W.C. Snyder Confirmed Borough Postmaster

Acting Postmaster's Position Ratified on April 29

Walter C. Snyder Jr., acting postmaster of Swarthmore since August 1, 1953, was confirmed by the Senate as postmaster on April 29, following nomination by President Dwight Eisenhower. One of four applicants for the post, Mr. Snyder rated first on the list of eligibles who took the written examination last July.

Born in Pottsville, the son of the late Walter C., and Evva P. Snyder, he moved to Swarthmore in 1923 when his father became chief of Swarthmore Police. A graduate of Swarthmore High School, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy in October, 1942, serving on destroyer duty until his honorable discharge in September of 1945. Entering the postal service that same year as a substitute carrier, he became superintendent of mails in 1950, a position he held until his temporary appointment last August.

He is a member of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, the Lions Club, the Swarthmore Fire and Protective Association, and a past commander of the Swarthmore American Legion Post. He is married to the former Catherine M. Effing. They live with their daughter, Sandra Lee, aged 5, at 239 Kenyon avenue.

To help meet the problem of the continued rise in deaths, injuries, and cost of highway accidents, the junior boys of the driver education class at Swarthmore High School are staging the fifth annual Safe Driving Week which will open Monday at the high school.

Using the familiar slogan, "The Life You Save May Be Your Own," the boys have scheduled a program that promises to be bigger and better than ever. One of the highlights of the week will be the assembly Tuesday afternoon featuring George Lowe, former assistant director of safety for the Commonwealth, and presently traffic safety engineer of Atlantic Refining Company. Presentations will include the "Pageant of Facts" and the "Safety Trio." Dick Wright will report on the Teen-age Traffic Conference which he is attending today at the State Teachers College at West Chester. The assembly program is in charge of Bob Borer.

Under the general chairmanship of Charles Livingston, with Faculty Sponsor Millard P. Robinson, various members of the class will have charge of the other activities planned to emphasize the need for traffic safety. Let's Face It—The Men Started it—Those Hats!

Elsie Felker, custom milliner and designer of Philadelphia, spoke on her favorite topic, hats, at the regular meeting of the Woman's Club Tuesday afternoon. In her talk, entitled, "I Love Hats", the speaker traced the history of head covering from 3000 B. C. to the present, illustrating her talk with 30 exquisite miniatures.

"For many years," she said, "only the men wore head coverings; women, being in the background, did not need them. Hats were worn for personal adornment, in compliance with the superstition that the gods would not answer the prayers of those with heads uncovered, as a protection against the elements, and a means of protection from the enemy in warfare."

"At times," she continued, "the style and size of hat would denote difference of rank; slaves were not permitted to wear hats. Religion figured in the history of headgear, as evidenced by the head coverings of nuns and monks, the cardinal's hat, and the bishop's mitre. The Indians wore an elaborate head dress of feathers, and the feathers had to be earned—the expression 'put a feather in your cap' is related to this practice. Even today two types of hats must be earned—the nurse's cap and the student's mortar board."

Miss Felker said that designers get their ideas for hats from

art galleries, museums, and from the world of history—even carvings on Egyptian tombs as far back as 3000 B. C. give information on the subject. The Greeks, Romans, and the Crusaders all played a part in the development of headgear.

The audience was interested to learn that the actual term "hat," or its equivalent, was not used until about 1404. Bonnets or shawls designated the head covering. Miss Felker brought out the fact that the original trade between England and the American Colonies was started by hats; the colonist would "trap the beaver for the beaver hats so much desired by the English."

Men's hats from 1880 on have shown very little variety. Between 1880 and 1900 the Homburg—later known as the fedora—was designed in Europe and brought to this country. Mr. Eisenhower gave increased popularity to the Homburg by discarding in his inauguration the conventional high hat for the more comfortable Homburg.

"As for women's hats," said Miss Felker, "there are many, many styles, influenced largely by changes in hair styling. The automobile, women's entrance into business, aviation, the depression—all made their mark on headgear. The depression, in fact, almost ended the millinery industry."

The present trend is to seek a hat that is becoming to the wearer. Miss Felker brought to the club many beautiful hats of various styles which her mother, Mrs. Ethel E. Felker, modelled very effectively.

Mrs. Robert B. Jarratt of North Princeton Avenue entertained as her house guest for 10 days her aunt Mrs. Donald J. Hutton who was en route to her home in Mexico City, following a two-month Mediterranean cruise and trip to the Holy Land.

The speaker concluded with the advice, "Take time enough to select your hat and go to a milliner who will take time and pains to help you. Don't do as one woman customer did in my shop. Seeing a hat on a hat stand, she said, 'I'll take that. If it looks well on that stand, it will certainly look better on me.'"

Miss Felker was introduced by Mrs. W. Alfred Smith, chairman of the American home department which sponsored the program.

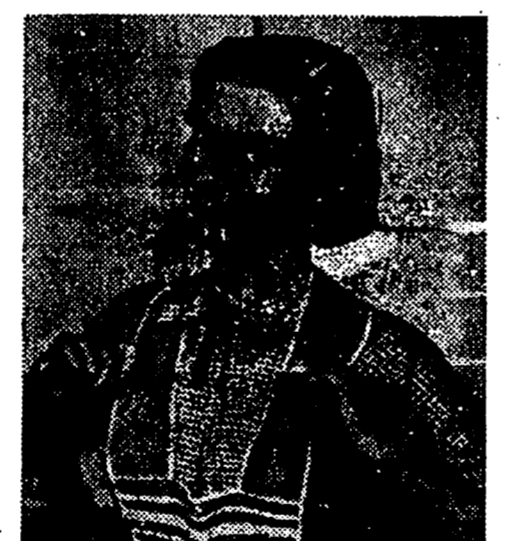



Council OK's Pool; 7 Couples Say 'No'

Group of Area Residents Seek Reversal By Court

The optimistic expectation of the 470-family Swarthmore Swim Club to enjoy a community pool at Riverview avenue and the railroad this summer was probably killed this week by the decision of owners of seven Riverview avenue properties to seek Court action preventing construction of such a pool in that area. Announcement that James N. Robertson, Media attorney, had a bill in equity ready to file as soon as a building permit was granted for the pool, came from A. Sidney Johnson, Jr., representing the Swim Club, at Monday evening's meeting of Borough Council, at which a 12-point agreement between the Club and the Borough was consummated and the building permit unanimously authorized.

