## School Needs Report Received by Board

What, Where When, How  
to Build Is  
Poser

Allan C. Wood, president of the Swarthmore Property Owners Association, reversed his former conviction that future elementary classes should be concentrated at the Rutgers Avenue School, and Wednesday evening told the Swarthmore - Rutledge School Board that he now favors a building on another site to accommodate part of the enrollment.

Wood's statement came as the Board held a special meeting to receive and express appreciation for a 60-page report presented by its Lay Building Study Committee. Charles H. Topping and John W. Carroll, chairmen respectively of the lay sub-committees on land and buildings and on educational standards and needs, spoke. Property and Board Chairman Samuel Carpenter "charted" a resume of recommended means of caring for increasing elementary and high school enrollments.

Wood said he had recently checked distances and found the many little children living in the far end of the Borough would create a transportation problem if the entire elementary school was at Rutgers Avenue. He also said the resultant 700-pupil school would be cumbersome on one site.

The favored recommendation of both sub-committees and Wood, (Continued on Page 5)

## Services Today for Mrs. Charles Minor

Park Avenue Woman Vic-  
tim of Short  
Illness

A memorial service for Mrs. Jane Hall Minor, widow of Dr. Charles L. Minor, will be held at 2:30 this afternoon in the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Minor died Tuesday morning of a coronary attack following a day's virus illness at 224 Park avenue where she had lived since coming to Swarthmore in 1937.

Born March 29, 1876 in Springfield, Ohio, she continued to live in that city until after the death of her husband, a physician, in 1936. She was a former president of the Young Woman's Mission Society and ex-president of the Springfield Woman's Club.

Since moving to Swarthmore she was active in the Presbyterian Woman's Association and in the local Poets Circle as well as in the New Century Club of Philadelphia. She also was a member of the Swarthmore Woman's Club and a former member of the Swarthmore Music Club.

Surviving are a daughter, Marcia (Mrs. Cyrus R.) Harvey, and three grandsons, Charles, Eric, and John, of Gtadyville; and two nieces, Mrs. Eleanor Adams of St. Paul, Minn., formerly of Wallingford; and Elizabeth Dresler of Dayton, Ohio.

Cremation will follow the memorial service. Interment will take place later in Springfield, Ohio.

## D.W.R. Morgan Named Prof. at Drexel Inst.

Former Borough Council  
President to Teach  
Engineering

Dr. David W. R. Morgan, immediate past president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and a retired vice-president of the Westinghouse Electric Corporation has been appointed professor of engineering at Drexel Institute of Technology, according to Dr. James Creese, institute president.

"In a period in which the tendency is for college professors to migrate from the campus to industry, we are happy to report a reversal of the flow", stated Dr. Creese in making the announcement. "Because of our intimate identification with commerce and industry, we are particularly fortunate in obtaining the services of Dr. Morgan who is well known in the field of engineering."

Identified with Westinghouse from his graduation from Ohio Northern University in 1913 until his recent retirement, Dr. Morgan became manager of the company's condenser engineering department in 1918, moving with that department to South Philadelphia two years later. Since 1940, he has held various positions in sales, engineering and manufacturing. He was appointed general manager of the steam and aviation gas turbine divisions in 1946 and was elected vice-president in 1948. In this capacity he served as general manager of the South Philadelphia works until August, (Continued on Page 5)

## To Describe Ministry In Industry, Labor

Presbyterian Women Bring  
N. J. Pastor to Tell  
Unique Story

The Rev. Delwyn R. Rayson, pastor of the Community Presbyterian Church, Mountainside, N.J., will address the evening meeting of the Woman's Association of the Presbyterian Church Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the church sanctuary. Mr. Rayson will relate his experiences in the church ministry to Industry and Labor. The meeting is open to all interested.

Until recently, Mr. Rayson was a pastor in Elizabeth, N. J., working in the Greystone Presbyterian Church. Due to the inner city location of this parish, Mr. Rayson became deeply interested in finding ways by which his church could relate more creatively to the laboring class of men and women around him.

In consequence he began training at the Institute for Labor Relations under the leadership of the Rev. Marshall Scott which is now moved to Chicago from New York. This institute is dedicated to the improvement of the church's ministry to Industry and Labor.



