 AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A POLICE PENSION FUND TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF PENNSYLVANIA, PARTICULARLY ACT NO. 490 OF 1955, THE AMENDMENTS AND SUPPLEMENTS PROVIDING THE NECESSARY APPROPRIATIONS FOR SAME, AND TRANSFERRING THERETO THE ASSETS AND LIABILITIES OF THE POLICE PENSION FUND CREATED BY ORDINANCE NO. 568, APPROVED SEPTEMBER 1, 1955.

**THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE HEREBY ORDAINS:**  
**SECTION 1.** For the purposes set forth in Act No. 490 of 1955, as amended, and pursuant to powers conferred by the statutes of Pennsylvania, the Borough of Swarthmore hereby establishes, as of January 1, 1958, a Police Pension Fund for the benefit of the members of its police force as now and hereafter constituted. The same shall be under the direction of the Swarthmore Borough Council as from time to time duly constituted.  
**SECTION 2.** Each regular police officer who has served as a police officer of this Borough for twenty (20) years, and who has attained the age of sixty (60) years, shall be eligible to retire from active duty, and to receive a monthly pension or retirement benefit equivalent to one-half the monthly average salary of such officer during the last sixty (60) months of his employment, computed as provided in said Act.

**SECTION 3.** Retirement at an age and after years of service other than prescribed in Section 2 of this Ordinance, but not inconsistent with the said Act, may be permitted by Borough Council, upon terms mutually agreeable to the Borough and such officer.  
**SECTION 4.** The Borough of Swarthmore shall make an initial appropriation and thereafter annual or other appropriations of amounts which, with other sums and benefits becoming available under the laws of the Commonwealth, gifts, Social Security benefits, and the contributions of the police officers, shall be sufficient to provide the benefits specified by this Ordinance and the said Acts of Assembly. Sums becoming available from gifts or other sources shall be applied against the municipal portion of the future service cost.  
**SECTION 5.** Each member of the police force shall contribute to the said fund in accordance with said Act, and as determined from time to time by Borough Council. Said contributions shall be not less than five (5%) per cent nor more than eight (8%) per cent of his current monthly compensation, provided that, with respect to that portion of his monthly compensation on which social security allowances are payable the minimum contribution of the officer shall be two (2%) per cent and with respect to his monthly compensation in excess of that on which social security allowances are payable the minimum contribution of the officer shall be five (5%) per cent. Upon termination of employment prior to retirement, such contributions shall be returned to the officer, without interest.  
**SECTION 6.** The finance committee of Borough Council, pursuant to such professional advice as it may be authorized to employ, shall compute the amount of appropriations to be made by the Borough from time to time to carry out the purposes of this Ordinance and to conform to all legal requirements. This Ordinance and the plan of pensions herein provided for may be amended or supplemented from time to time, in accordance with law, but no person who becomes entitled to receive or benefit therefrom shall be deprived of his right to an equal proportionate share therein upon the basis upon which he first became entitled thereto.  
**SECTION 7.** Any Ordinance or part thereof conflicting with the terms of this Ordinance shall be, and the same is hereby, repealed insofar as the same affects this Ordinance. The assets and liabilities of the Police Pension Fund, established pursuant to Ordinance No. 555, approved September 1, 1955, shall be transferred to the fund established under this Ordinance, in accordance with Section 7 of Act No. 505, approved May 29, 1956. The benefits herein provided for the officers covered by the old fund, being substantially greater than the benefits heretofore accruing to them under the old fund, are intended to be in complete substitution therefor, except that, upon termination of employment prior to retirement, all amounts heretofore contributed by such officer shall be returned to him as provided in Section 11 of said Ordinance No. 555, together with all contributions made by him under Section 5 of this Ordinance.

Let us have faith in the strength of freedom and the power of righteousness. This new approach would involve enormous risks. But they are not as great as those involved in continuing to balance on the knife edge of terror. Recognizing man's capacity for evil, we must seek to reinforce his God-given capacity for good.

