Dr. Fehnel Receives \$2500 Research Grant

College Prof. to Investigate Field of Cancer Chemotherapy

The National Cancer Institute of the U.S. Public Health Service has announced the award of a \$2,500 research grant to Dr. Edward A. Fehnel of the chemistry department of Swarthmore College for support of an investigation in the field of cancer chemotherapy. The objective of the investigation will be to develop syntheses for new types of organic compounds with potential anti-tumor activity.

According to Dr. Fehnel, there is reason to hope that specific chemotherapeutic cures for at least some types of cancer may eventually be discovered, just as specific drugs have been developed to combat most of the common bacterial diseases.

Part of the grant will be used to provide Dr. Fehnel with student assistance in his synthetic work next summer.

Emma N. Boesche School Teacher, Dies

Emma N. Boesche, a retired schoolteacher who had made her home in Swarthmore for nearly 15 years, died Tuesday at the hospital of the University of Pennsylvania after a long illness. Miss Boesche, who was 78, lived at 110 Park avenue. She was born in Council Bluffs,

Iowa, the daughter of Herman and Walpurga Boesche. Both parents had come to the United States from Germany, he to enlist in the Union Army to fight for the liberation of the slaves. Miss Boesche joined the faculty of the Abraham Lincoln High School in Council Bluffs at the age of 17 and taught mathematics there for 46 years. She possessed to an unusual degree the gift of making mathematics lively and interesting to high school youngsters, many of whom continued to correspond with her for years after their graduation. Among them were many who later became prominent in educational and business

Soon after her retirement in 1940, Miss Boesche and her sister. Mrs. Louise A. Sears, moved from Council Bluffs to Swarthmore. Mrs. Sears died last January.

Miss Boesche is survived by her niece. Mrs. Stephen M. Spencer of Ogden avenue; a nephew Melvin L. Sears of Palo Alto. Calif.: four grand-nephews, Dr. Steven S. Spencer, Douglas and David Spencer, and Richard Sears, and a grand-niece Patricia Sears.

Funeral services are to be held on Saturday in Council Bluffs, with interment in Fairview Cemetery there.

Catherine May Isberg Dies After Long Illness