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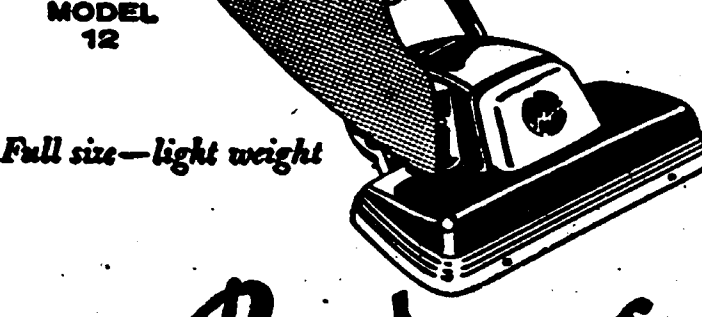
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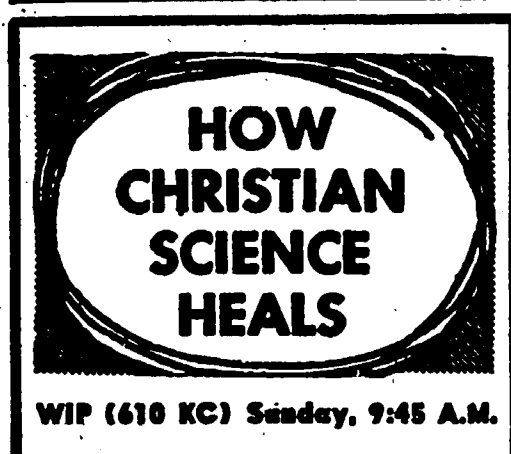

who served on the land and building division, seems to be the conversion of the present College Avenue Elementary School into a junior high school, building a seven-room elementary school on the Riverview Avenue field, and adding four more rooms to the present Rutgers School.

The above plan was estimated to cost around \$564,000 including needed modernization of the present high school building. The plan which would build all new elementary rooms at Rutgers was estimated at \$528,000, and another alternate that would retain the present College Avenue Elementary School, build a three-story, eight-room wing onto the present high school, and add four rooms at Rutgers was listed roughly at \$489,000. Mr. Topping pointed out that a 25 to 30 per cent variation in given estimates was possible.

After asking John Spencer, its finance chairman, to make a study of all means of financing building needs, through the school district's own borrowing capacity and through an Authority, the Board went into executive session to informally explore the myriad facets of the situation.

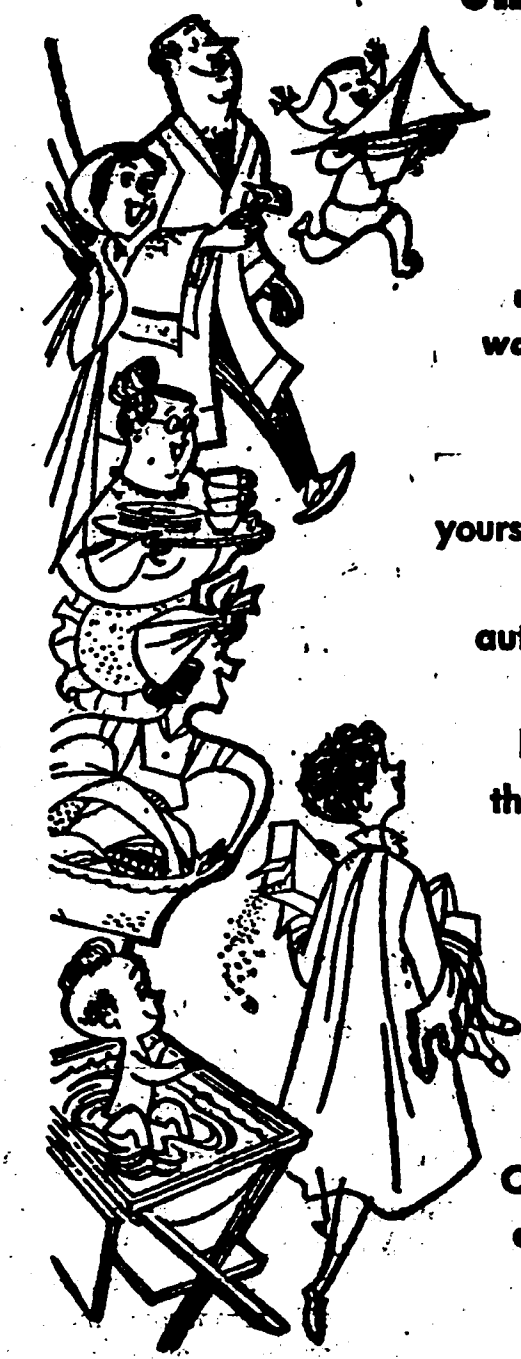

## Mid-Winter Notes From Local Bird Stations

A recent telephone call from a Swarthmore resident pertained to a suspected shrike annoying birds at a feeding station. During winter we may expect to see an occasional Migrant Shrike hereabouts, although the comings and goings of this northern representative of the common Loggerhead Shrike of our southern States are highly irregular. An extreme winter rarity here would be the Northern Shrike from Arctic regions. Hence any shrike identified by an amateur would be open to suspicion.