**WE COULD:**

1. Cancel our nuclear weapons tests because they are burring us now and warping the bodies of our grandchildren and because our souls are betrayed when we use our minds to plan the destruction of God's creation.
2. Start disarmament—by steps WE can take because there will be no real peace without world disarmament, and no disarmament unless some nation starts and because it is wrong to prepare to kill other men.
3. Share our resources more fully because helping people help themselves is a genuine answer to the appeal of Communism and because it is wrong to keep so much when two-thirds of the world is sick and hungry.
4. Consider the problems of men more important than the promotion of alliances because a solution to Algeria is more important than NATO; settling refugees in the Middle East is more important than sending arms; and because we are men and we know that men should live in peace and love one another.
5. Strengthen the United Nations as an inclusive and responsible agency for peace because nations in conflict need a common meeting ground and because mankind is indivisible.
6. Seek ways to bring men together across iron and bamboo curtains because everyone would gain from commercial, scientific, cultural and religious contacts and because the major foes of understanding are ignorance and bigotry.

### Social Security Notes

Those clergymen who did not file waiver certificates before April 15, 1957, and lost their right to elect coverage as self-employed persons under the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program now have another chance, it was announced this week by Herbert W. Gruber, district manager of social security office in Chester.

An amendment to the Internal Revenue Code which President Eisenhower signed into law on August 30, 1957, gives them an extended period of two more years (in general, through April 15, 1959) to obtain old-age, survivors, and disability protection for themselves and their families.

Ministers who file waivers during this extended period, Mr. Gruber said, will be mandatorily covered for 1958 and subsequent years for which they have net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more, including earnings from the pursuit of their ministry. It is also necessary, of course, that timely tax returns, including Schedule C, Profit (or Loss) From Business or Profession, be filed. In addition, any minister who filed a waiver before August 31, 1957, but who filed it too late to obtain coverage for 1958 by filing a supplemental waiver during the extended period. The law does not permit ministers to elect coverage retroactively for 1955.

Mr. Gruber added that the new law also provides that ministers will now include as net earnings for social security purposes, (1) the rental value of a parsonage or rental allowance furnished them as part of their compensation and (2) the value of meals and lodging furnished them for the convenience of their employer. This provision is effective for taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1957 except that, for the purpose of the retirement test under old-age and survivors insurance, it becomes effective with taxable years beginning after August, 1957.

