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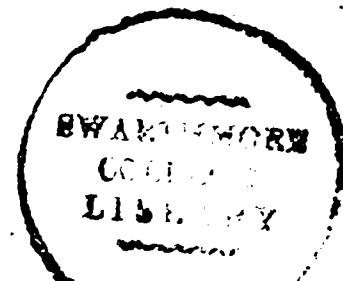
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Weiland at Retirement (Continued from Page 1) ing the period from 1917 to 1930 his name appeared on about 90 patents in the field of organic chemistry.

Dr. Weiland joined the Newport Chemical Company as a research chemist at Carrollville, Wis., in 1917. From then until 1925 he was engaged in design and start-up of plants for the manufacture of organic chemicals. In 1925 he was assigned to liaison work on patents and in 1928 he was promoted to head of the Patent Department for Newport Chemical. In 1931, in addition to his patent work, he was appointed assistant to the technical director. When the Newport Chemical Company was purchased by DuPont in 1931, Dr. Weiland was named director of the Carrollville Laboratory.

In 1935 Dr. Weiland was named special assistant to the director of the Jackson Laboratory at Deepwater Point, N. J., in charge of Organic Chemicals patent service. In 1941 he was transferred to Wilmington, Del., as assistant manager of the patents and processes division, becoming manager in 1943. Dr. Weiland has been manager of the patents section of the Organic Chemicals Department since 1948 and a member of DuPont's Patent Board for the last 20 years.

A native of Rochester, N. Y., Dr. Weiland received his bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of Rochester in 1913. He received his master's and doctor's degrees in physical chemistry from the University of Illinois in 1915 and 1917, respectively. **Main Weighs Gamble  
Of Democracy, Tyranny**  
Freedom Quest Will Win  
For Former, H. S.  
Grads Told

"Soviet tyranny will be broken by an ineradicable hunger which is the main distinction of the human animal," Patrick Murphy Malin, of the American Civil Liberties Union, told Swarthmore High School's class of 1955 at its graduation exercises in Clothier Memorial Tuesday evening.

Mr. Malin, whose son Randall is a member of the class and winner of several awards, explained the hunger, "the ultimate guarantee against winning by tyranny," as man's hunger for freedom to explore the mysteries of the world and freedom to fulfill his purpose in life by choosing among the manifold desires he experiences. Russia cannot teach her people to read indefinitely without their thinking, he said.

Setting forth "The Opportunity to Go on Working" as Democracy's only reward, Malin stated Democracy's problem is "how to" (Continued on Page 5).

**College Recognizes  
Herndon's Service**  
Trainer Receives Unique  
Award in 51st Yr. With  
Institution

At the Swarthmore College Commencement exercises Tuesday President Courtney Smith made the second annual presentation of the John W. Nason Award. Recipient of this unique honor was Rufin Herndon, head trainer of the Swarthmore College Athletic Department. Mr. Herndon, known to hundreds of Swarthmore graduates as "Ruff," this year completes 51 years of service to college and community.

The John W. Nason Award, given in honor of the Eighth President of the College, is presented annually "to one or more members of the total staff of the College, or to members of their families who have made a distinctive contribution, beyond the scope of their normal duties, to the life of the College community." The Award is made by the Instruction and Libraries Committee of the Board of Managers upon the advice of the President of the College and consists of a formal citation and a monetary award of one thousand dollars.

This award is made possible through the contribution of an interested alumnus of Swarthmore College.

Mr. Herndon first came to Swarthmore College in September of 1904 as a janitor on the third floor of the men's section of Parrish Hall. He immediately evidenced his interest in athletics and in 1905 was asked to accompany the football team on its trip to Ithaca to meet Cornell. "What a change in the way the game was played then and the way we play today," says Ruff. "We frequently played with 11 men during the entire game and the only reason anyone came out was because he could no longer stand." Members of that squad included the two great football officials Robert "Tiny" Maxwell and Wilmer Crowell. The team played Penn. Navy, Cornell, and Lafayette that year and in eight games rolled up 176 points to their opponents' 22.

Honorary Degrees**  
Ambassador, Justice and  
Senator Honored At  
Commencement

The conferring of honorary degrees at the Swarthmore College Commencement program Tuesday paid honor to three high ranking public servants. The degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Amos J. Peaselee, U. S. Ambassador to Australia, Hugo L. Black, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, and Paul H. Douglas, United States Senator from Illinois. The ceremony was given a family flavor by the fact that Ambassador Peaselee is a graduate of Swarthmore College in the class of 1907 and is the father of a graduate, Justice Black, who delivered the Commencement Address and Senator Douglas, who spoke at the Baccalaureate services yesterday, are parents of graduating seniors, Josephine Black and Jean Douglas.

The recommendation of Ambassador Peaselee cited his devotion to the promotion of better relations between the countries and peoples of the world. "He has served his country and his profession in connection with the American Commission to negotiate peace at Versailles, as a member of the United States Council for Defense in 1948, as a representative to the San Francisco Conference for the establishment of the United Nations, as President of the American Branch of the International Law Association, and as Secretary General of the International Bar Association." He was appointed Ambassador to Australia by President Eisenhower in 1953.

