

Another 7-Mill School Tax Jump Predicted

Jones Discusses New Elementary Cost at LWV

A 5 1/2 to 7 mill increase in the tax rate of the Swarthmore-Rutledge School District is required to build needed elementary classrooms, Donald P. Jones, school board president, disclosed at the February 14 luncheon meeting of the local League of Women Voters.

The lower figure would stand at the \$500,000 to \$600,000, estimated as the cost of a 10 to 12 room expansion, comes at 3 1/2 per cent interest and is amortized over a 30-year period. A 20-year amortization would add the other 1 1/2 mills, Jones said.

The District jumped 7 mills from its former 35-mill limit last year after its union with Rutledge raised it to a third class district. Doubling that anyone except a philosopher could predict school board decisions, Jones announced State approval of the Rutgers avenue site and of a proposed room schedule had been obtained and the local District is now in the third step (proving its financial responsibility), after which it will be ready for the final stage of applying for the State's O.K. on preliminary plans.

Jones said he believes 7 or 8 rooms are needed right away. He expects these to cost about \$350,000. Another 3 to 4 rooms must follow within a year or two later, he added. The Board is pressing hard in an attempt to rush the first new facilities to completion by September 1958.

As soon as the elementary project is underway, the Board will be able to consider high school needs. Jones said he hoped the vacated College avenue elementary school could be readied for junior high school occupancy by the Fall following the one in which its younger pupils were transferred to their new quarters (this would be the 1959-60 school year).

Renovation of the high school building should take place by the next year (1960-61), he felt, although he hoped some improvements such as lighting might be undertaken before more major ones could be afforded.

Asked if the elementary room schedule included a kitchen, Jones replied "No, not in the proposed building which will be separate but probably quite near the present school on the Rutgers plot; but we have discussed putting a kitchen on the wing of the old school in order to confine eating to the area already established there."

To another question regarding class size he stated the Board has in mind a minimum of 25 pupils and maximum of 30. County Superintendent of Schools, G. Baker Thompson, a former principal of Swarthmore High School, who also spoke at the meeting reminded the audience, "today's State policy of dividing by 33 children in establishing room needs is rough on areas like Swarthmore whose philosophy calls for smaller classes. Larger rooms might have to be built, or if Swarth-

College Announces New Faculty Members

3 to Join Staff for 2nd Semester Here

Chadwick Alger, Manuel Ascenso, and Michael Scriven, new professors of political science, Spanish, and philosophy, have joined the Swarthmore College faculty for the spring semester. Mr. Scriven comes to Swarthmore after work as a research associate at the Minnesota Center for the Philosophy of Science. His courses at Swarthmore include symbolic logic, philosophy of science and an introductory class.

Well-trained both in science and in philosophy, Mr. Scriven holds a B.A. in mathematics and physics and an M.A. in mathematics and philosophy from the University of Melbourne. He received a Ph.D. in philosophy from Oxford University. Born in England, though now an Australian citizen, Mr. Scriven acts as American correspondent for an English periodical "The Motorist" in his less academic moments.

A doctoral study on the role of private scholars in making foreign policy and four years of work with the Office of Naval Intelligence has helped prepare Mr. Alger to teach American Foreign Policy and International Politics. Most recently he has taught at Princeton University. He was an undergraduate at Ursinus College and did graduate work at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.

Mr. Ascension replaces James Sorber of the Spanish department, who is at present on a leave of absence in Spain. In addition to teaching several seminars in Spanish literature here, Mr. Ascenso is an associate professor of romance languages at Haverford College. He and his wife, Mrs. Elisa Ascenso, assistant professor of Spanish, keep the Spanish department "in the family" since the two Ascensos are the only members of that department at Swarthmore this semester.

does not take into account the fact that the lowest point on the present campus is at an elevation of approximately 100 feet above the proposed expressway route, and most points on the campus are screened from it by thick stands of trees. In other words, it seems unlikely that students on the campus would be aware of a highway in the creek valley at all.
 In his letter to alumni, Dr. Smith points out that the Crum Creek Valley is a "precious possession." That it is an asset to our area is undeniable. However, one must question the assumption that a picnic area is more precious to anyone than his home. The simple fact of this highway controversy is that the Crum Creek route would condemn a maximum of 45 homes in this and neighboring communities, while the alternative "A" route would destroy as many as 300.
 With these facts in mind, I do not see how any conscientious Swarthmorean, in the name of humanity, can favor the route that would cause the greater amount of damage and heartbreak.

A SUMMARY OF THE EXPRESSWAY ISSUE

COMMON GROUND
 All Swarthmoreans will agree that selection of a route for the proposed Mid-County Expressway should be based on fair appraisal of the engineering and cost factors. If these factors are approximately equal, consideration should then be given to the economic and social impact of the routes under discussion.

THE AREA OF CONTROVERSY
 Unhappily, controversy has arisen as to whether a route slicing through a corner of the Borough at Riverview Road, or one running through Crum Creek Valley would be the more harmful to Swarthmore and neighboring communities. The State has ruled out all other alternatives.

SWARTHMORE CITIZENS' POSITION
 Since no official action has been taken by our Borough's elected representatives, the committee known as Swarthmore Citizens in Opposition to Route "A" was formed to speak for Borough residents who recognize in Route "A" a threat to property values, to the Borough tax rate, and to the character of our community. Opposition to Route "A" has been expressed effectively in the form of a citizens' petition and other representations to the appropriate authorities.

LOCATION OF "BLUE" ROUTE
 There has been some confusion concerning the location of the "Blue" or Crum Creek route. This is understandable because an exact survey of this route has not been completed yet. However, preliminary plotting of the "Blue" route shows that no existing College installations would be destroyed. In fact, the road would run approximately 1,000 feet to the west of the nearest College building at an elevation approximately 100 feet below campus grade. The road would be shielded from the campus by trees, making it impossible even to see the highway from most points on the College grounds. The distance from Wharton Hall to the highway would be greater than the present distance from Parrish Hall to Chester Road.