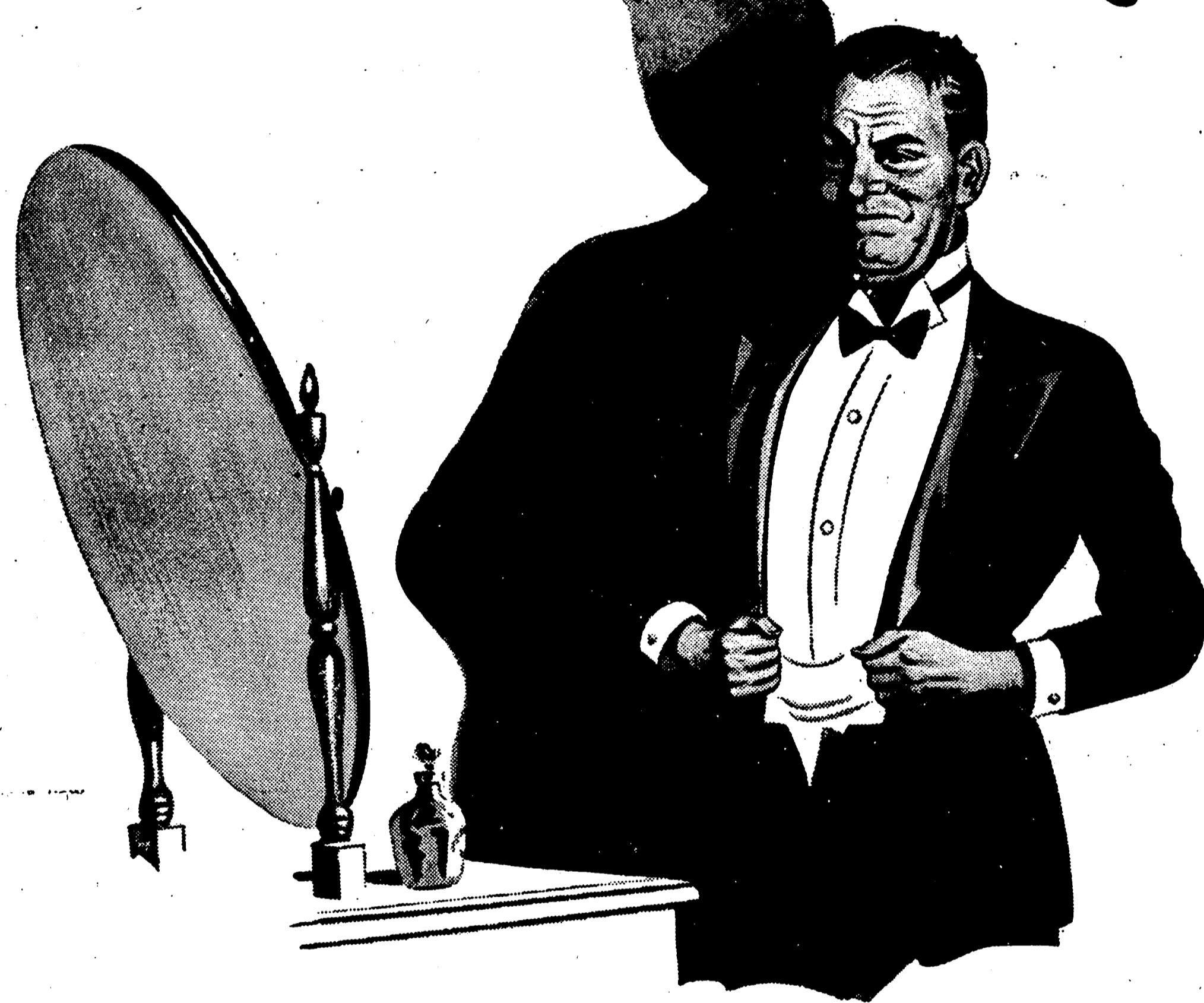