Conversation brought out the fact that the belligerent bird at the feeding station was probably a wintering Mockingbird. Whereas the sallies of shrikes have lethal intent, Mockingbirds are just plain mean and go about chasing lesser birds with no murderous motives but only to clear the territory for their selfish selves. It would not be difficult for a person unfamiliar with either species to make the wrong identification, for both birds are gray with white tail patches, and are approximately the same size (between Bluebird and Robin).

Another resident described — and correctly identified — a Hermit Thrush. This species winters sparsely in our region but is to be expected more routinely in Crum Woods than at a bird feeder. However, the report stated that a thick planting of rhododendrons behind the house seemed to have brought the bird there. A handy windmill bird feeder near-by was therefore adopted as a matter of course.

Hermit Thrushes are scarcely to be confused with other winter birds here. They are the only possible thrush to see. Besides looking typically thrush-like, they have a unique antic which is to bob their tails up and down in a rather deliberate way.

Close to Swarthmore, at 313 Sharp avenue in Glenolden, three House Finches are spending the winter enjoying the bird seed of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Gillespie. House Finches are a bird of our far west but were introduced on Long Island some years ago and have established themselves successfully there. It is a mystery where the Glenolden birds originated, but it seems likely that they have come from Long Island, not Colorado.

The Gillespies have banded birds for many years. Thus their feeder is well known among the bird populace. The fact that Purple Finches are wintering there too, may explain how the House Finches located the spot. To see House Finches and Purple Finches side by side makes it easy to identify the rare species. The Gillespies, by the way, are always happy to demonstrate their unusual avian guests to any interested persons who ring their doorbell.

"Ted" Rigby of Media informs me that Evening Grosbeaks are scattered through Delaware County this winter, being actually abundant in certain spots in New Jersey. I have not yet seen any, but readers of The Swarthmorean who feed the birds should not be too astonished to observe one or more of these large, thick-billed finches with white wing patches. — C. Brooke Worth

## Students, Teachers To Attend ASC Meet College, High School, In- vited to Symposium Feb. 16

The first Delaware Valley Regional meeting of the American Chemical Society will be host to a group of students and teachers from Swarthmore on February 16 at Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia.

Seven professors and instructors from Swarthmore College and the high school have been invited to bring outstanding students to an all-day symposium on the opportunities in chemistry as a career, arranged by the chemists as an adjunct to their professional meeting nearby.

