## All Elementary Grades To Be at Rutgers

### Board Strives for Early School Solution

Tentative decision to provide all contemplated elementary classrooms in a new unit at Rutgers avenue, but separate from the present school at that site, was reached near midnight Wednesday by the Swarthmore - Rutledge School Board. Just when the first rooms would be built is not yet decided. Four rooms were estimated by Dr. Samuel T. Carpenter, as an absolute necessity by September, 1957 and an additional seven by September, 1959 when it is judged the high school will take over the present college Avenue School.

Although the Board reached unanimous decision after long study of all angles of locating the new school and realizes the impossibility of satisfying everyone's desire in this regard, it stated that letters from any residents who believe they might have a better

## John Conway Funeral Tomorrow Morning

### Former Fire Chief Lived Here 71 Years

Solemn requiem mass will be celebrated for John F. Conway tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Morton. Friends may call this evening at Mr. Conway's late home, 322 Dartmouth avenue, where he passed away early Tuesday morning. Having suffered with arteriosclerosis for six months, Mr. Conway had been bedridden for the past five weeks.

Born in Philadelphia, Mr. Conway came to Swarthmore as a boy in 1885 with his family. He attended Oakdale School on Baltimore pike, Springfield. He operated a grocery business in Swarthmore until 1930 when he entered the electrical business with his son Thomas F. Conway of Park avenue.

His wife, the former Mary Flynn of Philadelphia whom he married in 1908 in the Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Media, died in March 1947. Shortly after their marriage the Morton church was finished and Mr. Conway became a member there and joined its Holy Name Society.

He was one of the oldest members of the Swarthmore Fire Company and in addition to serving terms as chief in 1930 and 1931, he had served as assistant chief.

Surviving besides his son are three sisters living in Swarthmore, Florence Conway of the Dartmouth avenue address, Mrs. John Campbell of Drexel road, and Mrs. Charles Wertz of Railroad avenue; two brothers James of Media and Joseph of Prospect Park; and two grandchildren Patricia Louise and Elizabeth Ann of Park avenue.

Interment will be in Calvary cemetery, Media.

As a living illustration of the slogan "Help a child return to play, buy a daisy Daisy Day," more than 80 girls from the Swarthmore Junior-Senior High School will stand at strategic locations in the village this weekend to "tag" passers-by with a daisy for contributions to the Children's Heart Hospital of Philadelphia.

All funds received will go towards providing day-by-day care of patients who cannot pay their own way. This children's hospital is the first of its kind in United States and the only one where a child in need can receive free medical care.

Beginning today and continuing through tomorrow, May fifth, the girls from the seventh through ninth grades will work in shifts under the supervision of Co-Chairmen Mrs. Wallace McCrory and Mrs. Frederick Dudley and their committee.

## Tenor Soloist Feature For Tuesday Program

### Women's Luncheon Will Precede Concert

Fritz Krueger of Havertown, outstanding young tenor who has appeared five times as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, will entertain members of the Swarthmore Woman's Club next Tuesday afternoon with a program, "Contrasts in Music." Mr. Krueger's concert, including opera, concert and oratorio selections, will follow the club's spring luncheon and annual meeting.

Mr. Krueger's career has been one of unusual interest and scope. From a dynamite man with the U. S. Forestry Service, this young tenor became a concert artist of national repute. Into a short space of time, he crowded a career of study and travel as colorful as his personality. He studied for a year in pre-medics at Yen Ching University, Peking, China; did pre-theological work in Nebraska; completed his music education in Ohio with degrees of A.B. and B.M.; received a scholarship for graduate study at Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia under Emilio de Gorgorza; studied in Europe and then spent three years as leading tenor with the Philadelphia Opera Company.

Mr. Krueger has also appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia "Pops" orchestra, the Philadelphia Civic Opera Company; Philadelphia Choral Society; Symphony orchestra of both Hagerstown, Md., and Springfield, Mo.; the Mendelssohn Clubs of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh; the Detroit Choral Union; numerous college and church groups; and music clubs in New York State and Canada.

Mrs. Krueger, an outstanding musician in her own right, will accompany him at the piano.

Mrs. W. R. LeCron, music chairman, is in charge of the program, and will introduce Mr. Krueger.

## Hart Breaks 5-Mile Record Set in 1918

Dick Hart of the Collegiate Track and Field Club of Swarthmore, broke the American record in the Olympic development five mile run sponsored Saturday on the college track, by the Middle Atlantic Association of the Amateur Athletic Union. His time, 24:23.6, bettered the 24:38.8 record set in 1918 by Charles Porez at the Great Lakes Track Training Station.

Hart holds the American record for six miles which he made at the college on October 1.

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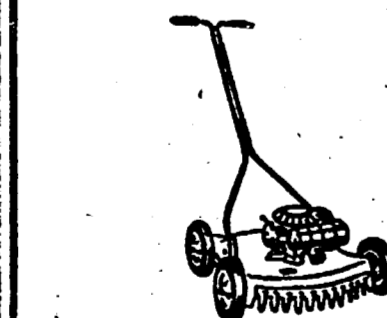

## IN BLOOM THIS WEEK ON THE CAMPUS

**Cherries**—late varieties will be at their height. They are between the Meeting House walk and the President's house.

**Crab Apples**—part of the collection is above the Tree Feony bank, south of the College avenue entrance. More varieties are on three sides of the girls' athletic field.

**Tree Peonies**—flowers will be opening on the bank near College avenue, and in the triangle on the north side of Beardsley.