A DELAWARE COUNTY ISSUE
 Letters expressing one point of view on the highway issue have been solicited from persons residing in all parts of the United States. We do not believe that such comments are relevant. The Mid-County Expressway will affect only residents of Delaware County. Residents of neighboring communities already are on record, through their elected representatives, against Route "A". We believe that residents of Swarthmore have an obligation to express their stand regarding the highway routes now under discussion. The fight against Route "A" is not yet won. LWV Reviews Local School Building Crisis

Final meetings on the League of Women Voters local program "Study and Analysis of the School Building Crisis in the Swarthmore-Rutledge School District" were held February 18, at the home of Mrs. Clark Byse, and on Monday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Hallock Campbell, chairman of the committee.

Mrs. Campbell reviewed the reports of the building study committee and the sub-committees. The building committee under the chairmanship of Dr. Samuel Carpenter includes administrative staff, faculty and School Board members. The sub-committee on educational standards and needs, chaired by John Carroll, and expansion and renovation of school facilities, chaired by Charles Topping, are made up of members of the community, school staff and school board members. The work of these committees, begun in 1950 has been periodically reviewed, and is currently up to date.

Dr. Amy Howland, co-chairman of the league's committee, presented charts showing the location and amount of land available for building sites, drafts of the school population increase and concentration, and preliminary plans of the proposed new building. Information obtained in the school census, recently completed by The Home and School Association with the assistance of the League of Women Voters was interpreted in some of the charts presented. The data presented in these charts was a graphic demon-

stration of the need for immediate building.

The committee expressed appreciation to Baker Thompson, Superintendent of Schools in Delaware County, who addressed the league on state requirements for elementary school buildings; to Donald Jones, president of the Swarthmore-Rutledge School District, who spoke on methods of financing the proposed expansion; to Dr. Samuel Carpenter, who presented building plans to the study group, and to Mary Spiller, John Spencer, and other members of the school board who have been most generous with their time and assistance.

The committee wished to also commend the school board for its careful study, cooperation with the community, and recent rapid progress in solving the school building crisis in the Swarthmore-Rutledge School District.

However, knowing Swarthmore alumni to be an intelligent, fair-minded group, we are confident that were the facts known to those living outside Delaware County, they would recognize the disastrous effects of the alternative 'A' Route on the Borough of Swarthmore and neighboring communities.

"These effects would include: destruction of many homes; downgrading of many more homes; increased local taxes resulting from the above; and disruption of many established communities.

"We are confident that these considerations, along with engineering and cost factors, will be considered objectively by the appropriate State and Federal authorities.

"Therefore we respectfully suggest that any letters reaching you from Swarthmore College alumni living outside Delaware County be regarded as expressions of opinion, not founded on complete knowledge of the facts."

State Told 47 Mills To Pay for New School

Board to Ask Council To Keep 1941 Agreement

The Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School Board completed a financial responsibility form for filing with the state Wednesday night in adjourned session. The form anticipates paying a \$38,500 rental annually for about 30 years to the municipal authority which will be created to finance the new 12-classroom elementary school contemplated to cost \$550,000. The form anticipates a tax rate up to 47 mills (5 mills increase over the current rate per \$100 of assessed realty evaluation). However, Board Treasurer J. John F. Spencer said whether the full increase would be required this year or whether some of it can be shaved off a year or two depends upon actual cost developments and on when and how much the authority will have to be paid.

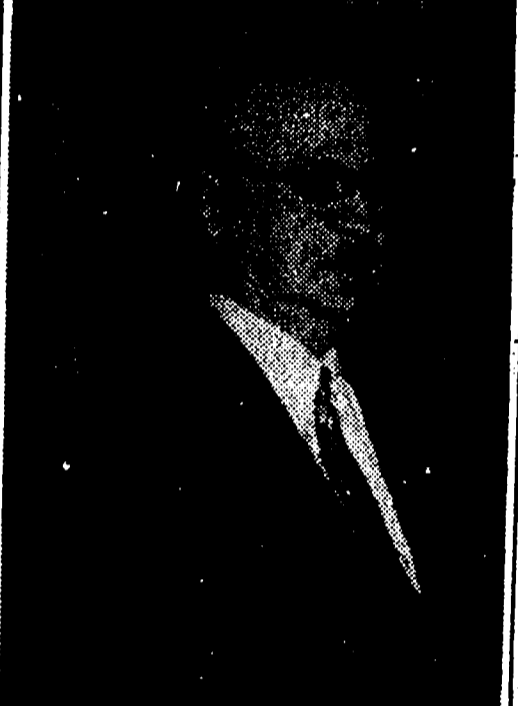

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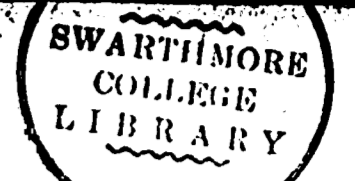

Harold Clurman, director of Tennessee Williams' new play, "Orpheus Descending" Sunday night delivered the fourth in the series of eight lectures on "Art and Mass Media" being held at Swarthmore College under the sponsorship of the William J. Cooper Foundation.

The director of "Awake and Sing," "Golden Boy," "Member of the Wedding," "Bus Stop," "Tiger at the Gates," and "Waltz of the Toreadors," expressed to the audience his concern over the "hit psychology" of the American theater audiences. "We don't see plays any more, we see hits or flops." If the opening night critics give a new comedy good reviews, continued Mr. Clurman, the second night audience is ready to laugh at the ushers before the curtain goes up; they know they are going to see a hit. If the notices are bad, the people come in with a kind of grave look as if to say: "We're going to bear this and be fair." But they are very tense about this fairness they are going to apply.

Deploping this regimented, supine theater audience, he called for playgoers who can make independent judgments, who are persons who have honest reactions, cultivated reaction, fine reaction, sensitive reaction, but their own reaction. A man can say he prefers leg shows and I shake that man's hand because he knows what he likes."

The next series speaker on March 10 will be choreographer and dancer Jerome Robbins. Mr. Robbins was choreographer for "On the Town," "High Button Shoes," "Call Me Madam," "The King and I," and the most recently "The Bells are Ringing," the Judy Holiday hit currently playing on Broadway, which he also directed. He has worked with the Ballet Theatre, Ballet Russe, and New York City Center.