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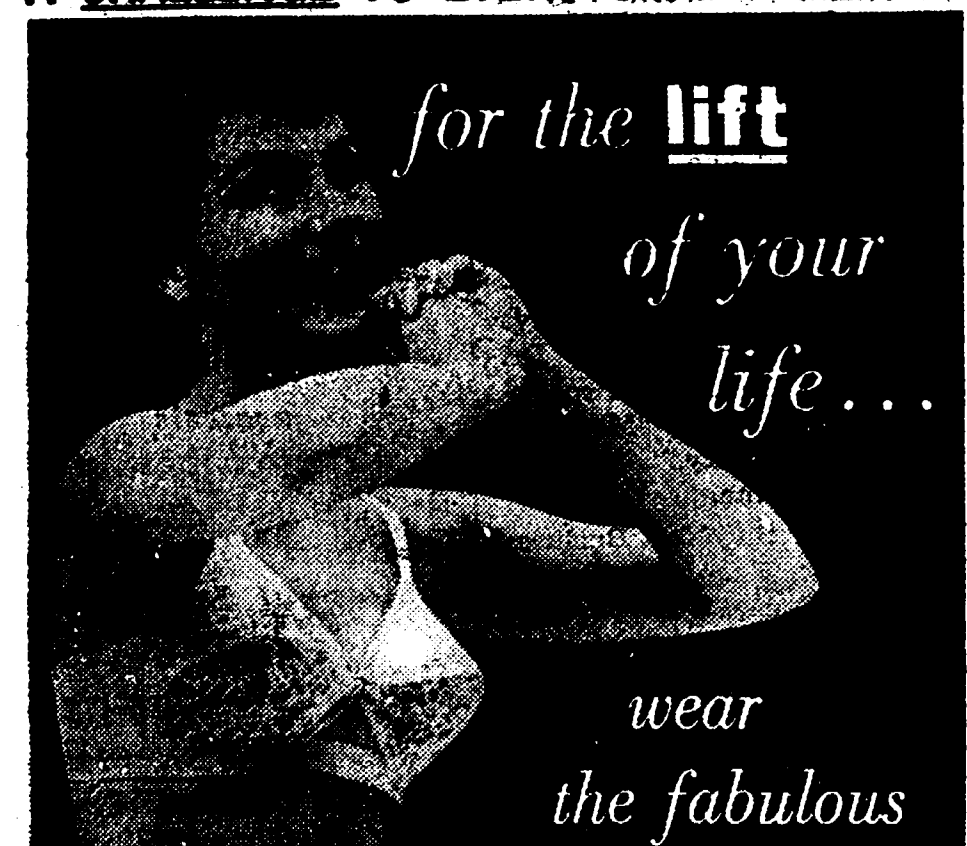
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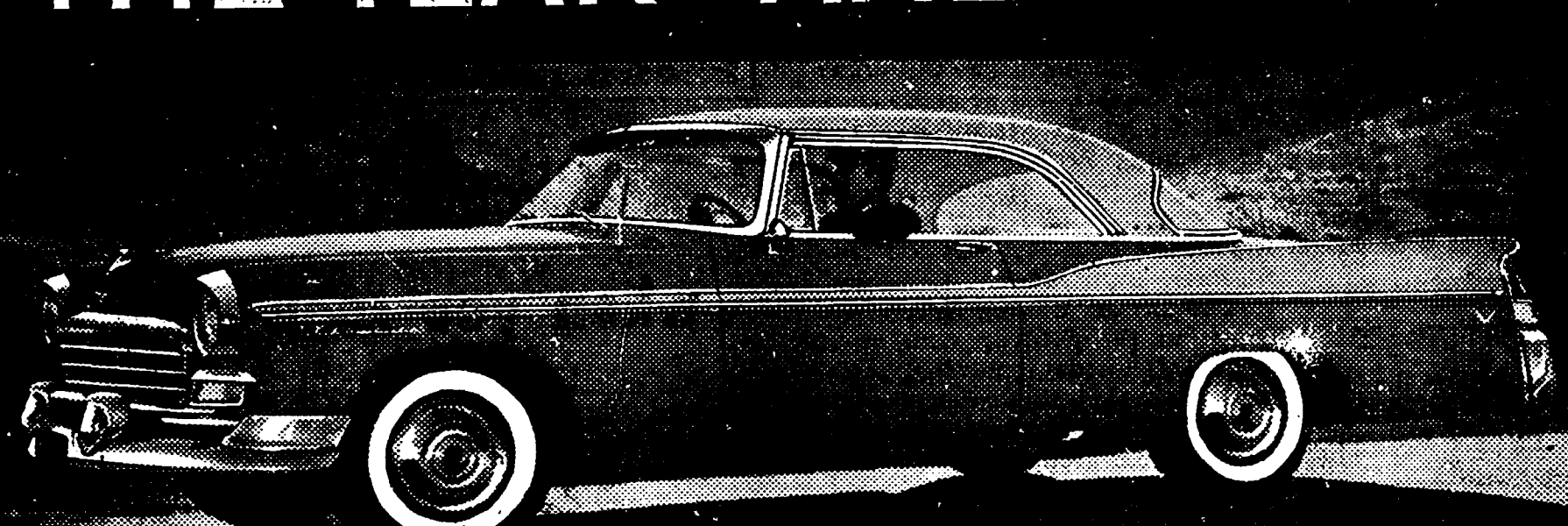
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High School Musicians