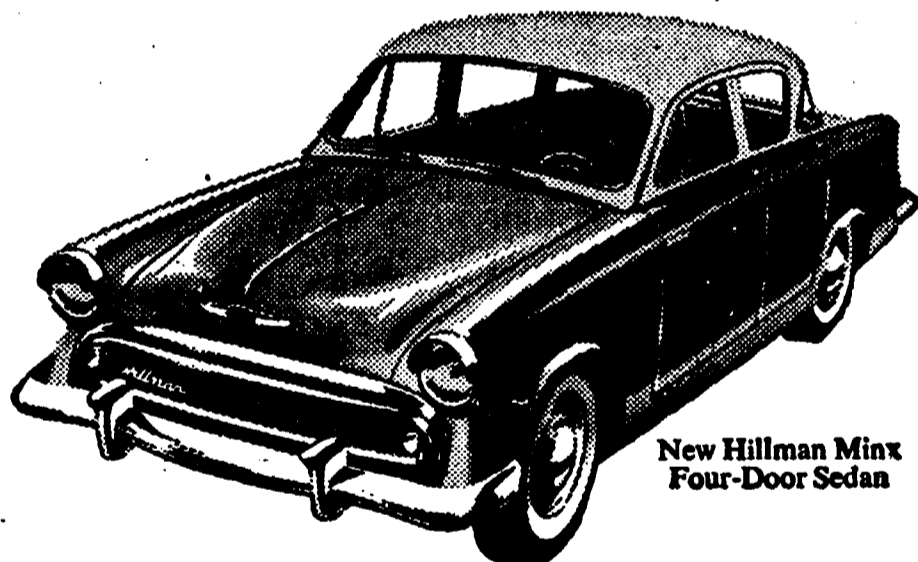

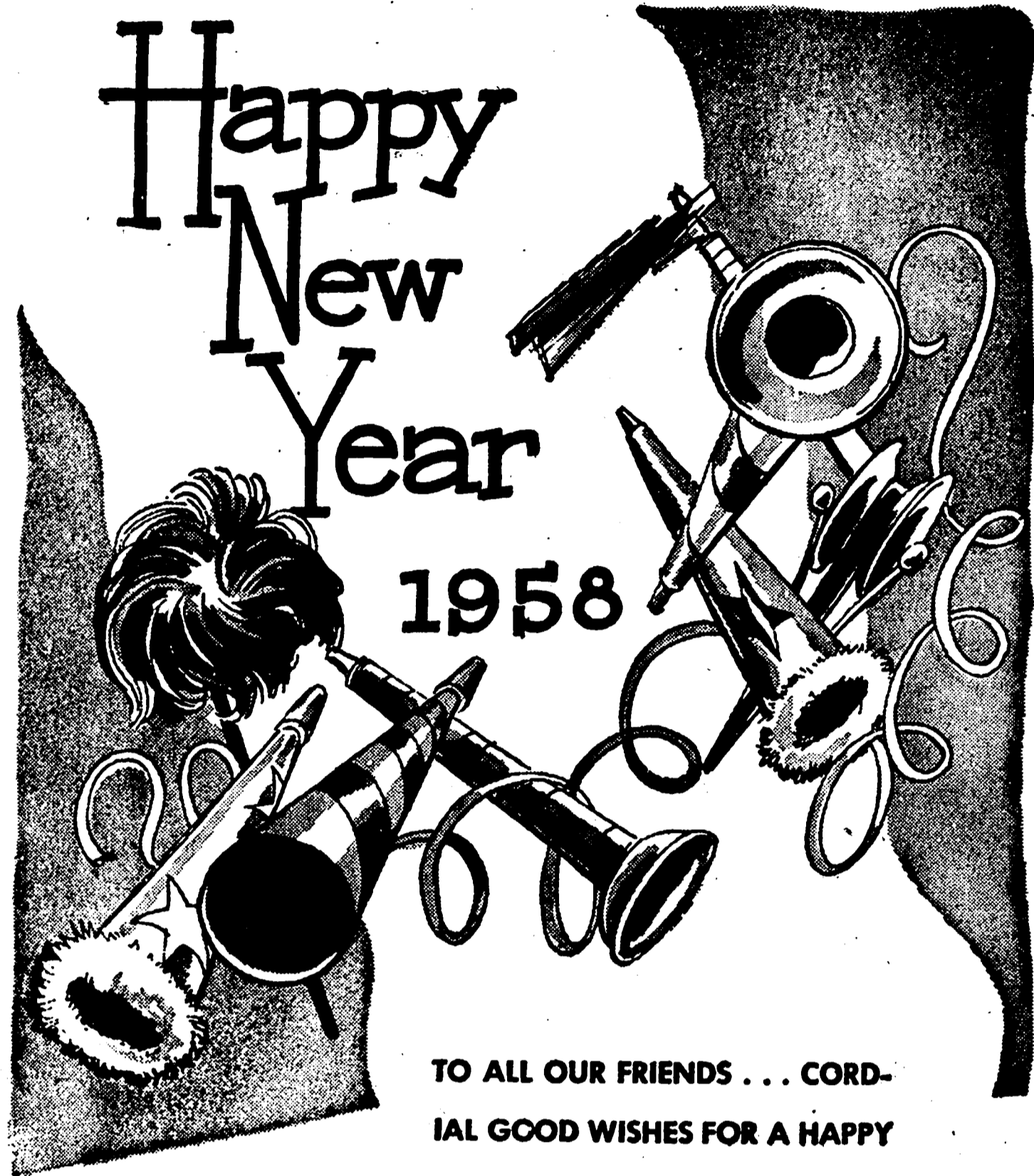