He will be followed on March 17 by composer-musician Paul Creston; on April 7 by motion picture producer and writer Dore Schary; on April 14 by television producer Lawrence Langner.

Not a Local Matter

To The Editor:

As a member of the Alumni Association of Swarthmore College and a resident of Swarthmore for more than sixty years, I maintain that the welfare of the college is not merely a local matter, confined within the limits of Delaware County. All of us who have shared the benefits of an education here have acquired also, it seems to me, a life-long responsibility not only on our own behalf, but for the sake of those who come after us.

All over our country are men and women who are living richer lives and are contributing in innumerable ways to the betterment of their communities because of the knowledge and ideals they carried away with them from the Swarthmore campus. Does it seem reasonable to think that they would have no interest in Delaware County and are not still active in maintaining the high standards of Swarthmore College? The homes around us are here because those who have founded them wished to live in the atmosphere of our college town. Here their families receive a diversity of benefits which the college freely offers and which it invites its neighboring communities to share.

In my judgment, we of Swarthmore, college and residents alike, should unite in strong protests against either Route A or the "Blue" Route being constructed anywhere adjacent to Swarthmore. When informed opinion everywhere is striving to make people more aware of our coun-

try's need for education, it would be a paradox indeed for the State of Pennsylvania to allow an outstanding educational institution, such as Swarthmore College, to be damaged to the extent now proposed by the Blue Route. Both Route A and the Blue Route, as planned, would destroy many homes. Both of these routes are "unacceptable" to this whole community.

"May all of us, far and wide, from now on work valiantly together to preserve a heritage for which we hold a responsibility to our nation."

Explains Source of Information

To The Editor:

Several citizens of the Borough have expressed interest in the sources of information contained in an advertisement signed by Swarthmore Citizens in Opposition to Route "A" in last week's Swarthmorean.

First, it should be pointed out that the advertisement stated approximate distances from Swarthmore College buildings to the proposed "Blue" or Crum Creek route for the Mid-County Expressway. The advertisement also made it clear that these approximations were based on preliminary plotting of the "Blue" route.

The precise location of the expressway route, whether it turns out to be the "A" or "Blue", will not be known until after the route is decided upon and detailed surveys are made. In the present stage of discussion, interested parties can only match available information concerning the proposed routes against accurate, authoritative maps of the area, such as the Franklin map of Delaware County, the Coast and Geodetic Survey map, and the map of the College campus published by Swarthmore College itself.

By the way, the information contained in last week's advertisement was developed. It is as accurate as any information on the subject can be at the present time. Information on the effects of Route "A" contained in previous advertisements sponsored by our committee was developed in the same manner.

We believe the decision on the expressway route must and will be based first on engineering and cost factors, and second on immediate, direct impact on people and communities. We believe further that Route "A" must and will be rejected on these grounds.

Faculty to Consider Soc. Security Coverage

A special meeting for all members of the Swarthmore-Rutledge School staff is being called at 2:45 Monday afternoon, March 11, in the All-Purpose Room to consider their contemplated action on the question of participating in Social Security coverage as well as the Public School Employees Retirement now required by law.

The last legislature developed a plan under which all members of the retirement system would be given the opportunity in the spring of 1957, to indicate whether they wish to join Social Security as well. Pamphlets explaining the plan have been received in the district and distributed to teachers.

School Boards of the State will be asked to vote on their desire to participate during the month of April and members in the Retirement System will be asked to vote on their individual preferences the latter part of May.

Since most members of the School Staff have never been on Social Security, it is anticipated that many questions will arise and that the meeting will be a long one; hence, all schools of the district will be dismissed at 2:30 Monday afternoon so that the meeting can get under way promptly.

Nursing Service Gives Monthly Report

The Central Committee of the Community Nursing Service, Delaware County, met on February 14 with Chairman Mrs. Birney K. Morse, presiding.

Reports were read from the various chairmen. Mrs. Arthur Blinn of Swarthmore and Mrs. George Trooley of Woodlyn were accepted as new members.

Mrs. John Ross, chairman of the Woodlyn Child Health Center reported that although the sessions had been increased from two to four, the center would be returning to the original plan of first and third Thursday each month, as it seemed practical because of the free polio vaccination program at each of the five county hospitals under the sponsorship of the Delaware County Medical Society, State Department of Health and the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The nursing staff of the Community Nursing Service Delaware County, have been assisting in this program.

Helen Daly, a senior student nurse from the Villanova University School of Nursing is on a three months affiliation with the agency and has been assigned to the Swarthmore office to work with the veteran staff nurse Mrs. Jane Zebley.

