For Christmas Mails

Postmaster Charles H. Grier said this week, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post Office facilities have been expanded, extra help will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Swarthmore this year."

The Postmaster suggested that special care be taken in preparing gift packages for the mails—all addresses should be legible and

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them", the Postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where packages are

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrap-

Another good idea is to place tape over the address portion of th label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipients full name, street ad-

dress, city, zone and state. Postmaster Grier says that if you follow these three simple rules, you are certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: Wrap them securely. address them correctly, and mail

BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE NO. 592 AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A POLICE PENSION FUND TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE IN ACCORD-ANCE WITH THE LAWS OF PENN. SYLVANIA, PARTICULARLY ACT NO. 600 OF 1956, ITS AMENDMENTS AND SUPPLEMENTS, PROVIDING THE NECESSARY APPROPRIA-TIONS FOR SAME, AND TRANS-FERRING THERETO THE ASSETS AND LIABILITIES OF THE POLICE PENSION FUND CREATED BY ORDINANCE NO. 558, APPROVED SEPTEMBER 1, 1953.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE HEREBY ORDAINS:

The same shall be under the direction of the Swarthmore Borough Council as from

SECTION 2. Each regular police officer who has served as a police officer of this Borough for twenty (20) years, and who men of the committee. SECTION 3. Retirement at an age and after years of service other than prescribed in Section 2 of this Ordinance, but not inconsistent with the said Act, may be permitted by Borough Council, upon terms mutually agreeable to the Borough and such officer.

SECTION 4. The Borough of Swarth-more shall make an initial appropriation and thereafter annual or other appropriations of amounts which, with other sums and benefits becoming available under the laws of the Commonwealth, gifts, Social Security benefits, and the contributions of the police officers, shall be sufficient to provide, the benefits specified by this Ordinance and the said Acts of Assembly, Sums becoming available force wife. Sums becoming available from gifts or other sources shall be applied against the municipal portion of the future service

SECTION 5. Each member of the police force shall contribute to the said fund in accordance with said Act. and as determined from time to time by Borough Council. Said contributions shall be not less than five (5%) per cent nor more than eight (8%) per cent of his current month-ly compensation, provided that, with respect to that portion of his monthly comances are or may be payable, the minimum contribution of the officer shall be two (2%) per cent, and with respect to his monthly compensation in excess of that on which social security allowances are termination of employment prior to re-tirement, such contributions shall be re-turned to the officer, without interest.

SECTION 6. The finance committee of Borough Council, pursuant to such professional advice as it may be authorized to employ, shall compute the amount of apposes of this Ordinance and to conform to all legal requirements. 





Gives Gift of \$1,800,000

Henry B. du Pont, president of The Longwood Foundation, Inc., located in Wilmington, Del., announced today a gift by the Foundation of \$1,800,000 to Swarthmore College, for the construction and-equipping of a new science building. The new building will house the departments of chemistry physics, and mathematics.

President Courtney Smith of Swarthmore expressed the gratitude of the college for the magnificent gift of the Foundation. "The College has had no new buildings for Chemistry or Physics since 1904," he said, "and the situation has now become critical if we are to maintain the quality of our scientific teaching and research."

The new building will be designed by the firm of Vincent G. Kling in Philadelphia to incorporate a common lecture hall and library for the three disciplines together with separate laboratory space, small seminar rooms, and faculty offices.
