Nothing like this ever happened before!

Wednesday morning, March 19, 1958, the U.S. Weather Bureau forecast for Philadelphia and vicinity read: "Mostly cloudy and cool today, with some light rain in the morning. Tomorrow mostly fair and continued cool. High today 45, low tonight 32. Northeast winds 10 to 20 miles an hour today."

That same morning there were a few snow flurries in the air. By nightfall a raging storm was blanketing the entire Delaware Valley area with the most disastrous snowfall in its history.

There have been deeper snows that were much easier to cope with. There have been floods and hurricanes that gave warning before they struck. But this storm was different! Never, in the entire 77-year record of the Philadelphia Electric Company have we experienced anything like it.

This snow had a character all its own. It was extremely wet an heavy and it clung to everything it touched. While the storm was raging, the Philadelphia Electric Company declared an emergency and called out every available man. But it was impossible to do much until roads were cleared of fallen trees and stalled cars, so that snowplows and our line trucks could get through.

Every emergency resource was called into action. Helicopters were employed to go where trucks couldn't reach. Highway and police departments cooperated in road clearance and rescue work on every hand. Hundreds of line crews were brought in from as far away as Ohio, Michigan, Connecticut, and Alabama to assist the thousands of Philadelphia Electric employees who worked around the clock to restore electric service.



When the last of the thousand spectators, 300 visiting firemen wiches were needed immediately. from the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 9th Districts, three dozen fire engines, dozen police cars, halfdozen ambulances and four canteen delphia, had departed, it was 7:30 a.m. Monday. Fire Chief George Humphries and a handful of fellow stalwarts from the Swarthmore Company, describing the fire as the ongest, hardest and most dangerous having occurred here, helped an Army truck and its crew haul the Swarthmore aerial truck and pumper out of the deep mud on the school lawn, just as the daytime

march of curious eyes began. Along with Boroughites who stood in the rain ignoring thunder and lightning and watched fire fighters pour "ten years' rain" onto the blazing building, firemen breathed gratitude that no risk to children or faculty had been present, and that the many treatments of firemen on the scene and at Taylor Hospital were confined to "nottoc-serious" lacerations and smoke

inhalation. Among firemen treated were John Rumsey, Bill Hartman and Layton Wilson. Countless doctors were on the scene, lending an experienced hand.





Unfair Taxation'

Protests State Levies on Non - Residents: Set Wed. Meeting

The Southeastern Pennsylvania Taxpayers' Association has invited all interested in the group's aims April 16 at 8 p.m. in the West Chester School Auditorium, North Church and Washington streets. At the meeting, methods for filing tax returns "under protest" will be discussed, nominations for officers

will be accepted, and the association's program will be outlined. At present the group is composed largely of residents of Chester and Delaware Counties, though any interested taxpayer is eligible for membership.

Most pressing of the short-range aims of the new group is spreading information on the Delaware income tax and "under protest" fil ing procedures before the state's deadline, April 30. Long-range aims include rallying support for H. J. R. 468, a joint resolution introduced in the House of Representatives by Representative H. W. Kean of New Jersey. The resolution calls for a constitutional amendment to invalidate taxation by one state on service fees and salaries earned by nonresidents. The local representative of this group is Richard K. Nove.







A Memorial Minute

AN ACTION TAKEN BY THE SESSION OF THE SWARTHMORE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

APRIL 3. 1958

The Reverend John Schott, Associate Minister since 1952 of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church, Swarthmore, Pennsylvania, died in the midst of his people during the morning service of worship, Sunday, March thirty, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and fifty eight. John Schott was born to John and Margaret Becker Schott in Newark, New Jersey, on Au-

gust 28, 1904. He was joined in Holy Marriage with Ellen Waite on July 8, 1932; their children are John Robert Schott and Carolyn Elizabeth Schott. From Wagner College, he was graduated a Bachelor of Arts in 1926; Union Theological Seminary graduated him a bachelor of divinity in 1929, and a master in theology in 1939; and he was

a student in the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem in 1930. The Presbyterian Church in the United States of America ordained John Schott to the Gospel Ministry in 1929; he was assistant minister of the South Park Presbyterian Church, Newark, from 1929 to 1933; minister of First Presbyterian Church, Nunda, New York, from 1933 • to 1934; minister of First Presbyterian Church, Webster, New York, from 1934 to 1940; associate minister of Fairmount Presbyterian Church, Cleveland Heights, Ohio, from 1940 to 1952; and was Moderator of the Presbytery of Rochester for the 1940 term.

He was a member of Rotary International and of the Author's Guild. In addition to his witness in the churches he served. he bore testimony to his faith in the written word, publishing articles in magazines ecclesiastical and secular.

Rightly did John Schott translate the word minister. In its root, it means a servant. In his life,

An associate minister, he was an associate servant; one yoked with others in the good bondage of duty. Well did he stand in the pulpit, rightly teaching the Word of Truth. Yet more he loved the shepherd task; and he was pastor to his people. When our children were born, John Schott knew our pride. When they were baptized, he called

them God's own. When they were married, he declared them one in Jesus Christ. When we were sick. he visited us. When he led us, in our sorrow, to the graveside, we heard the promise of the Resurrection. When our neighbors were new neighbors, he was early among them, amused at households

not yet well settled, and laughing with children not yet at ease with playmates new and strange. To the homes of our neighbors John Schott came. To our Church they came. There were homeless in the earth in his time; and we called them displaced persons. From Cleveland Heights and from Swarthmore, he sent word that there would be a place for them.

He met them when they came. He was their friend, compassionate, wise. At his last he stood among children, no longer little children, not yet full grown. To our Table, to the Table of our Lord, he welcomed them. And for the last of them, as for all the rest of them,

he prayed, so that his last words were a prayer: Defend, O Lord, this Thy servant with Thy heavenly grace; so that he may continue Thine for ever; and daily increase in Thy Holy Spirit more and more; until he come unto Thine everlasting kingdom. Amen.

Subcommittee Reports Study on Science. Math Courses in SHS

At the regular meeting of the Curriculum Advisory Committee to Swarthmore-Rutledge schools April 10 the report of the sub-committee on mathematics and science was presented by Co-chairmen Samuel Gurin and David Rosen. This is the first of several sub-committee reports on specific subjects to be made before the advisory committee. While the report was approved in principle, no action on any report will be taken until all are com-

The committee, besides Gurin and Rosen, included Dr. J. Alfred Calhoun, Gilbert P. Haight, Jr., Dr Wallace W. McCrory, and George W. Patterson In the report submitted for presentation to the school directors they listed these major recommendations for junior

1. Algebra should be introduced in the eighth grade for students capable of handling the subject, and continuation of the course through the ninth grade; 2. general eighth grades should be directed primarily toward preparation for biology, physics and chemistry and would involve some laboratory experience; 3. biology should be required for all students in ninth grade; 4. that there be no separate course given in health education but that'it be incorporated into the science program.

Suggestions for Senior High Chief recommendations for the

1. That tenth grade plane geom etry be fortified with elementary grade emphasize advanced algebra and include some trigonometry, and that the senior courses in trigonometry and solid geometry be enlargmathemates courses like calculus and modern algebra; 2: that physics and chemistry be given in tenth and 11th grades in seven periods per week instead of five. The seven periods are essential in order to include adequate laboratory work which at the present time is totally inadequate; 3. that courses in advanced biology and advanced physical science be given as electives in the 12th grade.

These recommendations were made after the committee fully investigated with the high school faculty the possibilities of extra hours programs. The ninth and final sesand other problems of schedule planning.