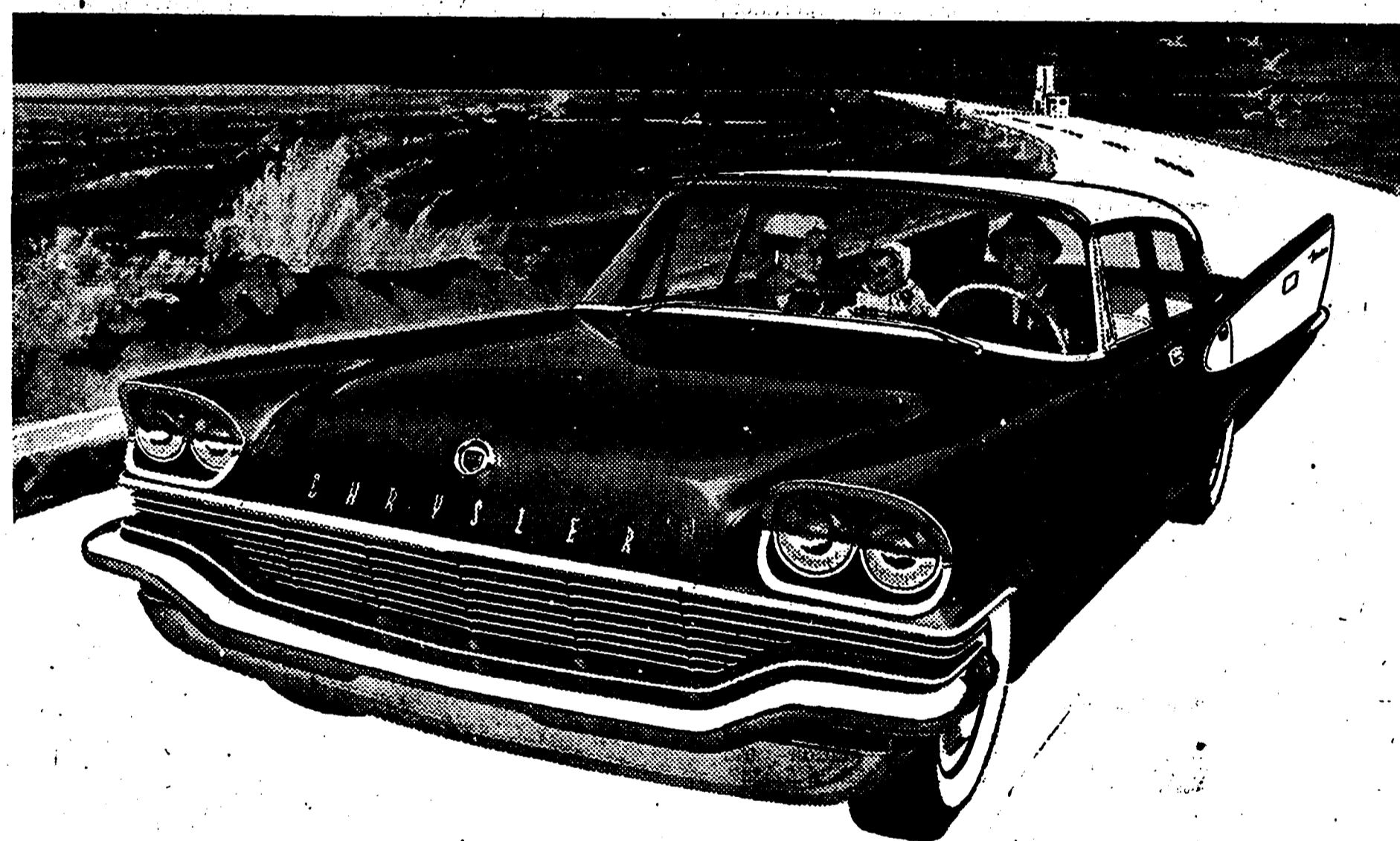
Janet Michel, a member of the staff, attended an all day Heart Seminar recently. The entire nursing staff visited the Day Care Center for Retarded Children in Lansdowne to better understand their part in coordinating their work with the retarded child in the home situation.

Dorothy Sidner, supervisor of the Swarthmore office, reported that the nurses made 1112 visits in the month of January. This compares with 895 in January 1956 or an increase of 247 visits. It was thought that the need for nurses in family health supervision has increased probably because she is recognized as the one able to instruct parents in infant care, formula preparation and to interpret local Board of Health rules in regard to communicable disease.

The board urged that those who have need of a Public Health Nurse call early in the day.

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Parents Hear Reading Consultant

Dr. Ethel Maney, reading consultant for Delaware County, addressed a large group of parents of children in the first three grades and in kindergarten, on reading, at a meeting February 20, co-sponsored by the education committee of Home and School and these grade groups.

Dr. Maney first outlined the things that she, as a parent, would expect the school to provide. They were the pronunciation skills including a sight vocabulary of 3500 words by the end of the Third Reader, word attack skills using phonics, the context, and syllables. She would also expect practice for smooth reading, for comprehension of the author's meaning and an evaluation of this, and for retention and application of what is read. Dr. Maney emphasized that a reading program for the first three grades must be highly flexible, tailored to each child's needs.

Of particular interest to many parents was her discussion of the things that as a teacher, she would consider the responsibility of the parents. These were good hearing, vision, and speech; good general health, and sufficient emotional maturity. She explained that a child who can't sit still for 10 minutes or who can't follow directions will be lost in the shuffle.

She feels that children today do not finish what they start, that they do not work on their own initiative, and that they do not want to try anything that is hard, as well as did the children of 20 years ago. She suggested too, that families be sure there is enough material for children to read to themselves at home, at an easier level than his or her school reading.