**Herbaceous Peonies**—some handsome and interesting early varieties will be opening in the display garden, west of the railroad station.

**Azaleas**—Azalea schlippenbachii, a fine early pink, is in bloom in the woods surrounding the auditorium. Other Azaleas will be opening in many parts of the campus for the next month.

**Rhododendrons**—a few smaller kinds are already in bloom. Watch the area below the auditorium for more early varieties, which open a few at a time. These woods will be worth a thorough exploration for the next month.

**Lilacs**—the early varieties near the Meeting House are in bloom, and the so-called French Lilacs will follow them closely.

**Hawthorns**—the walk from Parrish to Bond is lined with American species and varieties of the English Hawthorns.

 plan will be considered if received before final decision must be set.  
 Hazards and lack of space helped rule out a school for lower grades on the Riverview avenue athletic field which has been discussed in the past. Educationally and practically concentration of the entire elementary body at Rutgers was deemed advisable.  
 However, the plan calls for entering the proposed school from the Kenyon, Bowdoin avenue area in order to avoid congesting traffic further in front of the present school.  
 Board Treasurer John Spencer submitted a projected financial summary indicating approximately \$200,000 could be borrowed under the School District's borrowing capacity (including permission of the electorate) within the next two school years and carried on a ten-year loan at a tax rate of 42 mills until the year 1960 when another \$205,000 borrowing capacity would have accumulated for use in meeting remaining elementary and high school needs. Spencer stressed the fact that it was possible to vary the figures greatly one way and another in accordance with the Board's establishing the exact cost of its most pressing needs.  
 In other business the Board granted Mary Armstrong, high school English teacher, sabbatical leave for the 1956-57 school year. It accepted the resignation of Patricia Pierce, art teacher at the Rutledge School.  
 A report from Harry Oppenlander of the faculty revealed only seven parents were interested in having their children take driving education courses at the Summer School. This was not considered sufficient to support such a course so it will not be included in the curriculum this year.  
 The Board forwarded a resolution to the County Board of School Directors asking that the County Board press for county-wide equalization of realty tax assessments.

The Rev. Mr. Jones served for many years in Congregational Churches in California and Oregon. In addition to his brother, he is survived by his wife and seven children.