On Tuesday the bill in equity was filed before Judge William Toal, Media. The Court granted a temporary injunction against the construction of a pool on the Riverview avenue site. The injunction was granted on an affidavit signed by Marjorie H. Morgan, 45 Dogwood lane, and Cecil G. Compton, 345 Riverview road. Judge Toal fixed Friday, May 14, 11 a.m. for a hearing to decide whether the temporary injunction should be made permanent pending a hearing on the bill in equity, June 16, or canceled.

Read at the meeting was a letter against the pool, written by David W. R. Morgan, an ex-president of Council, whose son D. W. R. Morgan, Jr., a resident of the Riverview area, has been in opposition to the project and was one of a group of its objectors present at Monday's meeting.

Plaintiffs on the bill in equity, claiming the pool permit violates the Borough zoning ordinance and exposes residents to nuisance, hazard and property depreciation from noise, traffic and the like are listed as:

Mr. and Mrs. Brinton L. Liddell, Mr. and Mrs. Wesley J. Simon, Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Leachman, and Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Norman Anderson who occupy two double houses near the railroad end of Riverview avenue; Mr. and Mrs. Donald A. Hickey, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent P. Carroll, and Mr. and Mrs. S. Herman Cooper of 221,315 and 351 Riverview avenue, respectively.

The suit seeks an injunction enjoining the Swim Club from proceeding with its plans and the Borough from allowing anyone else to use the plot of ground in question for similar purpose.

Johnson said June 16 would be the first date on which a hearing would normally be held in such a case and that additional weeks elapse before decision. He stated, "Whereas the Club originally sought prompt granting of the permit so that it could begin construction, it now desires it in order that the seemingly inevitable litigation can get underway and to final settlement." At any rate it appeared (exclusive of their own tubs, garden hoses or leaky umbrellas) any dampening pool advocates receive in Swarthmore during 1954 would be confined to their spirits.

Borough Council authorized its solicitor Clarence G. Myers to answer the bill in equity, associating a member of the Delaware County Bar Guy G. DeFuria with him in the proceedings. Council

Miss Price to Speak Monday Evening at 8

Margaret L. Price will be the guest speaker Monday evening, at an open meeting of the parents group of the Presbyterian Nursery Day School to be held Monday, May 17, at the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church. Speaking at 8 p.m. in the Woman's Association room, Miss Price will address the group on "Early Childhood in Europe."

Michael, Carney Head Borough's UCP Drive

John Michael, of Harvard avenue, and Alvin Carney of Media, Swarthmore business men, will head the local drive of United Cerebral Palsy of Delaware County. The month's activities which began with the appearance of the familiar wishing wells in the business area, will culminate in a one night solicitation on Monday, May 24.

Funds raised in the May campaign will be used to continue and expand the diagnostic services and the three basic therapies—physical, speech and occupational—at the UCP treatment unit in Crozer Hospital, Chester. An average of 253 treatments per month and a caseload of more than 65 children from all corners of Delaware County make it necessary to seek some \$50,000 to carry on this help for the community's handicapped children.

It is estimated that there are between 500 and 800 cerebral palsied adults and children in the County and 500,000 in the nation, and no two are affected in the same manner and degree. Most frequently, cerebral palsy results from a brain injury at birth or shortly after; it can arise from the RH blood factor; it can occur at any age due to high fevers or severe blows on the head. Because a baby with cerebral palsy is born every 54 minutes, the affliction is named the "predictable crippler."

