 trict (5,000 - 30,000 population). Instruction expenditures, Department B, are increased from \$408,610 to \$442,505. This is an increase of about \$34,000 which is practically the same as the increase last year. About \$37,000 represents the increase of salaries, both higher salaries and also an increase in staff and the rest for the increase in instructional supplies. Also there is a \$8,000 increase in teacher salary reserve required to provide for contractual salary payments in July and August, 1957.
 Department C, Auxiliary Agencies, has increased from \$10,875 to \$11,450, most of which is due to the larger allocation of school district money for Student Activities in the High School, and medical and health services for the entire district.
 Department D, Operation of Plant, has increased from \$44,415 to \$45,890. This sum is due to a larger allocation for fuel, water, light, power, janitor supplies and custodial services.
 Maintenance Expenses, Department E, have been increased because of the great need of providing much needed repairs and replacement of equipment. The budget last year called for \$11,675 and for the coming year, the budget item is \$17,400.
 Department F, Fixed Charges, carries an increase of about

\$3,000, most of which is in the item—Payment to the State Retirement Board for retirement payments on behalf of school employees. The budget increase is from \$24,670 last year to \$27,210 next year.
 Percentage-wise, the allocations of various departments of current expense for 1956-57 are:
 A. General Control 4.8%
 B. Instruction 77.0%
 C. Auxiliary Agencies 2.0%
 D. Operation 8.8%
 E. Maintenance 3.0%
 F. Fixed Charges 4.6%
 Department G, Debt Service, is higher than last year, due to the payment of a short term loan of \$50,000 borrowed last year, to be retired in two years. \$34,000 in bonds will mature and be retired in 1956-57.
 Under H, Capital Outlay, provision is made for the establishment of a possible contractual base of \$166,228, to be used for planning school building expansion. If any of this money is spent, such money must be provided from borrowings, either short term or issue of bonds. This figure comprises the complete borrowing potential of the school district during the coming year. An additional sum of \$15,800 for current capital outlay, brings the budget allocation of this department up to \$182,028.
 The assessed valuation of real property upon which the local tax levy is made is \$8,308,445, a rise of \$268,770 or 3.34% over last year. The tax rate is 42 mills.

Frank Gettz Retires As Area Assessor

Frank R. Gettz, an accomplished horseman arrived in the blizzard of 1888 to aid Swarthmore College by driving its teams of sleigh horses. He remained and operated the College truck farm until his death in 1934.

Frank L. Gettz became an accountant in the freight department of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company on April 12, 1912 and had completed 35 years active service when he left the Company on sick leave in August 1947.

His political career began in 1914. Having turned 21 that spring, he was drafted into the job of judge of election when the regular judge became ill just before the fall election. Mr. Gettz arrived at the old Borough Hall, where all Borough votes were cast then, at 7 a.m. and was the first to vote in what turned out to be such a heavy election that it took until noon the next day to count the paper ballots. In those days there were but 600 to 700 voters in the entire borough and nearly 100 per cent exercised their franchise.

Later Mr. Gettz served a couple of terms as majority inspector. He also served as secretary-treasurer of the Pennsylvania State Assessor's Association and was instrumental in the passage of several laws governing and protecting assessors.

He has been treasurer of the Players Club of Swarthmore for the past seven years. Last year he also served as vice-president, an office he will continue in addition to being business manager next season.

Before and after World War I he was an active member of the Swarthmore Fire and Protective Association, of which his father was an organizer and charter member. He has served the Association as secretary and also has been recording secretary of the local American Legion Post. Married to the former Marguerite McLean of Rutledge in 1919, he has one daughter, Mrs. C. William Ramsay of Mt. Holyoke place and two grandchildren, C. William, Jr. (Chick) and Heather Marguerite Ramsay.

Added Tax Bills Out

The Swarthmore Borough Tax Collector, Mary Parke Dodd, has just announced that she is sending out supplemental school tax notices under Act 544 of the Pennsylvania General Assembly of 1952. Notices of these assessment increases had previously been mailed to each affected property owner by the Assessor, Frank L. Gettz, now retired.