The citation for Justice Black emphasized his defense of our basic freedoms of belief and expression. He was pictured as a vigorous opponent of unrestrained power, public or private, and as a person who has advanced the cause of constitutional liberty by helping to build these principles into the law of the land.

Senator Douglas, an authority on the economics of labor, employment, and social security, was cited as having made his name a symbol of intelligence and integrity in the public service.

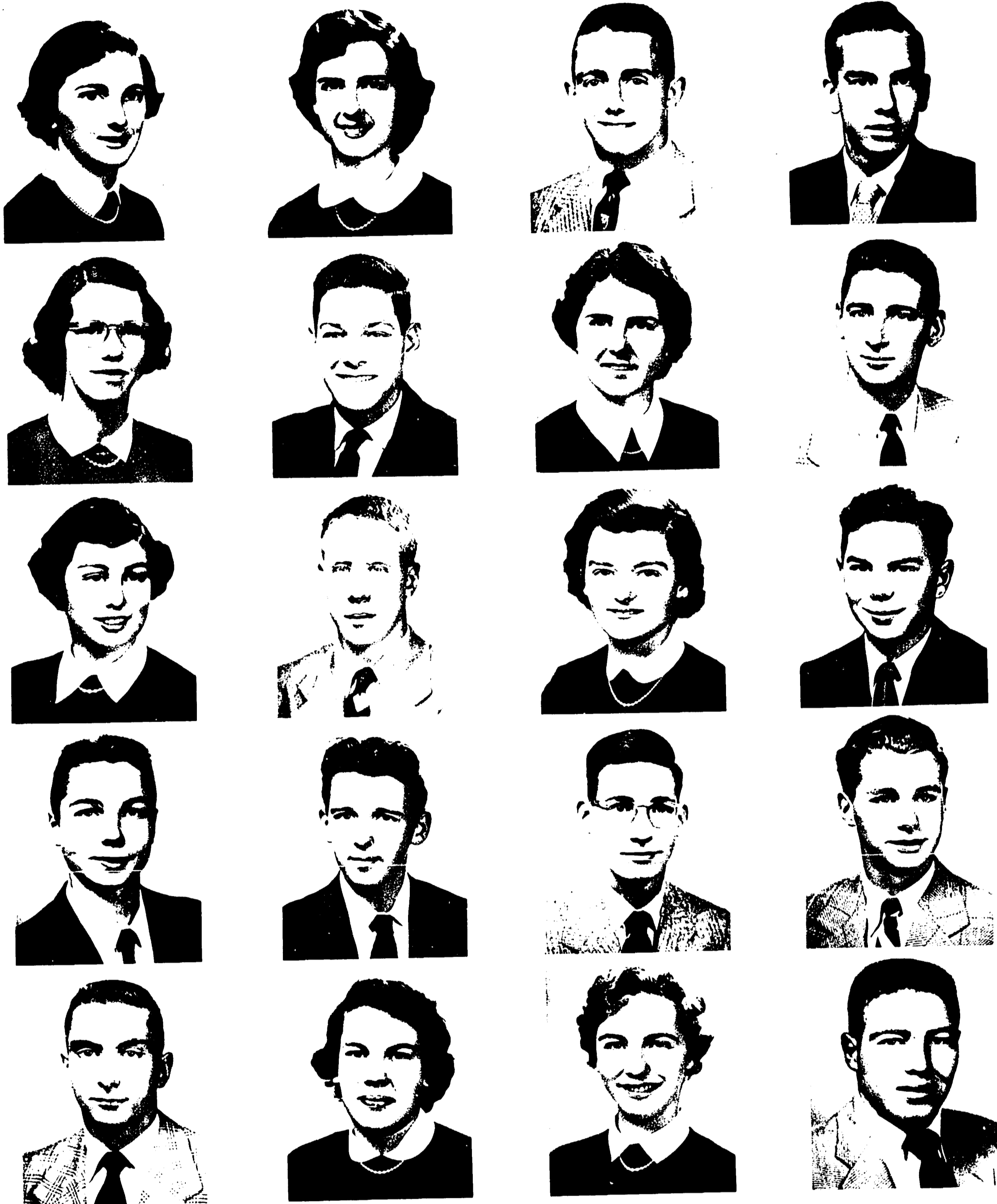
**Summer Music Program**

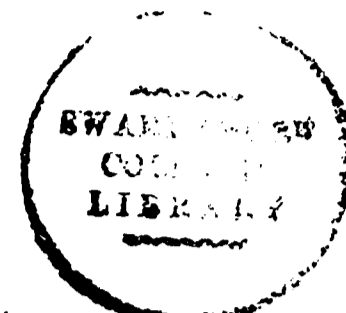

**College Recognizes  
Herndon's Service**

**Trainer Receives Unique  
Award in 51st Yr. With  
Institution**

At the Swarthmore College Commencement exercises Tuesday President Courtney Smith made the second annual presentation of the John W. Nason Award. Recipient of this unique honor was Ruffin Herndon, head trainer of the Swarthmore College Athletic Department. Mr. Herndon, known to hundreds of Swarthmore graduates as "Ruff," this year completes 51 years of service to college and community.