SWIM CLUB IN CRUCIAL MEET

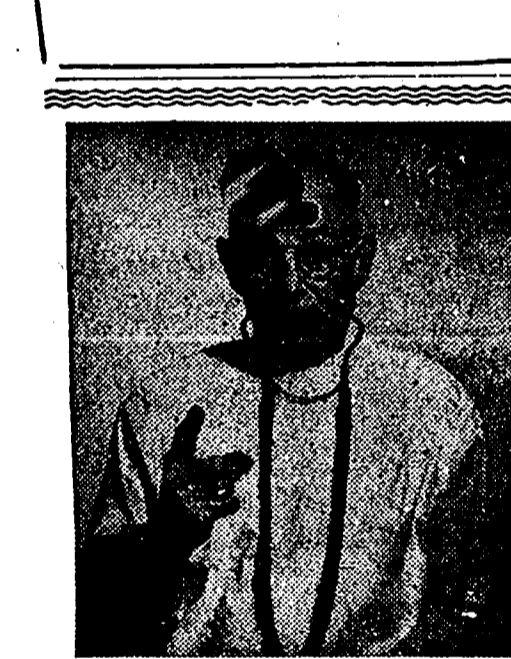

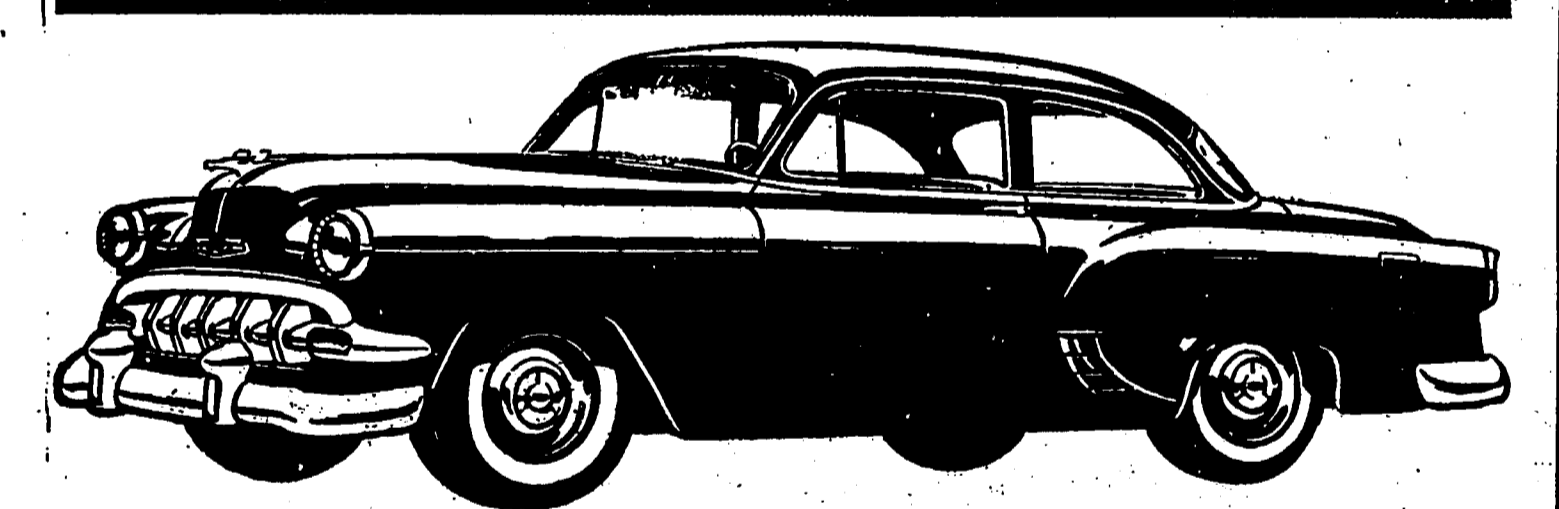

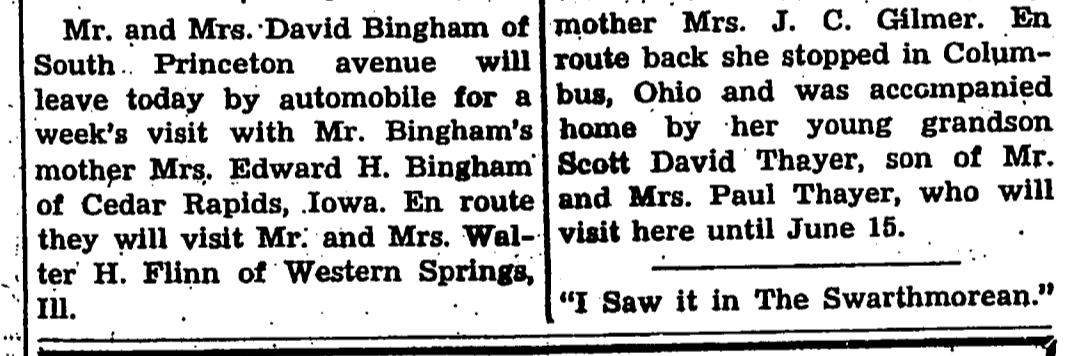

stated its decision to grant the pool permit followed repeated public hearings and much study which convinced it that the pool was not only permissible under the zoning ordinance but would not be injurious to the public's interests.

The agreement entered into by the pool remain private, be completely fenced, have a hard surfaced entrance to its parking lot and gates to be locked when pool is not open. It agrees that the Borough has power to regulate traffic by signs and barricades limiting and directing flow, and prohibiting parking in the vicinity. The club is to provide adequate off-street parking for members and guests and regulate same for order and safety. Prevention of unnecessary noise or disturbance, also glare from any lighting is stipulated. Plantings to screen the project from the nearest residences, in particular the Liddell property which borders the parking lot, are to be supplied by the Club.

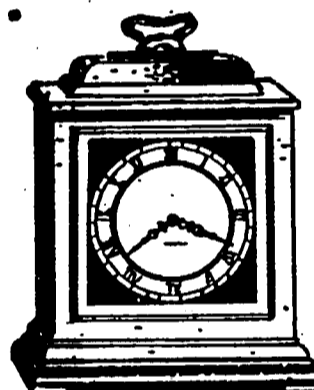

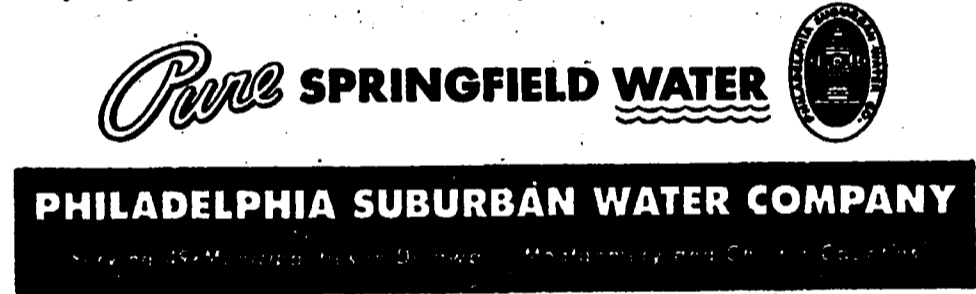

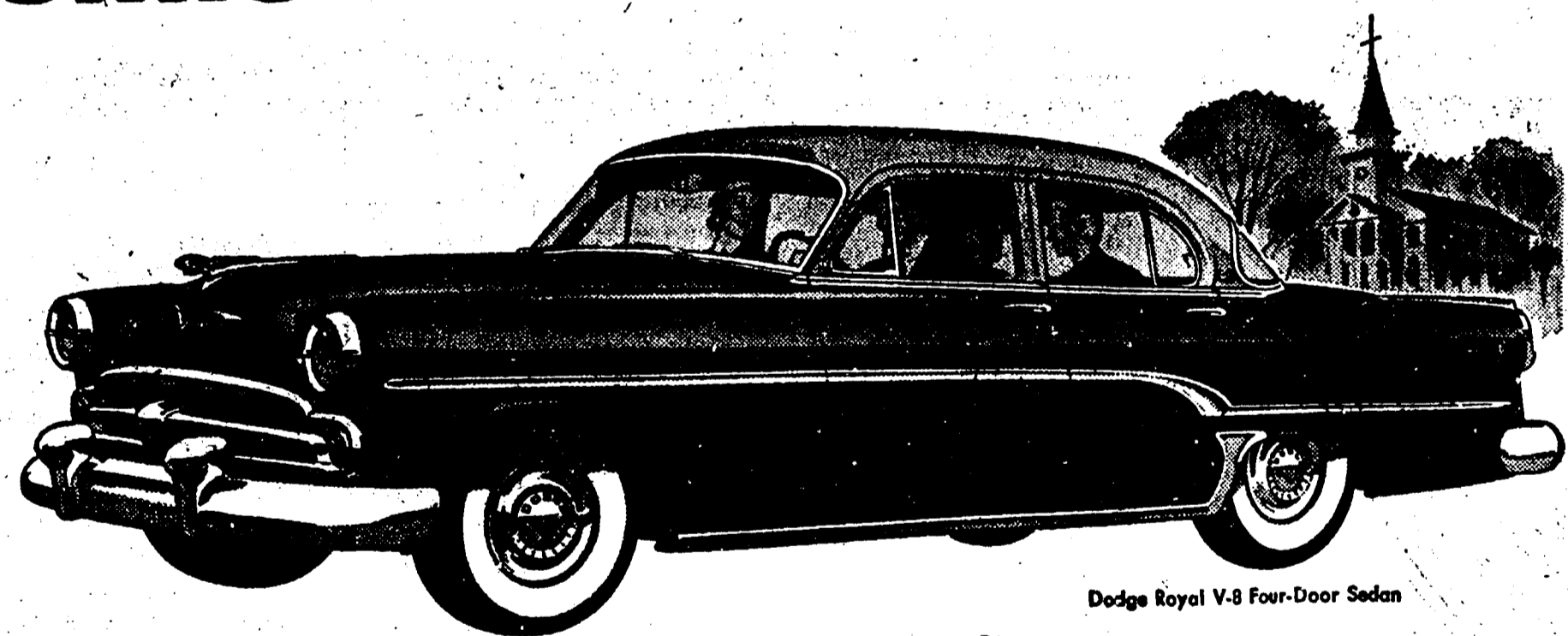

BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE Resolution Re Special Assignments for Police Officers

