Notices of the Pre-School Clinic for Swarthmore and Rutledge children who are to enter kindergarten in September 1958, have just been sent to parents of such children as are registered in the school census. Those children who are not now in the Swarthmore kindergarten but wish to enter Rutledge first grade should register at this time, also.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 14, 15 and 16 have been designated as registration days. Children who will be five years of age prior to January 31, 1959 will be eligible for entrance into kindergarten in September, 1958.

Mothers of such children are urged to telephone Mrs. Richard Eckenroth, KI3-0442 to make an appointment. Mrs. Eckenroth requests that calls be made on April 7 and 8 after 9 a.m. This plan will provide a minimum of waiting at the school at the time of the registration.

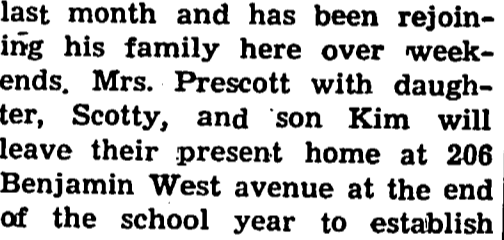

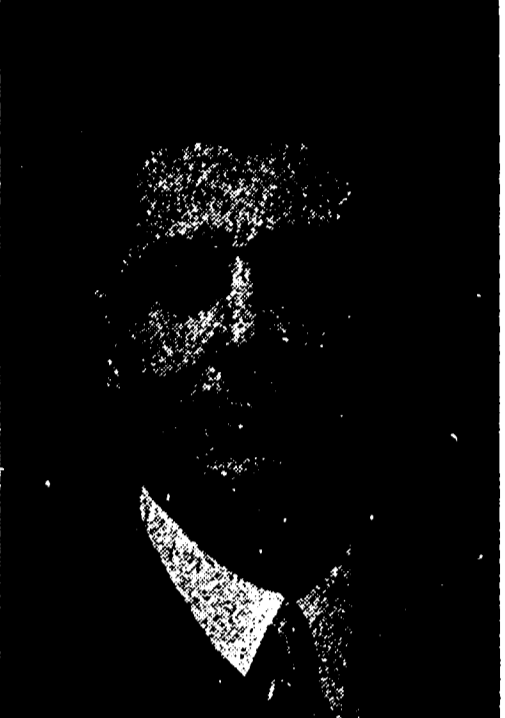

Palm Sunday Death Was Grievous Loss to Community

Summer Recreation Dates  
Set for June 23  
to Aug. 1

A revitalized and expanded baseball program for young boys is fast becoming a reality, thanks to the cooperation of Bill Reese and the baseball committees of the Lions Club and the Swarthmore Recreation Association. The response to the questionnaire distributed in the schools was very gratifying, indicating that about 120 boys will participate in the program.

Wells Forbes, baseball chairman of the association, reported at the meeting last Thursday night that, in order to provide an opportunity for the maximum number of boys to play and, at the same time keep the range of playing abilities within reason, the Swarthmore Intra-Borough Baseball League will be composed of six teams. An All-Star team will be selected periodically and will play outside teams on Saturdays. This team will be known as the Lions.

June 23 through August 1 have been set as the dates for the 1958 pre-school, primary and summer club programs. Registration dates for both programs will be announced in May.

For those newcomers who may know little or nothing of the program, the Swarthmore Recreation Association is a non-profit organization the purpose of which is to conduct a six-week summer program for three groups. The pre-school-primary, conducted at the Rutgers Avenue School, includes three-year-olds through the second grade; summer club, held at the College Avenue School, is for children of all ages who have completed the third grade; the third group is the aforementioned baseball program for young boys.

The activities of the first two programs, each under an able director and well staffed with teachers and assistants, are conducted five mornings a week, from 9 to 11:45, and include games, stories, music, sports, and handicrafts appropriate to each age level.

There are still several openings for teachers in the pre-school-primary program. Anyone who has had elementary education training and is interested in such a position is asked to apply to the director, Mrs. Franklin Robblee at Madison 9-3370. Student assistants are also needed, and boys and girls interested in those positions should also apply to Mrs. Robblee.

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### Fire Destroys High School, Undecided on Origin

(Continued from Page 1)  
unburned section of the lab the next day.

Stubborn flare-ups of the fire continued to bedevil firemen each time it seemed they had managed to conquer it. Toward 3 a.m. the moon and stars triumphed over the storm and billowing smoke decreased slowly, giving a preview of the new peaked-roofless skylight before the cold light of dawn revealed the full desolation.

Offers of accommodations for classes, loans of trucks and a variety of other assistances poured in from the College, Borough authorities, churches and other local organizations, schools from all over the County, businessmen and residents. Radio and newspapers announced "NO School" to any who might have slept through the disaster and advised classes were to be resumed that morning after several days' vacation. Nevertheless teachers, children and parents and Sea Scouts streamed to the scene to help in every way possible.