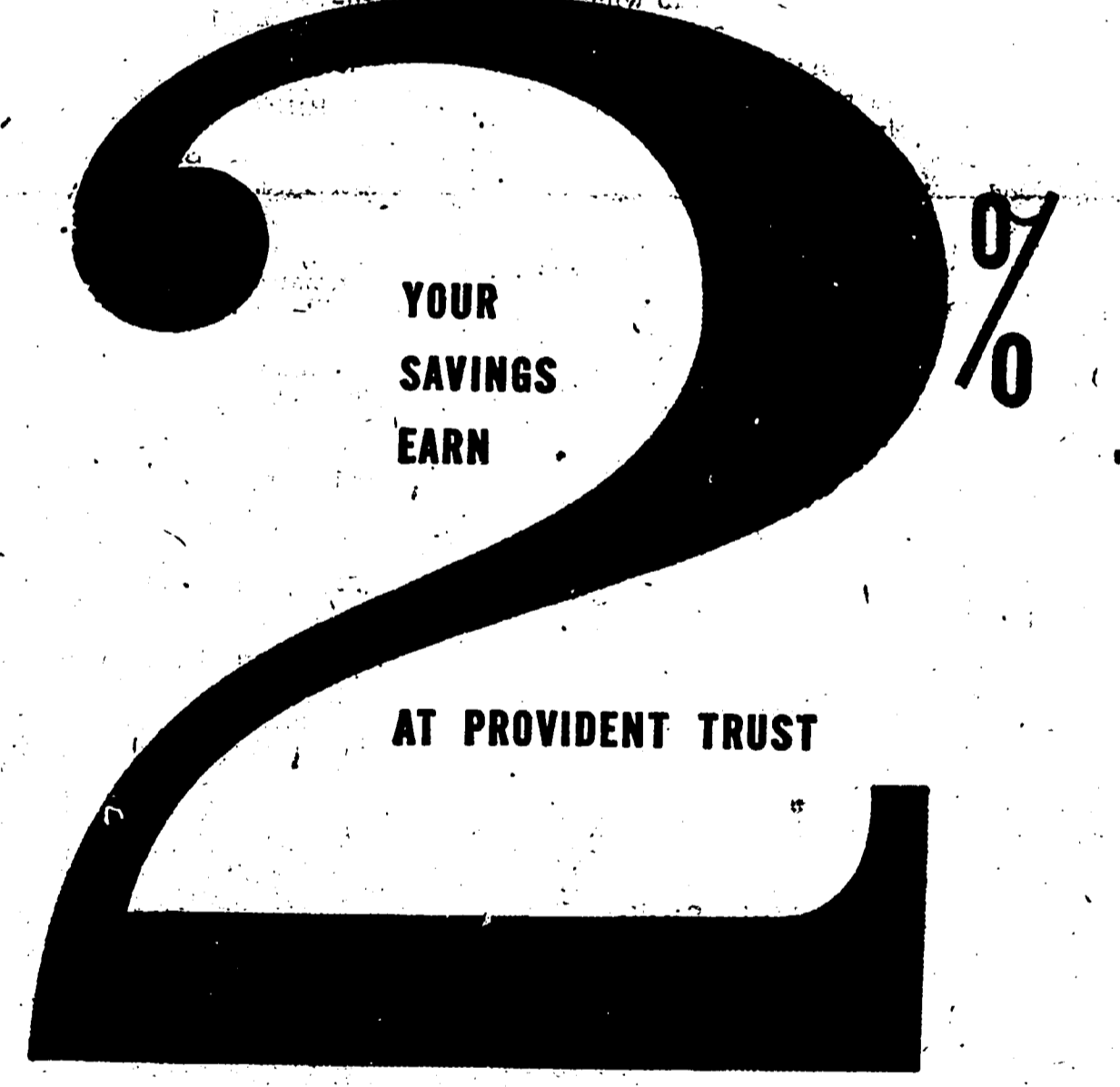

So that citizens of the community may have at their fingertips various reference books relevant to and about the United Nations, a number of pamphlets as well as books will be placed on display on this shelf. Included will be the current Headline Series published by the Foreign Policy Association, of which former Swarthmore College president John Nason is director. Some of the titles of this series are "Decisions '57," "Population Explosion," "Underdeveloped Land," "Mainsprings of World Politics," "United States Foreign Policy 1945-55," and "Many Faces of the Atom."

"TV has lowered the taste of the dance. They know the audience is satisfied with anything." Composer Paul Creston To Continue Art Series 'Art a Pioneer', Robbins, Choreographer Says Paul Creston, composer and musician, will continue the "Art and Mass Media" series at Swarthmore College, Sunday, March 17, in Clothier Memorial at 8:15 p.m. Mr. Creston has composed in every medium except opera, including works for radio, motion pictures and television.

His First Symphony captured the New York Music Critics' Circle Award as the best American orchestral work of the 1948 season; his Second Symphony was performed by the Boston Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Charles Munch when the group recently toured the U.S.S.R.

On five preceding Sundays James Michener, librettist Oscar Hammerstein II, novelist Budd Schulberg, director and producer Harold Clurman, and choreographer and dancer Jerome Robbins have discussed the effect of mass media upon the artist's work. Mr. Michener termed mass media the "marjuana of the mind." Mr. Hammerstein seemed to equate popularity and artistic success in the theater. Mr. Clurman deplored the regimented, supine theater audience that fails to make independent judgments.

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Naval Mutiny Holds Audiences Spellbound deFuria Directs Current Players Club Success

The cast of "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial," peppered with seasoned directors, insured a wholly absorbing theatre night throughout this week for Players Club goers. From a unique touch which attracts the attention of the audience upon entering the auditorium to the full spread of blue jackets at curtain call, the court room drama from Herman Wouk's Pulitzer Prize-winning World War II Novel reveals the strengths and frailties of humanity, changed little when gilded in uniform.

Spilling lawyers on the stage, behind the scenes, and in the audience, the play steadily develops in suspense during its two acts. Behind the scenes are directors Joseph W. de Furia, and Donald H. Pugh, Chester attorneys. Exacting admirable performances from an able cast, deFuria and Pugh manage real stage excitement without assistance of usual scene and costume changes - and the female form.

Amid the war's great conflict, the conflicts of Lt. Commander Queeg (masterfully demonstrated by Harry Gaffery, Jr.) as commanding officer of the U. S. Mine Sweeper Caine, the conflicts of Lt. Barney Greenwald (portrayed by Philip Price, as only one with his drama heritage could) in his role of defense attorney, stand out. In contrast, Lt. Commander John Challee (forcefully enacted by William A. Clarke, Jr.) seems to confine his conflict to the strong one he presented to the case of the defense.

Also to be commended are John Riley Love for his portrayal as mutinying Lt. Stephen Maryk, Charles E. Seymour as novel-writing Lt. Thomas Keefer, Edward F. Muller, Jr., as morale officer Lt. (j.g.) Willis Seward Keith, and Paul O'Neill, who as signalman third class, Julius Urban, provides the one light touch among the witnesses. Charles P. Larkin, Jr., as Capt. Randolph Southard, Ned Pyle and Harry Clark as the psychiatrists in-the case, Dr. Lundeen and Dr. Bird, turn in good performances of varied characters. Veteran William J. Simmons as Capt. Blakeley, convincingly presides over court silently sustained on the bench by Joseph Young, Donald Lehrkrider, Robert M. Grogan, and Roy McCune. Alan Slack as a stenographer, and Richard Wooten are effective in small roles.

with the unsightly vacant lot which by the very fact of its vacancy, with the scarcity of land in Swarthmore, has proven that no one has wanted the ground for any purpose allowable within the provisions of the zoning ordinance.

