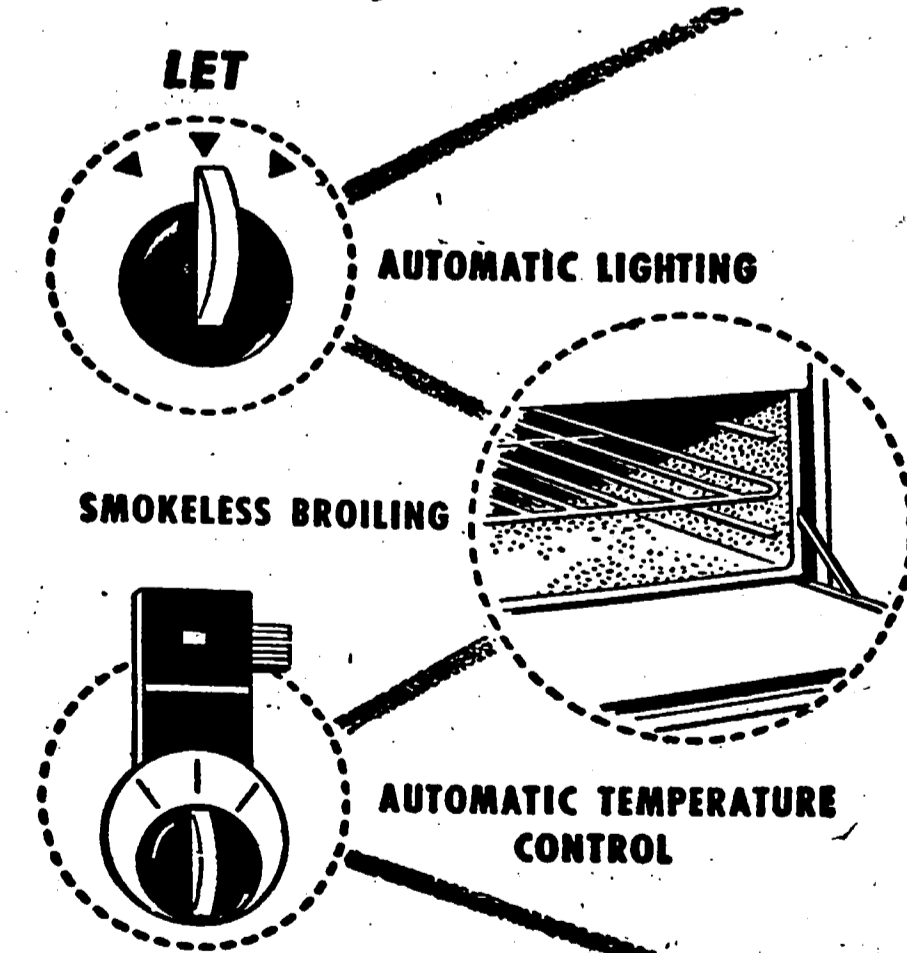

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### Public Hearing For Swimming Pool

(Continued from Page 1)

avenue, a worker for the pool six years ago and a member of the present club, cited considerable opposition existed in the River-view avenue, Dogwood and Forest lanes area, where he estimated 85 per cent of homes opposed the pool on the proposed neighboring site. Enlon said the opposition feared real estate values would decrease, tax revenue would be cut, by lower assessments, privacy encroached upon, and children of the area endangered by increased traffic if a pool were constructed on the Riverview plot.

Brinton Liddell, Wesley J. Simon, Mrs. Charles R. Innis, Jr., Robert H. Shipman, Norman Anderson, C. G. Compton, Edward Coletti were other Riverview avenue residents who enlarged upon the Enlon theme. Anderson saw the "peace and quiet of suburban country living" for which he came to Swarthmore converted to the "noise and squalor of the beach at Atlantic City" with parking, noise and hot dogs creating a condition worse than the circus "since the circus comes for a few days and leaves while a pool remains."

Mrs. Innis, of Riverview road, expressed herself as against placing a pool in an established residential area where people oppose it. "We could probably all live without the pool, but could we live with it?" she questioned, adding that the hazard of nearby train tracks should turn any thinking parent against the site.