By Monday night most of the furniture and supplies from the basement and first floor of the burned building had been carried into the nearby gym by these volunteers and school custodians, while William W. Rumford Company started to tear out the debris for the insurance company.

The College Avenue Elementary group speedily moved its equipment down the street to the new wing of Trinity Episcopal Church where it began classes the next morning. Trinity Nursery School considerably moved down to the Presbyterian Church.

School Board members shifted Monday night plans so they could meet in emergency session with County Superintendent G. Baker Thompson in the Rutgers Avenue School to consult on plans ardently worked out by the administration during the day.

**New Schedule**  
After grateful consideration of Swarthmore's generous offer of 14 to 20 classrooms for packs of each day, it was decided the best policy would be to keep high school students on their own territory since sufficient rooms in the auditorium, gym, and elementary building, and music building could be mustered to operate the seventh through-twelfth grades on a double schedule.

The upper three grades began yesterday attending 8 a.m. to 12:25 p.m. and the seventh, eighth and ninth grades from 12:40 to 4:55 p.m. School sessions will be held on three consecutive Saturdays beginning next week, rather than extending the school year further into the spring in order to gain back the three days lost and again bring the calendar (already jugged twice following bad snow storms) up to the 180 pupil-day minimum required by the State.

The new schedule will probably obliterate track and junior high sports except for those possible during gym periods which will be held out-doors during good weather and in the auditorium or cafeteria on rainy days. Senior high girls' lacrosse and boys' baseball can still be managed it was believed on Wednesday.

Home economics headquarters will be in the cafeteria since no cafeteria service except for faculty will be needed with double sessions. Instrumental music classes will move in with vocal music, to make room for typing classes in the instrumental music room. The auditorium which can accommodate 500 pupils will be used for study hall.

Mr. Bush's office will be in Room 13 in the basement opposite the College Avenue entrance to the auditorium. Supervising Principal Frank R. Morey's office will be in the elementary building, with some records being stored at the College. College laboratories for biology, chemistry and physics will also be used on Thursdays and Fridays and elementary pupils will exercise on a corner of the College field opposite Trinity Church.

### Police Investigate

Police converged on the school out of dangerous areas during the day until the burned and broken building could be boarded up, others to guard against pilferers at night, and still others including State Police Fire Marshal Edward Mays to investigate the possibility of arson following discovery by Mr. Oppenlander early Monday that four bottles of phosphorus and one of sodium plus seven sizable pieces of equipment were missing from their unburned shelves in the chemistry laboratory. Oppenlander said the equipment included an oscilloscope, audioanalyzer, electronics switch, signal generator, signal tracer, power supply, and decade capacitance. Peculiarly, it was practically these identical chemicals and chemicals that were stolen one week after the close of the 1957 summer school when someone broke into the school and also apparently tried to start a fire near the lab with a pile of twigs and sticks. Although Oppenlander and local police conducted an investigation, the case was never solved. The instruments (assembled from kits) were originally purchased with money won by the school in the Scott Paper Company's "I. Q." Contest. Purchased with insurance, their replacements had just recently been completed by students.

Residents who were suspicious of a car noted near the school just before the fire further started the inquiry. Otherwise it was a short circuit in the electrical wiring, said Jim Robinson, although Custodian Jim Robinson said original wiring in the attic was well encased and other wiring to a clock system was new.

Whatever the cause, the effect nullified the recent survey and plan for staggered renovation of the high school, made by George Ewing Company, architects, and accepted by the School Board only a few weeks ago. At Monday night's meeting Alex Ewing said a new study is now necessary to see whether the stone shell of the building is safe and worth saving and, if so, how the features which might be desired—carpet be worked into them.

Although possibilities are no longer restricted by existing interior, and the improved facility will be completed considerably earlier than under the previous plan, it will not be possible to conduct classes in the more or less usual manner that had been expected. If suitable insurance adjustment, planning, and construction can be secured rapidly enough, the Board hopes the new Swarthmore High School will be an actuality by September 1959.

**Tolstoi, the Creator**

Countess Alexandra Tolstoi, youngest daughter of the Russian novelist, will be presented by the Cooper Foundation in a talk entitled "Tolstoi, the Creator" in the Friends Meeting House on Sunday, April 13, at 8:15 p.m.

Having been secretary to Leo Tolstoi during his last years and literary executor after his death, Countess Tolstoi wrote several books about her father. She has lived in this country for a number of years, including a residence in Newtown Square, and has been occupied with the activities of the Tolstoi Foundation during recent years.

Countess Tolstoi is staying with her relative, Mrs. John Shatagin of Cornell avenue.