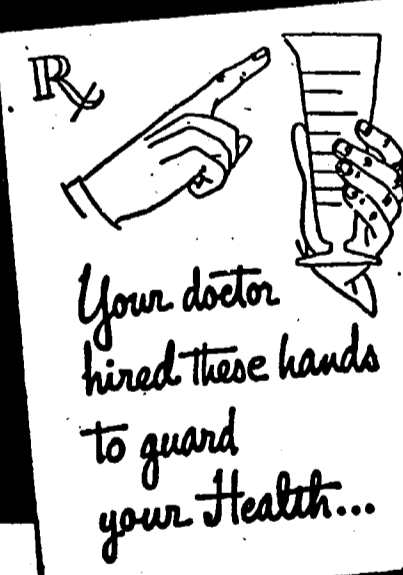

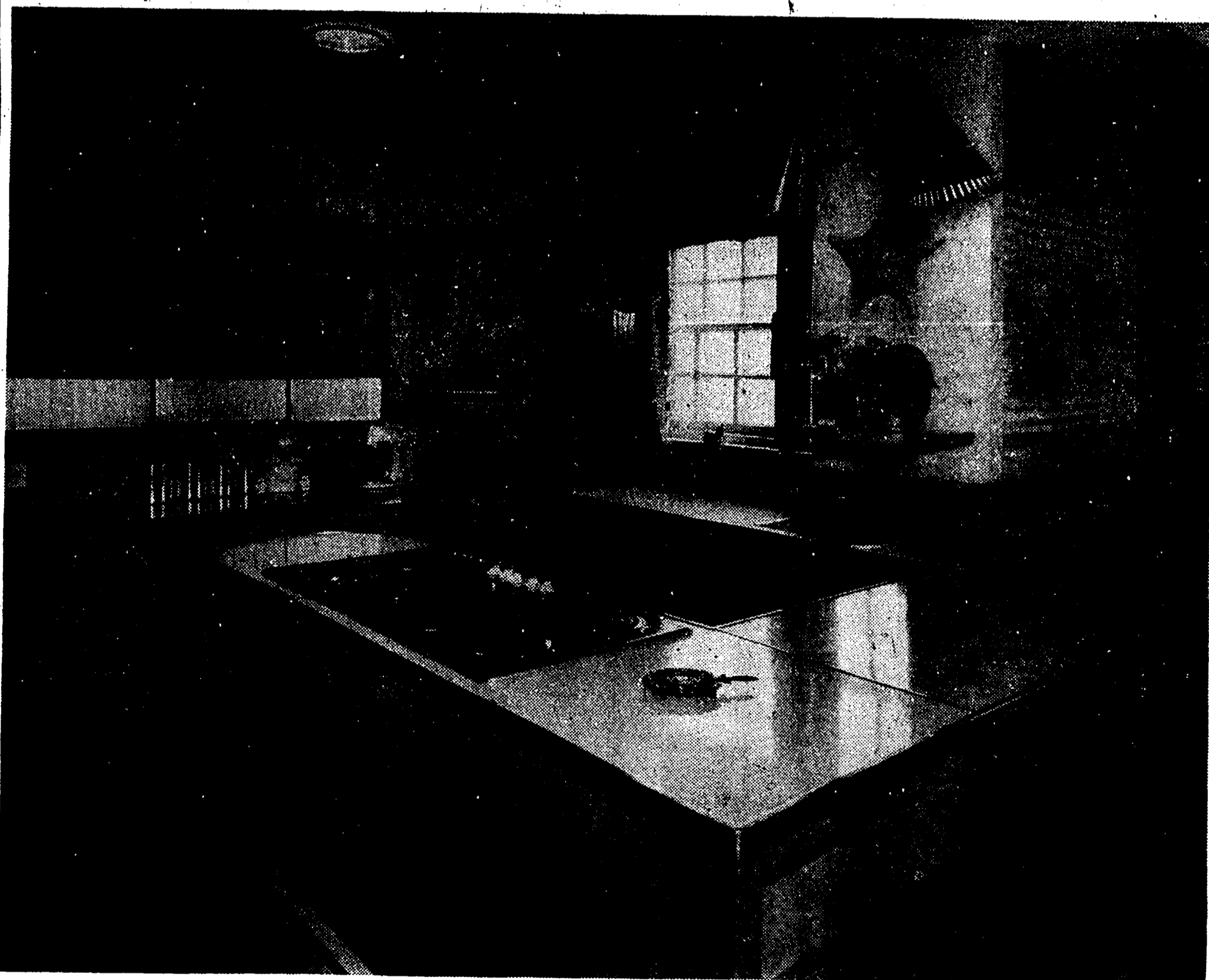

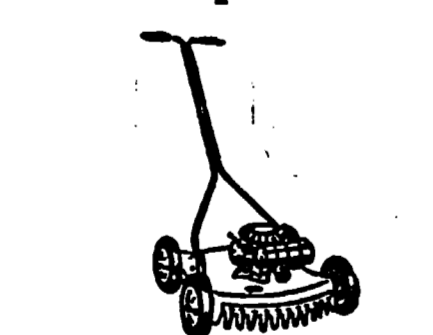

Fortunate are those who have budgeted their tickets and their time and can include the Rosemary Casey comedy in their schedule, for it's well worth the trip for a gay, hilarious and care-free evening at the clubhouse on Fairview road.

It's a cast of seven which takes the stage with apparent ease and confidence. J. David Narbeth, veteran of innumerable performances and countless successes for the club, appears with his usual aplomb as Billy Gordon, visiting house guest at the formal Colby home. Narbeth's roles are always a joy, as testified by his wide following, but perhaps the peak of his steady, consistently fine performance here is the pursuit of a lady's hand.

James S. Feight, another veteran player turns in a notable performance as the busy, popular author of Best Sellers — a man who gets what he wants—usually.

Elizabeth H. Swan portray's the difficult part of his mother, Mrs. Colby, who helps to achieve her son's pleasure of order and serenity. Mrs. Swan has played a variety of roles for the Players with admirable skill, and her marked versatility comes into account as mother to Colby and grandmother to his daughter Janet. Here is a dual role in more ways than one handled with her usual competence.

Penny Halladay as Constance Warburton is a vivacious and attractive artist-widow. Mrs. Halladay brings enough charm and allure to brighten a dull visit for any bored guest. Her portrayal is gay and convincing, and it's easy to believe the friends collected over a 20 year period are sufficient in quantity and influence to settle any situation.

The threesome of Gordon, Colby, and Mrs. Warburton form a delightful triangle (which explains perhaps, the play's title), that is refreshing in its lightness, and lack of coyness. Mrs. Halladay, Mr. Narbeth and Mr. Feight handle the situations beautifully.

Providing the young love of the piece are Philip Kniskern, who has played several roles for the club, and Beverly McIntire, appearing for the first time before the footlights. Mr. Kniskern's Matthew Anderson is a commendable portrayal of the quiet, capable, devastatingly handsome young man. Mrs. McIntire does credit to a part which could so easily be typical of the usual sweet young thing. Her interpretation gets across very well indeed.

Enid Cochran as the maid Sarah plays a small part well. Her excellent handling of ordinary lines are a wonder of expression and skill.