The John W. Nason Award, given in honor of the Eighth President of the College, is presented annually "to one or more members of the total staff of the College, or to members of their families who have made a distinctive contribution, beyond the scope of their normal duties, to the life of the College community." The Award is made by the Instruction and Libraries Committee of the Board of Managers upon the advice of the President of the College and consists of a formal citation and a monetary award of one thousand dollars. This award is made possible through the contribution of an interested alumnus of Swarthmore College.

Mr. Herndon first came to Swarthmore College in September of 1904 as a janitor on the third floor of the men's section of Parrish Hall. He immediately evidenced his interest in athletics and in 1905 was asked to accompany the football team on its trip to Ithaca to meet Cornell. "What a change in the way the game was played then and the way we play today," says Ruff. "We frequently played with 11 men during the entire game and the only reason anyone came out was because he could no longer stand." Members of that squad included the two great football officials, Robert "Tiny" Maxwell and Wilmer Crowell. The team played Penn. Navy, Cornell, and Lafayette that year and in eight games rolled up 176 points to their opponents' 22.

Dr. J. K. Shell, director of athletics at that time, had his eyes (Continued on Page 6)

**Ambassador, Justice and  
Senator Honored At  
Commencement**

The conferring of honorary degrees at the Swarthmore College Commencement program Tuesday paid honor to three high ranking public servants. The degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Amos J. Peaslee, U. S. Ambassador to Australia, Hugo L. Black, Associate Justice of the United States, and Paul H. Douglas, United States Senator from Illinois. The ceremony was given a family flavor by the fact that Ambassador Peaslee is a graduate of Swarthmore College in the class of 1907 and is the father of a graduate. Justice Black, who delivered the Commencement Address and Senator Douglas, who spoke at the Baccalaureate services yesterday, are parents of graduating seniors, Josephine Black and Jean Douglas.

The recommendation of Ambassador Peaslee cited his devotion to the promotion of better relations between the countries and peoples of the world. "He has served his country and his profession in connection with the American Commission to negotiate peace at Versailles, as a member of the United States Council for Defense in 1946, as a representative to the San Francisco Conference for the establishment of the United Nations, as President of the American Branch of the International Law Association, and as Secretary General of the International Bar Association." He was appointed Ambassador to Australia by President Eisenhower in 1953.

The citation for Justice Black emphasized his defense of our basic freedoms of belief and expression. He was pictured as a vigorous opponent of unrestrained power, public or private, and as a person who has advanced the cause of constitutional liberty by helping to build these principles into the law of the land.

Senator Douglas, an authority on the economics of labor, employment, and social security, was cited as having made his name a symbol of intelligence and integrity in the public service.

(Continued from Page 1) peeled for a "big husky boy" to take over as handler for the teams. He decided that Ruff filled the bill and arranged for him to take courses at night to learn how to ease strained muscles and how to patch up "his boys" so that they could go on with the game.

Ruff's memories are not restricted to football. The names of Johnny Ogden '19, Jim Clancy '21, Curley Ogden '22, and George Earnshaw '23 are sure to bring a gleam to the eye of any true baseball fan.

Most recent of this trainer's baseball graduates is Dick Hall '53, Branch Rickey's bonus rookie who went to the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1952 and came back to graduate the next year.

Ruff has seen the boys come and go and on a number of occasions has seen their sons come for their turn. He recalls Tod Eberle who set the record for the 220 yard dash and then saw Buz Eberle, Tod's boy, come along a few years later and break that record.

Recalling another father and son combination Ruff speaks of Les and Bob Asplund. He says, "Bob was good, but he just didn't have his father's toe. No one could punt like old Les." Les, of course, was in the class of 1923 and Bob in 1952 but Ruff talks of both as if they were here just yesterday.

Many Swarthmore graduates and especially those who, competed on various Swarthmore squads over the years are amazed at Ruff's ability to address them by name when they return for a visit to the college.

But Ruff's service is not only to the college and its athletic program. For 40 years he has been a member of the Official Board of the Campbell A.M.E. Church in Media. He has worked to increase the influence of this Church in the community and has been rewarded by its growth over the years. Another outlet for the seemingly bottomless well of energy of this "young" man is Camp Hope, a camp for underprivileged children of Delaware County located in French Creek State Park. Ruff is joined in these activities by his wife, Victoria Herndon. The two of them have raised money, cooked, and helped the camp with many problems as well as having been an inspiration to the many children who have been assisted by this organization.

Mrs. Herndon is also a former employee of Swarthmore College; starting first as a maid and then taking over at the telephone switchboard when this "new contraption" was first introduced.