Under the plan adopted by this school district under the Act referred to, the Assessor monthly reports to the School District and the Tax Collector the completed values of properties that have been finished or on which alterations have been completed. The School District computed the additional tax due and payable and reports this sum to the tax collector who sends the tax notice, on the first of each month on which the tax is due, to the respective property owners.

At the beginning of the new tax year, on the first Monday of July, the tax collector then sends a supplemental tax notice for the entire year covering the increased values over those reported in the regular tax notices. Such increases were not reflected in the regular tax bills and require supplemental billing. Since, under this Act, the School District is permitted to levy the additional tax for the succeeding full year which is the year 1956-57, these bills are now being prepared at the instance of the School District to be sent to taxpayers to be paid along with the regular school taxes. It is noted that the Legislature made these provisions available only to school districts and not to other taxing bodies.

Four out of five persons 65 years of age or over will be eligible for social security benefits in 1975.

Bugless, Dogless Boro Not Costless

The price of a pest-free Borough was weighed by Council in its regular July session Monday evening when payment of \$1848 for a mosquito fogging machine was approved and Blair Davis of Media, Borough dogcatcher, was granted the \$100 salary increase he requested.

The Borough paid \$748 on the spraying machine which arrived two weeks ago. The balance, and an additional \$100 which will cover cost of insecticide and labor for two of the regular weekly sprayings of the town, was contributed by citizens through a collection committee headed by Charles Topping. Although Council anticipated \$1000 must be budgeted for next year's anti-mosquito campaign, it was stated that the \$80 to \$90 weekly expense of doing its own bug-ridding, is considerably less than the \$140 and \$190 quoted by the Delaware County Mosquito Extermination Commission and another outside source for performing the service for the Borough on a weekly basis.

Dogcatcher Davis whose annual wage jumps from \$400 to \$500 reported he had apprehended ten dogs in the Borough during the past month. All were humanely destroyed.

With pests, gases, and destruction milling around in their minds the Borough Fathers decided to invest a bit more and endeavor to do away with speeders within Swarthmore's confines. During the next month policemen will be aided by special officers hired for ten hours weekly at two dollars an hour, to apprehend motorists who exceed the speed limits. Residents have been complaining of too-fast driving especially on Riverview road and Cedar lane.

Mr. and Mrs. George J. Becker, with their son Michael, of Walnut lane sailed yesterday on the Ryndam for a year in Europe. Mr. Becker, professor of English at Swarthmore College, has received a Fulbright Teaching Fellowship to the University of Bordeaux and the University of Lille in France. Mrs. Becker will be on a year's leave of absence from her teaching position at the Swarthmore High School.

The Beckers will spend this summer touring Europe, will live in Bordeaux and Paris during the winter, and next summer will be in England. They will return home in September, 1957.

John Becker, their oldest son, is being inducted into the Army today. Their other son, Dennis, is living in Newark, N. J. where he is working for the Prudential Life Insurance Company.

Mr. and Mrs. Prosser Gifford will be living in the Becker's home during their absence. Mr. Gifford is assistant to Courtney Smith, president of Swarthmore College and American Secretary of the Rhodes Scholarships.

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Area Mgr. Explains Security Trust Fund

Herbert W. Gruber, district manager, Social Security Administration, Chester, has made the following statement concerning the Security Trust Funds.

From time to time statements are made indicating a serious misunderstanding of the significance of the Federal old-age and survivors insurance trust fund. Because you and practically everyone has a personal stake in the social security program you may be interested in knowing some facts about the trust fund and its operations.

As a first step in understanding the operations it should be noted that the Federal old-age and survivors insurance trust fund, which was established by Congress, is kept separate from all other accounts in the United States Treasury. It is held by a Board of Trustees which by law is composed of the Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of Labor and the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare.

All contributions (better known as social security tax) made by employers, employees, and self-employed people under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance program go into the fund. The fund also receives interest on its investments.

The assets of the fund may be used only for benefit payments and administrative expenditures of the old-age and survivors insurance program.

Use Of Receipts
Most of the receipts of the trust fund are used to pay monthly and lump sum benefits, and the cost of administering the old-age and survivors insurance program. The remainder is invested, according to law, in interest-bearing obligations of the United States.

These investments are made to assist in financing the social security program. They are similar to a private insurance company's

Securities Backed By U. S.
The securities held by the trust fund are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States, as are all public debt securities; they are just as good as the public debt securities held by banks, insurance companies and private individuals.