**Leo Maris Aids**  
The Swarthmore Ship S. E. S. Leo Maris responded to a call for help after Sunday night's school fire. Mate Walter Reynolds was notified at 7 a.m. Monday, and shortly thereafter, the ship was mobilized.

Four Explorers assisted at the school grounds under the supervision of the local Police Department. Seven others lent their aid at the firehouse, cleaning fire engines and equipment.

Supplies came from the High School kitchen with Mr. and Mrs. David Narbeth transporting them and providing every kind of assistance to the Red Cross workers. Bread was secured from local stores, including special diet bread (it's possibly the first Fire Company lunch on slimming bread) and ham and cheese.

Various canned soups were collected and served (new combinations may have been discovered but all were found palatable). Coffee appeared and disappeared in amounts which seemed staggering to the fast working canteen.

The Red Cross thanks the Schumachers for permitting the use of their home in the convenient location across the street from the fire as a disaster center. It thanks also all those who assisted them, including Mr. and Mrs. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Narbeth, George Plowman, Peggy Schumacher, Jimmie Rowland, Eddie Shute, Jack Schumacher.

The local Red Cross chairman declared, after the fire was controlled, that she was more concerned than ever that Swarthmore's firemen are wonderful people.

### Ford Foundation Grants \$20,000 to College

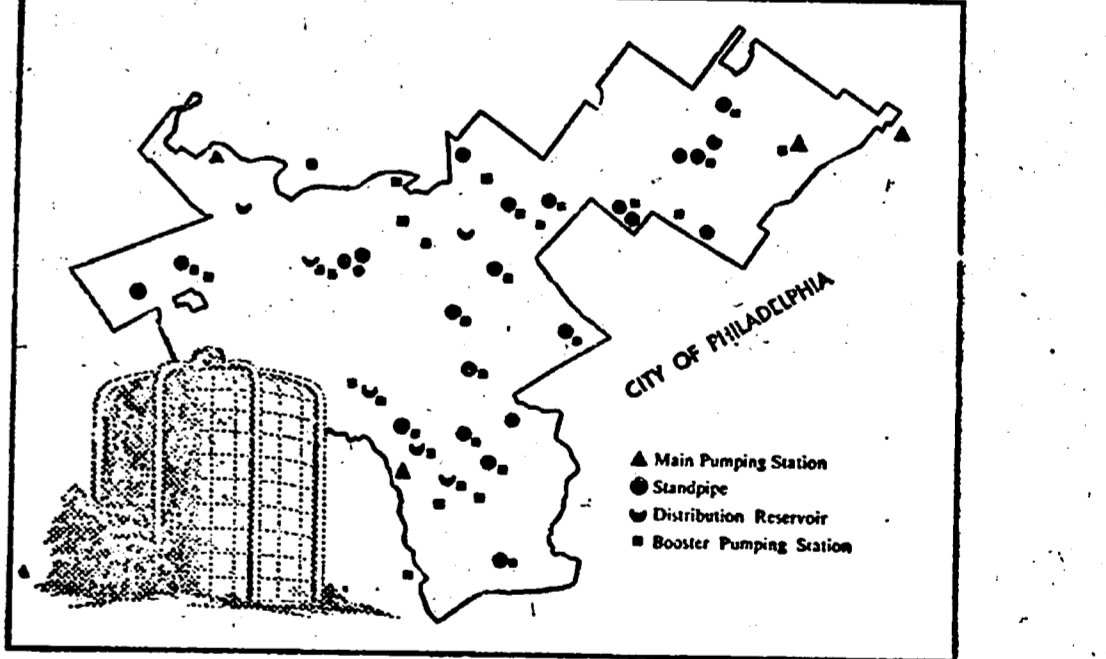

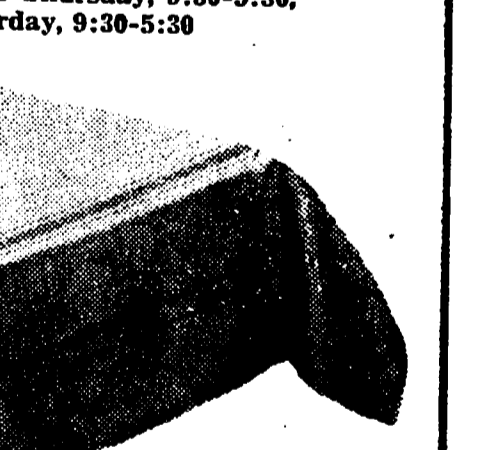

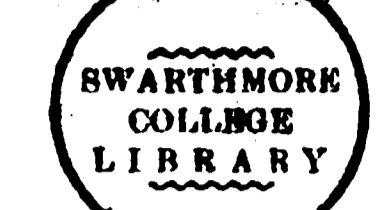

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Planning Commission To Undertake Survey Seek Community Help in Parking, Zoning Problems

The Swarthmore Borough Planning Commission is undertaking two related studies of conditions that are developing in the Borough—the parking problem and the conversion of large homes into several family units.