When asked about the Award itself, Ruff is completely at a loss to explain how he was chosen for this honor. "There must be dozens of people at the College who have done more than I have," he explains, "I just don't see how they came to think of me. All of these years I have just been doing my job from day to day and a man shouldn't receive any special award for that."

This is not the way that gray haired men talk when they return to the college and remind Ruff of a word of advice that he gave them ten, 15, 20 years ago when they were still "wet behind the ears" and a "bit too big for their boots." Ruff has never been thought of as only a trainer.

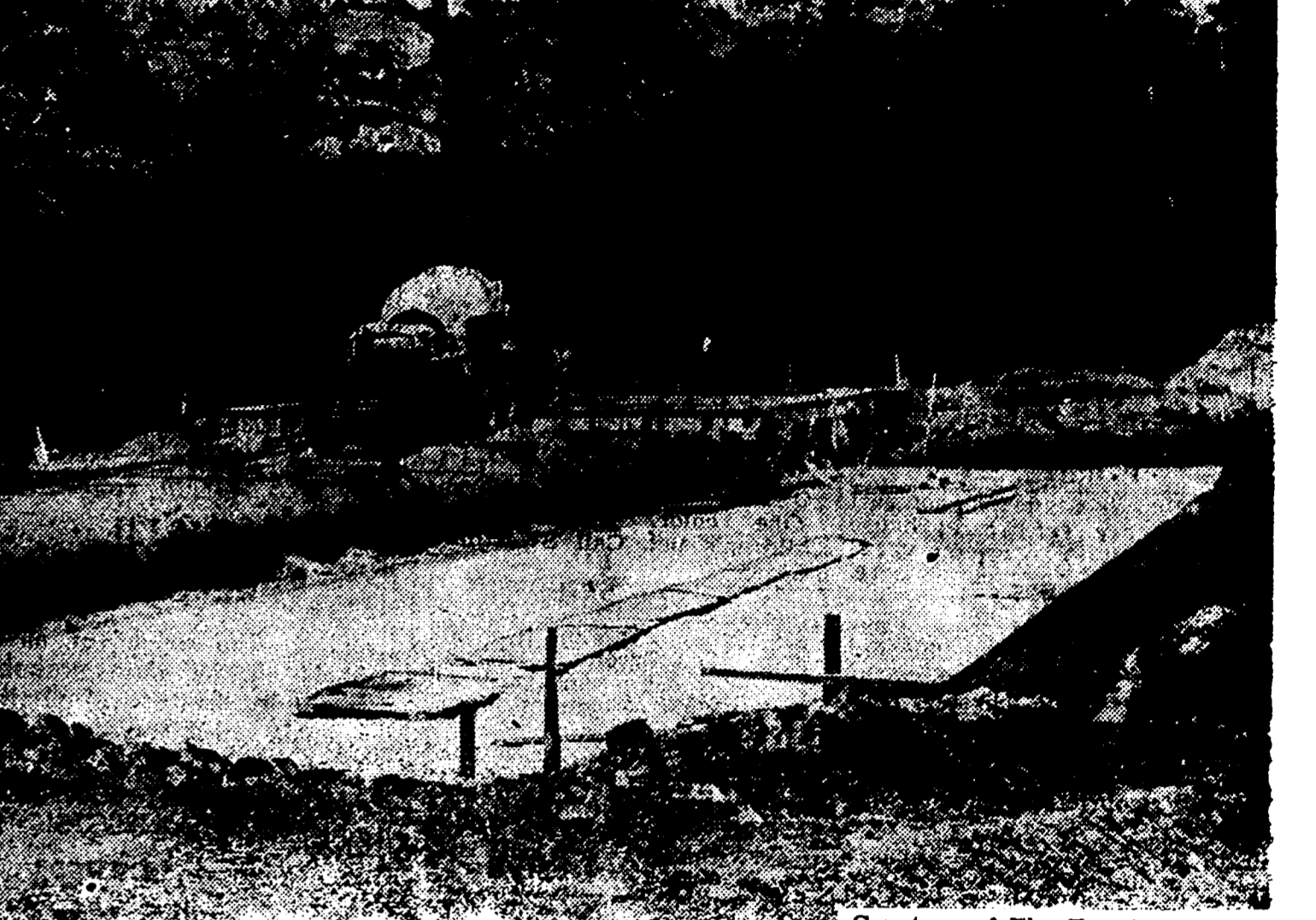

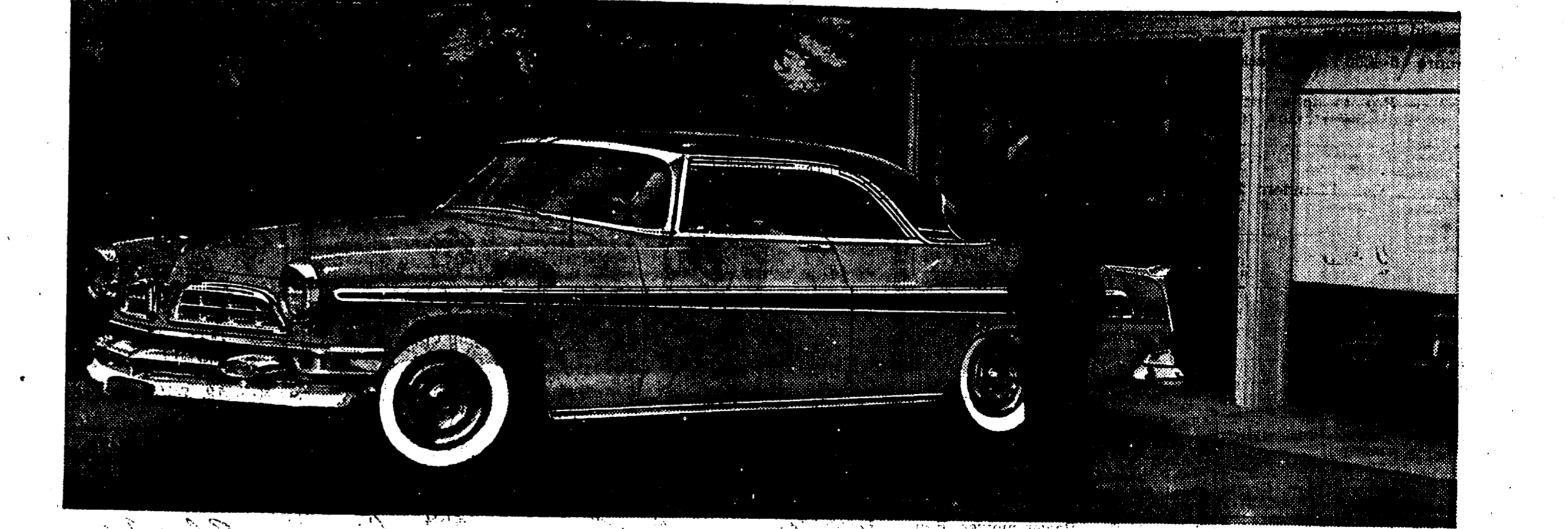