Mrs. Walter Dickinson, of Forest lane; Mrs. D. W. R. Morgan, Jr., and John Espenshade, of Dogwood lane; Charles Lukens, of Strath Haven avenue; Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Gilbert, of Meadow lane; Mrs. George Allen, Mrs. Enlon, and Robert Kamp, of Riverview avenue, spoke variously regarding maintenance of the barricade currently closing the railroad end of Riverview avenue, possible pool traffic along with ball players' parking along the access street, and features of the Emmons pool formerly on Guernsey road.

Richard Willis, of Dogwood lane, said he favored the pool at the proposed site and believes it would increase the value of nearby property.

Mrs. Philip Jacob, of Swarthmore avenue, mentioned the baseball noise across Riverview avenue from the pool site had not prevented people from buying homes there. It has been considered a good community enterprise and has established the section as a sort of recreational area, she continued.

Alfred Marsh, of Columbia avenue, whose living room would be within viewing distance of the pool, stated he felt it "most necessary that Swarthmore not miss the boat again in giving its children and adults proper recreation here."

Herman Bloom, also of Columbia avenue, stated happiness of children should be paramount and such investment be of greater consideration than any possible property depreciation.

John Seybold, of Amherst avenue, chairman of the site committee during the 1948 pool project, reviewed reasons for eliminating several other sites then available, in favor of the Riverview plot. One, across Baltimore pike, and another at Fairview road were considered too hazardous for children traveling to and from the pool. A piece of college ground proved unobtainable. The 4 1/2-acre Riverview site was considered best for the purpose because it is centrally located yet virtually outside the borough with three of its boundaries bordering other communities, and it provides minimum hazard.

George Wagner, of Cedar lane, bespoke the "comforting" noise of Riverview avenue recreation, experienced while a resident of Elinor West avenue.

Harlan Jessup, of Haverford avenue, cited the many times

within the past 50 years when new houses replacing open fields cut off the view of existing residences, and new people increasingly encroached on the "old-timers' privacy. Jessup reminded the audience that the pool would operate only three to four months a year and buildings would be one-story and small—while the kind of homes which might otherwise be built on such a site, bordering railroad tracks and with limited access, would be used year around and might depreciate surroundings more than a pool would. Jessup further suggested Council seek an automatic gate at the Swarthmore avenue crossing of the railroad, to overcome a safety hazard which exists even without pool traffic.

Valentine Fine said, "Everyone distrusts change," adding that if he'd been asked, he would have preferred to keep the pastureland on which his Swarthmore avenue property abutted when he moved to Swarthmore in 1946.

Charles H. Brooks, Jr., of Forest lane, said, "Since the opposition, though most vocal, favors a pool but on another site, I propose the opposition organize a research committee and secure a better site."

Robert Boulter, of Riverview avenue, expressed confidence in Council to conduct an adequate survey on noise and traffic before arriving at any decision on the pool. He also said it would be forgetting and endangering the tradition of community and country if the minority opinion and individual's rights were not given every consideration.

Heinz Heinemann, of Dickinson avenue, objected to Boulter's stand on "democratic rights" in this instance. Heinemann declared the issue was not political, "not whether we should locate a pool off Riverview avenue, but should

In closing the 2 1/2-hour session Council President Thomas Hopper said no decision would be made that night. He said Council would study the problem, possibly in a private meeting. It will not be possible to please everyone but some decision must be made, Hopper said, on the twin problems: "Is the pool permitted under the zoning ordinance and, if so, is it a serious hazard?"