"It is planned to have 24-hour medical coverage so that at any time of day or night a doctor would be available for any emergency that might occur within the borough. The X-ray and laboratory facilities would not only be advantageous to our patients but to all borough residents. The centralizing of many patients records would result in better medicine for the community in that during the absence of one doctor, patients could be seen by one of the other physicians and have their records available so that continuity of treatment would not be lost."

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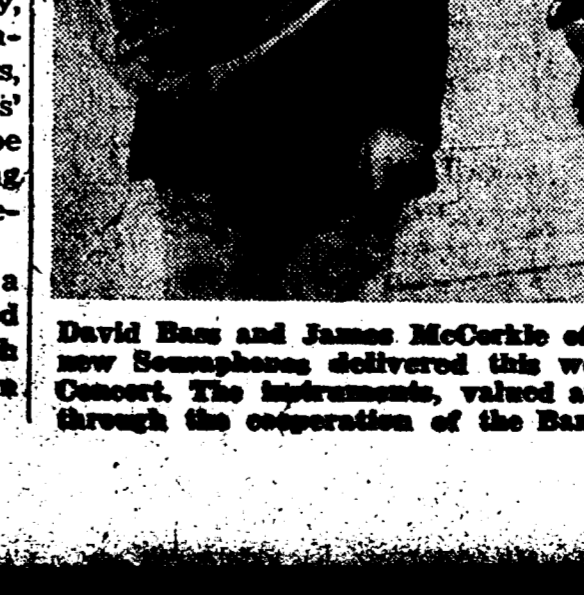
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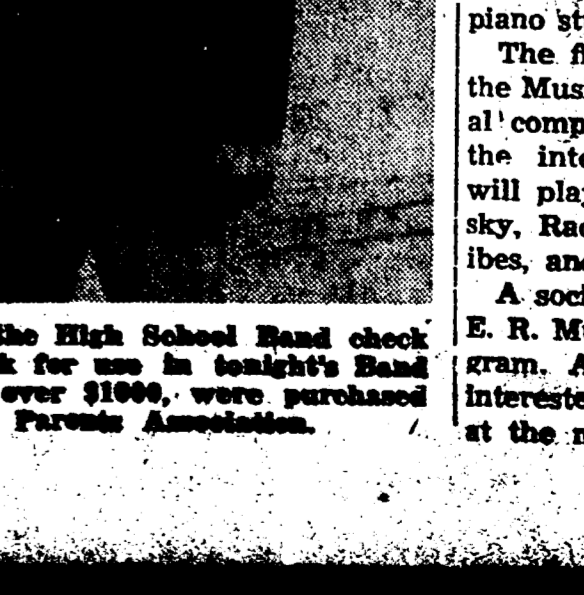
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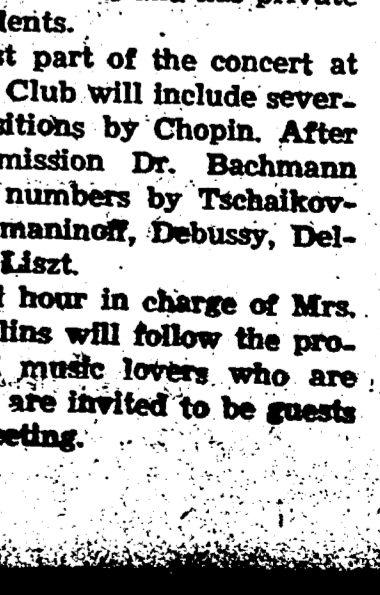
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Henry W. Cornell Has Fatal Heart Attack

Great Grandson of University Founder

Henry W. Cornell, great grandson of Ezra Cornell founder of Cornell University, died of a heart attack in his apartment in The Dartmouth House at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. He had been bedfast since a similar attack on Wednesday of last week.

Formerly contract negotiator for the Defense Materials Department in Washington, D. C., Cornell moved to Swarthmore in December. He was administrator of demolition at the Baldwin Plant, Eddystone.

Born in Ithaca 57 years ago, he was graduated from Colorado College, and served with the American Expeditionary Forces in France during World War I. He was a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

Surviving are his wife, Paulette Leprestre; three sons, Rene of Glendale Calif., Henry W., a graduate student in the Cornell University Law School, and Timothy a student at the University of Maryland; an 11-year-old daughter, Victoria Elizabeth, a student at the Rutgers avenue school here; two brothers, Alonzo B. and Ezra and a sister Mrs. Margaret C. Leprestre.

Services were held yesterday in the University chapel at Ithaca. Interment followed in Ithaca's Eastlawn cemetery.

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INCOME TAX FACTS No. 5

Personal Deductions May Cut Your Tax Bill

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax laws. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, and the Pennsylvania Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

When you use the "short form" in filing your income tax return, or take the standard deduction on the "long form," you are allowed a deduction of about 10 percent to cover such personal expenses as interest, state and local taxes, contributions and medical expenses.

If you are sure that your personal deductions are less than 10 percent of your adjusted gross income, there is no need to itemize them. But if you are not sure, or if you are not sure of the value of your deductions, it is worth the effort of calculating your tax on both forms. Here are some deductions you should be careful not to overlook:

Interest on Loans
The interest you pay on loans is deductible. This includes mortgages, automobile loans, appliance loans, and other loans for which you pay interest. The part of "carrying charges" representing interest on installment purchases is deductible. Evidence such as a statement from the seller should be obtained to show the amount of interest you paid during the year.

State and Local Taxes
Most taxes, other than federal taxes, are deductible. These include state and local real estate, personal property, income, retail sales, poll taxes and, in all but a few states, gasoline taxes. You can also deduct auto licenses and registration fees, but not dog or hunting licenses.

Charitable Contributions
Another type of deduction you can take if you itemize your deductions is your contributions to any "religious, charitable, educational, scientific or literary" organizations. These contributions are deductible up to 30 percent of your income, and up to 30 percent if at least 10 percent of your income was paid as gifts to religious organizations, schools or hospitals.

In adding up your contributions, don't forget that gifts of property can be deducted at their fair market value at the time they were donated. Suppose, for example, you contributed to your church a share of stock which had doubled in value while you had it. You can deduct, even though you only paid half that much for it. At the same time you gain which would have been realized if you had sold the stock instead of contributing it.