WHEREAS, from time to time it becomes necessary to employ one or more additional police officers on a temporary basis because of the illness or absence on vacation or other leave of members of the police force, or because of the temporary need for additional policemen; and,

WHEREAS, members of the Swarthmore Police Department have requested that where possible they be assigned to such additional police work during their off duty hours, at a compensation to be fixed by Borough Council;

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that whenever the Burgess and the Chairman or Acting Chairman of the Public Safety Committee shall from time to time agree upon the necessity of employing additional police officers, or assigning officers of the Borough to such additional police work during certain of the hours when they would otherwise be off duty, the employment of such additional temporary officers, or the assignment of regular officers of the Borough to such temporary additional duties is hereby authorized. The compensation to be paid such officers on special assignment shall be such as prescribed by the Burgess and the said Chairman or Acting Chairman of the Committee on Public Safety, but not in excess of the going rate per hour for such services then prevailing in Delaware County. Assignments made and compensation paid or promised prior to the date of this resolution are hereby gratified, confirmed, and approved.

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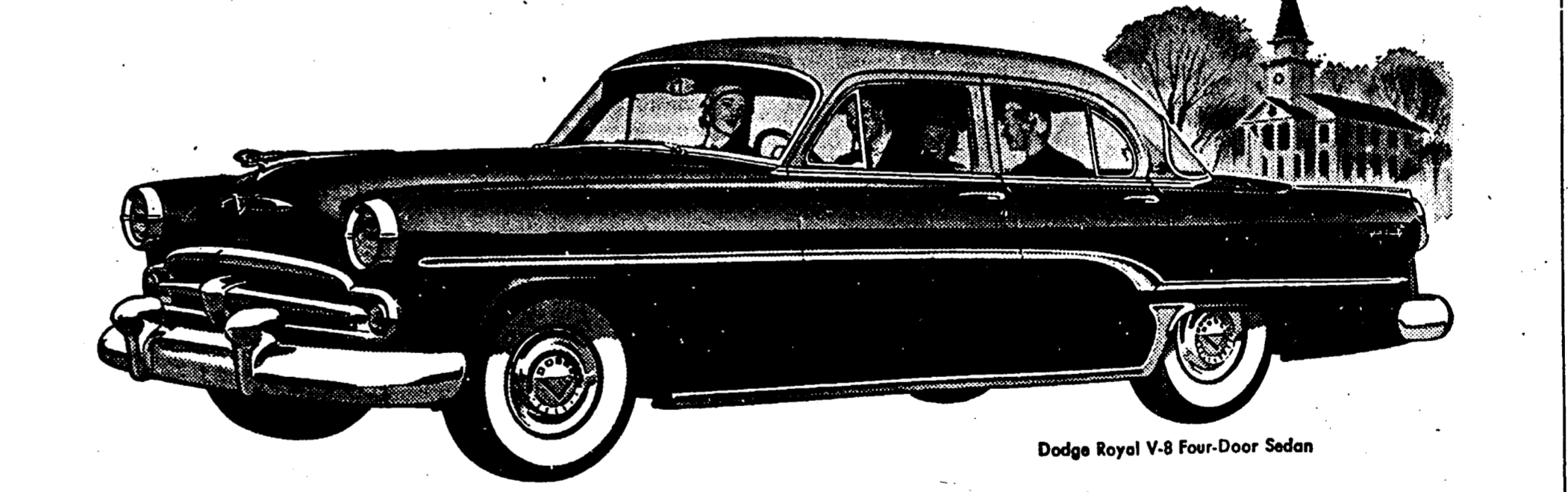

Contest Tuesday Gives Citizens Opportunity To Choose Candidates

At Tuesday's Primary Election, voters in Swarthmore will have an opportunity to vote for the candidates they want to represent their parties in the Fall Election. The offices for which citizens will cast their ballots are:

Three Judges to the State Superior Court; Governor; Lieutenant Governor; Secretary of Internal Affairs; Representative to Congress; Four Representatives to the General Assembly; a State Committeeman and a State Committeewoman; Precinct Committeeman and Precinct Committeewoman.

Locally, the only contest for committeeman or -woman is in the Western Precinct. Republican voters must make a choice between Robert G. Gillilan, Jr., and Herbert E. Michener.

For the General Assembly on the Republican ticket, five men are running for four offices. Incumbent Edwin E. Lippincott 2nd, Clarence D. Bell, Joseph W. Isaacs, and Joseph H. Foster, are being supported by the Republican County Committee. Donald H. Pugh is the Independent Candidate. There is no contest for this office in the Democratic Party.

The Congressman on the Republican ticket, Congressman Benjamin F. James, is standing for re-election. Congressman James is considered by many authorities as one of the ablest men in the House of Representatives. He is being opposed by Harry Hyde Jr.

On the Democratic ticket, Gerard J. Mangone of Swarthmore who has the support of the Swarthmore Democratic Committee, is opposed by O. Arthur Cappello.

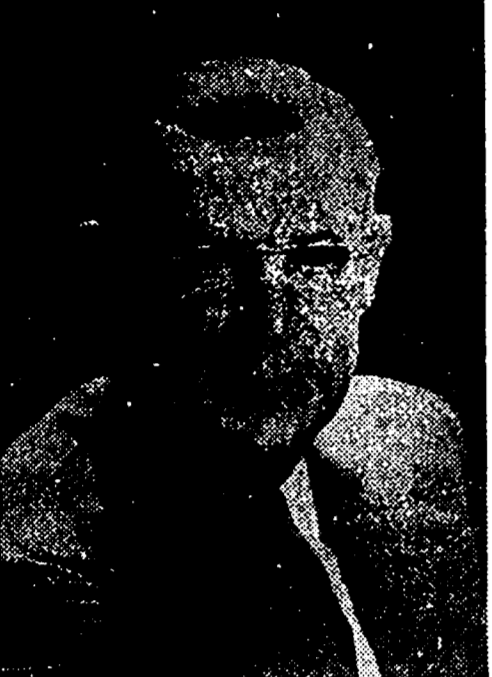
The only other contest in the Democratic party is for Governor in which three candidates are seeking nomination by their party.