The purchase of Federal obligations by the trust fund from the Treasury does not increase the national debt. The national debt increases only if the Federal Government's expenditures are greater than the receipts from taxes levied to meet those expenditures. When such a deficit occurs, the Treasury must borrow money to meet the deficit by selling Federal securities.

If there were no trust fund, the Treasury would still have to borrow the same total amount, all from other investors.

Redemption Of Securities
When taxes are levied to redeem the securities held by the trust fund, these taxes will not be levied for the purpose of paying social security benefits. Rather, they will be levied for the purposes for which the money was originally borrowed; for example, to pay costs arising out of World War II.

The fact that the trust fund, rather than some other possible investor, holds a Government bond does not change the purpose of taxes levied to redeem it.

Benefits paid from the trust fund are expected to increase steadily during the next 50 years.



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

Paul Creston Joins Swarthmore Faculty

(Continued from Page 1)

His latest honor is a first place blue ribbon for his First Symphony in a four-nation competition at the Paris Referendum Concert. "I look upon music and more specifically the writing of it as a spiritual practice," wrote Paul Creston several years ago to his friend and music critic, Henry Cowell. "I believe that everyone should compose and that musical composition should be a definite course in our educational system as much as history and mathematics, without deeming it a special privilege of the professional composer..."

"My philosophic approach to composition," continues the letter, "is abstract. I am preoccupied with matters of melodic design, harmonic coloring, rhythmic pulse and formal progression, not with imitations of nature or narrations of fairy tales or propounding of sociological ideologies. Not that the source of inspiration may not be a picture or a story. Only that regardless of the origin of the subject matter, regardless of the school of thought, a musical composition must bear judgment purely on musical criteria. Its intrinsic worth depends on the integration of musical elements toward a unified whole."

Mr. Creston in an article about Mr. Creston in "The Musical Quarterly" October, 1948, speaks to the point of how close Mr. Creston approaches his standards in his compositions: Paul Creston's career is marked to an unusual degree by sincerity, self-discipline and earnest reflection. There is no one known to me who handles more expertly the traditional types of development of a musical germ. His First and Second Symphonies and the two Choric Dances achieve a smoothness of integration that is extremely rare on such a scale today."

Mr. Creston is now living in New York City, where he is teaching, playing the organ at St. Malachy's Church, and working on a violin concerto.

Swarthmore-Rutledge Now Separate Entity

School Pays Off 30-Year Debt, Moves Toward New One

The removal of Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School District from Unit Number 3 of the Delaware County Plan which grouped it with Nether Providence, has been approved by the State Council of Education the local Board was notified at its July meeting Wednesday evening. Boro's 'Navy' Will Be Launched Next Week

Explorers' 36-foot Craft To Be Put in Water At Chester

Swarthmore's "navy"—the Sea Explorer Ship "Leo Marls"—is scheduled to be launched at Sun Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, Chester, next Friday, July 27. This event will climax a two-year project in which the local unit has adapted a 36-foot LCF (L) obtained from the U. S. Navy. The rebuilt craft, with new superstructure and bridge added, will provide bunks for 14 boys and two officers on cruises. Feverish activity in fitting out and painting is under way in preparation for getting the boat in the water at last.

Although no special ceremonies are scheduled at the launching, a formal commissioning will be held at a later date. Meantime, says "Skipper" George Myers, nautical-minded residents of the borough are invited to see the craft at Sea Explorer headquarters on Cresson Lane at any time when work is being done on the ship prior to its removal to the launching site.

Prompt Registration Urged for New Pupils

Morris Matthews Lee Former Editor, Dies

College Avenue Man in Newspaper World 40 Years

A widely-known Philadelphia newspaper man for forty years, Morris Matthews Lee, of College and Princeton Avenues, died Tuesday, July 17, at his home. He was 79.

A native of Philadelphia, Mr. Lee was educated in the public schools and Central High School. He was graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Haverford College in 1898, and from Harvard University in 1899.

First joining The Bulletin staff in January of 1900, Mr. Lee resigned as news editor in 1918 to become managing editor of the Evening Ledger. Shortly thereafter he was made managing editor of the Public Ledger. He returned to The Bulletin in 1926, and remained there until he retired in 1942.