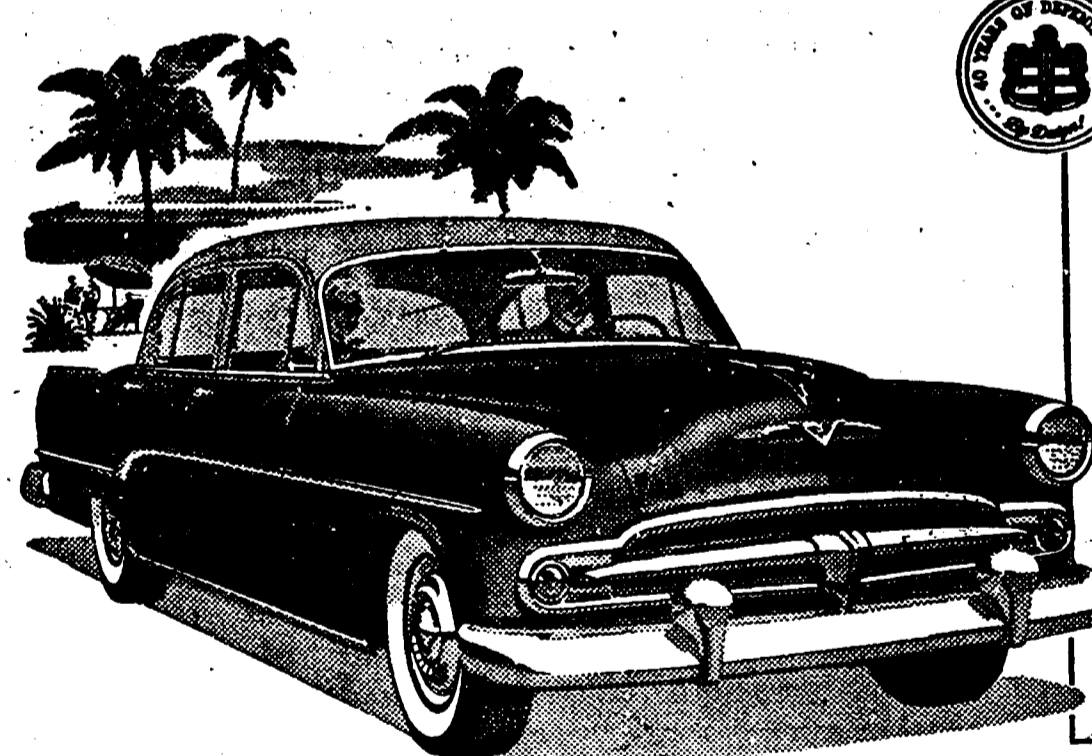

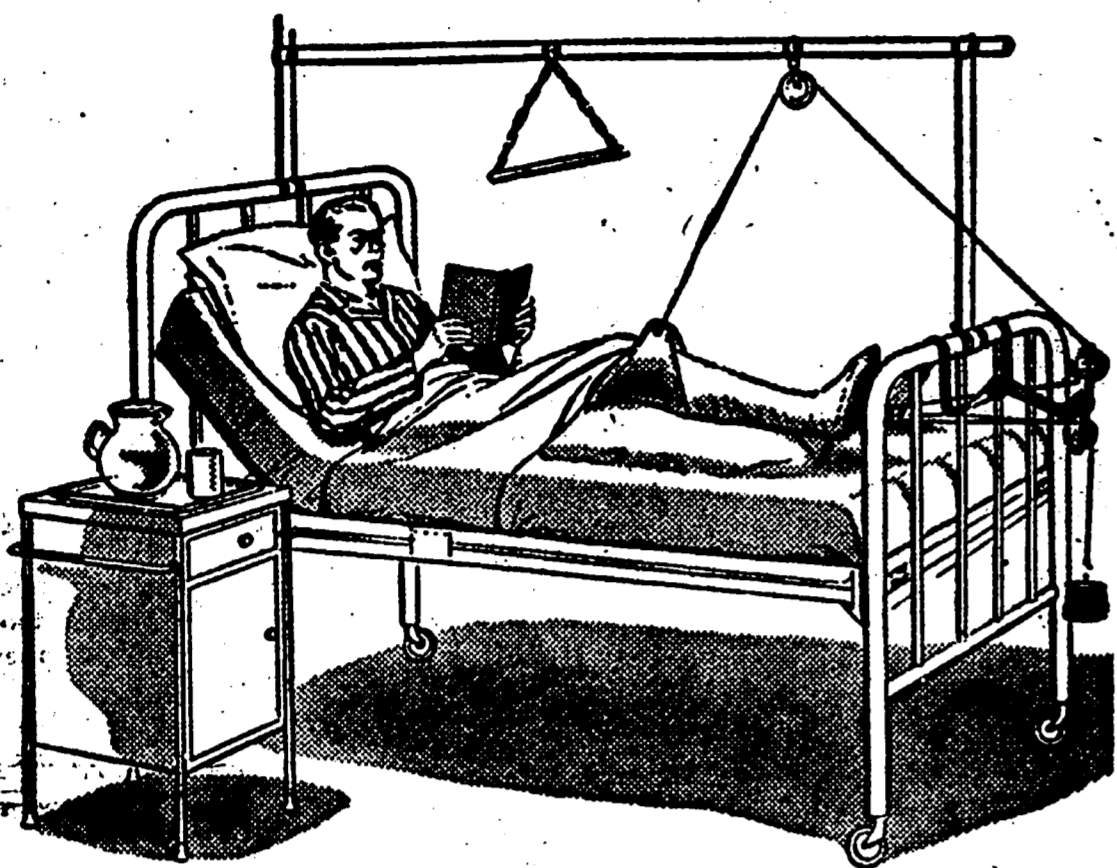

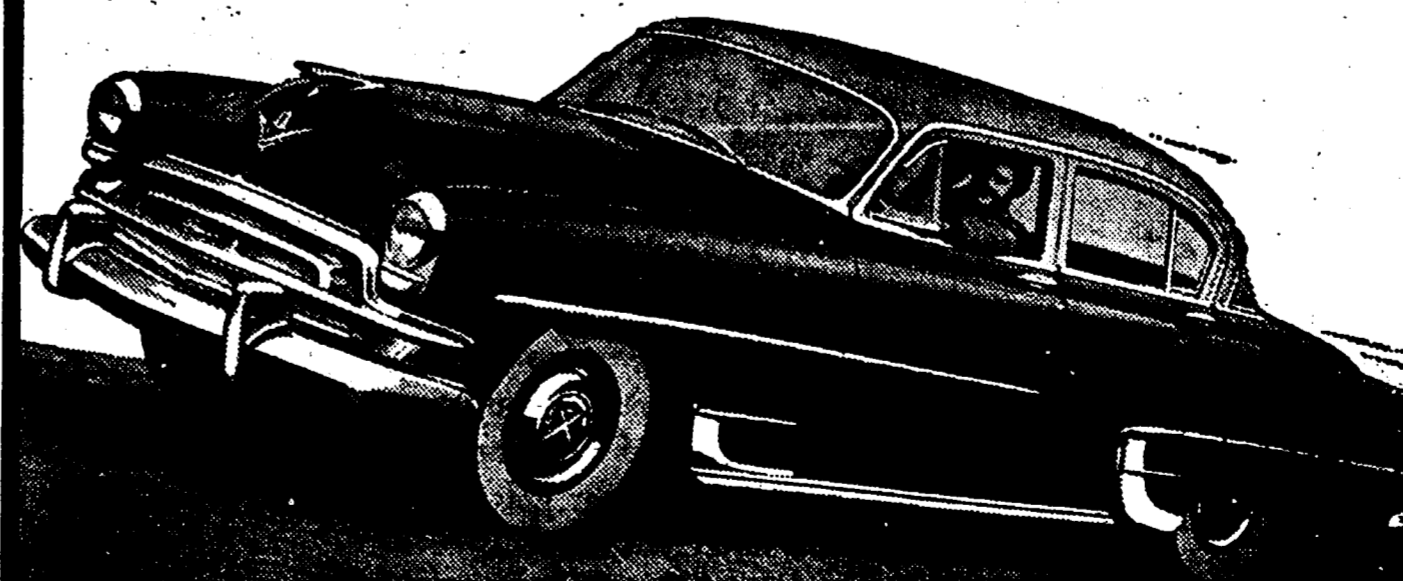

**School Gets Nest Egg For Visual Education Aids**

Nell Wiseman's fifth grade College Avenue School mothers' group, assigned whatever balance is left in its treasury at the end of the school year, to start an Elementary School Visual Aids Fund to be administered by Elementary Principal Thomas A. Boyle. Such a fund could give valuable supplement to the school's film strip and slide library or fill in at other points to the advantage of all local elementary students, and it is the group's hope that other grades might like to add contributions for this purpose.