The three candidates supported by the majority of state leaders for the Republican nomination to the Superior Court are Judge George W. Griffith of Ebensburg, Judge Robert E. Woodside of Millersburg, and Judge Ralph T. Bell of Pittsburgh.

Judge Griffith, a Judge of the Cambria County Court since 1942, was born and still lives in Ebensburg. He is a graduate of Princeton University and the University of Pennsylvania Law School. He served as an ambulance driver in 1917 with the French Army, and a Second Lieutenant, 316th Field Artillery, 81st Division, in 1918 and 1919. Always interested in the problems of youth, he is chairman of the Pennsylvania Council of Juvenile Court Judges. He is married and has three sons.

Judge Robert E. Woodside, who lives in Millersburg, began his political career in 1921 when he served as a Senate page boy. He served for 10 years in the General Assembly and was elected to the Dauphin County Court in 1941 and served in that office until his appointment as Attorney General in 1951. He was appointed to the Superior Court in 1953.

Judge Ralph T. Bell, born in Washington County, one of 10 children, was appointed to the Allegheny County Court in February, 1952. He was admitted to

the Bar in 1933 after graduating from the University of Pittsburgh in 1925 and that University's Law School in 1928. In 1948 he was named Special Counsel for the State Insurance Department. He is married and the father of two children.

Mrs. Gaynelle M. Dixon of Butler County, is candidate for the Republican nomination as Secretary of Internal Affairs. The first woman to be selected for such a high elective public office in the State, she is now serving her third term as President of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women.

Frank F. Truscott, Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, now a resident of Philadelphia, was born in East Stroudsburg, and served as an officer in the Field Artillery in France in World War I with the 28th Division. After the war, he entered the University of Pennsylvania Law School. He has been very active, for years, in veterans' affairs.

Lieutenant Governor, Lloyd H. Wood, candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor, was born in Grantman, Clearfield County but now lives in Montgomery County. He served as a Corporal in the United States Marine Corps during World War I, and at the end of that conflict entered Ursinus College, later graduating from Temple Law School. He served four terms in the General Assembly and was elected to the State Senate in 1946. He was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1950.

Contest Tuesday Gives Citizens Opportunity To Choose Candidates

At Tuesday's Primary Election, voters in Swarthmore will have an opportunity to vote for the candidates they want to represent their parties in the Fall Election. The offices for which citizens will cast their ballots are:

Three Judges to the State Superior Court; Governor; Lieutenant Governor; Secretary of Internal Affairs; Representative to Congress; Four Representatives to the General Assembly; a State Committeeman and a State Committeewoman; Precinct Committeeman and Precinct Committeewoman.

Locally, the only contest for committeeman or -woman is in the Western Precinct. Republican voters must make a choice between Robert G. Gillilan, Jr., and Herbert E. Michener.

For the General Assembly on the Republican ticket, five men are running for four offices. Incumbent Edwin E. Lippincott and Clarence D. Bell, Joseph W. Isaacs, and Joseph H. Foster, are being supported by the Republican County Committee. Donald H. Pugh is the Independent Candidate. There is no contest for this office in the Democratic Party.

The Congressman on the Republican ticket, Congressman Benjamin F. James, is standing for re-election. Congressman James is considered by many authorities as one of the ablest men in the House of Representatives. He is being opposed by Harry Hyde Jr.

On the Democratic ticket, Gerard J. Mangone of Swarthmore who has the support of the Swarthmore Democratic Committee, is opposed by O. Arthur Cappiello.

The only other contest in the Democratic party is for Governor in which three candidates are seeking nomination by their party.

The three candidates supported by the majority of state leaders for the Republican nomination to the Superior Court are Judge George W. Griffith of Ebensburg, Judge Robert E. Woodside of Millersburg, and Judge Ralph T. Bell of Pittsburgh.

Judge Griffith, a Judge of the Cambria County Court since 1942, was born and still lives in Ebensburg. He is a graduate of Princeton University and the University of Pennsylvania Law School. He served as an ambulance driver in 1917 with the French Army, and a Second Lieutenant, 316th Field Artillery, 81st Division, in 1918 and 1919. Always interested in the problems of youth, he is chairman of the Pennsylvania Council of Juvenile Court Judges. He is married and has three sons.

Judge Robert E. Woodside, who lives in Millersburg, began his political career in 1921 when he served as a Senate page boy. He served for 10 years in the General Assembly and was elected to the Dauphin County Court in 1941 and served in that office until his appointment as Attorney General in 1951. He was appointed to the Superior Court in 1953.

Judge Ralph T. Bell, born in Washington County, one of 10 children, was appointed to the Allegheny County Court in February, 1952. He was admitted to

the Bar in 1933 after graduating from the University of Pittsburgh in 1925 and that University's Law School in 1928. In 1948 he was named Special Counsel for the State Insurance Department. He is married and the father of two children.

Mrs. Gaynelle M. Dixon of Butler County, is candidate for the Republican nomination as Secretary of Internal Affairs. The first woman to be selected for such a high elective public office in the State, she is now serving her third term as President of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women.

Frank F. Truscott, Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, now a resident of Philadelphia, was born in East Stroudsburg, and served as an officer in the Field Artillery in France in World War I with the 28th Division. After the war, he entered the University of Pennsylvania Law School. He has been very active, for years, in veterans' affairs.

Lieutenant Governor, Lloyd H. Wood, candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor, was born in Grantman, Clearfield County but now lives in Montgomery County. He served as a Corporal in the United States Marine Corps during World War I, and at the end of that conflict entered Ursinus College, later graduating from Temple Law School. He served four terms in the General Assembly and was elected to the State Senate in 1946. He was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1950.

Springfield Township Fire Company also was on hand to fight the fire which apparently started in the refrigeration motor room. The alarm was given by Mrs. Abe Schwartz, wife of a former Martel produce department employee, when she smelled smoke in her apartment above the store and heard the market's alarm-system sound.