Married on April 26, 1905, to the former Mary Ritchie Walter, he and Mrs. Lee resided in Germantown for a number of years. But from 1910 until 1922 when they moved to their newly built home on College Avenue, they summered in Swarthmore on the college campus.

Described as a "modest extremely polite man with a quick step and a keen mind," Mr. Lee was noted, in his life-time work for the gift of moving newspaper copy, for his patience and understanding, with young reporters; and for the respect and admiration with which his co-workers held him. One of his former associates said of him:

"There are not too many things in my life I can be proud about—but believe me—I can be, and am proud of the fact that I once worked for Mr. Lee. He was a spiritually generous, kindly human—the most civilized man I ever have known (and, probably, ever will)."

And in the borough, where he had a host of friends, Swarthmore will miss seeing Mr. and Mrs. Lee walking together down Darmouth Avenue towards the Dew Drop or one of the shops in the village.

Surviving him, in addition to Mrs. Lee, are two sons, William F. of Guernsey road, and Morris, Jr., of Hartsdale, N. Y.; three sisters, the Misses Augusta and Nan Lee, and Mrs. Samuel L. Kamps, all of Ambler; and four grandchildren—William F. Jr., and Elinor C. of Swarthmore, and Margaret P. and Robert L. of Hartsdale.

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
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Swarthmore Man Receives 'Wings of Gold'

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


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

 couldn't keep me awake." And fatally, she exhibited the trait most characteristic of Americans — in the eyes of the world — she hurried. Nevaz who at no time lived farther from high school than Dogwood lane, and could walk — "Mostly I had to run, because I was late."

Nevaz celebrated her 18th birthday on May 18. "They celebrated it for me," she said. "Nancy, my sister here (Nancy Dellmuth — Nevaz lived with the Hoppers from January to June) invited me to dinner, and the girls from my class were hiding behind the couch . . . It was the loveliest day of my year here . . ."

Her last "official" appointment was a date with the dentist on Monday afternoon — to offset all the ice cream, cake and chewing gum. Gum, apparently is the worst thing for them "but I chew it anyhow, I love it."

She also loves shopping. "I would go shopping now if anyone would take me." And department stores — Nevaz said she couldn't stop looking.

Nevaz had a good education back home in Karachi. She speaks English beautifully, along with her own national language Urdu, and Gujarati, the religious language of the Parsees. She knew, despite the onslaught of American movies, that the United States had slums, and other problems. The greatest surprise to her, she thought, was the servant problem.

Once home (where every one has a servant) Nevaz will probably finish her final year of schooling in Karachi. She would like to do social work as a sideline, but what she would like as a career she wouldn't say; there are too many possibilities. "And I'll probably change my mind anyway," she said.

Nevaz would like to come back to America for college. Her first choice is Swarthmore, then Smith, and third is the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, which she saw on her recent tour. "I loved the people — they were so good to me — they were good everywhere," she added. She liked their accent, she liked Knoxville, and "I suppose it is not as hard to get into as Swarthmore," she said wistfully. But her first love is Swarthmore, its people, its flowers and its trees.

"I want to see my family again, but I hate to leave more than I can say. Will you put in a line for me — Thank all the people of Swarthmore for everything they have done for me. I loved every one of them. I've loved it here and I hate to go back and leave them."

Nevertheless, Nevaz sails on Monday aboard the Arosa Kulp; her first stop as a Pakistani student (there are five of them altogether) will be Zeebrugge, Belgium. From there they will go to England for two weeks before sailing from Liverpool for Pakistan.