In line with a request made at the last Mothers' Council meeting for any suggestions by grade groups on possible conference improvement, the group favored: Preparation of a brochure for parents of new pupils explaining school procedures including operation of the conference system of reporting, perhaps complemented by an early fall meeting for parents of all new pupils at which parents could be briefed on what to expect from the school and could have any individual questions answered.

A printed agenda or list of topics and points to be discussed at a conference, to assist teacher and parent in covering important information within the conference time limit, and to provide something for the mother to take home to the father.

The teacher taking the initiative in terminating a conference by indicating when the time has expired.

A return to some sort of achievement report at the middle conference each year.

Approving the conference system in general, the group felt any existent faults are with techniques of parents and teachers.

The group sent back its approval of the Elementary Open House, to the Mothers' Council, stating it would furthermore like to see the project extended to give more information about

classroom procedure, possibly a brief resume by the teacher. The importance of retaining the practice of separate nights for the College Avenue School open house and the Rutgers Avenue one was stressed.

Discussing points made in the recently published letter of the Twelfth Grade Parents' Group to the School Board, the Fifth Grade Mothers suggested a Wednesday afternoon educational program for students be held during the next conference period, showing the part honesty plays in good citizenship, why laws should be obeyed and possibly what happens when they are disregarded. It was also suggested that parents try to keep their children away from the village shops except for specific errands.

Further suggestions included that the Home and School Association send a letter to parents stating the dishonesty problem, asking for home emphasis on honesty, and encouraging discussion of the subject at the next Home and School session. One mother thought that although parents tried to teach moral aspects of honesty some might have neglected to caution against the "smart-aleck" attitude of stealing as a game, or proof of cleverness, particularly as a gang pastime. There was general agreement that parents should be promptly informed when a child transgresses.

The group also decided to ask the Home and School to make available to parents accident insurance for children on school property or on school trips, other than sports coverage.

**BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE No. 366**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE No. 361, APPROVED OCTOBER 17, 1954, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCE No. 361, APPROVED DECEMBER 7, 1953, BY CHANGING THE AMOUNT OF FEE AND FEES, INSPECTION CHARGES, AND CHARGES TO BE MADE FOR RESTORING THE SURFACE OF STREETS AND SIDEWALKS WHERE AUTORIZED EXCAVATIONS ARE TO BE MADE THEREON.

The Council of the Borough of Swarthmore DOES ORDAIN: Section 1. Subsection (c) of Section 8 of Ordinance No. 361, approved October 17, 1954, is hereby repealed and amended to read as follows: (c) Where public service or utility companies, or their agents or other applicants are permitted to do the work of restoring the surface of the street and/or sidewalk, or any part thereof, in lieu of paying the estimated charge or charges set forth in (1), (2) and (3) of subparagraph (b), upon suitably securing the Borough against the consequences of any neglect or improper doing of such work, each such applicant shall nevertheless pay the Borough in addition to the permit fees prescribed in the first paragraph of subparagraph (b), the sum of \$1.00 per square yard to cover the cost of necessary Borough inspection and supervision by the proper Borough officers.

Section 2. Except as herein supplemented, Ordinance No. 361, and amending Ordinance No. 361 are hereby re-enacted and approved. PASSED this 8th day of March, 1954.