Local firemen had scarcely rolled up the 1600 feet of hose line used at Martel's when at 3:07 they were called to a field fire at Swarthmore and Princeton avenues.

At 4:36 in answer to a alarm they sprinted with the booster line to Palmer Hall, Swarthmore College girls' dormitory on South Chester road opposite the Swarthmore Apartments, where a mattress, bed, table and window frame were burned.

Jerry Martel announced on Monday that the store would probably be closed throughout this week for replacement of damaged equipment, renovation of the smoke-damaged main mar-

Dr. Prentice Made Prof. Dr. Stott Associate Dean of Men

Courtney Smith, president of Swarthmore College, has announced that Dr. William C. H. Prentice had been promoted to a full professorship and Dr. Gilmore Stott named associate Dean of Men, by action of the Board of Managers of the College.

Dr. Prentice is chairman of the department of psychology and has been teaching at Swarthmore since 1947. Hyde maintained that McCarthy was not a Republican in the tradition of Abraham Lincoln or Dwight Eisenhower. He felt that the junior senator from Wisconsin should be denied political patronage, committee assignments, and that he could be removed from his Senate post.

Pointing out that "McCarthyism" is one of the main issues facing the country today, Hyde declared any tendency toward "character assassination — shooting first and asking questions afterward." He was in favor of the passage of the Morse-Lehman bill. The speaker claimed that he knew of no actual communist that McCarthy has exposed, nor any espionage either.

Harry Oppenlander, who spoke in place of Gerard Mangone, who was unable to attend the meeting, directed the major part of his speech to criticism of the present Administration's foreign policy.

The Administration has not lived up to its 1952 campaign pledges, Oppenlander told the group. He pointed out the inconsistencies in the 1952 Republican campaign pledges of a war of liberation, reduction in government expenses, a balancing of the budget, and cutting of taxes.

Oppenlander cited the need for real bi-partisan participation in American foreign policy. He criticized the use of the terms "massive retaliation" and the "new look" saying that these terms had a bad effect upon countries abroad. These terms, he said, implied the use of atomic weapons, the "most catastrophic type of consequence that might result." He said the use of these terms had a bad psychological effect at home as well.

covered will be collected through the classroom.

The Board decided to take part in a county survey of the interest, needs and financial aspects of various areas in a possible technical school for Delaware County. Supervising Principal Frank Morey reported Swarthmore does get some students who desire this kind of immediate job preparation.

At the suggestion of County Superintendent Carl Leech, the Board agreed to continue earlier discussions with Rutledge regarding a jointure some time in the future. A meeting for this purpose will be held June 2 if agreeable to Rutledge.

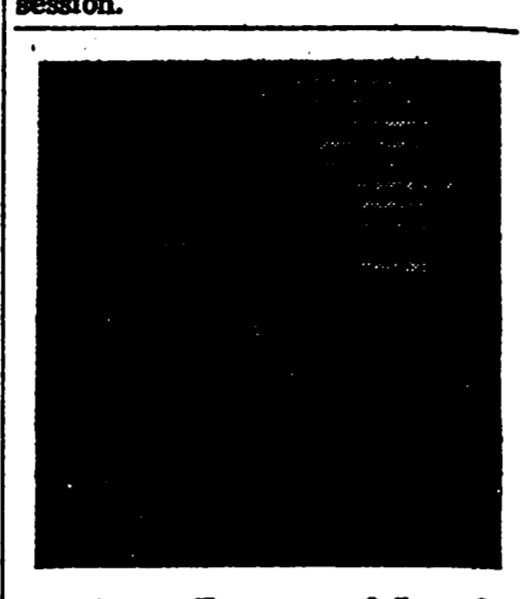
The bid of Nico Company, Philadelphia for four in-wall folding tables and benches for the new multi-purpose room at Rutgers Avenue Elementary School was accepted at \$1486 for the lot. A change order to redimension this many of the 11 table recesses in the room plans, was authorized at a cost of \$430. The recesses were originally designed for a different size table, which including the change order cost would have run an additional \$834. It is felt four tables, each able to accommodate 20 students or teachers, will be sufficient until such a time as a hot-lunch serving kitchen might be added to the school.

The Southern Pennsylvania Bus Service bid for transportation on athletic, musical, and other pupil trips during the next school year was accepted, as also was the low bid of George B. Newton Coal Company on 70,000 gallons of fuel oil for the two school plants, and the Home Linen Supply Company for towel service.

Expenditure of \$148 for supplying, firing and installing 225 tiles for a vestibule mural in the new school was approved. The mural tiles are to be painted by the elementary art classes to form a design being created by Art Instructor Anne Jane Cleaver and having the architect's approval.

The Board adjourned until next Wednesday night when it

hopes to adopt its new budget and set the tax rate for next year. It will convene at 8 o'clock following a half-hour executive session.

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John Carroll Named Home & School Pres.

Elementary Teaching, Reporting Discussed Monday

John Carroll, this year's vice-president and program chairman, was named next year's president of the Swarthmore Home and School Association at the parent-teacher group's final meeting of the season Monday evening in the high school auditorium.

Completing the slate accepted by those present as read by Mrs. J. A. Calhoun in the absence of Nominating Committee Chairman Edmund Jones, were: John Honnold, vice-president in charge of program; Mrs. John Roxy, vice-president in charge of membership; Mrs. Earl Edwards, recording secretary; Mrs. Irma Foley, corresponding secretary; Alvin Carney, treasurer.

John Seybold, retiring president, made a parting plea for funds. Seybold said, "The treasury holds enough to cover the scholarship money but it will have to be built up to face extraordinary demands for facilities and equipment outside the School Board's budget next year when the expanded elementary school is in operation."

Supervising Principal Frank R. Morey explained the still unsettled status of the School District rating, remarking that several other districts had already become reclassified on the interim census legalized when the last State Legislature passed the so-called Swarthmore Bill, while ironically Swarthmore's bid for change from fourth to third class remains pending.

Unless a change from the usual Tuesday meeting-night was responsible, Monday's meager attendance indicated that even some of those who had been desiring just such a program on the grade school level had forgotten the importance of elementary education, stressed by John Carroll's statement, "No high school teacher stands a chance of success with a pupil who has not had a good elementary foundation." However, the half-hundred parents who did see Monday night's film "Skippy and the Three R's" and afterward submitted questions to Elementary Principal Thomas A. Boyle and a nine-teacher panel, were rewarded by the sketch of elementary procedures in 1954.