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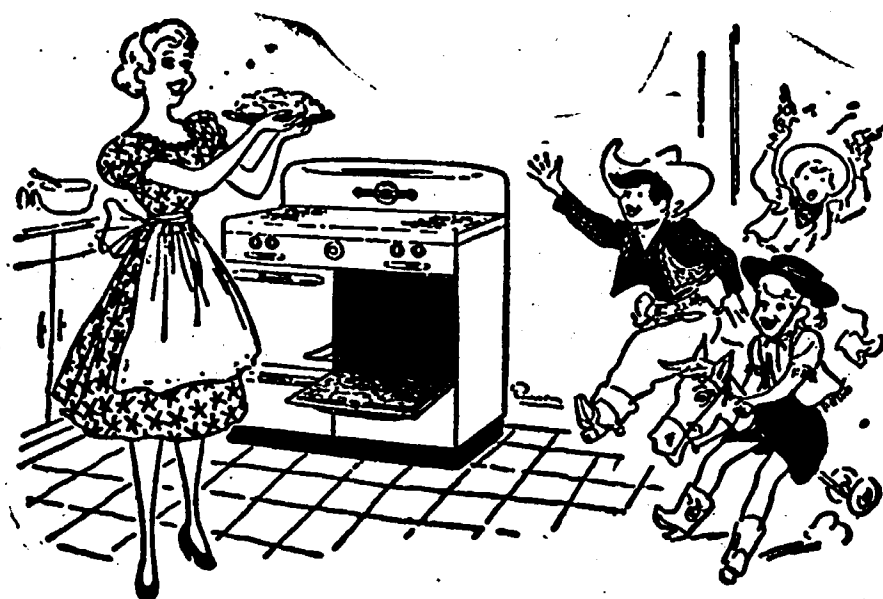

might help out optimistic budgeters as the year progresses, for after next month's final payment of \$190 to the Park-O-Meter Company the haul will be entirely the Borough's.

The new budget provides 5 per cent pay increases for members of the police force. Street lighting allotment was also increased by an annual \$780 when Council voted to comply with the Business Association's request for improved lighting in the business area. A lone dissenting vote to the lighting increase was cast by Carroll.

Council moved to place a sign on Cedar lane prohibiting use of that street to trucks except for local deliveries. A "thru traffic to left" sign will also be placed at Cedar lane and Swarthmore avenue to direct southbound traffic into the turn which State Route 320 makes at this point.

Requests to the State for repair of Chester road between Yale avenue and Fairview road, and to the Pennsylvania Railroad for remedy of dangerously broken steps and future removal of any snow and ice at the Princeton avenue pedestrian underpass, were issued.

Birney Morse, public safety chairman, reported the public library could be air-conditioned by four two-ton conditioners for an expenditure of \$1600 and the police and secretary offices included for an additional \$1000.

A Civil Defense request for an emergency truck was held for study. The request, made by Charles Fleck to tie the knot at 64-64 and relayed by Councilman Lukens, proposed that the \$6000 cost be shared equally between the Borough and a Federal grant.

ORDINANCE NO. 580

An Ordinance creating a Department of Borough Planning to be in the charge of a Borough Planning Commission, prescribing the jurisdiction, duties and powers thereof, requiring certain plans of real estate development and municipal projects to be submitted thereto, and prescribing penalties for the violation of this ordinance.

**THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE DOES ORDAIN:**

Section 1. Department of Planning. A department of the Borough of Swarthmore is hereby created, to be known as the Department of Borough Planning, which shall be in charge of the Borough Planning Commission.

Section 2. Organization of The Commission. The following residents of the Borough of Swarthmore are hereby appointed as original Planning Commissioners, for the terms indicated:

Walter H. Mason one (1) year  
Philip W. Kinkor two (2) years  
Raymond K. Denworth three (3) years  
Rosa E. Hopkins four (4) years  
John D. DeWolf five (5) years

Annually thereafter a resident of this Borough shall be appointed by Borough Council to serve on said Planning Commission for a term of five (5) years. If the term of any member becomes vacant the Council shall appoint a qualified resident of the Borough to fill such vacancy for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. Jurisdiction. The Borough Planning Commission shall have the jurisdiction now or hereafter prescribed by law and by ordinances of the Borough of Swarthmore currently in force. It may make recommendations to any public authorities on any matters or individuals in the Borough with reference to the location of any building, structures or works to be erected or constructed by them.

Section 4. Duties. The Commission shall act promptly upon all matters submitted to it. Three members shall constitute a quorum. It shall have the right to report its transactions to Council.

Section 5. Powers, Expense. With the prior approval, by motion, of Borough Council, the Commission may employ engineers and other persons, and incur authorized expense. It may contract for professional planning services, the cost and expense of which, when approved by Council, shall be provided for through proper appropriation by Council.