Ruff's memories are not restricted to football. The names of Johnny Ogden '19, Jim Clancey '21, Curley Ogden '22, and George Earnshaw '23 are sure to bring a gleam to the eye of any true baseball fan.

Most recent of this trainer's baseball graduates is Dick Hall '53, Branch Rickey's bonus rookie who went to the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1952 and came back to graduate the next year.

Ruff has seen the boys come and go and on a number of occasions has seen their sons come for their turn. He recalls Tod Eberle who set the record for the 220 yard dash and then saw Buzz Eberle, Tod's boy, come along a few years later and break that record.

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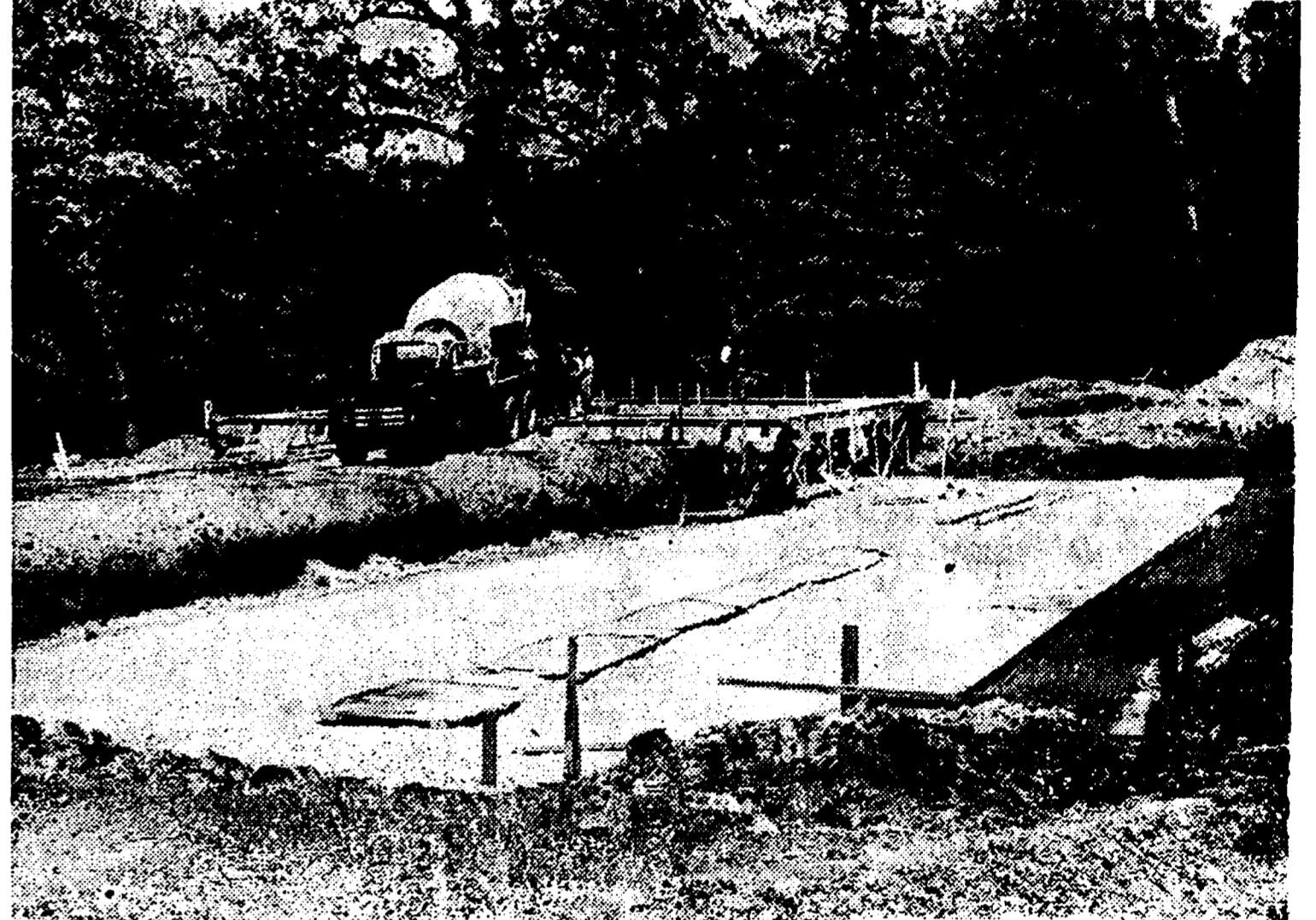