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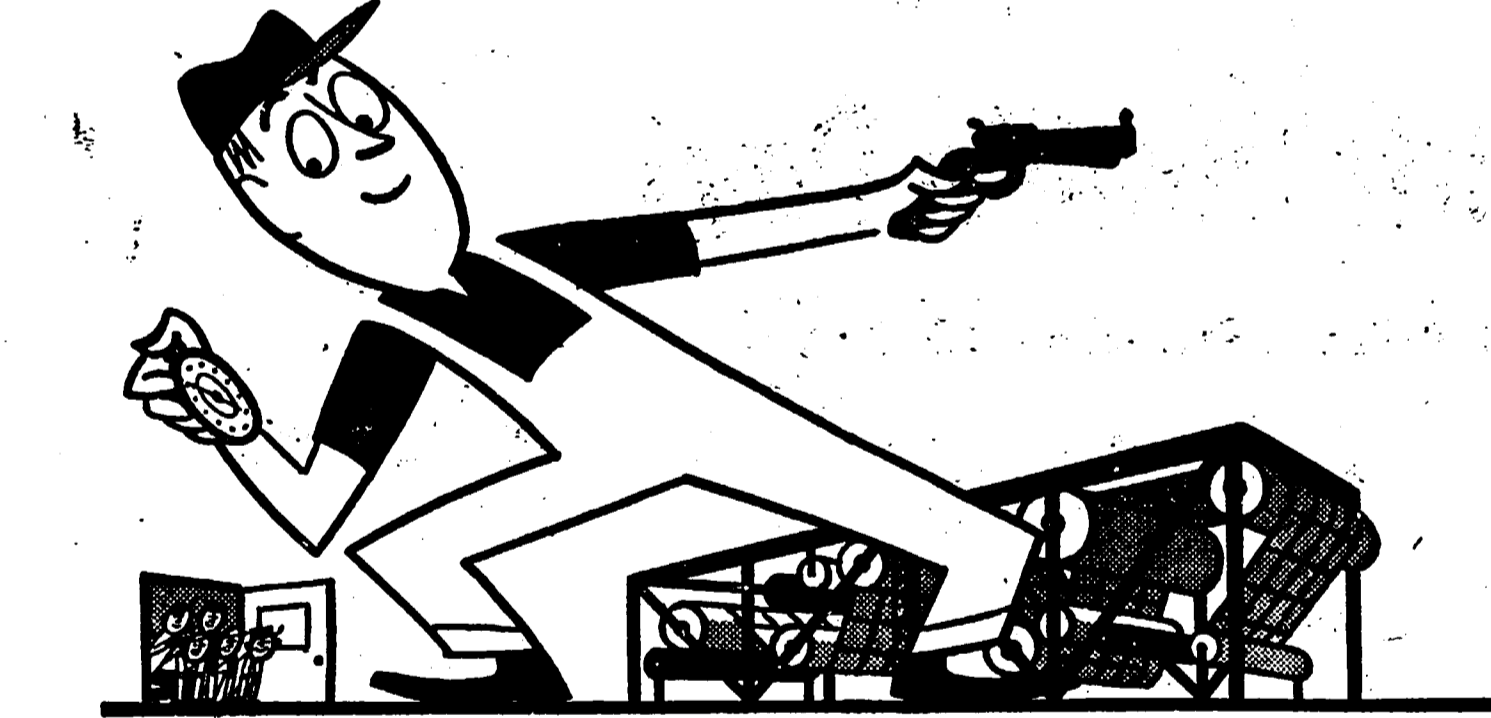

### Woman's Club Hear Book Reviewer

Mrs. Peter E. Told was the speaker at the Tuesday meeting of the Woman's Club of Swarthmore sponsored by the Literature Department, Mrs. Joseph B. Shane, chairman. Using the title "Have You Read?", Mrs. Told gave a comprehensive survey of current books with discriminating and helpful comments. Her talk gave evidence of her wide reading, careful judgment, and clear thinking. Mrs. Told possesses the real asset of a good reviewer—the ability to present books in such a way as to make the audience eager to read them.

"We must remember," said Mrs. Told in her introduction, "that the time in which the authors write their 'conditioning' to it, their resilience to it, plus the sensitivity of their readers explains in a very practical way a year's output and intake of books."