An individual is not permitted to deduct a contribution of property if the property is not permitted.

Miscellaneous Deductions
If you had certain expenses connected with your employment (other than travel or reimbursed expenses) you can claim them in connection with your deductions. Examples would be tools, uniforms, union dues and employment agency fees.

Other miscellaneous deductions include the fee for preparation of your tax return, some alimony, and a share of interest and real estate taxes paid by a cooperative apartment corporation of which you are a tenant stockholder.

The instruction book which comes with your tax forms gives further information. Help is also available by telephone or at offices of the Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue Service urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you decide to seek outside help.

Dr. J. B. Roxby, Sr., Service Held Yesterday

Early Borough Physician, Temple Professor, Died Monday

Funeral services for Dr. John Byers Roxby, Sr. were conducted by the Rev. John C. Kulp at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the Swarthmore Methodist Church of which Dr. Roxby was a charter member.

Death came Monday night in Temple University Hospital just two months before the eighty-sixth birthday of the well-loved Swarthmore physician and Temple Medical School anatomy professor emeritus. He had been hospitalized Saturday when a cardiac condition from which he suffered became severe.

Born in Shenandoah, Schuylkill County, Pa. on May 18, 1871 he studied at Millersville Teachers College before coming to Philadelphia with his parents in 1889. After pre-medical studies, he was graduated with honors in 1896 from the old Medico-Chirurgical College which later became the nucleus of the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Medicine. The following year he was appointed a demonstrator in anatomy and later chief demonstrator and instructor.

Dr. Bachmann was born in Budapest in 1916. His father was a music educator and conductor, and his mother played cello in the Budapest Symphony Orchestra. He studied music for 14 years in various conservatories, finishing with eight years at the Royal Academy of Music at Budapest where he graduated with highest honors. The Academy is world renowned and of especial interest to Philadelphians, since it is the Alma Mater of Eugene Ormandy.

Dr. Bachmann's latest position in Hungary was professor of advanced theory and associate director of the State School of Music in Szombathely. He conducted all over central Europe and is a finished concert pianist.

Tibor Bachmann with his wife and seven year old son escaped into Austria during the late uprising in Hungary. He had spent a year in prison for anti-communist activity, and was under sentence of death. On December 21, 1956, he landed in this country, and immediately resumed his musical career. He is now on the staff of the Delaware School of Music where he teaches advanced piano and theory. He also gives piano club recitals and has private piano students.

The first part of the concert at the Music Club will include several compositions by Chopin. After the intermission Dr. Bachmann will play numbers by Tschalkowsky, Rachmaninoff, Debussy, Delibes, and Liszt.

 is supplying registration and owners cards and men to assist with the technical testing. Elementary School Principal Thomas Boyle told the Board that the program aims to decrease dangerous riding habits and lessen school and parental headaches over lost bicycles.
 Licenses are planned in school colors.
 An early preliminary draft of the 1957-58 budget was presented to Board members for study and possible paring within the next few weeks. No details of the budget which is not scheduled for final adoption until May 15, were revealed except that in its rough form it calls for a seven-mill jump in the tax rate (making a total school district millage of 49). Three mills is included to care for Authority payments on new elementary expansion which might become payable during the budget term. Another three mills pays off a short term loan negotiated a year or so ago in connection with heater replacement at the College Avenue School and the high school choral room.
 The Board will probably begin its first combined squeezing of the new budget in an executive session following an adjourned meeting to be held April 3.
 Although it informally considered the tax collector's salary at a recent meeting and decided to make no change at that time, it could make some adjustment along that line if it takes to heart an observation brought to it Wednesday evening by the local Republican Committee. The committee wished to bring to the attention of the School District the fact that Swarthmore's tax collector receives an approximate gross compensation of \$6,500 while District auditors receive only \$70 each per annum. On a salary basis the School District pays the tax collector \$2800, while the Borough adds \$3100 on a 2 1/2 per cent of collection basis, and the County makes no recommendation. The Committee is of the opinion that the School District auditors are underpaid and the Borough Tax Collector is overpaid.