**Two Mourning Doves Banded to Date**  
On May 28, two fledgling Mourning Doves were banded at the home of Mrs. Charles Zensen, 221 Sylvan avenue in Rutledge. This nest was in a pear tree seven feet (not six, as previously reported) high and presented an easy banding problem.

The same day an attempt was made to band the doves at 201 College avenue, reported by Miss Bye. When a 19-foot aluminum ladder, lent by a neighbor on Elm avenue, was lodged against the nesting branch of the maple tree, one of the fledglings flew to the roof of the house. This indicated that both babies were beyond banding age, so the ladder was removed.

Reports of additional nests continue to trickle in to banding headquarters. Through roundabout channels it was learned that doves might be nesting at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. William F. Meredith, 313 Summit road, Springfield, but investigation disclosed that this brood was fledged about a month ago.

The really "hot" tip of the past week-end came from the Landons at 307 N. Princeton avenue, Swarthmore. From the window on their stair landing they spotted a dove brooding in a spruce tree. This nest is easily within reach of a reasonably tall ladder and should furnish numbers three and four in the Swarthmore banding series.

Mr. and Mrs. Landon have an unusual opportunity to observe such things as hatching dates and feeding schedules, so that the proper banding date—six to 10 days of age—of the fledglings should be established without undue disturbance of the birds.

still the Paxson home.

A member of Swarthmore Friends' Meeting, Mrs. Paxson was active in Meeting affairs. She taught in the First Day School for many years. She was instrumental in organizing the Wednesday Sewing Group during the First World War, to make garments and gather funds for the American Friends' Service Committee. She served on many committees in the Monthly and Quarterly Meetings, and was a valued member of the board of the Friends' Boarding Home of Conyars. Mrs. Paxson was a delegate to the Friends' General Conference held in London in 1920, and worked with a Yearly Meeting Committee to revise the Discipline in 1927. She was a member of the board of the Friends' Intelligencer for many years. With her sister, Abby Mary Hall Roberts, she carried on the publication of "Scattered Seeds" which was distributed in the First Day Schools, and served on a committee that prepared two anthologies for children, the "Children's Story Garden," (1924) and the "Children's Story Caravan" (1938).

In the midst of her busy life, Mrs. Paxson's deep love of beauty found expression in the enjoyment of fine literature, the writing of poetry and the delicate water color sketches from her brush. She was a lover of birds and her garden was one of her best friends.

Mrs. Paxson is survived by four children, William Paxson, of Springfield, Eleanor P. Keighton of Cedar lane, Carol P. Brainerd of Exton, Margaret P. Jacob of Elverson, ten grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