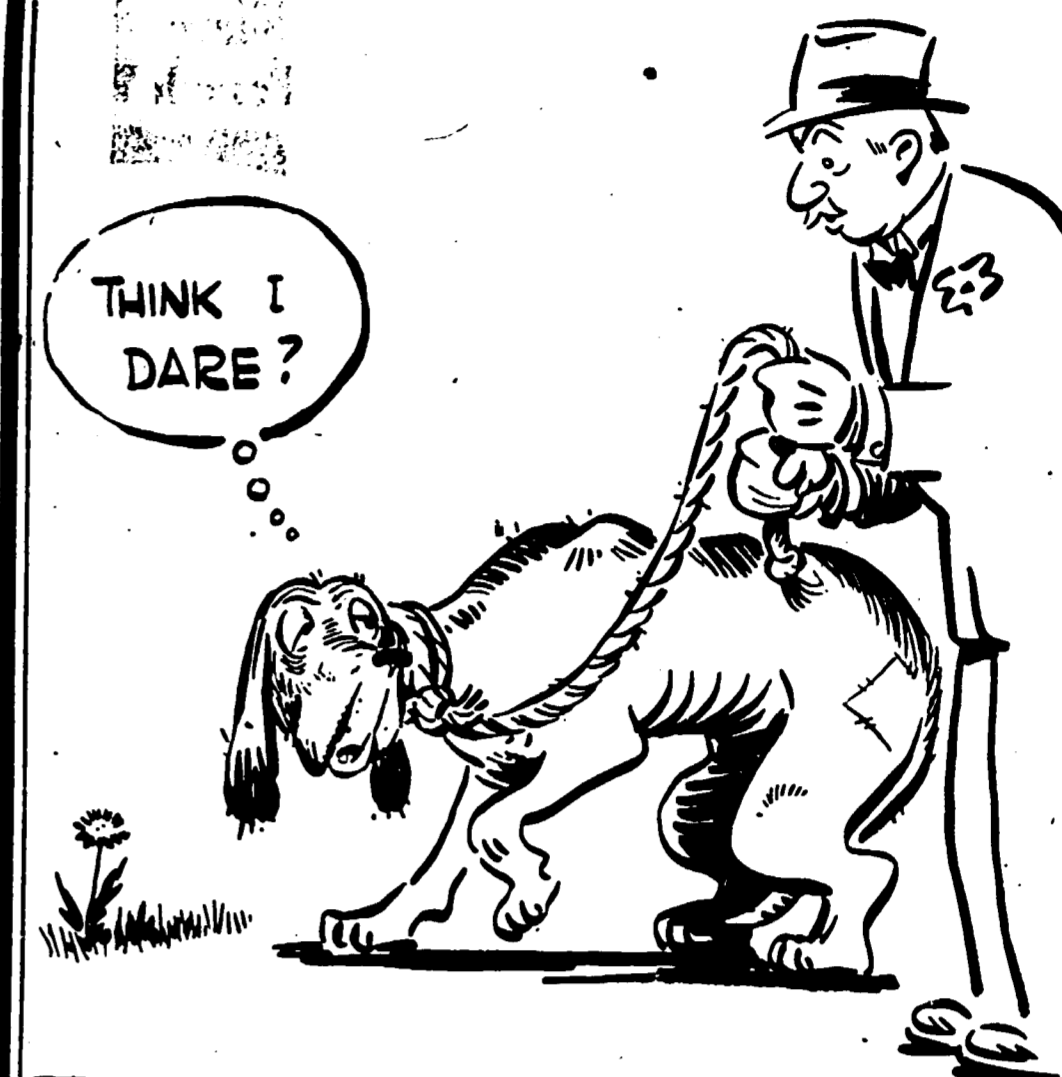

ouncement had been made, only one spectator and one press representative attended the initial organizational meeting of the Borough Planning Commission. During this meeting, it was suggested that written invitations be sent to the local Property Owners Association and to the League of Women Voters to have representatives sit in on future meetings. Otherwise, there was the majority feeling, with Councilman Carroll concurring, that future meetings should be either completely closed sessions or briefly open for public presentation before an executive session. Fortunately, the lone dissenter, Raymond Denworth, was strenuous enough in protecting these views to have a definite decision deferred.

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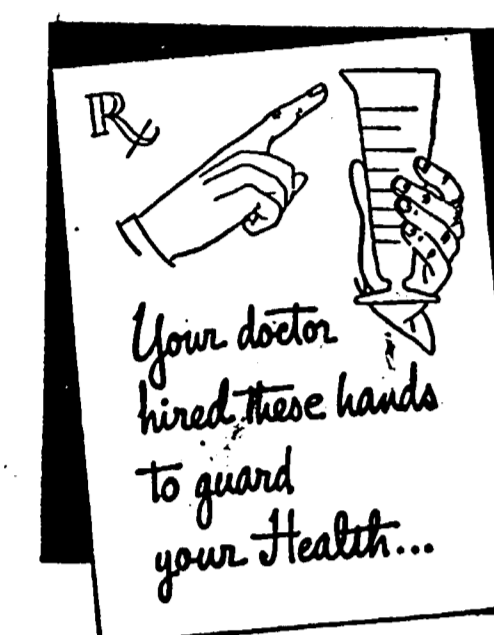

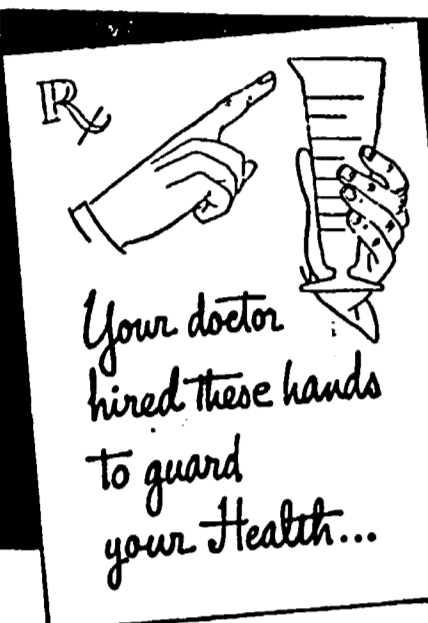

penier, Treasurer John F. Spencer and other members of the Board explained that teachers and lay committees in 1952 and again in 1955 had stressed the advisability of separating elementary and high school plants. Reluctance of the College to sell even a narrow strip of land when consulted several years ago, and the high cost of an acre which the Board did buy from the College 25 years ago were cited by the Board. Difficulty of meeting State requirements as to play area at any site but Rutgers avenue were also explained.

Elementary Principal Thomas Boyle said a northern school of one class of each grade through third would not prevent the necessity of sending many children from that side of the railroad down to the Rutgers avenue school. He said a bus company had expressed willingness to pick up children at distant spots in the morning and return them in the afternoon for a twelve cent round-trip fare.