Virtually every mature American community, and especially those which grew up with the generation of large families and big homes, is showing a considerable activity in converting older homes into multi-family units. Concurrently with this is the growth of the use of the automobile which is creating traffic and parking problems that need current provisions and future planning. Swarthmore is no exception. In fact, it is quite typical of many such situations.

These changes have not always been anticipated by zoning ordinances and other controls that exist for the maintenance and protection of the character of the community. City planners are becoming more and more interested in the question "What is the impact and effect of such a trend upon the community, (Continued on Page 5)

### College Ranks 7th In Engineering Alumni

Swarthmore College, a leading liberal arts college with the smallest accredited engineering school in the United States, ranks seventh among all institutions in the proportion of engineering alumni from all three departments—civil, electrical and mechanical, listed in "Who's Who in Engineering."

The quality of teaching which has made this possible has been greatly assisted by the acquisition, over a decade ago, of a Universal Testing Machine.

The machine—manufactured by the Electronics and Instrumentation Division, Waltham, Mass. of Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton Corporation—does these things for the institution here in Swarthmore:

Offers an unusual opportunity to undergrad engineering students; attracts and keeps top engineering professors on the faculty; provides enough funds to pay all students working on it; promotes industry contacts with resulting grants and gifts; offers surrounding industries the convenience of a testing facility for unusual problems which would otherwise not be available within the immediate area; aids in the placement of graduates.

Installed in June 1947, this Baldwin-Tate-Emery 600,000-pound floor-type tester can make two basic tests—tension and compression—on all types of material—wood, concrete and metal.

Housed in a specially built addition to Beardsley Hall, one of two engineering buildings on the campus, the B-L-H testing machine is ideally located in the center of a building where ample space and facilities allow for component testing of large assemblies.

Prior to the acquisition of the B-L-H tester, Swarthmore engineers had to be content with coupon testing and extrapolation which is not nearly as accurate as data obtainable from full size sections. Coupon testing is the examination of a small section of a much larger assembly, such as a one-foot piece of a steel beam, on a small testing machine. The extension of the test results on this piece are used to predict the characteristics of the entire beam.

The Swarthmore Borough Planning Commission, recognizing this general situation and the immediate Swarthmore circumstances, has had several discussions with the Delaware County Planning Commission, with the result that a cooperative study program has been developed.

This study program assumes Swarthmore to be a typical community and starts with a determination of the facts as they now exist. These facts are to be assembled through a questionnaire and personal conferences with the occupants of Swarthmore properties.

The questionnaire forms and approach has been conceived as a sort of trial run that may later be applied to the other parts of the county.

The good offices and public spirit of the League of Women Voters of Swarthmore is making this study possible, as many of their members will be among those making the personal calls and contacts. This is a large task—one that deserves the cooperation and appreciation of every person in the community.

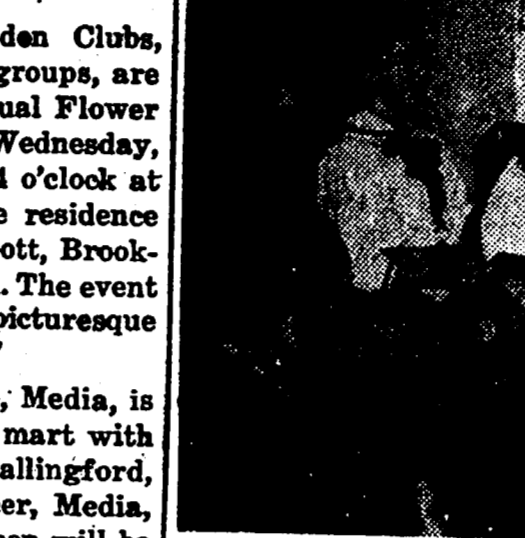

The Swarthmore Borough Planning Commission, recognizing this general situation and the immediate Swarthmore circumstances, has had several discussions with the Delaware County Planning Commission, with the result that a cooperative study program has been developed.

This study program assumes Swarthmore to be a typical community and starts with a determination of the facts as they now exist. These facts are to be assembled through a questionnaire and personal conferences with the occupants of Swarthmore properties. The questionnaire form and approach has been conceived as a sort of trial run that may later be applied to the other parts of the county.

The good offices and public spirit of the League of Women Voters of Swarthmore is making this study possible, as many of their members will be among those making the personal calls and contacts. This is a large task—one that deserves the cooperation and appreciation of every person in the community.

