Funeral services for Harry P. Tarr of Morton, who died Thursday night, July 19, at his home in Morton, were held Monday afternoon, July 23, in Glenolden; burial was held in Arlington cemetery.

Born in Morton 17 years ago, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul G. Tarr, Jr., of Highland avenue, Harry had been ill for the past five years. Until recently, he had been steadily improving, and had been able to continue his studies at Swarthmore High School during the spring. He would have been a junior in September.

He was a member of the Kedron Methodist Church and a junior member of Morton Fire Company 1.

At high school, he was manager of the football team of 1955, and this past season was assistant manager of the baseball team. He also managed in various sports during his junior high school years.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Paul, 3rd, a 1950 graduate of Swarthmore High, who will shortly be released from the United States Army; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul C. Tarr, also of Morton.

Roy Witmer Former Fire Chief Dies

Roy H. Witmer, a native Swarthmorean, died Friday, July 20, at the Veterans' Hospital at Bay Pines, Fla., where he had been confined for the past four months with a brain tumor.

For several years chief of the Swarthmore Fire and Protective Association, and at one time vice-president of the organization, he was born and reared in Swarthmore. Residing for many years on Union avenue, he later moved to Ridley Park. He moved to Florida in 1934, and since 1946 had made his home in Largo.

He is survived by his wife, the former Bertha Titus, four brothers, and three sisters.

Mrs. Mary Rosamond Haines, widow of Joseph E. Haines, died Friday, July 27, at 3:30 a.m. at the Green County Memorial Hospital, Catskill, N. Y. She was 86.

Mrs. Haines and her husband were residents of 212 South Chester road for many years. After her husband's death in 1944 Mrs. Haines continued to make her home in Swarthmore, at 201 South Chester road. Lately, she had spent several summers at Haines Falls, where she was taken ill.

Mrs. Haines was a member of the Swarthmore Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends. She and her husband were very active over a period of years in borough affairs. Mrs. Haines was particularly interested in the early years of the Swarthmore Woman's Club.

Before her marriage to Mr. Haines she was a teacher for many years at the Friends Central School.

She left surviving her one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Haines Stephenson of Bloomington, Ill.; two grandchildren, George W. Stephenson, Jr., and Anne W. Stephenson; and two stepgrandsons Joseph Martin and Richard Martin.

Christine Ford Wins German Fellowship

Christine Ford, Amherst avenue, has been awarded a special scholarship given by the Federal Republic of Germany for study in that country during the 1956-57 academic year.

Only 60 of these special scholarships, including round-trip transportation, tuition at any institution of higher education in West Germany or West Berlin and a stipend of 300 DM a month from November 1 to July 31, 1957 were offered. All candidates in the field of study excepting medical studies were eligible to apply. The competition, open to both men and women, closed June 1 of this year.

These fellowships were established by the German Republic in gratitude for the help of the American Government and people in the post-war reconstruction of Germany.

Chris, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Ford, is scheduled to sail October 17 on the M. S. Berlin. A student at the University of Pennsylvania she is currently spending the summer at the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Mich.

Swarthmorean Man Wins Air Trophy

Major David F. McCallister of Swarthmore, commanding officer of the 142nd Fighter Interceptor Squadron won the Air National Guard's Earl T. Ricks Trophy in a 1,922 mile flight Saturday.

McCallister, commander of the Wilmington, Del., Air National Guard unit, officially averaged 547.68 miles an hour in the flight from Hamilton Air Force Base, near San Francisco, to the New Orleans Moissant International Airport. He made three stops along the way for men in his unit to refuel his plane.

A veteran of more than 1000 flying hours in jets and 3000 hours more in conventional aircraft, McCallister worked overtime last September flying his jet through Hurricane Ione to chart its course for weather control stations in the Delaware Valley area.

He and his wife Dorothea live at 2 Yale avenue with their six children.

Last year's winners Bill Trumpler and Bill Haseltine, earned permanent possession of the former awards by posting their third triumph in the annual event. Both teams in this year's finals were looking for their first win, though both have been finalists on a number of prior occasions.

PASTOR JOHN C. KULP REPORTS FROM HIS POST IN IKUNO, JAPAN

The following are excerpts from an open letter to the congregation of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, from the pastor, John C. Kulp, who is currently in Japan with a 37 member ministerial team. The letter records his travels from the time of his departure on June 24 up to the date of his letter, July 20. (Originally appointed to serve the town of Samukawa, on coastal Japan, he was transferred to the mining town of Ikuno in the mountains.)

"Let me thank so many of you for the inspiring send-off you arranged at the airport. All my life I shall never forget that thrill! . . ."

"The flight here was uneventful if not fatiguing. Fortunately, the long hours were broken by a long stop-over at Chicago where we attended evening service at Chicago Temple First Methodist Church, Dr. Charles Ray Goff, Pastor. This is the downtown church famous for its Chapel in the Sky and an original of Warner Sallman's 'Head of Christ'."

"The continuing trip from Chicago was also broken by shorter, legstretching stops at St. Paul, Billings and Spokane, with breakfast at Seattle, Wash. Then, it was on to Anchorage.

Gain Ribbons In Championship Events

Jean Boyer and Jan Lawrence placed fourth and fifth among 10 senior women's diving entries Tuesday evening when Judy Tate of Colonial Village captured the championship in this division of the Suburban Swim League at Martins Dam. Jean's total judges' scoring slightly surpassed Judy's over five of her dives but dropped on a low scoring sixth. Her score of 103.3 was just 3 points below Jan Powell of Aronimink who placed second.

Dave Detweiler, Colonial Village lifeguard, won the senior men's championship with a score of 200.55. Bob Fitzgerald of Martins Dam was second and Steve Fisher of Aronimink third. Skip Cannon of Martins was fourth, Dennis dePaul of Marple-Newtown fifth, and Bill Mattis, Colonial Village, sixth.

Diane Renshaw placed sixth with a score of 52.7, just two-tenths of a point less than Colonial Village's fifth placemaker in the junior girls diving championship at Rose Valley Wednesday evening. Each of the six clubs in the League had a diver place among the top six in this classification, Aronimink winning first, Martins Dam second, Rose Valley third, Marple-Newtown fourth.

John Ungern, who was out of last Saturday's meet due to a head injury received in practice diving the previous day, was back in competition along with Rob Baker and Eric Peterson representing Swarthmore in the junior boys diving. All were out-classed as Marple-Newtown divers placed first and third, Aronimink second and sixth, and Colonial Village fourth and fifth.

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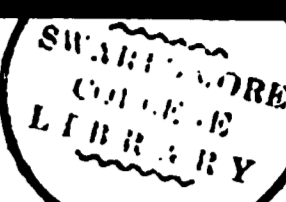

business education programs. No concerted analysis has been made of the impact on business education of enrollment trends or changes in the training, interests and capacities of students. Little is known about the kinds of jobs for which business schools are training, or should be training, their students. No serious effort has been made to assess the relationship between business sources, the liberal arts and other branches of higher education. Hardly any consideration has been given to the role business schools might play in preparing students for effective participation in government or community activities.

Forty-six years ago Dr. Abraham Flexner did for medical education with his study "Medical Education in the United States and Canada, a Report to the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching" what Dr. Pierson hopes to accomplish for business education. Dr. Flexner urged that medical schools be brought under the management and responsibilities of universities. Today this is almost completely the case.