Section 6. Maps, Plans. The Commission may make, or cause to be made, and lay before Council, and, at its discretion cause to be published, maps of the Borough or any portion thereof, including territory extending three miles beyond the Borough limits, showing the streets and highways, and other natural and artificial features, and also locations proposed by it for any new public buildings, civic center, street, parkway, park, playground, or any other public ground or public improvement, or any widening, extension, or relocation of the same, or any change in the Borough plan with relation to any of the same, and to the location of any bridge, tunnel, ground, or elevated railway. The said commission shall have the power to disapprove any of the said ordinances, bills or amendments, which disapproval, however, must be communicated to Council in writing within ten (10) days from the introduction of said ordinances, but such disapproval shall not operate as a veto.

Section 7. Penalties. Any owner or agent of the owner of any land subject to the provisions of this ordinance who shall sell, transfer or agree to sell any land by reference to, or exhibition of, or by any other use of a plan of subdivision or development containing three (3) or more lots before the same has been approved by the Borough Planning Commission shall, upon summary conviction before any Justice of the Peace, be subject to a fine or imprisonment for a term not more than thirty (30) days. The Borough may also enjoin such transfer or sale or agreement by action for injunction in a court having jurisdiction of such cause.

## Six Pupils Granted Vocational School

A possible 1 per cent of Swarthmore-Rutledge School District pupils would attend a proposed Delaware County Vocational High School, according to a committee which the School Board decided, Monday evening, to forward to the County Superintendent's office. The Board voted to formally indicate interest in such a high school to the extent of two students a year, or a total of six over the tenth, eleven and twelfth grades. The Board was reticent to overcommit itself, and lacked confidence in the finality of choice indicated by a survey of present high school pupils.

In the survey, held this week, 11 girls and 12 boys in grades 7 through 12, with parental approval, stated they would be interested in attending the vocational school if it were available. Of 618 questionnaires circulated, 354 were returned. Courses which those interested would take included: beauty operator, secretarial, mechanics, carpentry, machinist, cabinet making, electronics, food trades, decorating, computation machine operation, sheet metal work, auto repair and practical nursing. Of the total evincing interest seven were in the seventh grade, one in the eighth, one in ninth, two in tenth, seven in eleventh and five in twelfth.

In a roughly projected picture of School District finances over the next six years, Board Treasurer John F. Spencer used a 40 mill realty tax rate beginning this year and a 42 mill rate beginning two years hence. Although no accurate prediction of levies could be made at this time, Spencer said some increase over the present 35 mills is mandatory even without new elementary and high school building.

Spencer's report came as the Board launched in earnest into the problem of accommodating skyrocketing enrollments. Weight capacity against resorting to a local authority, it seemed the for-

mer, if it could be managed, would be more economical and retain more freedom and control in hands of the School District. The Board also managed to agree that, at least at the moment, a plan which would remove all elementary grades from the College Avenue site was preferable. Whether a new elementary school would be built at Rutgers Avenue or at Riverview Avenue will be based primarily on educational advantage, it was stated.

The Board decided not to devote any of its tight funds to hiring an outside consultant to study its problems. The recent report of the lay building committee had recommended that the Board engage services of a specialist in school planning, to review the overall need and recommend solution.

Final decisions must be made by the Board in any event. The Board felt the local situation is so limited by space available and educational policy already established that Board members, armed by their long studies and the excellent surveys of the lay committees, were in as good a position as anyone to resolve the situation to Swarthmore's taste.

Mrs. Marion Becker, eighth grade English and social studies teacher, was granted a leave of absence without pay for the 1956-57 school year in order to accompany her husband, George, who will study and travel in Great Britain and western Europe during his sabbatical year from Swarthmore College.

A one-cent cut in the Federal lunch subsidy as of February 1 was announced. Originally nine cents, the subsidy was cut to six cents last fall and now will be five cents.

The Board will review educational features with teachers at an informal meeting at the home of President Donald P. Jones on Swarthmore Avenue, Wednesday evening, February 22.

## Ibsen Revival Now At Players Club

The Players Club revival of Henrik Ibsen's "Hedda Gabler" opened Monday night at the Fairview road clubhouse where it will play through Saturday night. Curtain time is 8:20.

To the untinted, the attraction of the role of Hedda holds for actresses of great ability is inexplicable. Attempts to explain her malevolence do not lessen the evil she embodies. It has been said that if Hedda Gabler had been called Medea, her egotistic ferocity would not have distressed the critics who complain that of all Ibsen's "unwomanly women" she is the prime example.