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### Airport Bus to Come, Railroad Signs to Go

Council to Require Requests 10 Days Before Sessions

Permission for the Suburban Airport Transportation Company to operate a service through Swarthmore connecting Wayne to the Southwest Airport was granted by Borough Council in regular session Monday evening. The Volkswagen to be used will travel Chester road to Yale avenue, Yale avenue to Swarthmore avenue, and Swarthmore avenue to Ridley Park.

Council decided to write to the Pennsylvania Railroad notifying it that if the railroad did not remove advertising signs, recently erected on the platform and visible from the street, the Borough would remove them since they violate local ordinance. The railroad will also be requested to place an unbreakable light in the Princeton avenue pedestrian underpass so that the present almost-nightly blackout will no longer endanger users of the route.

Consideration of a request for permission to build a dental office on a 50-foot lot adjoining the Pusco garage on South Chester road had to be postponed since it was received late. However it triggered a new ruling that all requests must be submitted at least 10 days in advance in order to qualify for consideration at the subsequent meeting.

The public safety committee's recommendation that Rutgers avenue be made one way going north, between Strath Haven and Yale avenues, at all times beginning next September was accepted, and the solicitor instructed to prepare an enabling ordinance.

It was decided to advertise for bids for 10,000 feet of street resurfacing, and to place the auditor's report, accepted at this meeting, on public view.

Clayton Taylor was granted permission to erect a fence at his 315 Rutgers avenue property providing it was set back 25 feet from the center of the road.

The Borough's inquiry as to whether Springfield Township contemplated acquiring the Morrow Quarry for a dump brought a reply that it didn't know whether it would or not at the moment, but at any rate it would not be interested in the Quarry before September 1959 and it would notify Swarthmore at any time it might be considering same. J. Roy Carroll was elected president pro tem for the April and May meetings while President Birney K. Morse is in Europe.

of new materials and insurance takes a 20 per cent allowance for the depreciated state of the former structure the amount actually proposed to be paid by the insurance company would be \$160,000. This it would seem the District would have a \$40,000 bill just to replace outmoded facilities.

George Ewing Company, architects for the Board, presented three rough alternatives: rebuilding as was, with wood, substandard lighting and old stair well for \$203,000; rebuilding the same 29,000 square feet with fireproof steel or reinforced concrete, improved lighting and exit for \$406,000; or adding another 6,000 square feet to create five more classrooms than in the past and bring space and function up to modern minimum requirements for \$660,000.

Howell Lewis Shay, Jr., architect for the elementary project at Rutgers avenue, was authorized to add a \$250 incinerator to his plans for a kitchen addition to the present multi-purpose room, and to advertise for bids to be received May 14 so that the facility will be ready next fall along with the new annex of rooms. Among the many wisps of thoughts aired at the meeting was one which might use the annex for junior high pupils next year, if Trinity Church could continue to house the former College Avenue elementary group for which it is being built, and thereby the upper schools could go back on normal full-day sessions while awaiting reconstruction of their own complete plant.

Great Sebastians Make Gay Comedy for Players

Players Club audiences are having a gay old time this week with the club's current production "The Great Sebastians," in closing performances tonight and tomorrow at the little theatre on Fairview road. It's a Lindsay and Crouse comedy (practically a guarantee of fun in itself), and under the direction of Ned Pyle who presents a top flight cast to tell the story of a mind-reading team playing Prague just after the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia.

Emma Reynolds and James Feight share the title role—and the burden—of this very amusing comedy of political innocence caught in a Russian bid for power. The play by the authors' design "belongs" to the Sebastians, and both Mrs. Reynolds and Mr. Feight make the most of it. On stage the majority of the time, and usually the main focal point, they carry their chores with considerable skill and aplomb.

Paul Birkahn, well known to the club for previous performances, portrays the humorless and quietly desperate General Zandek with a conviction that bespeaks his ability. 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Subcommittee Reports Study on Science, Math Courses in SHS

At the regular meeting of the Curriculum Advisory Committee to Swarthmore-Rutledge schools April 10 the report of the sub-committee on mathematics and science was presented by Co-chairmen Samuel Gurin and David Rosen. This is the first of several sub-committee reports on specific subjects to be made before the advisory committee. While the report was approved in principle, no action on any report will be taken until all are completed.

The committee, besides Gurin and Rosen, included Dr. J. Alfred Calhoun, Gilbert P. Haight, Jr., Dr. Wallace W. McCrory, and George W. Patterson. In the report submitted for presentation to the school directors they listed these major recommendations for junior high: 1. Algebra should be introduced in the eighth grade for students capable of handling the subject, and continuation of the course through the ninth grade; 2. general science now taught in seventh and eighth grades should be directed primarily toward preparation for biology, physics and chemistry and would involve some laboratory experience; 3. biology should be required for all students in ninth grade; 4. that there be no separate course given in health education but that it be incorporated into the science program.