\$10, and \$15 respectively.
Tuition free enrollment of foreign exchange students, Hans Peter Borne, of Bern, Switzerland, as a member of next year's senior class was granted. It was announced that Hans would live with the William Welsh family at 102 S. Swarthmore avenue.
Harry Oppenlander, chairman of the High School curriculum committee, reported the committee had devoted itself to a study of the social studies curriculum during the past year and decided to somewhat revamp the former program. Oppenlander said "When I came to Swarthmore 18 years ago we taught civics and ancient history in ninth grade, world and modern history in tenth, American history in eleventh and problems of democracy in twelfth. About ten years ago we changed to plain civics in ninth, world history including American in tenth and eleventh. In the last few years we have found it difficult to fuse American and foreign history—it requires too much jumping back and forth across the ocean, and we feel it would be better to return to teaching American history alone in the eleventh grade. Our tentative program is: seventh grade—remains same as formerly—English and social studies with emphasis on American history; eighth grade—geography, ancient civilizations, Greece and Rome; ninth grade—continuing courses in civics but point out origins of democracy; tenth grade—world history (from prehistoric man to atomic bomb); eleventh grade—straight, solid course in American history to World War II; twelfth grade—bring together work of tenth and eleventh grades until title "Contemporary Problems" including nationalism and revolution, industrial revolution, colonialism, crises and trial changes in the twentieth century. To carry out the new program the Board granted Mr. Oppenlander's request for a new tenth grade text book "Man's Story" by T. Walter Wallbank and a twelfth grade text "Modern History" by Karl Becker. Present texts were purchased a decade ago.

Mr. Oppenlander said the curriculum study committee, in the face of conflicting views on today's mathematics education throughout the country, had decided to focus on that department at Swarthmore in its 1956-57 school year studies. A slight change in this department has already been made with the ordering of a new algebra text and decision to have all students take algebra instead of some substituting general math.

Presbyterian Pension Board Takes Option on Morrow Tract

The Board of Pensions of the Presbyterian Church, located in Philadelphia, has taken an option to purchase the tract of land adjacent to the old Mary Lyon School property on which to build some individual homes for retired ministers and missionaries. The property was selected after careful study of properties in the suburban areas of Philadelphia and is reported to be ideal for the purposes intended.

The plan is to build a number of homes which will be owned by the National Church through its Board of Pensions and rented for life to those who need such accommodations. The unit in Swarthmore is the first such project and will probably receive considerable national publicity.

Later additional projects will be established in different sections of the country to the extent needed. The number of family units in each location will normally be from 10 to 25, and since each home will be occupied by not more than two people, the number of persons per acre will be much smaller than normal. In these projects there will be no central dining room, no central recreational area, no infirmary and no nursing home. If the residents are sick they will care for themselves in their own homes in the same way as younger persons. When they are seriously ill they will go to hospitals or nursing homes in the area. In effect, these people are to live their lives as normal citizens of the community.

A review of the needs of older ministers and their families led the Church to recognize a need for housing facilities for a small portion of the retired group. Most ministers never have a home of their own and their salaries are such that few have been able to save substantial capital sums which would be needed to purchase a home on retirement. Even if the minister at age 70 has an adequate retirement income, it is very difficult for him to purchase a home at that age because the payments on the home cannot sensibly be extended over a period of 20 years or longer.

365 Pupils Complete Summer School Today

Annual Session Records Largest Student Body Teaching Staff

The Swarthmore Summer School has just completed its annual session with the largest enrollment in recent years. Three hundred sixty-five pupils from 35 schools were in attendance during the six-week program which began on June 18 and ends July 27.

Not only was the size of the student body the largest but also that of the teaching staff. Four supervisors and 21 teachers, including nine from Swarthmore College, 10 from West Chester State Teachers College, and two from nearby school districts directed a program of academic subjects and also five commercial subjects not offered in the regular Swarthmore curriculum.

As in the past, the Swarthmore-Rutledge School District, with 95 pupils enrolled in 143 courses, led the list of schools represented. Interboro with 80 pupils, Ridley Park with 39, and Springfield with 35 were also well represented.

From a financial standpoint, the summer school more than paid for itself. Although the fee of \$7 per course is considered nominal, the expected balance of income over expenses, not including overhead, will slightly exceed \$800.

Commenting on this year's summer school, Harry Oppenlander, Principal, stated:

"The summer school staff was most successful this year in maintaining a sensibly controlled educational environment in which



During the war Mr. Brodie served front-line troops with the Church of Scotland Mobile Canteen and for a short time operated in the American Sector and was in touch with Y.M.C.A.

His wife, the former Constance Lindsay Hope, is accompanying Mr. Brodie on the trip to the United States. They have three children.



