W.C.Snyder Confirmed **Borough Postmaster**

Acting Postmaster's **Position Ratified** on April 29

Walter C. Snyder Jr., acting postmaster of Swarthmore since August 1, 1953, was confirmed by the Senate as postmaster on April 29, following nomination by President Dwight Eisenhower. One of four applicants for the post, Mr. Snyder rated first on the list of eligibles who took the written examination last July.

Born in Pottsville, the son of the late Walter C., and Evva P. Snyder, he moved to Swarthmore in 1923 when his father became chief of Swarthmore Police. A graduate of Swarthmore High School, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy in October, 1942, serving on destroyer duty until his honorable discharge in September of 1945. Entering the postal service that same year as a substitute carrier, he became superintendent of mails in 1950, a position he held until his temporary appointment last August.

He is a member of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, the Lions Club, the Swarthmore Fire and Protective Association, and a past commander of the Swarthmore American Legion Post. He is married to the former Catherine M. Effing. They live with their daughter, Sandra Lee, aged 5, at 239 Kenyon avenue.