Suggestions for Senior High Chief recommendations for the senior high are: 1. That tenth grade plane geometry be fortified with elementary analytical geometry, that the 11th grade emphasize advanced algebra and include some trigonometry, and that the senior courses in trigonometry and solid geometry be enlarged, thus allowing time for advanced mathematics courses like calculus and modern algebra; 2. that physics and chemistry be given in tenth and 11th grades in seven periods per week instead of five. The seven periods are essential in order to include adequate laboratory work which at the present time is totally inadequate; 3. that courses in advanced biology and advanced physical science be given as electives in the 12th grade.

These recommendations were made after the committee fully investigated with the high school faculty the possibilities of extra hours and other problems of schedule planning. The committee stressed that this program was planned with the interest of all students in mind, but made flexible enough for the gifted and interested ones to forge ahead. Reports Accelerated Since the fire damage will necessitate rebuilding of the school, the advisory committee is accelerating its work in order that recommended curriculum changes can be considered in the eventual architectural plans of the school. Harry Oppenlander, co-chairman of the committee, expressed the hope that

renovation can be in terms of the education program. While no specific recommendations were made by the committee the consensus of opinion was that expansion was necessary. Samuel Carpenter, member of the school board and chairman of the property committee, presented the various alternative aid options that now face the board and the lay committee in view of the fire damage. He asked the committee to consider sizes of classes in its reports since this has a direct effect on number of classrooms needed. He pointed out that size of classes has a direct bearing on effectiveness of teaching and implementation of a revised curriculum.

Sub-Committee Named The committee made plans to meet again in two weeks to hear the reports of the language and social studies committees. Mrs. Robert Brodhead, chairman of the English sub-committee, announced the following members: Dr. Robert Spiller, American civilization professor, University of Pennsylvania; Dr. David Cowden, professor of English at Swarthmore College; Anne Abernathy, Haverford Township High School, teacher of English, and Elma Peck, Ridley Park High School librarian.

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School to Ask Voter Approval of Bond Issue \$100,000 Primary Referendum Would Aid in H.S. Rebuilding

School Board in special session at 10 p.m. Wednesday passed a resolution to seek the electorate's approval of a \$100,000 general obligation bond issue toward rebuilding the high school burned on Easter night. Today is the deadline for placing such referendums on the ballot for the May 20 primary election.

By law the Board can only borrow up to two per cent of local assessed valuation without the consent of the voters at large. This means about \$160,000 of the District's current \$260,000 borrowing capacity can be negotiated as is. Gaining permission of the electorate to use the remainder will put the Board in a position to utilize its entire worth if it should decide to do so, in overcoming the present emergency.

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Plans for New \$1.8 Million College Science Bldg. Call for '59 Completion

Plans for Swarthmore College's new Science Building were made public today by Courtney Smith, president, after recent approval by the Board of Managers.

The building is made possible by a \$1.8 million grant last December from the Longwood Foundation, a nonprofit corporation endowed by the late Pierre S. du Pont. It will be built next to the present biological sciences and engineering buildings on the site of the old football field and will accommodate the chemistry, physics, and mathematics departments.

The design of the science building by architect Vincent G. Kling features four distinct units organized around a central open courtyard. Both physics and chemistry studies have their own two-story rectangular units, complete with laboratories, classrooms, and faculty offices. A square one-story unit will provide a reading room and stacks for a science adjunct to the main library. The link between this and the chemistry unit will house mathematic offices. A 200-seat lecture hall, with adjacent rooms for the preparation of demonstrations, completes the building complex.

In speaking of the plans, President Smith said that "The new building, as conceived by Mr. Kling, makes it possible for each of the three departments involved to have the kind of space, equipment and exposure best suited to its own needs. Present laboratory facilities that are taxed to capacity will be replaced with those which will provide some leeway for fluctuations in the number of majors in chemistry and physics each year. Independent faculty research will be encouraged by the provision (Continued on Page 4)

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**Collego Senior Wins 2-Year Scholarship**  
Rob't Greenawalt Receives Keasbey Foundation Award

Scholar, athlete, and campus leader, Robert Kent Greenawalt, a senior at Swarthmore College, has been awarded a two-year Keasbey Foundation scholarship to New College, Oxford University, England. He is one of two college seniors throughout the United States to receive the award this year and the second Swarthmore graduate of the previous six recipients chosen for the awards since they were initiated in 1955 by Miss Marguerite A. Keasbey of Morristown, N.J., in memory of her parents, Henry Griffith Keasbey and Anna Griffith Keasbey. Richard T. Burdick, who was graduated from Swarthmore College in 1956, studied at New College, Oxford, for two years and is now a student at Harvard Medical School.