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

Sea Horses Splash Tally-Hi, End at Tail
Last Score Close; Ask All Aid Tomorrow
There was a determined glint in the garnet eyes of the white seahorses worn by the Swarthmore Swim Club in its meet with Arononink last Saturday morning in the local pool. And sure enough, they upped their previous scores against Rose Valley and Marple-Newtown by 29 points, tallying 142 to Arononink's 195.

It was another loss for the seahorses in their first season of Suburban League competition but was far the closest to victory to date. Arononink is a six-year-old team. Swarthmore was handicapped by the absence of some of its usual place-makers, Jan Lawrence, Sue Campbell, Charlotte Brodhead, Helen Morrison, Diane Renshaw.

It's The Army's Loss
Swarthmore was jubilant, however, at the return of its assistant coach Carl Schaefer, whom they had relinquished to the Army (they sadly thought) two days earlier. It seems Mr. Schaefer (despite what Swarthmore mermaids might think) is not perfection personified and the Army discovered a little defect which it hopes is only temporary so Uncle Sam gave him a six-month reprieve to come home and help groom the seahorses for tomorrow morning's final meet with Martins Dam and Colonial Village at Colonial Village, and to start his formal teaching career as a member of the Springfield High School faculty in September. This would have been an even tougher week than usual for Coach Millard Robinson, had the Army not been so perspicacious, for the team's other assistant coach, Mrs. Nancy Terry Johnson, is on vacation for this period.

Calling All Swimmers
With each team allowed only two official entries in each event there is no way a team can fail to take at least the one point given for third place, unless its entry is disqualified for illegal stroke, kick or touch. Therefore it is disheartening when a team has to sacrifice a point here and there simply because it does not have someone on the spot to swim for it or when number 1 time is disqualified and places move up. Thus it is hoped all swimmers who could possibly swim in tomorrow morning's meet will be timed and ready to supply the spots where replacements will be needed this week.

Spectatorwise (even for those who weren't able to add up the five points for first, three points for second, etc. or hear the announcer's remarks) last Saturday's meet was full of excitement as Swarthmore captured eight of the 32 first places in swimming and four of the six top diving awards.

Double and Triple Winners
Bob Sublette captured two firsts for Swarthmore; Joanne Robinson a first and second and swam on Swarthmore's winning relay team; Carol Williams a first and relay win; Joyce Williams a diving first, swimming second and relay win; Elizabeth Breakell a first and two seconds; Joanne Espenschade a first and two seconds; Jim Foley a first and third; Jean Paul a first. Other double and triple winners were: Ann Paul, a second and third and relay win; Molly Huse two

seconds; Howard Schad a swimming and a diving second; Brodie Crawford a swimming and diving third; George Sullivan a second and two thirds; Ann McDowell two swimming thirds and a diving second.

Opponents Break Records
Arononink's Steve Fisher won two swimming and one diving firsts. Their Lanny Reppert won two firsts, breaking a League record each time. Lanny's junior boys' breaststroke time 38.1 bettered the former record of 38.5 set July 30, 1955 by Benzel of Rose Valley. His 32.2 butterfly bettered his own League record of 33. Five other Arononink swimmers won double first places, and another, Fitzgerald, broke the midget boys' breaststroke record of 53.4 set by J. Robertson of Rose Valley one week earlier, finishing in 45 seconds flat.

Swarthmore picked up seven points when its 400-yard girls relay team won and an additional 33 points in the diving contests.

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Boy Scouts Return From Camp Delmont

plight of many of the older religious leaders and their wives after long periods of service to their fellow men. The gift provides the capital needed to construct the homes in the Swarthmore project.

Taxes Expected
Because rents will be charged, it is expected that taxes will be paid. Since there will be no children, this addition to the community of Swarthmore is expected to be a financial asset without further complications to the already crowded school situation.

The Board of Pensions is one of the oldest organizations in the Philadelphia area and traces its origin to the "Fund for Pious Uses" which was established by the Church in the year 1717. The original fund was used primarily to assist widows of Presbyterian

ministers. The Board now administers a large pension fund with assets totaling over \$90,000,000 and it is through this fund that the Church pays pension benefits to retired ministers and missionaries. There are now over 2000 retired Presbyterian ministers and over 3000 widows of ministers who receive benefits monthly under the Plan.