Parents remained adamant in their declarations that forcing young children to travel to a more distant school and remain there all day if their parents couldn't chauffeur them, would be psychologically bad for the pupils.

Later in the evening the School Board decided to secure anew the College's attitude toward making any of its land available for School District use.

Mrs. Andrea Adeson, currently teaching fourth grade in Framingham, Mass., was hired as fourth grade teacher for the Rutgers avenue school next September. Mrs. Carolyn Valentine, now teaching second grade in Alhambra, Calif., was hired to teach second grade at the College avenue school.

Mrs. Grace Yeaw, part-time speech teacher, was employed for an additional day per week next year, making three days in all.

Bids for towel service, fuel oil, and a tractor were opened an hour after the scheduled 8 p.m. and referred to the administration for scheduling and study.

Oppenlander said, "Although the curriculum committee feels driver education is very worthwhile it cannot see how the required two periods a week could be fitted into the present tight schedule of the tenth and eleventh grade, unless it went into physical education time or Saturday mornings." He also estimated the course would cost the School District about \$70 per pupil. However, he stated the committee would be glad to review the situation if in the future a sufficient number of parents desire the course offered at the sacrifice of some present class.

A survey revealed Eddystone, Ridley Park and Interboro Schools now have driver education programs. Classes have about 60 pupils and require one teacher nearly full time. They include a class period, plus eight hours behind the wheel and 21 hours observation.

## Replies to Criticisms

To the Editor:

In view of the misunderstanding of the attitude of the Borough Planning Commission which is reflected in the recent letter in The Swarthmorean from Mr. Richard B. Wray, criticizing the newly formed Commission as a "closed corporation" it is appropriate that I give the residents, through you, a statement of that which is and will be my personal position so long as I am Chairman of the Commission or a member of it.

The types of problems which this Commission will undertake to settle and determine for the Borough are complex, involving many collateral ramifications. They will have technical and quasi-technical phases, which may be variously in the fields of engineering, architecture, law, economics, parking, traffic beautification and what not. They will involve many seemingly unrelated subjects both within and beyond the Borough limits. Swarthmore planning activities must be harmonized and coordinated with County planning and to a degree with Philadelphia metropolitan area planning. Planning must take account of current physical and population changes and trends such as new construction, blight, deterioration, migrations and the like. Our planning must draw upon the experiences of other communities.

Appropriate decisions in this city planning field are reached only as "studied judgments." This is in contrast to "observation judgments" where proposals and decisions are based on emotions, superficial or incomplete considerations and otherwise without profound study.

Every member of the Planning Commission intends to give that time which is necessary for study and analysis and to give that which is required of his personal knowledge and experience in order that our decisions and recommendations may be "studied judgments" as to that which is for the best interests of the Borough.

My personal attitude is that the Planning Commission will always welcome any comments, suggestions, communications or discussions from or with any resident provided that that person will have given the particular subject sufficiently thorough consideration so that he can and will present a "studied judgment." Personally, I respect and seek the counsel of all others who will give the particular problem sufficient and appropriate study so as to be fully informed. I am probably more interested in the judgments of those who may disagree with me than of those who agree, provided that such judgments reflect conscientious analysis and study of the problem equivalent to that which I will have given to it.

Frankly, I do not have the time nor the physical energy to attempt to answer planning questions through the device of a Town Meeting type of procedure with all of its emotional and superficial characteristics. Furthermore, my experience proves that this type of approach to technical or quasi-technical questions is abortive, ineffective and too often is the source of unsound results. In my opinion the Planning Commission should seek results which reflect the wishes of the residents, but only to the extent that they are of practical accomplishment and to the best interest of the whole Borough and where the decisions are reached through an effective, efficient procedure.

Any implications that Councilman Carroll or any of the members of the Commission do not

hold our local organizations in the highest regard, is completely erroneous. Such a misapprehension would arise only from a lack of understanding of how a Planning Commission must operate to be efficient and effective.

Did this happen because she did not know where to go for help? Because she did not know about the many social agencies in Delaware County equipped and ready to help her with this problem and with her baby? Because she did not know these agencies would help her get medical care, would help her arrange for her baby's care? Because she did not know they would respect the confidential nature of her problem? If this is true, to any degree, then we, the community and leaders in social welfare have failed.

There are, in Delaware County, social agencies supported by both public tax funds and by the United Community Campaigns of both Chester and Philadelphia, agencies whose responsibility it is to help unmarried mothers. The Delaware County Children's Aid Society is one of these Red Feather agencies, Family Service of Delaware County is another, Salvation Army is another — only to name a few.

But none of these agencies can help this young unmarried mother now. It is too late.

We urge you to publish this letter. We urge your readers to remember where this service is available. We urge anyone who needs this service to call one of these agencies.

### Service Committee Hears Nurses' Reports

The Central Committee of the Community Nursing Service, Delaware County, held its regular meeting on Thursday, May 10, in the Borough Hall, Swarthmore.

Three staff nurses gave a brief resume on part of the school work they do.

Mrs. Elizabeth Irons told of some of the ways they have of encouraging children to eat a well balanced and nutritious breakfast. Jeanette D'Orazio spoke of good grooming, good health habits and good posture, and the methods by which they try to develop these things. A rubber doll is used to demonstrate the good and bad posture of the school children. Dorothy Hillenbrand spoke on various ways used to teach the younger children to keep their hands from their mouths and to discourage nail biting and the importance of fresh air recreation.

These and many other health programs are correlated with parts of the curriculum to develop a healthy, well rounded student, the nurses reported.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Groff, executive director of the Nursing Service, stated 24 nurses serve approximately 296,000 people of the agency's two offices.