Peggy Pugh plays the tremendously taxing role with evident ability and sincerity. She needs more even support. Critics agree that there is no let-down in an Ibsen play; every word is necessary to the whole. Therefore an Ibsen revival requires the sustained best of its entire staff.

Joyce Noone appears in the role of Berta, the Tesman servant. The role is slight yet frequently has the foretelling power of a Greek chorus. Mrs. Noone is consistently able. Dorothy Moore does a telling job as Miss Juliana Tesman, especially in the first act when the warmth of her affection bounces off Hedda's rude repulses. Her business with the hat is, of course, one of the lighter moments. Sonia Griffin as Mrs. Elvsted enters into the most sympathetic role with warmth and charm.

Gilman Spencer is adequate as Eliart Lovborg, turning in a commendable performance. Maurice Webster's Judge Brack lacks savaneness and the timing which progresses the action, despite consistent amiability. David Elkington works hard in the ineffectual role of George Tesman. Ibsen's sharp, cruel character contrasts come through very well.

The staging is excellent; the production staff earns commendation. The Peer Gynt music sets the necessary atmosphere. Robert G. Gillilan directs the ambitious production with Donald H. Pugh assisting.

## BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE NO. 579

An Ordinance Fixing the Rate of Taxation for the Year 1956 for General Purposes of the Borough of Swarthmore, for Aiding in the Maintenance of the Free Library and for Payment of Interest on the Debt of the Borough, and Payments into the Sinking Funds as Required by Law.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1. That for the year 1956 a tax be and the same is hereby levied upon all property in the Borough of Swarthmore, subject to taxation for Borough purposes, at the rate of sixteen and one-half (16½) mills on each dollar of the valuation of same as assessed for County purposes.

Section 2. The tax above levied shall be apportioned to and among the following purposes:

- For general Borough purposes a tax at the rate of thirteen (13) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation;
- For debt purposes, and payments into Sinking Fund No. 12, a tax at the rate of one-half (½) mill on each dollar of assessed valuation;
- For debt purposes, and payments into Sinking Fund No. 13, a tax at the rate of one and one-half (1½) mill on each dollar of assessed valuation;
- For aiding in the maintenance of the Free Library a tax at the rate of one and one-half (1½) mill on each dollar of assessed valuation;

making a total rate of Borough tax for the foregoing purposes of sixteen and one-half (16½) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation, as aforesaid.

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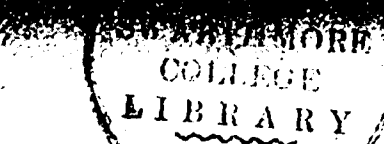

Chosen from among six entries, these plays will compete for the annual Book and Key Contest Award. The audience will judge the best play, director, actress, and actor.

"No Roses," written by Barbara Behnke, concerns a tangled conflict between a mother with one daughter pursuing a journalistic career and the other married to a lazy sluggard.

Written by the veteran Little Theater Club actor, Chris Lehmann-Haupt, "Love! I Love Thee Not" finds a misunderstood preacher's son and his confused younger sister torn by split loyalties.

"Matilda," a story of a parents-son clash over procrastination in getting a summer job, was written by Philip Fanning, who acted last year in the LTC productions "Hamlet" and "Six Characters in Search of an Author."

## Flood Relief Appeal Issued by Red Cross

The American Red Cross issues through its local chapter a special disaster appeal due to "a series of natural disasters unique in its experience."

Floods in December and January affected more than 17,000 families in western states, 9,000 of whom will require Red Cross help to the extent of \$8,000,000. Last fall the eastern states flood required expenditures in excess of \$17,750,000 by the Red Cross to rehabilitate its victims. More than \$750,000 was spent in the South-eastern Chapter's area, of which \$410,000 was contributed locally.

Major disasters since July 1, the start of the Red Cross fiscal year, have cost the organization an all-time high of more than \$27,000,000. Expenditures for disaster relief operations during the previous fiscal year were slightly over \$7,000,000. In addition to known needs, the Red Cross must plan to finance disaster relief for the remainder of the fiscal year, normally the heaviest disaster period due to spring floods and tornadoes.

"The Red Cross has no choice but to make this appeal," National Chairman E. Roland Harriman says. "All the will in the world is of no avail without funds."