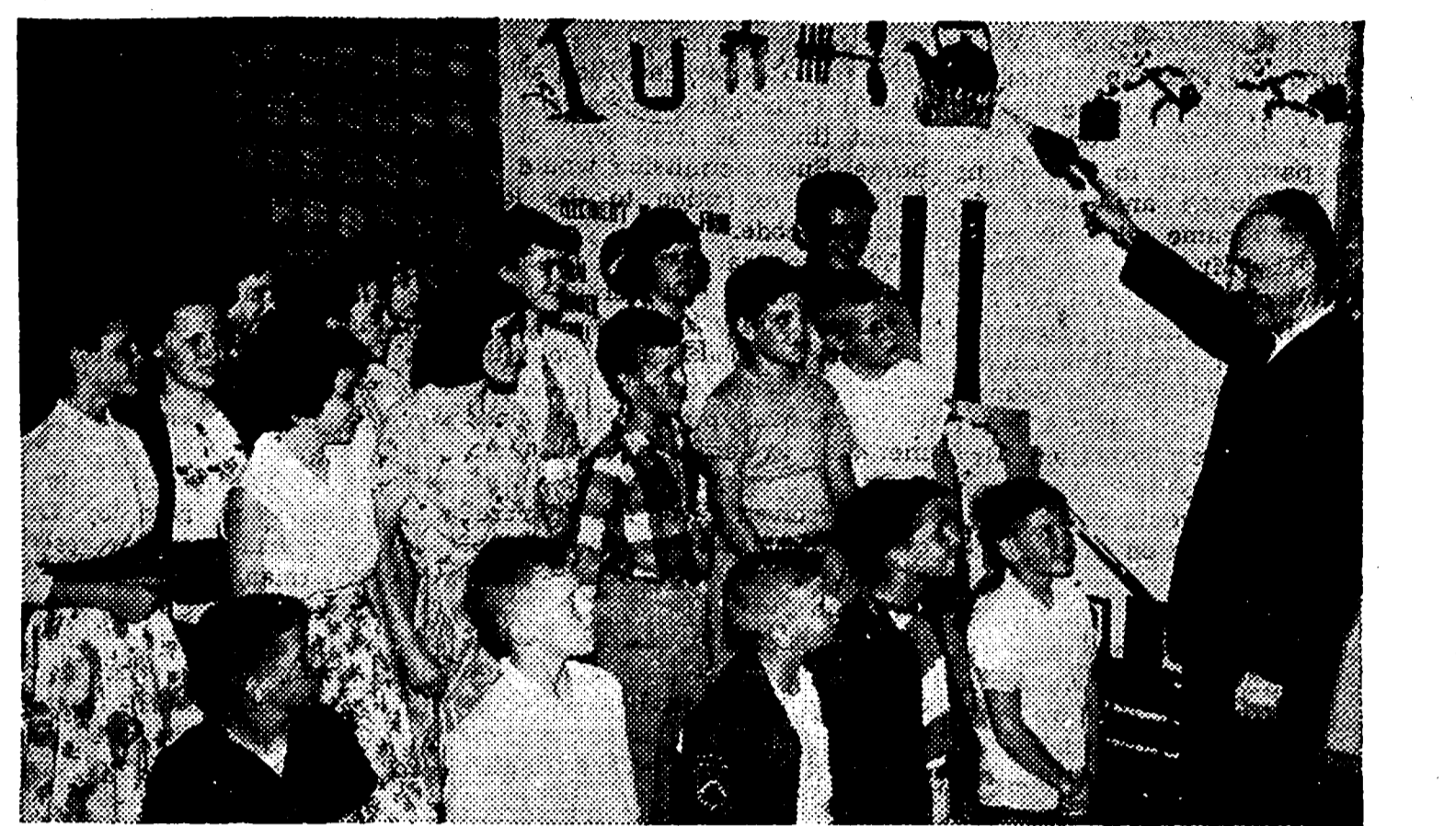

**UNCHAPERONED KIDDIES SHOULD AVOID POOL SITE**

Club Doing Utmost Toward July 1 Swimming

Children who have been visiting the site of the Swarthmore Swim Club's uncompleted pool, unaccompanied by their parents, were a source of anxiety to the Club's board of directors at a meeting on Tuesday evening. Noting that such visitors had increased since schools recessed for the summer, the Board reviewed the many dangers which children encounter on the pool property as workmen rush to complete the project for use. The construction machinery, depth of pool sidings, and rain water accumulated in the deep end are hazards which the Swim Club directors hope parents will have their children avoid by restraining them from exploring the site at Riverview avenue and the railroad unless accompanied by an adult.

At Tuesday night's session the board finalized the Club's initial by-laws which it plans to issue to members very soon. It also concentrated every effort toward trying to finish the pool and a minimum of required auxiliary facilities in time for members to be able to enjoy their use over the Fourth of July week-end despite the delay occasioned by the past ten days' weather.

**More Efforts to Band Young Mourning Doves**

Over the past weekend a follow-up of the dove's nest at the Landon residence, 307 North Princeton avenue, disclosed that the nest contains one egg. As a rule Mourning Doves have two eggs per setting, although a few records exist of three or even four. Single eggs observed late in incubation, as in the present case, may indicate the loss of one through some accident.

On June 11 Henry Coe reported a nest with young near his home at 130 Guernsey road, Henry has just completed ninth grade at Swarthmore High; he discovered the nest, about 12 feet in elevation, in a juniper tree overgrown with vines, alongside an ash sapling. Access to the nest was attained by scaling the ash tree and stepping across to the juniper at nest level, a feat too hazardous to be assigned to anyone but an agent of the Fish and Wildlife Service.