Dorothy M. Sidner, supervisor, reported in April that the Western Area Office staff nurses made 1226 home visits; 22 immunizations were given; 254 polio injections, and 34 baby examinations were made at the Woodlyn Child Health Center.

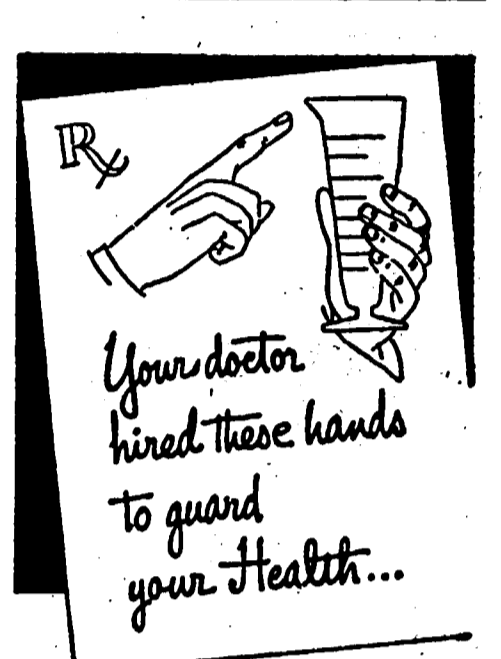

## School Needs Acute Carpenter Tells LWV

Pressure on the Swarthmore Schools has developed three years earlier than forecast in a 1952 survey, Dr. Samuel T. Carpenter, secretary and property chairman of the Swarthmore - Rutledge School Board, told the Swarthmore League of Women Voters at a luncheon meeting Monday at the Ingletenk. Carpenter, who is also professor of civil engineering at the college said a more rapid erection of home and influx of new children had brought the local situation to the level not anticipated until 1960.

The growth of the high school and elementary pupil population to 700 each by September, 1959, demands that four more elementary rooms be built by September, 1957, and an additional seven by September, 1959, when the high school takes over the present College avenue elementary school, if current class sections of 33 to 36 in both schools are to be brought to the desired 25 pupil level instead of increasing further.

The amount of income now received from tuition pupils, equal to four (4) mills on the local realty assessment, will have to be replaced as resident pupils crowd out the last tuition pupil four years hence, Carpenter warned his audience.

A new state law entitles school districts to state reimbursement on school construction regardless of type of financing, if no more than \$100 per child is spent, said Carpenter. "However, I am told, by county authorities, that an advance review of plans by a state inspection team is a necessary qualification, and already 600 school districts are listed ahead of us," he continued. "This means that Swarthmore would have to waive right to such reimbursement, if it desires to bypass this delay and secure new facilities promptly, by the time it deems them necessary. Plans must be completed and construction begun by next January first, if the first elementary rooms are to be ready by September, 1957," stated Carpenter.

An answer to the local board's request to have Swarthmore-Rutledge separated from Nether-Providence in the current county plan is necessary before the board can apply for state approval, since the first question on each form asks in effect is "Is this proposed building in accordance with the county plan?"

Carpenter said the school board members recognize the desirability of an elementary school convenient to children living north of the railroad, but the board is up against many problems, not the least of which is the state rule of requiring five acres and one acre per each 100 pupils for elementary school, he declared. The Riverview road plot is less than four acres in addition to offering considerable hazards, he continued.

Among suggestions made by LWV members were: Having the railroad end of Riverview road vacated and added to the present plot on that location; erecting a pre-fabricated school; discontinuing kindergarten.

Dr. Carpenter said the first two suggestions could be considered but might not prove feasible, and the latter was impossible as kindergartens can't be discontinued after they have been established.

The election of Mrs. Melvin Molstad to a vacant directorship on the local LWV was announced. The group changed its monthly luncheon meeting date from the second Monday to the second Thursday of each month beginning in September when meetings are resumed.

Accepted as items of continuing responsibility for the local league's coming year's agenda were:

Support of town planning; advocating salaries for teachers, adequate for maintenance of the highest education standards; equalization of real estate assessments; establishment of public health unit in Delaware County.

New chairmen announced were: Mrs. Maurice Webster, Individual liberties; Mrs. Morris Fussell, state constitution; Mrs. Molstad, water conservation; and Mrs. Hallock Campbell, school needs.

## School in Rose Valley To Open Summer Camp

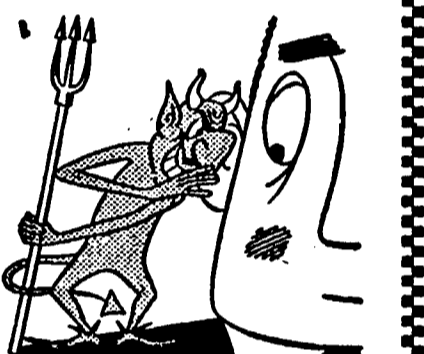

## Student-Parent Panel Sets Up Standard Of Practice For Baby-Sitters, Employers

Because there exists a great deal of confusion leading to misunderstandings and wide differences of opinion and practice in the employment of school age "baby-sitters", a panel composed of Swarthmore High School students and parents of children in both the Rutgers and College Avenue Schools has agreed upon the following standards of practice as being a fair solution:

Baby-sitters ("B-S") up through the eighth grade in school should be paid at the rate of \$.35 per hour. Children from this group should not be expected to stay beyond midnight. They should not be given duties not commensurate with their age, such as, for example, the cooking of a meal.