According to Mrs. Robert Enders, kindergarten and former remedial reading teacher, the swing is back to phonetics in teaching reading. For a while it was thought that phonetics slowed the process of learning to read, but it now appears that was hardly possible since children only sound out words that they do not know anyway.

One father inquired, "If kindergarten and first grade have a lax, 'follow the child's whim' policy and formal, demanding work for college preparation is met in high school, where is the 'tightening up done'?" Mrs. Ruth Wright, one of Swarthmore's three sixth grade teachers, replied, "It might be said it is done in fifth or sixth grade although the same unit type programs continue and actually learning speed and control and 'tightening up' for accomplishment is gradual." Mrs. Wright further stated "We are not sure in the elementary school, that pressures put on in high school are necessary, or that forcing discipline on students in sixth grade is good."

"If there is chaos and confusion in the classroom it is not due to the progressive system, it's the teacher," Boyle said. "In such an atmosphere a child would probably learn little except to duck in self defense. On the other hand teachers can remain too traditional, strictly confining pupils to their seats. It is the happy balance that is considered successful in teaching and in developing proper responsibility. We want freedom of expression for each child, but with orderliness and consideration for every other child," he concluded.

Asked about a new guide sheet being given to parents during the current Wednesday afternoon conferences with teachers, Boyle declared: "Parents in general agree with school authorities that personal conferences are an improvement over written reports in securing a picture of the individual student's progress. However, in checking we have found that new residents, formerly accustomed to written reports, sometimes have transition difficulties, and that 'Johnny is doing as well as can be expected' has failed to satisfy some other parents. Therefore a mimeographed sheet guiding parent and teacher to specifics under several headings such as emotional, social and physical growth; special interests, abilities and needs; and academic achievement was developed by a committee of teachers and parents, in an effort to attain the most satisfactory coverage on each pupil. Mothers should ask for the sheet if the teacher does not proffer it upon arrival for conferences. They should write on it any particulars they desire, so that they will have a report card if they want it to take home to inform fathers of children's progress."

"Don't discuss your complaints with neighbors over the back fence, but come talk them over with the school. We are hired to help your child and to help you to understand him and send him on to higher education, a well adjusted student. Go into your conference and ask questions and you'll get the answers. Among facts you should be told is in which quarter of the class your child stands."

Boyle, completing his first year as principal here, feels Swarthmore youngsters should test a year ahead of the national average or "norm" for their grade due to the better facilities and individual attention they enjoy as compared with some less fortunate districts. His conviction was corroborated by Mrs. Enders who stated the local median usually ran a year ahead in all subjects except spelling. In the latter borough pupils remain in the median.

Rev. Kulp to Give Memorial Day Address in Exercises Monday

Swarthmore will have its traditional Memorial Day exercises and parade, after all. At 10 a.m. Monday the Swarthmore High School Band, the American Legion and Auxiliary, Boy and Girl Scouts, Brownies, Cubs, Red Cross, Fire Company, a detachment of the locally stationed 24th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Group and patriotic un-uniformed citizens will join at Borough Hall.

Following the day's address given by the Rev. John C. Kulp, pastor of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, who served as Navy chaplain aboard an attack transport in the Atlantic Fleet during World War II, flags commemorating the honored dead will be placed in front of the War Memorial at the corner of Park and Dartmouth avenues. LWW Council Hears Pakistan Ambassador

Economic cooperation on an international scale is the duty of human beings, Professor Ahmed S. "Asians are a little tired and a little suspicious of bi-lateral help. They want help from an international body without being beholden or any strings attached," he said.

Expressing great faith in the United Nations, he said that he felt that as long as the countries got together and talked round the table there was hope in warding off a conflagration. He pointed out that the UN was instrumental in putting out small fires. "Although the U. N. has no law, no police, no army it has been able to reach into the heart of man," he said.

Turning to the problems between India and Pakistan, he asserted that there is no problem that Pakistan considers more important than its dispute with India and with Kashmir, which has been before the security council for seven years. According to Bokhari all decisions of the security council have been stultified

and rendered naught by India. He said that though his countrymen have a feeling of frustration on this question they still have faith in the UN.

He felt that the importance of Kashmir went beyond the contest between India and Pakistan, and that a glance at the map would show the strategic vicinity of Kashmir to Sinkiang and the USSR. Communists have been receiving much publicity for their drive for independence on the part of the press, according to the speaker.