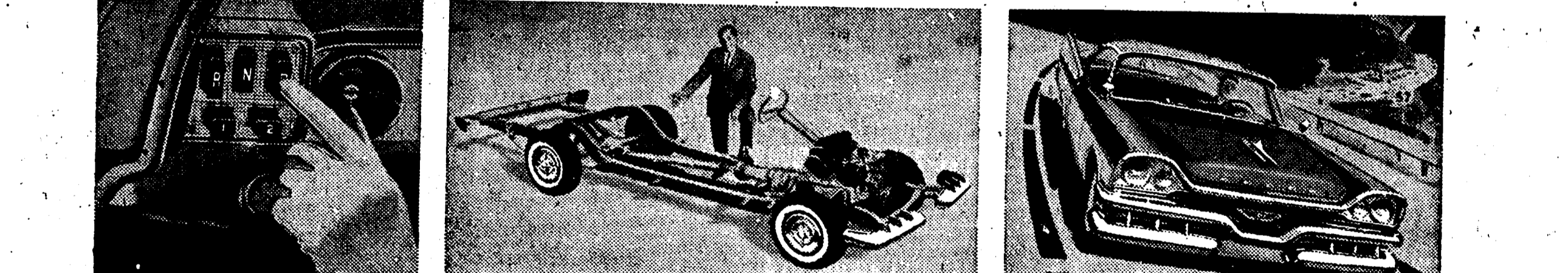

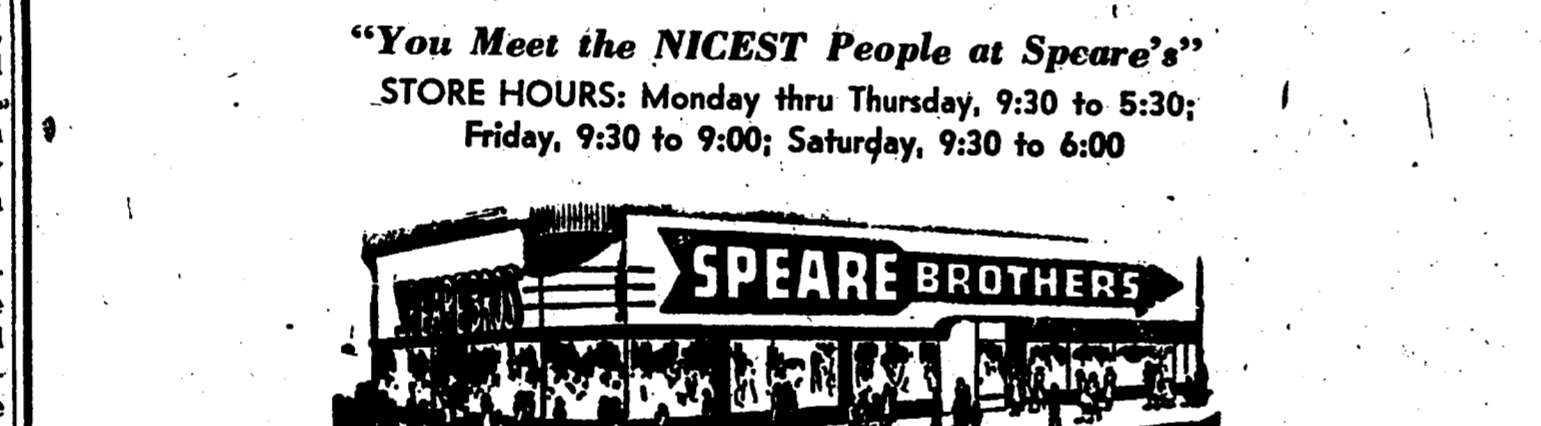

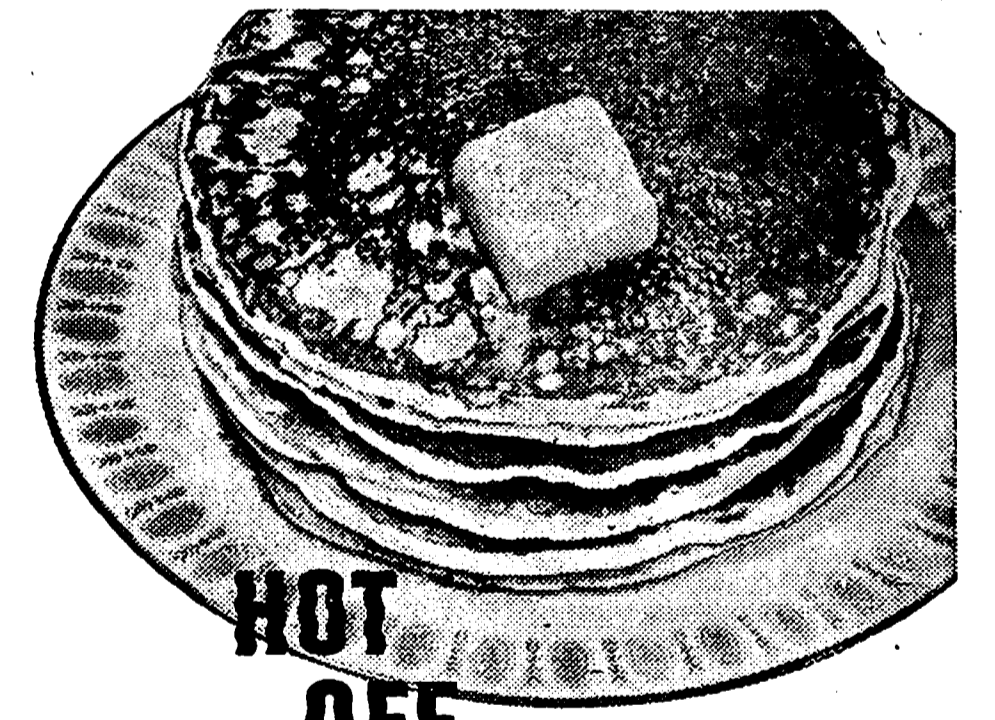
Addresses Coaches Clinic

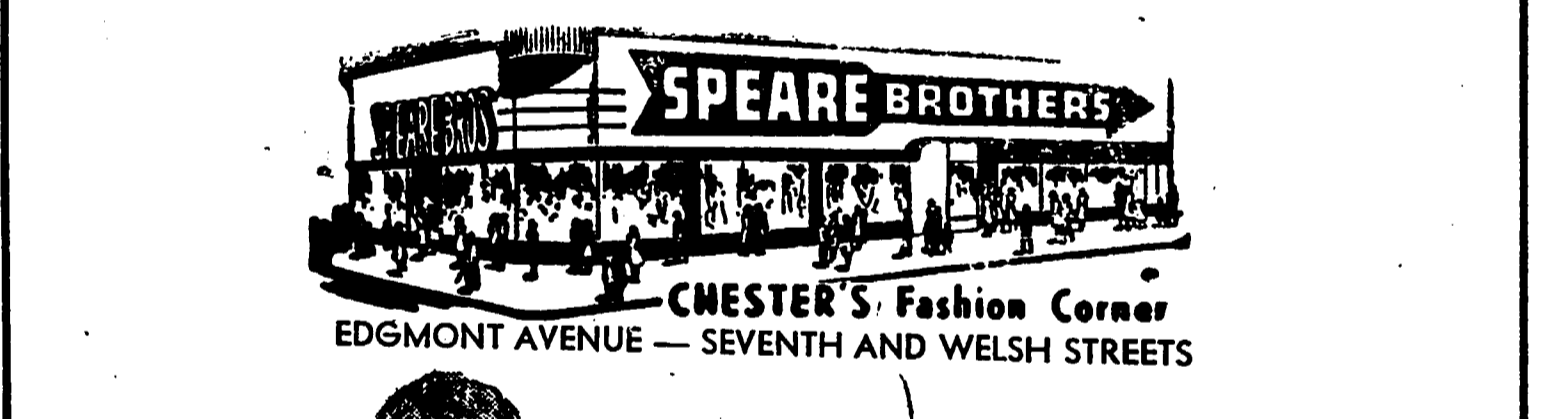