This nest contained, again, a single fledgling, just at proper banding age. The number of young is of course not indicative of the original number of eggs, for accidents to baby birds are even more frequent than those occurring during incubation.

Mrs. W. O. Heinze, 922 Strath Haven avenue, telephoned about a nest in a hawthorn tree close to the house. Unfortunately the young were full-fledged, and when a ladder was raised against the tree on June 14, they flew away on strong wings.

The total banding score thus stands at three birds. Further information on Mourning Doves' nests should still be reported to Dr. Worth at Swarthmore 6-4444.

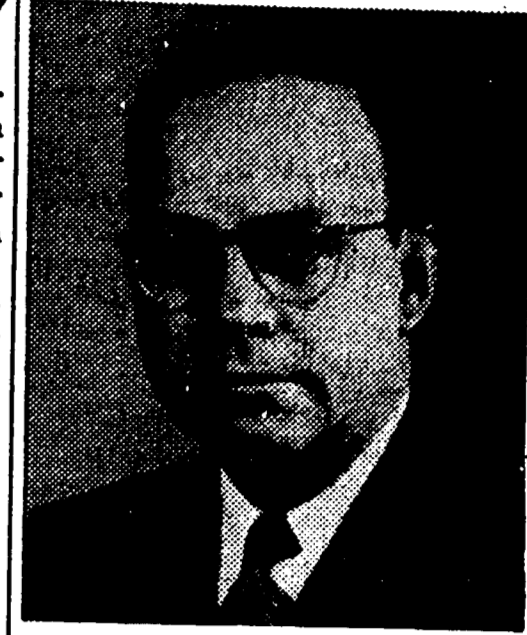

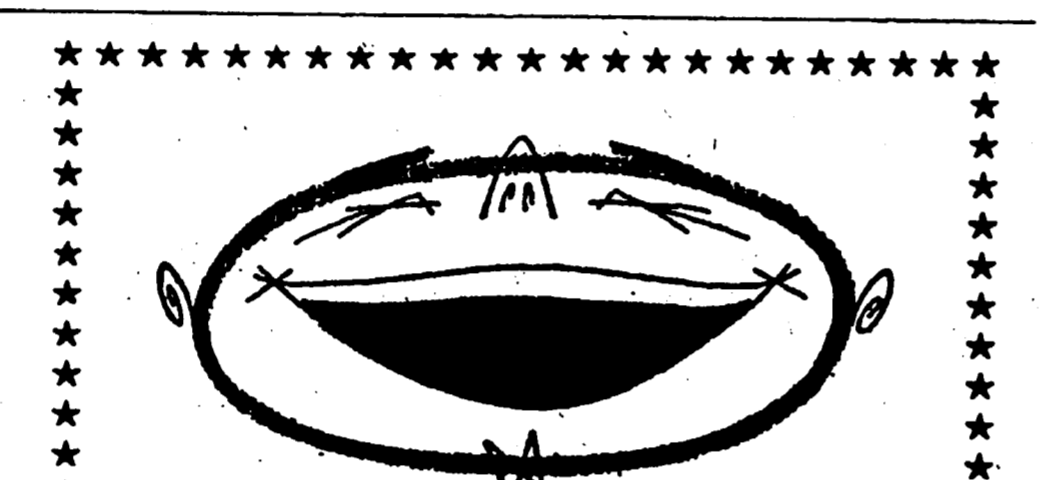

The Morse party went to the dining room for lunch and soon Mr. Zimmerman came with his wife, followed by Mr. and Mrs. Martin Boyken (school teacher), Dr. and Mrs. H. J. von Brandis (surgeon), and Mrs. Hildegard Schneider (wife of a lawyer). Mrs. Schneider brought with her a letter she had just received from Mrs. John Michael saying that she was sorry that she would not be able to come to Stade on her present trip to Europe.

Mr. Boyken took the whole party on a conducted tour of Stade which the Morges describe as a quaint, walled, medieval city. They saw many rhododendron in bloom, thought that the planting seemed similar to Swarthmore's. They visited the "beautiful church," the town hall (it was there, they were told, that the team was chosen for their "great adventure"), the old Guild Hall, several medieval buildings. (Continued from Page 1) sion for a garage addition which would extend further toward the street than the front wall of his home. Such permission would require an exception to the local building code. The proposal of H. D. Sipler to build a garage and storage structure on a 20 by 20 foot foundation of a former building across the alleyway at the rear of his South Chester road place of business, met with Councilmanic approval. Dr. and Mrs. Walter P. Billstein received favor for their request to build a swimming pool at their home, 309 South Chester road.

Gennaro Pinto of 558 Juniata avenue was told Council had no objection to his seeding and gardening part of the unopened extension of Rutgers avenue which borders his home. Council listened to the complaints of a dozen new homeowners in the southeastern section of the borough, as voiced by Luke W. Corbett, 546 Marietta Marietta.