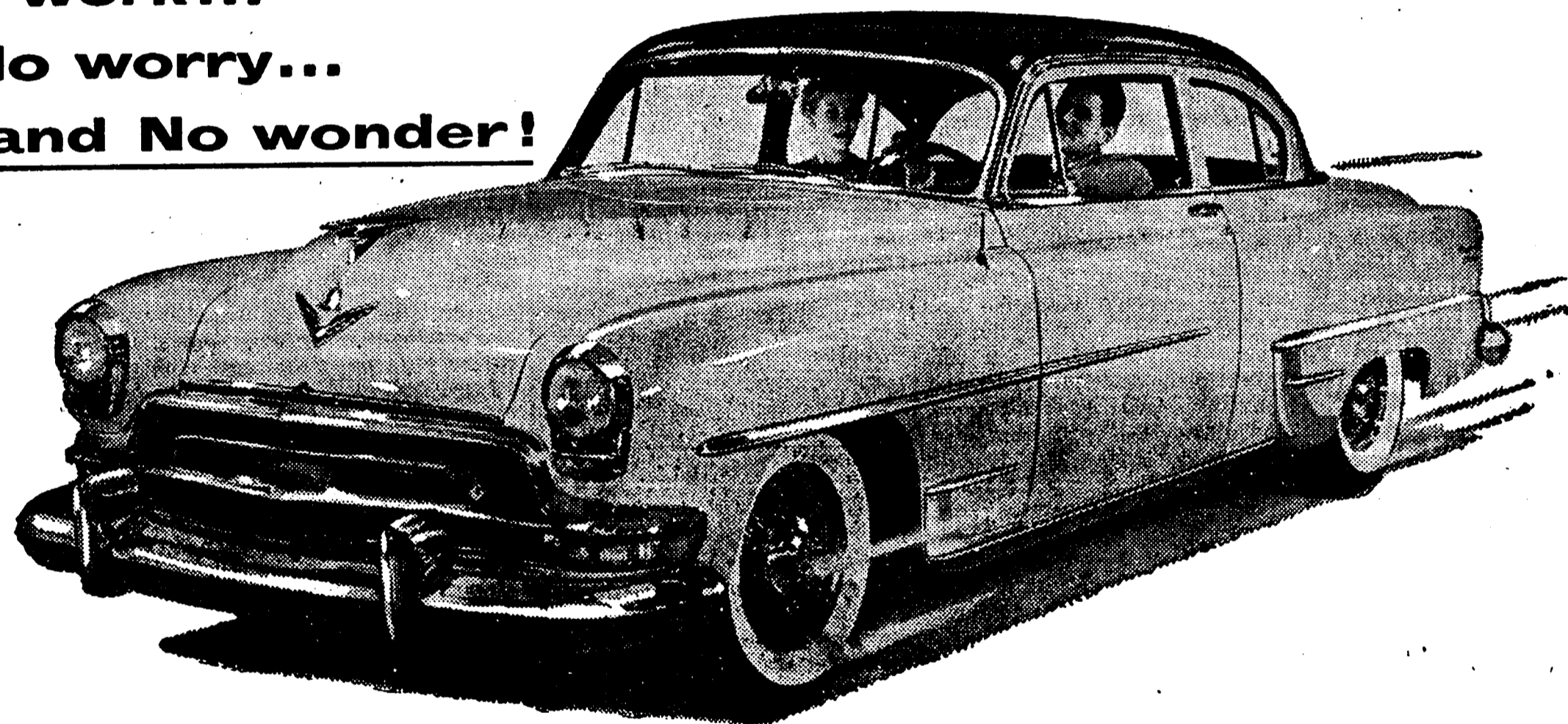

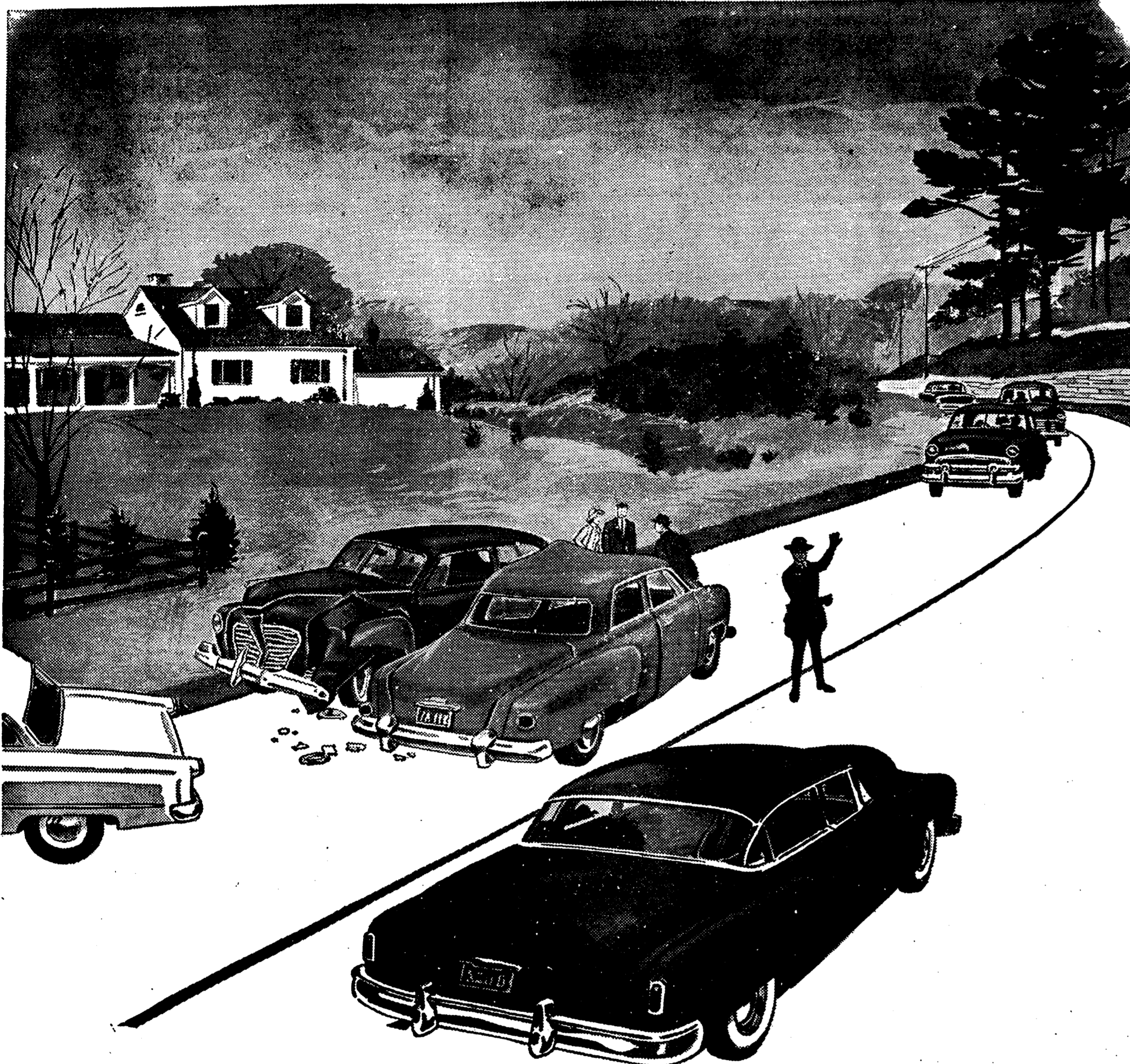

better construction job in the long run and possibly less expensive. Members were told construction would begin the minute legal obstacles are cleared.

Van Urk explained that subscribers' funds, amounting to \$68,424 to date, held in escrow until success of the pool venture was assured, will be placed in an interest bearing account so that the investment of each subscriber will grow during the delay caused by the court suit.

A. Sidney Johnson, Jr., attorney for the Swim Club, reviewed points of the agreement signed with Borough Council to protect residents of the pool area from unreasonable noise, traffic or other nuisance. Due to the fact that James N. Robinson, counsel for the seven couples who filed the bill in equity at Media, plans to be in military encampment on the normal day of hearing, June 16, Johnson said Judge William Toy will probably hear testimony in the case on an early Friday next month. A decision should follow in another several weeks, after which the losing side may appeal to the County Court in full, and further to the Supreme Court if it so desires.

It was generally conceded last Thursday night that should the current pool project be defeated Swarthmore could consider itself forever bereft of community swimming facilities due to unavailability of ground as well as the probable unwillingness of any residents, however civic-minded, to again undertake the exhausting task of coordinating activities preliminary to actual pool building.