"There is meaning to the fact," continued the speaker, "that 'Power of Positive Thinking,' 'Life is Worth Living,' 'A Man Called Peter' are long at the top of the best seller lists." We must be realistic in acknowledging that Polly Adler's "A House is Not a Home" and Thompson's "Not as a Stranger" has gone to the top since January. Against this she finds it consoling that Gann's good story "The High and the Mighty" has been there since late summer and "Caine Mutiny" is in its third year.

Mrs. Told's survey impressed the listener with our freedom to read books of our choice and the democratic spirit inculcated in this land which enables writers to express themselves and readers to weigh literary works without bias or pressure. She concluded very aptly with a quotation from "Vermont Tradition": "What chance have we to preserve the democratic spirit? Only a fighting chance. Enough. What more is needed for any heart with courage in it?" and added the words of Timothy: "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind."

Because of many requests a list of the books covered by Mrs. Told in her survey is given: Recent fiction, "Not as a Stranger," Thompson, "Love is a Bridge," Flood, "Rainbow on the Road," Forbes, "The Greek Passion," Kazantzakis.

Four lesser novels, but rewarding: "Family Album" by Ridge, "With Kitchen Privileges" by Kent, "The Spare Room" by White, and "Cress Delephant" a delightful story of adolescent problems, by Jessamyn West.

Among children's books the new uniform editions of Kenneth Grahame were mentioned: "Wind in the Willows," "The Golden Age," and "Dream Days" (the latter two about children). Recent good children's books are: "Appolonia's Valentine" by Milhouse and "Book About God" by Florence Fitch.

Non fiction is pushing fiction in sales and is the best writing about our time. Three of the best are: "Spirit of St. Louis" by Lindbergh, "Vermont Tradition" by Fisher, and "Mary Tudor" by H. Prescott. Excellent stay-at-home travel books are: "Farsi is My Heart," Nafisi; Travensoli's "My Heart Lies South," and the new Kimbrough book "Forty Plus and Fancy Free". Four other non-fiction books deserving special mention are:

Hunt's "Conquest of Everest", Davis' "But We Were Born to be Free", E. B. White's collection of poems, essays and stories, "Second Tree from the Corner," and Bowles' "Ambassador's Report."

## Juvenile Delinquency Topic of Club Speaker

Mrs. Norma B. Carson, retired chief policeman of Philadelphia, was the speaker at the Tuesday meeting of the Woman's Club of Swarthmore, sponsored by the Health and Welfare department, Mrs. David Bingham, chairman.

"My theory of policemen," said Mrs. Carson, "is different from that of many people. In some cities a policeman is thought of as a 'female cop.' I think she has something far different to contribute. Put her in the department and let her work for the welfare of women and children."

The speaker gave figures to show that the rate of delinquency among girls has declined a little, but girls are committing more serious crimes than heretofore. The rate among boys has risen considerably. Delinquency is a problem not only in the under-privileged but in children from good homes and those who attend church, the speaker said. "Delinquency is everybody's problem; it is the problem of the home, the school and the church."

Mrs. Carson decried the sensational material seen by the children in the movies, on TV and in newspapers. "It is unfortunate," she commented, "that headlines are given not to children growing up normally, but to those showing abnormal development."

"The trend of progressive education has been away from discipline," she continued. "A good adult has had to have at some time discipline and punishment. The wave of car stealing and other crimes can be attributed to the fact that children have not been taught discipline. To combat delinquency we must start in the home; we must start, in fact, with the baby."

Rather alarming statements were made about the increase of shoplifting and the misuse of charge-a-plates. The family automobile is tied up with some forms of delinquency. Children can no longer walk; the boy must have the car for his date, and girls turn down boys without cars. "Too much of our action," said Mrs. Carson, "is completely degenerate and objectionable. The children read by boys and girls are slanted to sex. The state liquor stores and saloons sell to minors. Women's clubs can and should do something about these obstacles to the proper development of children."

The speaker concluded, "Are we trying to promote the ideals that constitute real living? We must remind everybody that our nation is, first and foremost, a Christian nation. Not until we build up this idea can we give our children security and lead them to better potentialities and a better life."