Baby-sitters from the ninth grade and upwards should be paid at the rate of \$.50 per hour to 1

3. If, for any reason, more than one girl or boy undertakes the job, only one shall be paid. That one will decide if the wage should be split.

4. No "ice-box raiding" unless invited to have some particular refreshment by the employer.

5. When the B-S leaves, the house is to be left in as orderly a condition as when she arrived.

6. B-S shall be expected to remain awake until the parents return.

7. "B-S" of high school age should be expected to wash dishes from those meals in which they have taken part.

When employing the "B-S" the first time show her the location of:

1. Telephone

2. Children's bedrooms, bathroom, light switches, night clothing.

1. Doctor's name - phone number. 2. Neighbor to be called in case parent can't be reached -

branch's arrangement to supply blood to residents.

Mrs. Jones reported the Red Cross share of the United Community Campaign to be \$65,000 more than its own 1953 campaign raised but from this amount must \$100,000 be against the cost of the Red Cross campaign in 1955 of

\$65,000. Locally, since Swarthmore raised 148 percent of its \$23,000 quota, the Red Cross share was \$4,000 as against the \$-9,000 raised in this community in 1955.

Mrs. Herman Bloom listed 6,000 hours given by the Junior Red Cross in varied services. The report of Virginia Rath, chairman of First Aid and Water Safety was listed.

Mrs. R. W. Deacon, chairman of Arts and Skills, reported teaching

arts, ceramics, weaving in the federal hospitals in the area and spoke eloquently of the need for other volunteers in this much appreciated service. The Red Cross supplies the materials used by the volunteer aids. Anyone interested is urged to contact Mrs. Deacon or Mrs. Plowman. Mrs. D. F. Jones, chairman of Canteen, reported 220 hours of service at three industrial blood donor dates and the local day by 12 volunteers.

Mrs. John Good's report of the E. and S. committee listed a total of 15 parties at the following centers: United States Naval Hospital in the general hospital and the Neuro-psychiatric sections; Valley Forge in the N. P. and men's and women's tuberculosis wards; and at the nearby Nike installation. An average of 10 junior and two senior hostesses attended an average 100 patients at each party.

For the Christmas program in the hospitals the E. S. group contributed \$450 to the Southeastern Chapter for Christmas trees and gifts to patients, 25 pounds of candy to the Naval Hospital, 65 gifts to the "Gifts to Give" program, and five committee mem-

bers who helped patients at Valley Forge and Coatesville Hospitals with their gift wrapping.

During the year 126 home made birthday cakes and over 8,000 cookies were sent to Naval Hospital; seven afghans were sent Valley Forge, Coatesville, and Naval Hospitals; 150 decks of used playing cards with pencils and score pads to West Philadelphia Veterans and Valley Forge. Mrs. Good reported \$178.49 raised for this purpose on May 1 at the home of Mrs. Morse.

Mrs. John R. Bates reported 295 hours given by the Motor Corps. Mrs. Wayne Randall listed 348 contributed by the Nurses Aides. Mrs. Norman Hume announced six blankets contributed by the Friendly Open House and a total of 451 hours. Mrs. Elingham reported the Staff Aides service which Mrs. Plowman emphasized by the headquarters comment that Staff Aides were more highly trained than any other volunteers.

Mrs. Sargent Brewster listed 448 hours of service by six Swarthmore workers in the Chester office of Red Cross Home Service, with 21 of the 1952 assisting cases logged in Swarthmore.

For three days the group talked to both Whites and Negroes. Practically without exception the team was well received by both sides after they had explained that the point of their mission was "to bring Christian greetings to both parties of this conflict", and to give support to the spirit that exists in both groups to reach a solution that upholds basic human dignity.

Pointing out that a ferment period is a necessary part of the process and that it must be realized that generations of habits and training and culture patterns are not easily changed, Hardin also expressed the belief that the real cause of the conflict is economic. Equal wages for all and a raising of the living standards of the Southern Negro he said, will go far to lessen the difficulties of integration.

