Commissioned

Arthur P. McCormack son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. McCormack of 100 Ogden avenue, was commissioned today as a second lieutenant in the Artillery of the United States Army Reserve. Lt. McCormack completed his academic work for a commission at Princeton University. To obtain his commission as a second lieutenant, he enrolled in basic military science. After two years of basic he was selected on the basis of his academic grade average and leadership ability to participate in the advanced military science program. The advanced program is a two year academic course supplemented by this six-weeks summer camp in which the students train to carry out tactical missions as officers. Lt. McCormack will be called to active duty with the army sometime prior to July 1, 1955. He will serve a minimum of two years on active duty and six years in the reserves.

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According to John E. The conference was part of the Mary Conover Mellon Foundation program at Vassar which conducts research on personality development in women with special reference to the effects of college education.

In twos they presented original soap operas and teamed for guessing games while the 12 psychologists observed.

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Mrs. Jarratt, who is the present president of the class of 1933 will help to write an article about the conference for the Vassar Alumnae Magazine. She came away from the conference with the "utmost respect for the entire group," a feeling in which the psychologists expressed their complete agreement.

Tests used were based on those of the University of California.


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