While maintaining an outstanding academic record, 21 year old Greenawalt has exercised a major influence on almost every phase of campus life. As a junior, he was president of the Student Council. As a senior, he is president of his fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi, and his classmates elected him permanent president of the class of '58. An officer of the National and International Affairs Committee, and a proctor for two years in the men's dormitory, he was also in charge of planning Freshmen Orientation this fall.

A starting guard on the varsity five since his sophomore year in college, co-captain Greenawalt received regional recognition for his skill on the basketball court when he was named to the all star first team of the southern division of the Middle Atlantic States Conference at the end of the basketball season and earlier when he was tapped for the weekly All-East small college team of the Eastern College Athletic Conference for his play-making as well as for his scoring and rebounding. Although Greenawalt did not play organized basketball at Seaside High School in New York, from where he was graduated in 1954, after one year with the Swarthmore JV's he was advanced to the varsity squad and by the end of his junior year he rated among the nation's top free throw artists and earned a position on the all-league first team. Although his major contribution in athletics has been in basketball, he also earned varsity letters in cross country and was a member of the JV lacrosse team.

Greenawalt, who is combining a major in political science with minors in economics and religion in the Swarthmore Honors program, wishes eventually to obtain a law degree, and says he probably will study jurisprudence at Oxford. Now, however, one of his chief interests is religion, for "to understand how to do things, you have to understand why you do them," he reasoned, and in addition to his academic work with philosophical and religious questions, he chose to spend the summer at the end of his junior year doing volunteer work in the East Harlem Protestant Parish with 14 and 15-year old boys.

(Continued from Page 1) private laboratory spaces adjoining faculty offices, many of which are grouped around the courtyard. The courtyard and entrance colonnade will be inviting spaces for informal student-faculty interchange.

The low, sprawling form of the building marks a distinct departure from the pattern of existing campus structures. Dr. Smith called it, nevertheless, "a welcome change," adding: "We have never been bound here to an architectural style; we are bound only to a habit of honest inquiry and forward thinking."

The outside wall material for the building, which will be of concrete beam and slab construction, is expected to be related to its stone neighbors. Glass will be used generously for laboratory walls, most of which enjoy north light. A modular arrangement of structure and equipment will permit easy relocation of laboratory benches and walls to adapt to future needs. All benches will be served by variable voltage (AC and DC) current, in addition to other special utilities.

The science building will be erected by the Turner Construction Company. Allabach and Rennis are consulting structural engineers, and Pennell and Wiltberger are consulting mechanical engineers. Completion is expected by the early fall of 1959.

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**SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE OFFERS ADVICE TO HOUSEHOLDERS ON DOMESTIC HELP REPORTS**

The Chester social security office today reported that some householders are not reporting the wages of their household domestic help under social security as required by law.

According to Herbert W. Gruber, district manager of the Chester office, certain applicants for social security benefits, based on domestic work in private households, are finding their employers have failed to record their cash wages with the Social Security Administration.

Nearly all domestic employees are now covered by social security. Gruber pointed out that the legal requirement to report the wages of household employees and to remit the social security tax on those wages rests directly upon the employer. The employer who fails to do this is liable for the delinquent taxes on these wages, plus a penalty for failure to report at the proper time.

Where domestic work is performed in non-farm homes, the employer is required to make a report of the employee's wages at the end of each