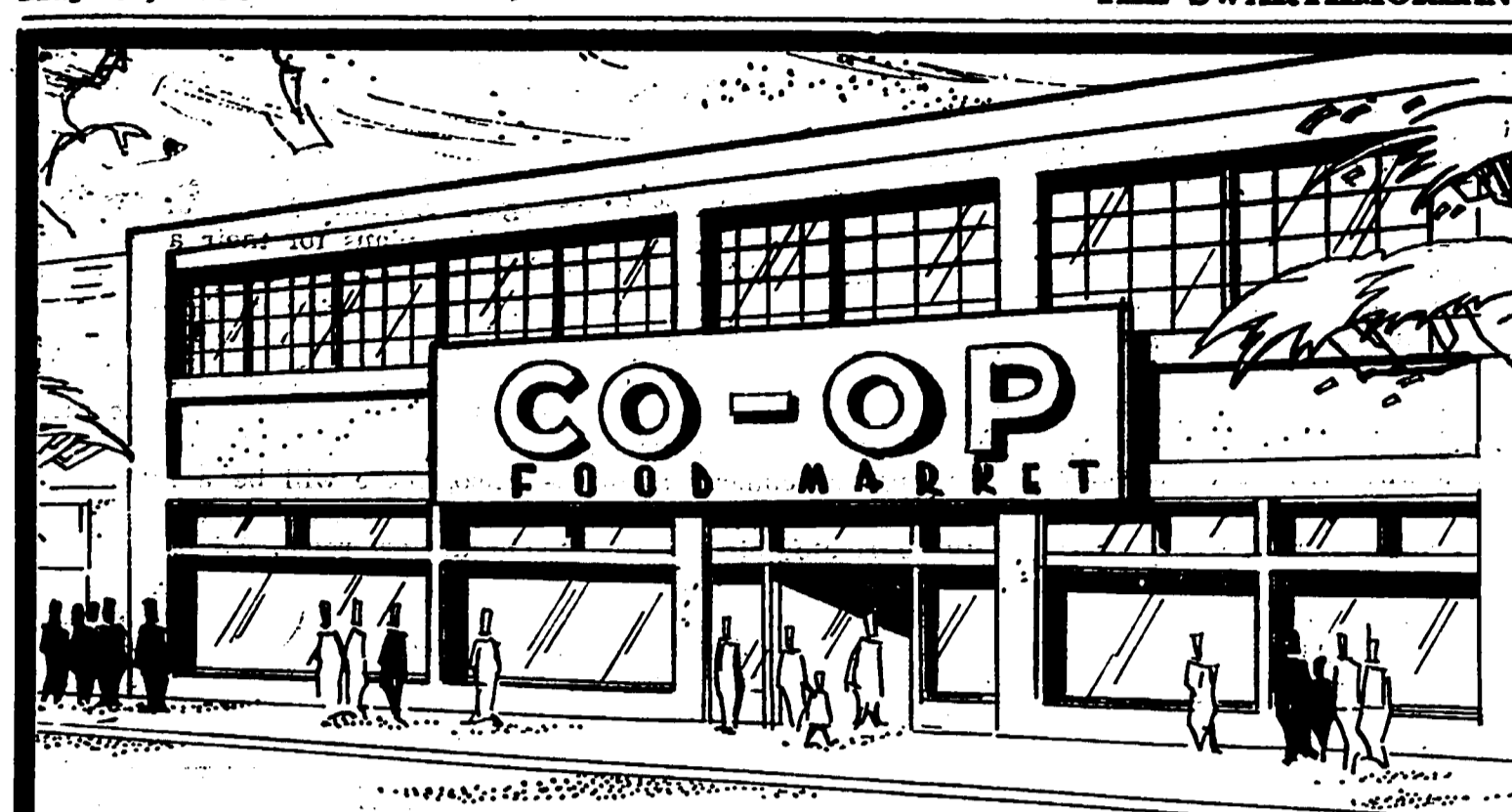

### Coll. Commencement Speakers Announced

#### Boston Judge C. E. Wyzanski to Address Class of '56 on June 4th

Judge Charles Edward Wyzanski, Jr., president of the Board of Overseers of Harvard University and Judge of the United States District Court in Boston, will address the graduating class of Swarthmore College at its Commencement on June 4 in the amphitheater on the campus.

Judge Wyzanski has had a distinguished career in education and law. He has served as Special Assistant to the Attorney General and with UNESCO in Paris and Washington and has lectured on government at Harvard. Currently he holds membership in the American Academy of Arts and Ford Foundation.

Dr. Brand Blanshard, professor of philosophy and Fellow of Calhoun College at Yale University, will speak at the Baccalaureate of the class on June 3 in Memorial. Dr. Blanshard, a Rhodes scholar, was professor of philosophy at Swarthmore College for 20 years before going to Yale in 1945. He received an honorary doctorate of letters from Swarthmore in 1947. His books include "The Nature of Thought," "Philosophy in American Education" and "Preface to Philosophy."

Dean Everett Hunt, retiring after 19 years as Dean of Men at Swarthmore College, will address the senior class at its final Collection on June 3. Dean Hunt will continue to be active as professor of English and will write a book on various aspects of life at Swarthmore.

year search for the cause of retrolental fibroplasia — blindness in premature babies; for his skillful, sympathetic reporting of an epic medical quest culminating in the recognition of excess oxygen as the villain; for his inspiring insight into the problems confronting the clinical investigator; for his understanding and ability to relate this research to the human and emotional cost of blindness to the child, the family and the community; and for his brilliant exposition of laboratory and hospital triumphs which have notably stimulated public interest in support of medical research against the disabling and killing diseases."

Born in Omaha, Nebraska, where his father, Guy, was cartoonist for the Omaha World-Herald, Mr. Spencer graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1928. He joined the staff of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin and was soon devoting his time to a relatively new specialty, science writing. He was a Nieman Fellow at Harvard in 1939. He joined the staff of The Saturday Evening Post in 1945 and became an associate editor in 1947. The Post has published more than 75 articles by Mr. Spencer. His three sons are all headed for medical careers.

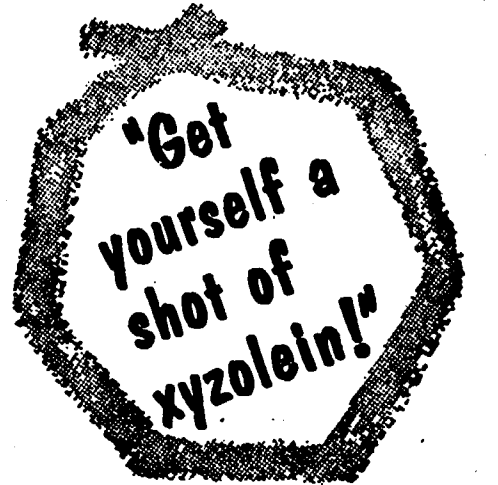
