# Swarthmorean Man Wins Air Trophy

Major David F. McCallister of Swarthmore, commanding officer of the 142nd Fighter Intercepter Squadron won the Air National Guard's Earl T. Ricks Trophy in a 1,922 mile flight Saturday.

McCallister, commander of the Wilmington, Del., Air National Guard unit, officially averaged 547.68 miles an hour in the flight from Hamilton Air Force Base, near San Francisco, to the New **Orleans Moissant International** Airport. He made three stops along the way for men in his unit to refuel his plane.

A veteran of more than 1000 flying hours in jets and 3000 hours more in conventional aircraft, McCallister worked overtime last September flying his jet through Hurricane Ione to chart its course for weather control stations in the Delaware Valley area. He and his wife Dorothea live at 2 Yale avenue with their six children.

# **Christine Ford Wins** German Fellowship

Christine Ford, Amherst ave nue, has been awarded a special scholarship given by the Federal Republic of Germany for study in that country during the 1956-57 academic year.

Only 60 of these special scholarships, including round-trip transportation, tuition at any institution of higher education in West Germany or West Berlin and a stipend of 300 DM a month from November 1 to July 31, 1957 were offered. All candidates in the field of study excepting medical studies were eligible to apply. The competition, open to both men and women, closed June 1 of this year. These fellowships were estab-

lished by the German Republic in gratitude for the help of the American Government and people in the post-war reconstruction of Germany.

# PASTOR JOHN C. KULP REPORTS FROM HIS POST IN IKUNO, JAPAN

The following are excerpts from an open letter to the congregation of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, from the pastor, John C. Kulp, who is currently in Japan with a 37 member ministerial team. The letter records his iravels from the time of his departure on June 24 up to the date of his letter, July 20. (Originally appointed to serve the town of Samukawa, on coastal Japan, he was transferred to the mining town of Ikuno in the mountains.)

"Let me thank so many of you for the inspiring send-off you arranged at the airport. All my life I shall never forget that thrill! ... "The flight here was uneventful if not fatiguing. Fortunately, the long hours were broken by a long stop-over at Chicago where we attended evening service at Chicago Temple First Methodist Church, Dr. Charles Ray Goff, Pastor. The book contains no narrow denominational story but is representative of Protestant Christianity in upholding moral standards and developing the spiritual resources of the people. It presents the evidence that democracy and the freedoms men hold dear sprang from man's sense of responsibility to God.

Brief explanatory introductions bring the reader directly to the heart of each selection. The book is of interest to the general reader as well as to the student of American Church history or religious aspects of American civilization. Dr. Anderson has prepar-

Soviet Union has launched a massive new offensive, economic in method, political in purpose and backed by a vast and growing military machine. NATO is hanging by a thread; no progress is being made toward strong, reunified Germany. In the Suez crisis, there has been marked reluctance by some ountries to accept the Western invitation to a conference. Many of the new nationalisms of Africa, the Middle East and Asia are increasingly susceptible to the influence of the Kremlin. The Chinese Communists have again practiced naked aggression, this time n Burma. If we are not to see many nations lose economic and political independence, the United States must take the initiative and return wth greater vigor "to its true mission of champion and promulgator of Liberty." It would be fatal to allow the coming campaign to focus so exclusively on what has gone well that the American people and their representatives in Congress fail to appreciate the dangers and responsibilities that lie ahead. Already there is a ground swell in the country for retrenchment, especially in respect to foreign affairs.

It is for the Republicans to transform the campaign from a national liability to a national asset; to use it. not merely to win an election but to inform the American people-and the rest of the world—that the United States is fully conscious of its responsibilities and determined to meet them.

The Way to Meet It

To do that, this newspaper believes the Republican platform should state, the Republican spokesmen should confirm, the Republican- candidates at every level of government should pledge:

1. That the United States will maintain a sufficient military establishment to meet its fullest international commitments. It must have research, weapons and manpower adequate to deter the Soviet Union from major aggression; to defend the nation and its retaliatory capability against surprise attack: to assure this country's allies of effective assistance in case of "localized" aggression, and in the maintenance of international order. Security must have priority over budget balancing for its own sake.

2. That the United States will develop and pursue a coherent, continuing foreign economic policy, provided with resources and flexibility, to assist the free nations to maintain their independence, without having to choose between the Kremlin and chaos.

3. That the United States, in full sympathy with the principle of national self-determination, will advance the interests of peoples determined to be free. At the same time, it will respect the legitimate