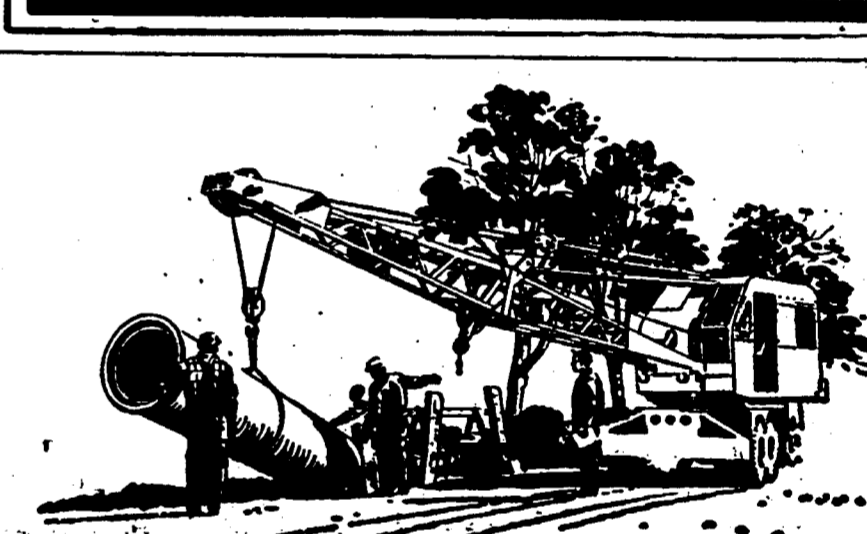

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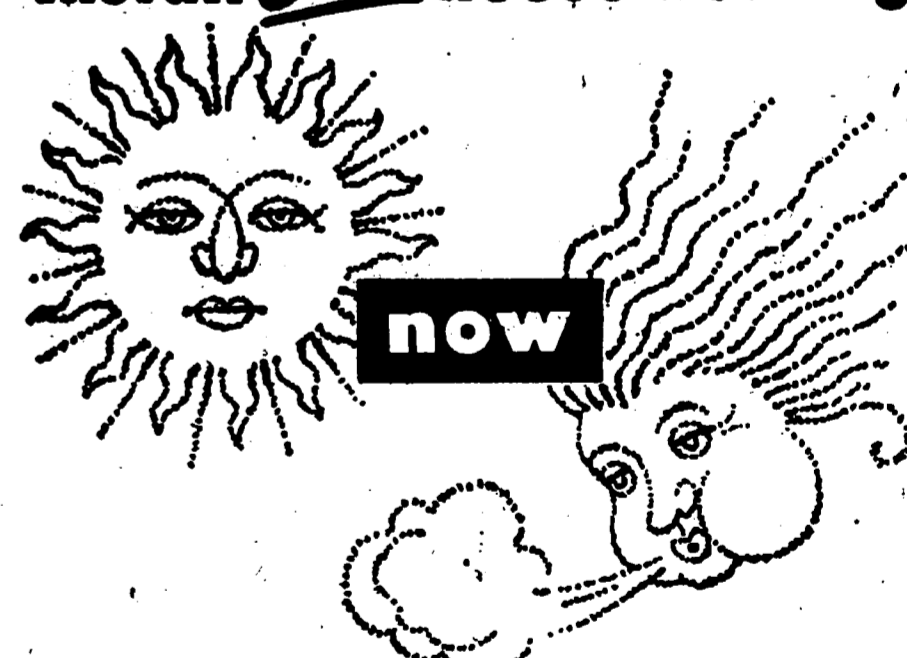
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**College to Present  
Concert Sunday Night  
8:15 Program to Feature  
Compositions of  
Alfred Swan**

A concert of compositions by Alfred J. Swan, professor of music and chairman of the department of music, Swarthmore College, will be presented by the department of music and the College Chorus on Sunday evening, at 8:15 in the Meeting House. The concert is free and open to the public without ticket.

The concert will open with a performance of the Quartet for Flute and Strings in D, by Victor Ludwig, 59, flute; Hidetaro Suzuki, violin; James Fawcett, viola, and Noel Snyder '61, cello. This work was written for Rene LeRoy and the Pasquier Trio and the first movement was played by them in Clothier Memorial Hall at a concert on January 19, 1939. The first complete performance was given by LeRoy and the members of the Belgian Quartet on January 17, 1941.

**PATTERSON'S  
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Professor Ralph Fox, Swarthmore '32, from Princeton University, will perform a group of piano works. Professor James D. Sorber, accompanied by Clifford Earle, Jr. '67, will sing a group of songs, and the piano duet of Clifford Earle and Elizabeth Hornann '59 will play the "Christmas Game." The concert will close with the "Song of Glorification and Thanksgiving" performed by the Swarthmore College Chorus, Peter Gram Swing, conductor. This work was written especially for the Swarthmore College Chorus for its first festival of contemporary choral music in May 1956.

Alfred J. Swan received his musical training as a composer at the St. Petersburg Conservatory of Music. His compositions include four piano sonatas, four string quartets, choral works, songs and shorter piano works. He has also published a collection of Russian folk songs. His career at Swarthmore includes distinguished service as a conductor, noteworthy performances including operas by Rimsky-Korsakoff and Ralph Vaughan-Williams, and the St. Theresa Mass of Joseph Haydn. Professor Swan is a scholar of international fame in the field of Russian music, contributing articles to such publications as Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians, the New Oxford History of Music and the Musical Quarterly.

The Hill Burton Fund will account for another million to bring the total to three and a half million of the four million plus needed to build a 150-bed (expandable to a 350-bed) hospital.

This hospital, Mr. McCafferty continued, will have the best of laboratory equipment, operating and delivery rooms, hospital staff, research and a geriatric center.

The balance of \$700,000 can be obtained by private philanthropy, foundation, or even public subscriptions of 12,000 families at \$1 a month for five years. The approval of the project by a majority of the 35 Delaware County organizations and service clubs that Mr. McCafferty will visit, would make this hospital the medical center of the east.
